There is absolutely no reason for this building being destroyed. It is valuable property, and the building can be used for many things. You are invited to help protect the property.

We know a lot of work has been done and a lot more will be done by the end of this week. In order to keep an organization of this nature going, it requires an enormous amount of effort on the leaders. We congratulate each of you officers and directors for the swell job you are doing.

As this article is being put into type President Eisenhower is in the process of bringing the Taft-Hartley Labor Law to bear on the steel strikers. This writer was in hopes the President would not do this, as we feel there is little to gain from it. We were in hopes that a settlement could be reached by industry and labor that would do away with a lot of the so-called "feather-bedding" in the industry and put management back in its rightful position. But Big Labor has gained such a stronghold (or stranglehold) on management in the period since World War II that it is going to be hard to break. And it is our opinion that the nation must suffer considerably before labor is brought under control. The nation cannot continue to raise wages every year or two as demanded by the labor organizations, and continue to be the powerful nation we have been in the past. Inflation will eventually overcome us, and we will be a nation in ruin, rather than a nation looked upon with envy by every other country in the world.

We are in hopes the management side of the steel dispute will just continue to hold as they have for the past almost 100 days.

There are some other big industry-labor problems that will face the nation soon, and a lot depends on the final settlement in the steel industry as to how the coming dispute in the rail industry, auto industry, the dock strike and many other major industries across the nation, will be settled. Management just cannot afford to relax now.

## Citizens Asked To Be Careful Of Garbage Fires

Two times in recent weeks the city trash truck has caught fire because the trash collector put trash from containers that had fire in them on the truck without knowing it. Fortunately, both times the fire has been put out without much damage.

The last time the truck caught fire was Monday afternoon, and as it happened the truck was near the city hall, where water was available to put it out.

Citizens are requested not to burn trash in the garbage can the trash collector picks your trash up from. A City Ordinance requires that you do not burn trash in your garbage container. Roy Bible, the man responsible for picking up the trash, does not have time to stir your garbage and see if there is a fire in it before he puts it on the truck.

Your cooperation is needed, and required, in getting the trash picked up. You are required by law to pay the monthly charge for picking up the trash, but if you disobey the law and fail to cooperate, the trash collector has been instructed NOT to pick up your trash.

Equipment used for this purpose is expensive. If it were destroyed by carelessness on someone's part, it might be sometime before the equipment could be replaced.

## Community Chest Drive Still Short; Not Complete

The Community Chest Drive is about \$285 short of the goal of \$3,000 for the current year. Two areas in the rural drive are still un-reported and the drive in Santa Anna is just over \$100 short of the quota.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers will play hosts to the Goldthwaite Eagles in the final home game of the year Friday night. One of the largest crowds of the year is expected to be present to help cheer the Mountaineers on.

The Eagles have scored a total of 130 points this year and have won only two games. They have had a total of 130 points (the same total) scored against them in losing five games. In comparison, the Mountaineers have scored a total of only 26 points in losing seven games while having a total of 238 points scored against them.

Cross Plains is the only team the Mountaineers and Eagles have played. The Eagles won over the Buffaloes by a 26-14 score, while Cross Plains won over the Mountaineers by a 34-0 score. The Mountaineers were off just about as much as a team could be for this game, and the Buffaloes were keyed up to a fine point. So, there is a difference in the attitude of the boys when they go on the field.

The Mountaineers should be in good spirits for this game. It is Homecoming, and in all probability the last chance to win a game this year. We hope to see the Mountaineers finish this game on top.

The assignments are to begin with the starting of school next fall and will be for at least two years.

In the new District 10-A, Early was brought up from Class B and Eastland was dropped from Class AA. Albany, Clyde and Cross Plains have been in District 10-A. Santa Anna was moved from District 9-A.

Remaining in District 9-A are Mason, Goldthwaite, Burnet, Llano was moved up to Class AA district.

The District 10-A representatives will meet the latter part of this week to arrange their playing schedules for the next season.

The local school is already in the process of making contacts for non-conference games next fall. We will have a 5-game non-conference schedule, and a 5-game conference schedule.

## Tax Collector To Be In Santa Anna Friday

John Skelton, County Tax Assessor - Collector, announces he will be at the Santa Anna National Bank all day Friday, October 23, for the purpose of collecting state, county and school taxes. Full taxes may be paid at this time.

State and county taxes paid in October are subject to a 3 percent discount. The tax collector's office offers this added service to the residents of Santa Anna and area for your convenience. You are invited to take advantage of the opportunity to get your 1959 taxes paid.

