9-Point Resolution Passed at Texas Safety Meeting

More than 160 traffic leaders from all parts of Texas approved a 9-point resolution calling for increased and improved traffic regulations at the close of the first annual conference of Governor Price Daniel's Highway Safety Commission. The meeting was held Monday, Nov. 24, in the Chamber of the House of Representatives in the State Capitol at Austin.

Governor Daniel presided at both morning and afternoon sessions, and Governor and Mrs. Daniel were hosts at a noon luncheon at the Commodore Hotel.

Delegates to the conference represented every section of the State, and during a question-and-answer session which closed the meeting, brought up numerous questions concerning traffic laws, regulations and proposed legislation.

The Conference Resolutions Committee was headed by John H. Winters of Austin, Commissioner of the Texas Department of Public Welfare and member of the Texas Traffic Safety Council. Other members included Mrs. J. Howard Hodge of Midland, R. V. Converse of Spearman, Gordon H. Fisher of Sinton, Artie P. Stephens of Sulphur Springs, Bill Stinson of Mineral Wells and Mayor R. C. Gusman of Bay City.

The resolutions approved by the state-wide group included the following:

1. That the Legislature be urged to provide funds for driver education teachers in public schools and that, in the meantime, the Texas Education Agency urge all schools to increase present driver education and traffic safety programs.

2. That the Legislature be urged to pass an enabling act allowing counties to create traffic courts of record if they so desired.

3. That the Legislature be urged to enact a law allowing police officers to use medically-accepted chemical tests in traffic cases involving driving while drinking.

4. That the Legislature be urged to strengthen the Texas drivers' license law to bring it into conformity with the national Uniform Vehicle Code.

5. That the Legislature be urged to adopt the Uniform Vehicle Code in order to remove any possible doubt about constitutionality of the present traffic law.

6. That the Legislature be urged to increase salaries for the Texas Highway Patrol, that its strength be increased by 100 men per year until it has 1,600 officers, and that other personnel be increased to minimum standards.

7. That the Texas Highway Department be urged to increase the number of warning signs at

Declaration of Human Rights 10 Years Old Wed.

Ten years ago, December 10, 1948, the General Assembly of the United Nations meeting in Paris, adopted The Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

The principles of this Declaration have come from the need of a world in which the basic freedom of man could be secure. Franklin D. Roosevelt presented these simple concepts to Congress on January 6, 1941, and they were the basis of talks between he and Prime Minister Churchill, when they drew up the Atlantic Charter.

In the final draft of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights there are thirty articles, but in principle they are:

1. "The First is freedom of speech and expression — everywhere in the world.
2. The second is freedom of every person to worship God in his own way — everywhere in the world.
3. The third is freedom from want — everywhere in the world.
4. The fourth is freedom from fear — anywhere in the world."

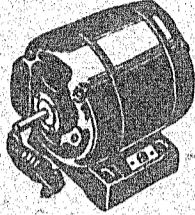

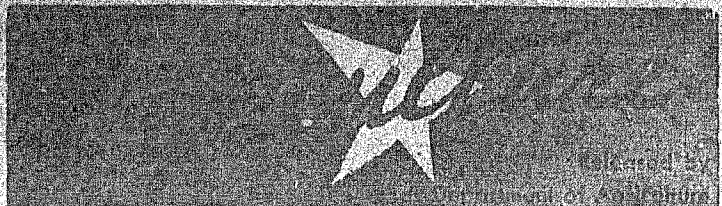

FOOD FADS EXPLODED

A nationwide educational campaign to alert the public to what is estimated as the "Billion Dollar Food Faddist Racket" has been launched by the American Medical Association, the Federal Food and Drug Administration and the National Better Business Bureau. State and county medical societies are taking the lead in carrying out

the campaign at local levels.

The campaign is aimed at nutritional quacks who operate through an appeal to fear and lure the unwary into buying their products by advancing myths such as: (1) all disease may be due to diet; (2) soil depletion causes malnutrition, and (3) all modern foods are low in nutrients.

At least 50,000 door-to-door vendors and "health" lecturers are selling a variety of "worthless" products to a gullible public, say the sponsoring organizations. Oliver Field, director of the American Medical Association's Bureau of Investigation, warns that food supplement sales men, using a "you are what you eat" pitch are selling at high costs their inexpensive-to-produce and ineffective combinations of peppermint tea, herbs, vegetables, vitamins and minerals.

