Saturday night was the big night. After supper our trail guide had his horses perform for us. The horses performed with oral commands only — no whips, halters or anything.

Would you believe a horse can get through an ordinary hula-hoop? Neither did we, until he showed us. We all enjoyed this very much.

At eight o'clock we went to the reception room and saw a regular movie, "Rock Pretty Baby." After the movie, we played ping-pong, danced, played shuffleboard, or fished. We all turned in the tiredest that night. You see, once we were in the cabins that didn't mean sleep. The girls usually sat up talking over dates and just gossiping in general.

Sunday morning we arose bright and early. We had breakfast which was delicious, but the boys couldn't get enough to eat.

On the nine o'clock train ride that morning there were even

fewer horsemen and women. Those in my cabin were so tired, blistered, and sore that to mention horses made them sick.

We got back in time to go to church.


We ate lunch at 12. We packed the bus in a dowry pour, and left the Bar-K about 2:00 p. m.

We stopped to visit the Longhorn Caverns at Burnett. We all enjoyed this very much and then went to the Buchanan Dam. We arrived there about six o'clock and ate supper and saw the sights. Then we started for home. We were all so tired and sleepy when we finally got home. We also met some nice kids from other schools while we were at the Ranch. These included kids from West Orange, Bryan, Hart and Cisco.

McINTIRE**

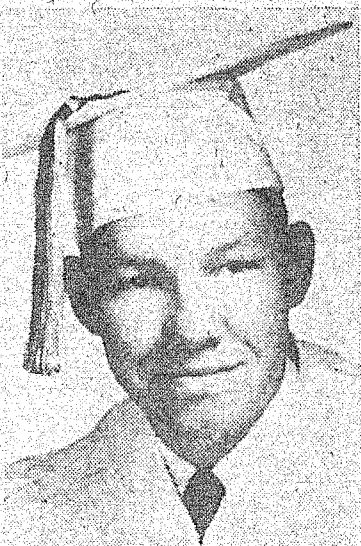

The Cycle of Seeing

Most people assume that seeing stops at the brain, but actually it is almost a complete cycle.

To understand this, pick out some object, the dial of a clock for instance, and look at it. Light falling on the clock is reflected into your eyes. Keep in mind that the light reflectance from the face of the clock is the same for all people. No variation.

When the light reaches the eye it is modified by the various eye lens surfaces and the way it strikes the retina, nerve layer at the back of the eye, will be different for different people according to their particular eyeballs.

The retina transforms the light into nerve impulses which pass at once into the brain—light itself does not reach the brain. Now the many physical and psychological experiences you have had with clocks and time keeping are joined to this present experience of looking at the clock face.

In the higher brain centers you make whatever interpretation and decisions are needed for your next (or following) action. But while this is going on you are also PROJECTING the clock dial BACK "OUT THERE" where you think it is located. People are seldom aware of this return projection, yet when you stop to think, it is entirely necessary to answering important questions such as "where is it?" "is it still there?" "is it moving?" "in what direction?" etc.