Next May will be a political year throughout the nation. Elections will be held for National Officers, state, district and county offices. You are urged to pay your poll tax in order to be a qualified voter for next year.

Poll taxes may be paid anytime between now and January 31. The same goes for all city, county, state and school taxes. However, if county and state taxes are paid early, you are entitled to a discount. The discount is 3% in October, 2% in November and 1% in December. No discount is allowed after December 31st.

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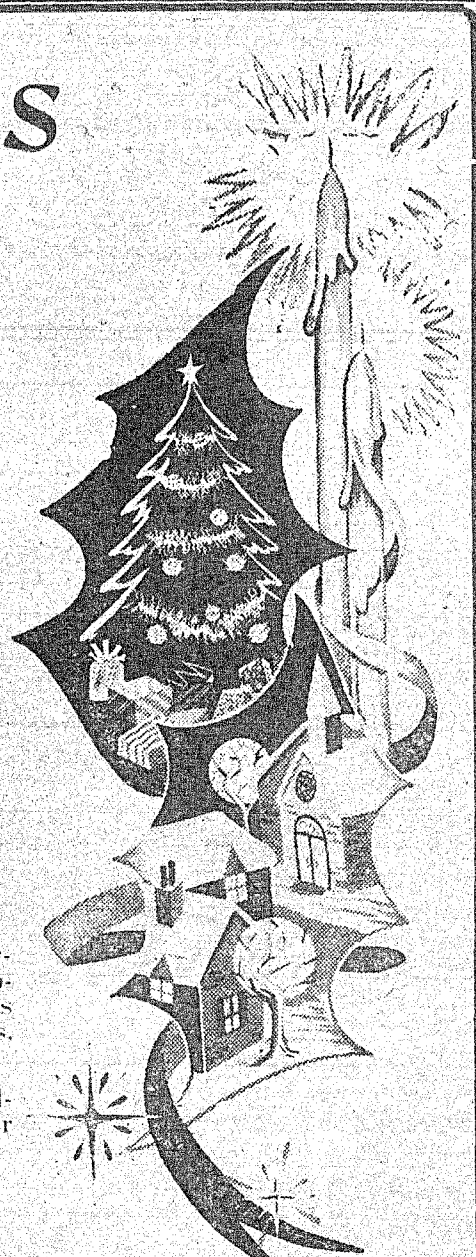

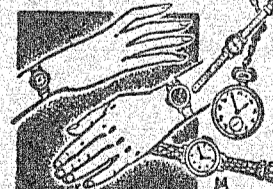

# Mason Takes First Conference Game 28-0

The Punchers could have run up many more scores had their coach wanted to. This writer (and we know many Mountaineer fans) are grateful to the Mason coach for the manners in which he handled the affairs of his team.

Mason has been known for this outstanding characteristic for a number of years, and we think it is very commendable. We believe the Mason coach was going to let the Mountaineers score near the end of the game, but a fumble took care of that.

**The Game**  
Mason kicked to the Mountaineer 21-yard line, with a return to the Mountaineer 26-yard line. Failing to gain, the Mountaineers punted to the Mason 36-yard line, with a return to their 44-yard line. One play gained 17 yards, then a pass play went all the way. The extra point was kicked.

Mason kicked short to the Mountaineers 37-yard line with no return. Failing to gain, the Mountaineers punted to the Mason 36-yard line, with a return to their 42-yard line. On the next play Mason was penalized back to their 39-yard line, then in four plays they were over the goal line again. The extra point was kicked again.

The Mountaineers returned the kickoff to their 39-yard line, then lost 3 yards and fumbled, with Mason recovering on the Mountaineer 36-yard line. In six plays the Punchers went over the goal line again, and again kicked the extra point.

The Mountaineers took the kickoff on their 21-yard line and returned to their 31-yard line. Two ground plays netted a first down, then the Mountaineers lost 6 yards, then connected with a pass good for 19 yards and another first down, but lost three yards as the quarter ended.

Two 5-yard penalties put the Mountaineers back on their 43-yard line, and failing to gain, they punted to the Punter 24-yard line with no return. On

the first play Mason gained to the Mountaineer 46-yard line, then lost back to their 46-yard line and punted to the Santa Anna 23-yard line, with a return to the 30-yard line. Failing to gain a first down, the Mountaineers punted to the Mason 21-yard line. Mason gained 4 yards, were penalized 5, failed to gain then received another 5-yard penalty, then punted to their 46-yard line. The Mountaineers returned to the Mason 43-yard line, and on the third down fumbled and lost the ball to the Punchers on the Punter 41-yard line. The Punchers gained 5, were penalized 5, then lost 17 yards in two tries and punted to their 49-yard line. The Mountaineers were penalized 5, then picked up one yard on the ground, then connected with a pass to the Punter 26-yard line, connected with another pass to the Punter 18-yard line. Two more 5-yard penalties and a big loss set them back on the Punter 41-yard line as the half ended.