Absurd health claims, Field says, are made for everything from sea kelp to irradiated peat moss. While the products themselves usually are harmless, great harm can result if the sales man leads the purchaser to believe they have the power to cure disease — causing needed medical care to be postponed.

PRACTICE MAKES GOOD DRIVERS

Austin. — Technique in driving, as in any field of activity, is developed to the point of perfection only after much practice and experience, it was declared today by J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association.

"The stars in sports, music and on stage did not develop their talents overnight," he said. "Neither does a driver become a real pro at the wheel without knowing the rules of safe driving and following them

According to Dr. Kenneth Milstead, Food & Drug Administration Official, the food faddist "threatens the lives as well as the pocketbooks of our people". He adds that despite the high educational level of the American people, quackery and spurious schemes still thrive in all parts of the United States.

"The food faddist makes the old-time medicine man a small-time operator", says Dr. Milstead.

The American Medical Association points out in a pamphlet that nutritional foods are available for Americans in abundance. "There are no shortcuts to health", say authorities. "An adequate daily menu is the best road to health and should include (1) milk and dairy products, (2) vegetables and fruits, (3) meat, fowl, fish or eggs, and (4) bread and cereals.

The safety official called attention of Texas motorists to the five fundamental tips for safe driving during winter months:

1. **IT'S UP TO YOU.** You know that driving conditions are less favorable during the winter. It's up to you to winterize your car, to winterize your driving techniques — and to winterize your determination to avoid accidents.

2. **KEEP WINDSHIELD AND WINDOWS CLEAR.** Be sure that your wiper blades, your heater, and your defroster are operating properly. Clean frost and ice from the windshield and from all windows of your car. Ventilate to keep the inside of your windows from fogging.

3. **GET THE "FEEL" OF THE ROAD.** In order to avoid unintentional sliding or spinning of your wheels, occasionally try your brakes of gently press your accelerator while driving slowly and as traffic and highway conditions permit. Then adjust your speed to road and weather conditions.

4. **FOLLOW AT A SAFE DISTANCE.** Keep well back of the vehicle ahead so that you will have plenty of room to stop. It takes three to twelve times as far to stop on snow and ice as it does on dry pavement. You may find it hard to explain why you couldn't stop when the other fellow did.

5. **PUMP YOUR BRAKES.** The best technique for stopping on slick roads, while maintaining full control of your car, is a fast up-and-down pumping of your

Millions the World Over Tested For TB By New Process

First graders in Texas, infants in South America and millions of people across the world have been tested for tuberculosis infection with a clear, colorless substance, available the world over because of efforts of a woman in Philadelphia.

The substance is Purified Protein Derivative. It is better known as PPD. It is used by doctors to determine whether a person has tuberculosis germs within his body, in short, to determine if "tuberculosis infection" is present.

The woman is Florence B. Seibert, Ph. D., a biochemist who has conducted research in tuberculosis for 26 years at the Henry Phipps Institute, University of Pennsylvania, with the aid of Christmas Seal funds from tuberculosis associations in Texas and the other states.

PPD (tuberculin, when injected under the skin of the arm, causes a reaction in persons who have been infected with tuberculosis germs. This reaction does not necessarily mean a person has active tuberculosis. Further tests would have to show that. But the test shows presence of the germs, and can lead to discovery of the active case of tuberculosis which is giving off the germs and infecting other people.

Tuberculin was first used in crude form by Dr. Robert Koch, discoverer of the germ which causes tuberculosis.

Twenty years ago, Dr. Seibert made a batch of tuberculin which is still used as the standard against which PPD used the world over is tested. The standard product was freeze-dried and stored in laboratories in the U. S. and Europe.

PPD is used by the World Health Organization in tuberculin testing people in Europe, Asia, Africa and South America. The WHO estimates that 270,000 people have been tested with PPD.

Dr. Seibert is now doing research on tuberculosis immunity under a grant from monies raised by sale of Christmas Seals by tuberculosis associations across the U. S.

Mental Attitude Would Change If Opportunity Granted

When an accident has happened, how many times have we wished that we could live those few seconds over again. In most of the cases the accident would not be repeated. The reason is obvious: our mental processes would size up the situation and show us how to proceed safely.

