Movement Starts for Managed Dollar that Will End All Money Speculation

Washington, October 31—Adoption of the Connally plan for revaluation of the dollar is seen by observers here in the new move instituted by President Roosevelt whereby the government will buy gold, setting a price that will adjust the value of the dollar to commodity levels.

President Roosevelt explained his new monetary policy in his recent radio address, and it was almost identical with the proposal which was advanced by Senator Tom Connally of Texas last winter.

More significant was the statement of President Roosevelt in his speech that "thus we are moving in the direction of a managed currency."