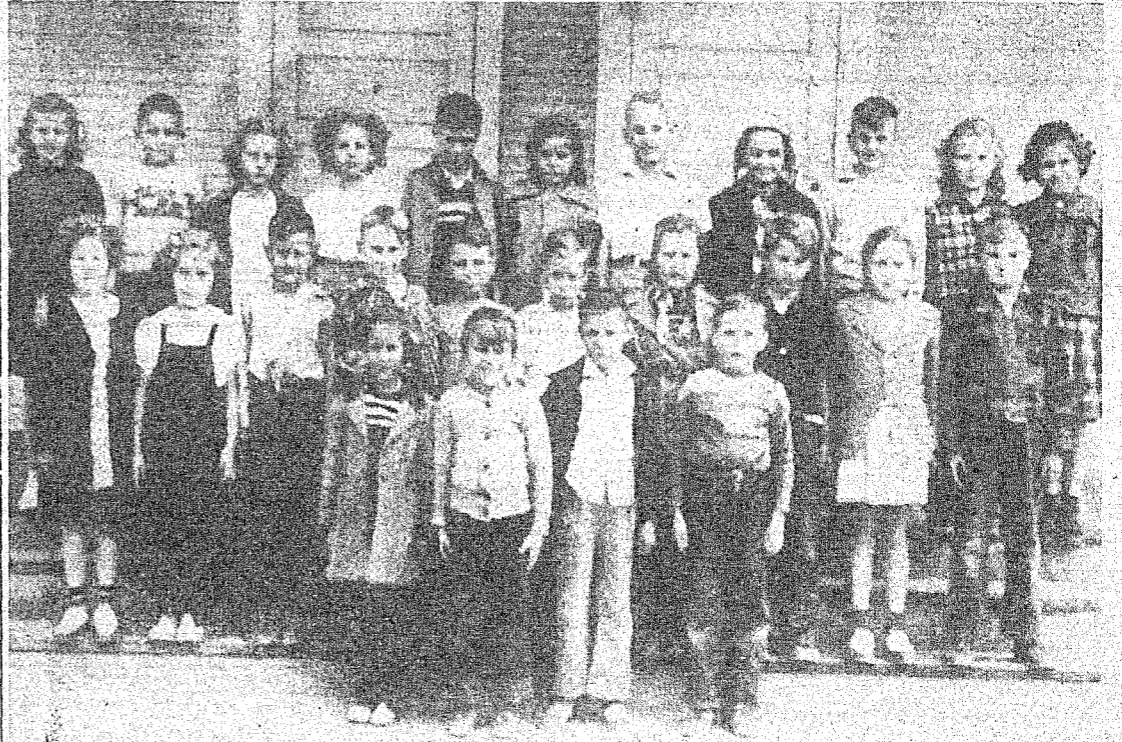

When still very young, he was given the nickname "Buddy" by his sister. This name has stayed with him all through the years of school.

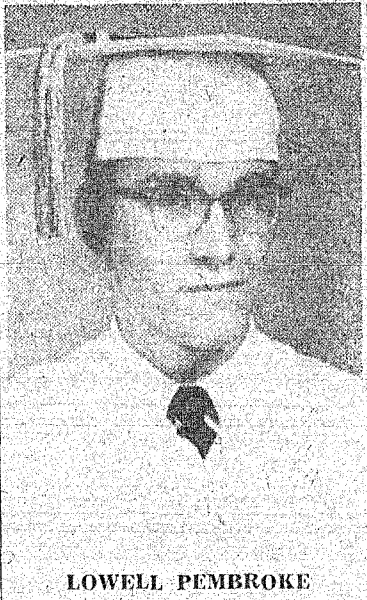
While Buddy was in grade school he didn't participate in any athletics except basketball for two years. He was the Vice-President of his eighth grade class.

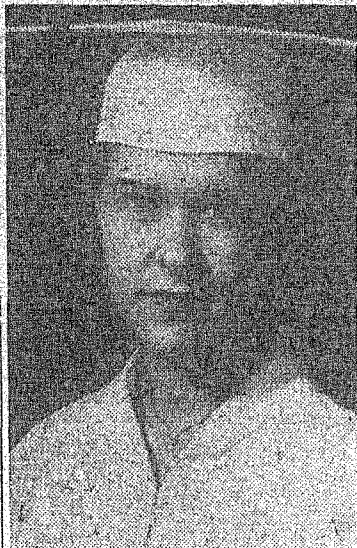
During the third grade through the eighth grade, she was a member of the Burkett 4-H Club. She was secretary for two years and treasurer for one year.

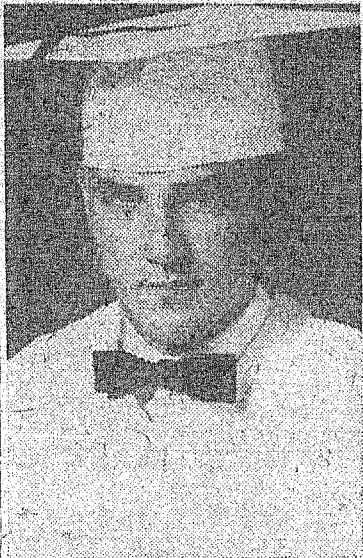

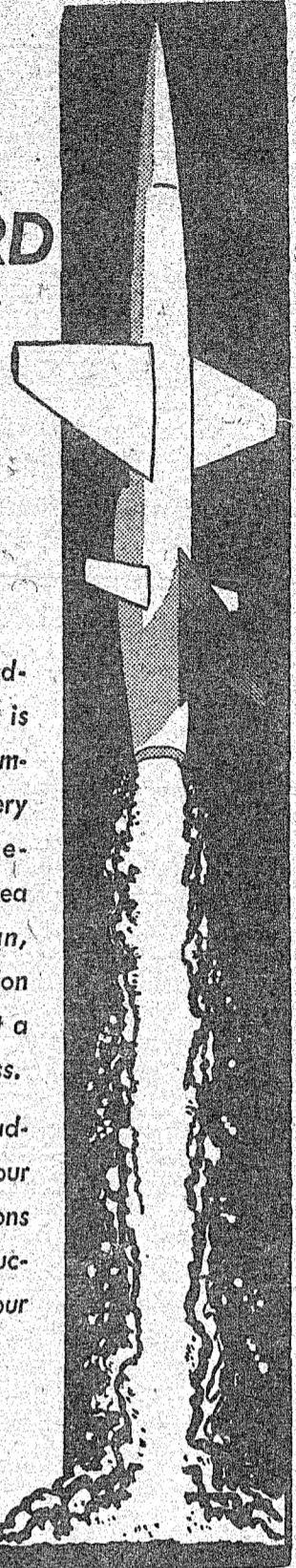