If those few seconds - prior to the accident - could be lived over, one factor would be changed: that of our mental attitude. This one factor could have prevented the tragedy, be it great or small. The hazard might still have existed, but when we stopped for a brief moment of thought to consider the things that might occur, the hazard would have been rendered harmless and we could have remained unhurt.

It is very much like removing a fuse cap from a dynamite charge, the potential destruction of the dynamite is still there, but nothing happens because there is nothing to set it in motion.

So it is with most accidents. According to the Texas Safety Association, most accidents occur when a day-dreamer comes along and rouses them to life. An accident seldom claims a victim without the help of some person who didn't think.

Quail Season Brings Warning On Gun Safety

Austin - With the reminder that quail season begins December 1, comes the warning "Don't become a fenceline fatality," from the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

"Hunters are in for one of the best seasons ever," the director said. "With the abundant cover growth there should be plenty of quail throughout the state."

"Safety afield cannot be stressed too much. It would be a good idea to wear bright red or yellow clothing while hunting. "Guns should not only be unloaded while traveling to the hunting area, but also, as an added precaution, while crossing fences. If hunting alone, lay the gun down along the fence line pointing away from the cross-over spot," he added.

Cripple losses can be reduced in dense grasses by taking a good pointer or retriever dog along.

"Hunters should remember," he concluded, "that shotguns must be plugged for a three-shell capacity." Shotguns may not be larger than 10 gauge.

Egg limit is 12 quails a day and not more than 25 a week, or in possession. Migrating hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

WHAT THE FUTURE HOLDS FOR WEATHER?

Tornadoes like the ones that barreled through the plains last week may be as much a part of folklore as the Indian rain dance in the world of tomorrow.

Robert Zeleny, science editor of The World Book Encyclopedia, says man may take the weather into his own hands some day, and perhaps even determine the climate he will live in.

Here are some of the ideas that may take the guesswork, and the hazards, out of the weather.

The weatherman of the future will bring rain clouds to drought areas, when nature abandons the farmer. Man-made rain will put out the forest fires and replenish water supplies.

Dangerous clouds will be choked off, putting an end to such terrors as tornadoes and hurricanes. Controlled rainfall will prevent floods and soil erosion. And chemical mists will be used to dispel fog over airfields.

Dreaming of a white Christmas won't be just a song, for farmers will sprinkle dye over the ground to absorb sunlight and speed the melting snow to advance the planting season.

Rain-makers have been in business since 1946, when a General Electric scientist breathed into a freezer, added dry ice to chill the water vapor, and created a miniature snowstorm.

Scientists now can produce rain and snow, and even change a drizzle into a downpour, by this process of "seeding" clouds with dry ice.

But changing the climate... or the pattern of temperature, wind, rainfall and sunshine... is a more tricky problem, especially since the changes in one part of the world might affect the weather in another area.

Man has no power over the amount of energy from the sun that falls on the earth, which ultimately controls weather and climate. But he might be able to control the amount of solar energy that the earth retains.

An ambitious weatherman might spread microscopic layers of white matter over Antarctica to capture the sun's rays and transform the frozen continent into rich farmland.

While man tinkers with nature, traveling forecasters in the form of unmanned satellites will circle the globe. They will pick up information with a television camera and relay it to earth.

You won't be able to put the blame on the weatherman if you get caught with your umbrella down. The human forecaster will just set a dial and let an electronic computer worry what kind of a day it will be.



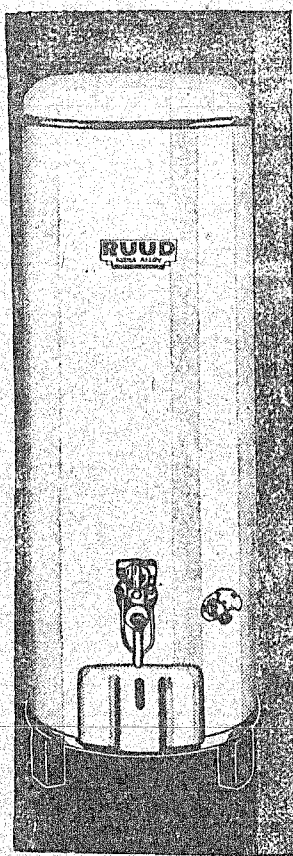

About Your HEALTH

Nature uses many devices to protect us from disease — especially infants. When children are born, there is usually a built in protection from many of the childhood diseases such as measles and mumps.

