### WhatIs Brucellosis?

Brucellosis is a contagious disease of animals and man caused by a bacterial agent. In the largest number of people it has been called Bang's caused by a bacterial agent. In cattle, it has been called Bang's disease and cantagious abortion. In swine it is also referred to as contagious abortion. In cattle, brucellosis localizes in the reproductive tract and interferes with normal reproduction. In addition, the disease affects the mammary glands and reduces milk production.
The germ causing brucellosis is not a hardy individual and will not survive long outside the animal's body under Texas climatic conditions. Its main means of spread from animal to animal is through contaminated feed and water through direct contact with infected animals.

During 1956, the livestock sanitary officials in Texas ran a survey of dairy herds using the milk ring test. A similar survey will soon begin on the State's beef herds. On a national scale, brucel-losis control is moving at a rapid and accelerating rate. Dur-ing 1958 four more states have been added to the list of those already Modified Brucellosis Free. The fifteen states currently recognized are: New Jersey, Michigan, New Mexico, Utah, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Minnesota, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Vermont

Washington, and Wisconsin.

In addition, many counties in other states have reached the goal of certification. At last count, fifty-three percent of the counties in the United States are either certified or on an area control program.
