Public Schools Week To Be Observed In Local Schools All Next Week

"Texas Public Schools — Democracy in Action" is the theme of the annual observance of Texas Public Schools Week, to be held throughout Texas next week, March 2 through 6. The observance marks the 105th year of public schools in Texas.

Included in the local observance will be a musical program, and a meeting of the school board on Tuesday evening, March 3rd; the PTA will be hostesses and serve refreshments on Wednesday afternoon; and on Friday night a Teacher Recognition and Awards program and banquet will be held in the school lunchroom. The public is invited to participate in these affairs as well as to visit the school at least on one day during the week. You are also invited to visit the lunchroom and to have your noon meal there during your visit.

In your visit to the lunchroom you are requested to notify the lunchroom or Mr. Harris the day previous to your visit. This is necessary in order to prevent the waste of food. The lunchroom staff will prepare only enough meals for their regular attendance and for the ones who request a meal on any certain day. Adults will be charged 40¢ or 45¢ with coffee for the meal.

Actually, the first public meeting in observance of Public Schools Week will be the regular meeting of the School Board. This meeting will be held in the school office at 6:30 p. m. and the general public is invited to attend.

Beginning at 7:00 p. m. Tuesday, March 3, a musical program will be presented in the high school auditorium. Included on the program will be the Senior and Junior Bands, under the direction of James Mallow, and the Junior High School Choral Club, under the direction of Mrs. Gertrude Martin. The program will last about 2 hours. No charge of admission will be made.

Wednesday afternoon from 2 to 4 p. m. the Parent-Teacher Association will act as hostesses for visitors at the schools. Refreshments of coffee and tea will be served in the lunchroom. The organization will do this in place of their regular monthly meeting.

Each member of the PTA is to call three persons who are not members of the organization and invite them to visit the schools on Wednesday afternoon.

On Friday night, a Teachers Recognition and Awards banquet will be held in the school lunchroom. Admission tickets are \$1.50 per person and the tickets are on sale by members of the school board, the Lions Club and the Delta Omicron Sorority. This is planned for the highlight of the week's observance. It is hoped that about 200 persons will be in attendance.

The primary purpose of Public Schools Week is to get the public better acquainted with the school programs and accomplishments. Every person is urged to visit the schools for a part of the day at least. In the elementary school each classroom will have a registration table. In the high school a registration table will be in the hall as you enter the building. You are invited to register in each place you visit.

Following is a complete schedule of teachers from the Sixth Grade through the high school. If you would like to visit a certain class, you may select the time from the schedule and visit that class. All classes from the First Grade through the Fifth Grade are held in the same room, and you are invited to visit them at any time.

Bands will compete on the basis of school enrollment and the Skyliners will compete in the Class A Division.

The local band will play at 3:00 a. m. Friday. They plan to leave here about 6:30 a. m. The reason for the early appearance is because Santa Anna is the nearest school to Brownwood entering the contest. Bands from just about all over the state are entered.

Some of the programs will be broadcast by Brownwood radio stations. The public is invited to attend the programs also. There will be a continuous program of music for the two days.

President Of Hardin-Simmons To Speak At Teacher Recognition Program

Dr. Evan A. Reiff, president of Hardin-Simmons University of Abilene, will be the principal speaker at the Teacher Recognition and Awards Banquet, to be held at the school cafeteria Friday evening, March 6. This program will be the highlight of Public Schools Week, to be observed March 2 through March 6.

Dr. Reiff was born at Bartlesville, Oklahoma. His education includes high school at Newport, Arkansas; a B. A. degree from Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Okla.; a M. A. degree and Ph. D. from the State University of Iowa, Iowa City, Iowa. Undergraduate majors were English and French; graduate majors were English literature, literary criticism and philosophy and other allied subjects.

His teaching experiences include the English Department of the State University of Iowa, Associate Professor of English and Director of Debate of Oklahoma Baptist University, Head of English Department and Director of Speech activities at the University of Ottawa, Kansas; and Professor of English and Chairman of the College Division of the Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary of Philadelphia, Pa. President of Sioux College, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, and President of Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene.

Personal interests include public speaking and oratory, student of government, hunting and the carpenter craft. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge, Blue Lodge, Rotarian and various professional societies.

Admission tickets to the banquet are on sale by members of the Lions Club, Delta Omicron Sorority and members of the school board. Price of admission is \$1.50 per person. All who can are urged to attend.

Teachers of the local school system will be recognized for their length of service, here and elsewhere. Local teachers have an average of 16 years teaching experience, and an average of 9 years in the local school.

The program is designated to be entertaining as well as educational.

County Has Loss Of 82 Students For 1959 Year

A report from the County School Superintendent's office this week indicated the county will suffer a loss of 82 school students, according to the school census taken in January. The 1958 census showed a total of 2490 students in the county for 1958, and a total of 2408 students for 1959.

Broken down, the figures for 1958 were as follows: Coleman, 1414 white students and 60 colored students; Santa Anna, 475 white students and six colored students; Talpa-Centennial, 191 white students; Mozelle, 145 white and 11 colored students; Novice, 124 white students; Burkett, 64 white students, making a total of 2413 white students and 77 colored students.

The 1959 census showed: Coleman, 1322 white and 54 colored students; Santa Anna, 459 white and six colored students; Talpa-Centennial, 183 white students; Mozelle, 141 white and seven colored students; Novice, 118 white students; Burkett, 58 white students, a total of 2341 white and 67 colored students. Every school in the county suffered a loss of students.