However, there is one disease, generally associated with children, which takes its toll from earliest infancy. This disease is pertussis (whooping cough).

This year there have been 3,720 cases of pertussis reported to the State Department of Health as of November 15. But many cases of the disease go unreported. So there is no accurate count of the number of times that pertussis strikes during any given year.

We do know that it is a serious disease under the age of four. It may be fatal in over 10 percent of the cases in this age group. In very young infants, however, complications such as pneumonia may occur, and the fatality rate varies between 15 and 30 percent.

Ninety-two percent of all pertussis cases occur in children under age two. Sixty-five percent strikes youngsters under one year of age.

Whooping cough was first described in 1578 by Baillou. The typical symptoms, even as they are today, were outlined. The disease occurred in epidemic form in England during the 17th century.

The disease has a world-wide distribution. Pertussis is a constant threat in larger cities, but occasionally epidemic proportions are attained.

In Scandinavia and Denmark, there is an epidemic every four or five years. However, during the interepidemic years only a few cases are reported.

Whooping cough is generally more prevalent in colder climates than in warm or subtropical climates.

The incubation period of the disease is usually seven days.

Some people contract it up to 10 days, and rarely up to 21 days.

Whooping cough derives its name from the fact that the patient during the early catarrhal and paroxysmal stages coughs spasmodically with a "whoop". The "whoop" is produced by a deep inspiratory breath sucked rapidly over the vocal cords, repeating itself after a few normal breaths.

Pediatricians routinely advise vaccine protection within the first few months of age. Parents who have themselves been victims of the disease in childhood or witnessed whooping cough in other children are usually anxious to try to protect their own children. (A weekly feature of the Public Health Education Division of the Texas State Department of Health.)



QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. When my wife applied for social security benefits she was under 65 years of age and had to take a reduction in her payments. Does the increase in benefits she will receive in January mean that she will no longer have to take the reduction in her payments?

A. No. The law has not changed and it is still necessary that a wife under 65 must take a reduced benefit. The increase she will receive will be about 7 percent of her present amount. No application need be filed to receive this increase.

Q. I applied for disability benefits in 1957. I was turned down because I didn't have enough work under social security. Can I get benefits now?

A. You may, if you meet the work requirements under the 1958 Amendments and your disability is determined to be so severe that you cannot work. You still must have at least five years of work under social security in the 10 years prior to becoming disabled. Under the new law, however, you no longer need to have worked at least a year and a half during the three years just prior to becoming disabled.

Q. I receive old-age retirement benefits and have a chance to work for at least 4 months at \$250 a month. I guess you should stop my benefit checks during those 4 months.

A. If your total earnings in the year are not over \$1200, you can receive your social security benefit checks for all months, including the 4 in which you work.

Q. I must have an operation which will make me unable to work for about 3 months. Can I draw disability payments under social security during that time?

A. No. The law requires that you must have a disability for at least 6 months and that it must be expected to last for a long and indefinite time. If it is temporary disability and can be expected to improve with further medical treatment so that you will be able to work, you cannot qualify.

Helps Suggested In Filing Claims For VA Compensation

Survivors of deceased veterans were offered four suggestions today to assist them in filing claims for Veterans Administration compensation or pension.

Dr. George T. McMahan of the VA Center in Waco, said that adjudication of their claims will be expedited if the survivors follow these suggestions:

1. If the veteran's death certificate does not contain a statement as to the cause of death, it should be accompanied by a certificate from the attending physician, showing dates of treatment and cause of death.
2. A widow filing a claim should furnish a record of her marriage to the veteran. If she or the veteran were previously married she should, if possible, furnish copies of death or divorce certificates to establish that the previous marriages were dissolved.
3. If minor children are among the survivors, birth or baptismal records should be furnished, containing the names of both parents and date of birth. In the case of adopted children, a copy of the court orders should be provided.
4. Dependent parents filing a claim must establish their relationship to the veteran by furnishing VA with a certified copy of the veteran's birth or baptismal certificates containing the names of both parents.