No Filing For City Or School Elections Yet

The time for persons to file their names for places on the school board and city council ballots is fast expiring. Persons who are interested in seeking these positions should file their names right away.

The school trustee election will be held first. Scheduled to be held on Saturday, April 4, the deadline for filing for a place on the ballot is 30 days previous to election time, or Wednesday, March 4th. Persons interested may file their names with the local Superintendent of Schools or with the County Judge at the courthouse in Coleman.

The three now serving on the school board whose terms expire this year, have not made any commitment as to whether they will seek re-election. Terms expiring are W. H. Pittard, Tom Stewardson and J. W. McClellan. All three have served on the board for a number of years.

So far as the city election is concerned, it will be held on Tuesday, April 7, and the filing deadline is 30 days previous to election day. This makes the filing deadline fall on Saturday, March 7. As all the names must be filed with the City Secretary, and the City Hall closes at noon on Saturday, persons wishing their names printed on the ballot must file them before closing time on Saturday, March 7th.

If you would like an opportunity to serve on either, now is the time for you to file your name with the respective offices.

New Fire Insurance Key Rate

Austin — After nearly seven weeks in session, the Legislature has not yet given any clear indication of how it will solve its basic problem — how much to spend and where to get it.

State agencies still insist they need every cent they asked for — and need it had. But those who would be "fall guys" of money-raising measures proposed thus far show no genial willingness to ante up.

Gov. Price Daniel is still pushing hard for his tax program. He suggested that critics would do better to stop sniping and start snooping — for a better way.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert called the governor's plan to gain \$18,000,000 by a change in bookkeeping just "legalizing a false statement."

Budget Board Director Vernon McGee termed it "unworkable." Daniel also contends that his plan for the state to take over unclaimed bank accounts, abandoned property, etc., might help a lot of people, since the state first would advertise for right-

ful owners. But bankers and spokesmen for other affected industries called it "confiscation," said it would undermine public trust in their institutions.

Corporations continue to blast at a franchise tax raise they say would increase their burdens as much as 500 percent. A two-thirds vote of each House would be necessary to put this into effect to help with the deficit this year. Many say chances are dim.

A Lubbock legislator, Rep. H. J. Blanchard, made a survey on tax and spending attitudes. About 60 percent of those replying opposed a sales tax. Roughly the same percentage favored more spending for teacher pay, higher education, old age assistance, state hospitals and prisons.

GOTTA HAVE IT — Strong pitches for more spending are being made by spokesmen for three major state services.

"I don't see how higher education can be financed without some broad-based tax," said J. R. Sorrell, chairman of the University of Texas Board of Regents. "You will have the backing of this administration and this board in selling it to the people of Texas."

"We are absolutely broke, we don't have a dollar," said Prison System Director O. B. Ellis. "Riots that will cost more than the appropriation requested may result, if conditions aren't improved."

"You can chop off dollars, but you can't chop off children," declared a representative of the Texas Youth Council. Director James A. Turman said money spent on parole supervision and rehabilitation of youngsters in trouble would save on future prison costs.

THREE FOR SPEAKER — Three definite candidates already are jockeying for speakership of the House in 1961.

They are Reps. Wade Spilman of McAllen, Ben Glusing of Kingsville and L. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi. It may be a close-quarters fight. All are from the same general South Texas area.

Rep. Joe Burkett, who lost to present Speaker Waggoner Carr in a very close race, said he won't run again. Many members have protested early campaigning. They say it hampers work of present session.

"FREEDOM" BILL DELAYED — Senate Committee has put in its "back pocket" a bill to set penalties for those who refuse to make public records public.

Measure is one of several "freedom of information" bills sponsored by a group of newsmen's organizations.

It was sent to subcommittee for reworking with no time set for the subcommittee to report. In some cases, such action means the bill is buried for the session.

NEW AGENCY URGED — A bill has been proposed to take tax collecting out of the Comptroller's Department and set up

a new agency headed by a state collector of revenue.

All members of last session's Senate General Investigating Committee joined in sponsorship. They said they felt tax collecting could be handled more efficiently by an appointive officer of longer tenure.

Committee investigated the Comptroller's Department extensively last session. At one time members commented on the awkward position of an official who had to collect taxes and solicit votes — from the same people. However, the present comptroller hasn't had any opposition in years.

SAFETY CONSCIOUS — Traffic safety legislation is developing into a major issue this session.

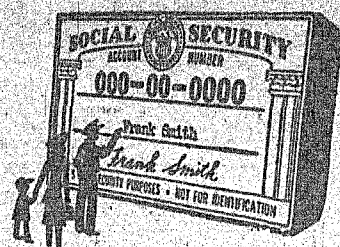
Rep. Tom James of Dallas has introduced the uniform traffic ticket bill, which he says will make for more effective enforcement against violators. He also proposes setting up county courts of record to review corporation court cases and also city traffic appeals courts.

James said he would join Col. Homer Garrison Jr., Director of the Department of Public Safety, in asking better salaries for state highway patrolmen.

Garrison told a recent meeting that "if the present trend continues, every second child born in Texas today will be killed or injured in traffic accidents."

Speaker Waggoner Carr said he felt "the climate of opinion was more favorable than ever before" for safety legislation.

SHORT SNORTS — Texas is pouring millions in state tax money into "inadequate, unnecessarily small school districts," said Texas Research League Director Alvin A. Burger in a recent speech. . . Maj. Gen. K. L. Berry has been reappointed state adjutant general by Governor Daniel. Brig. Gen. William H. Martin was renamed assistant adjutant general. Texas started 1959 by paying