'ELIGIBLE VOTERS' FOR COTTON VOTE DEFINED

College Station — Farmers "eligible to vote" in the upcoming referendum on 1959-crop cotton marketing quotas has been defined by Searcy M. Ferguson, Chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

"The general rule is that anyone who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 is eligible to vote in the December 15 referendum," the Chairman explained. "This, of course, would include all persons — whether owner, operator, tenant, or sharecropper — who had an interest in the 1958 upland cotton crop.

"However, under provisions of law now in effect, the term 'eligible voters' also includes some other persons whose right to vote on cotton quotas may not be so well understood," Ferguson declared.

"For instance, any grower who had a 1958 cotton allotment for his farm but who produced no cotton this year is also eligible to cast a ballot on 1959-crop quotas.

"Likewise, a farmer who placed his 1958 cotton allotment in the Soil Bank is eligible to vote in the December 15 referendum.

Income TAX FAX

Questions and Answers About Your Individual Income Tax Report for 1958, as Presented By The Texas Press Association.

Here is a check list of some of the things that you should do before the first of the year if you want to get the most benefit from the exemptions in the Income Tax laws:

Bad Debts: Be sure you can prove they are bad this year and claim the deduction.

Capital Losses: If you have stock market losses, sell this year to take the loss. Warning — do not repurchase the same or similar stock until at least 31 days after the sale.

Contributions: Pay them to secure the deduction this year. Pledges are not deductible. They must be paid. You can take up to 30% in some circumstances.

Dependents: Be sure you can claim them. If you are not providing over one-half the cost of support, see if you can make an arrangement with the others who are helping with the support.

Alimony: Separation pay-

ments may be deducted by the husband and included by the wife. You may want to catch up on these payments this year.

If your spouse died in 1956 or 1957 chances are you filed a joint return with her for that year. You can compute your tax as though you were filing a joint return for 1958 if you have not remarried and if you have a dependent child or step-child. You may want to recheck your dependency credits on this.

Sales of your business equipment and business buildings: If you have a loss from such a sale you can carry the loss back for two years and forward for five years, or until it is offset by earnings. If you have a loss that you must take, go ahead and sell this year. You can take the loss against 1956 and 1957 income, and if that doesn't cover it all, you can carry it forward to 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963.

Depreciation: You can depreciate new equipment, original in use with you, under several new systems which can produce a depreciation rate twice as fast as the old straight line method.

Capital Gains and Losses: Consider offsetting short-term gains with long-term losses, etc.

Medical Expenses: Pay them all this year to get the deduction.

Dues: Membership dues in a business association may be deducted in full. Also all expenses incurred in attending conventions of the Association.

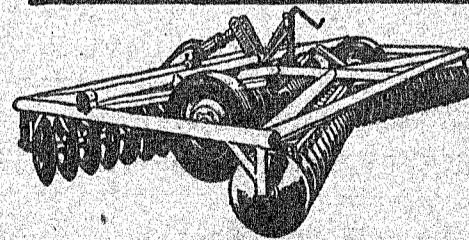

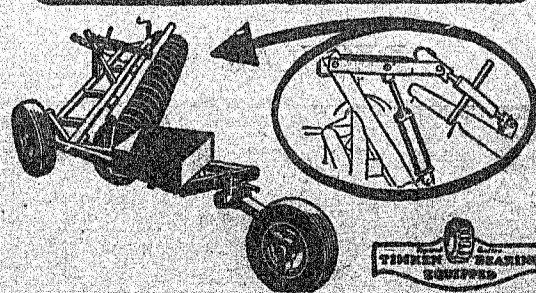



BIBLE SUNDAY

TODAY is Universal Bible Sunday and it is a good time to examine the Book of Books. To begin with, the Bible is a library of many books—39 in the Old Testament and 27 in the New. The classic feminine plural, biblia, masculine singular, and the Book of many books became the Book. If you remember that there are 39 books in the Old Testament, multiply 9 by 3 and you will have 27, the number of books in the New Testament.

Though the Bible was hundreds of years in being written and completed, it has a unifying peculiarity that distinguishes it from all other books—it is a revelation of God. 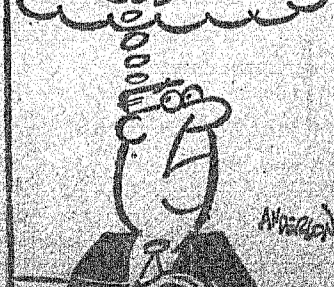