The Mountaineers kicked to the Punter 16-yard line, with a return to the 36-yard line. A short loss, incomplete pass, and a short gain caused the Punchers to punt to the Mountaineers 26-yard line. The Mountaineers returned to the 34-yard line. On successive ground plays, the Mountaineers moved to the Punter 16-yard line where a fumble gave the Punchers the ball and stopped a drive that netted 50 yards. The Punchers were penalized back to their 9-yard line, then punted to their 36-yard line. The Mountaineers returned to the Mason 27-yard line. A long TD attempt by the air lanes was intercepted on the 16-yard line and the Punchers ran the ball back to their 22-yard line. A 5-yard penalty was assessed, the Punchers a ground play put the ball on their 27-yard line and a long run was called back on an infraction and they were penalized back to their 21-yard line. On three successive ground plays the Punchers drove to the Mountaineer 34-yard line as the quarter ended.

On the second play in the fourth period the Punchers passed for 21 yards, and their final TD, then kicked the extra point.

The Mountaineers took the kick-off on their 17-yard line and returned to their 40-yard line. Failing to gain a first down, the Mountaineers punted to the Punter 30-yard line. The Punchers lost back to their 21-yard line, then punted to their 49-yard line. On the run-back the Mountaineers received a 15-yard penalty that put them on their 40-yard line. Two first downs moved the Mountaineers to the Mason 31-yard line, then an 8-yard loss put them back on the 39-yard line. A 3-yard

gain and an attempted pass let the ball go over to the Punchers on the Mason 37-yard line. A 5-yard penalty and a 5-yard gain gave Mason a first down. After 2 plays, the Punchers received another 15-yard penalty that put them back on their 44-yard line, then a loss of 6 yards on a fourth down gave the Mountaineers the ball on the Mason 49-yard line. Three first downs and the Mountaineers were in possession on the Mason 5-yard line. A costly fumble gave Mason the ball on their 9-yard line.

**Is 20/20 "Perfect" Vision?**

Question: What is meant by 20/20 vision?

Answer: About one hundred years ago a scientist named Snellen perfected by means of mathematics combined with experimentation a method for determining the size of objects the normal eye should see at different distances.

At that time it seemed logical to make test charts from letters and numbers. However, subsequent experience has shown that these letter-number charts leave something to be desired since some letters are harder to distinguish than others and most numbers are more difficult than letters.

Other charts have been developed on the same principle. Some use pictures—this type chart is especially useful for children. The boats, airplanes, and other objects of interest to the small fry are arranged in rows, like letters, and each row is smaller than the one above. The optometrist can grade the child's visual acuity (sharpness of vision) by the size of the picture he can recognize.

Another chart is made using the letter only. The E is turned in different directions—reversed, on its back, or prongs downward, etc., and the patient must correctly identify the direction in which the prongs of the E point. In a child or deaf mute we can have three of his fingers represent the prongs and the individual must point the fingers in the direction cor-

responding to that of the particular E he's looking at.

Another type chart uses the letter C but the principle is the same as in the E chart only on this one the patient must identify the position of the gap in the C.

Actual grading of sharpness of vision is done by using a fraction the top part of which is the distance at which you are being tested and the bottom part is the size of target you recognize. In other words, a visual acuity score of 20/20 means that a person sees at 20 feet the size letter Snellen's formula says he should see at 20 ft. A score of 20/40 means that this person must be at 20 ft. to recognize the size letter a person with normal vision can recognize at 40 ft. away. 20/100 is a fairly large size letter and this score means the person must be at 20 ft. to recognize a letter so large that a normal sighted person could recognize it standing 100 ft. away.

A very common question on this subject is "does anyone ever get better than 20/20 vision." The answer is definitely yes. Remember I said that Snellen developed this system a hundred years ago. At that time he did not have the efficient electric chart projectors and aluminized picture screens we have today. Many people are able to read one line smaller than the 20/20 line (20/15) and I have seen a few who could read two lines smaller (20/10).

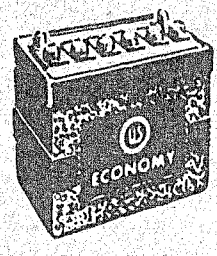

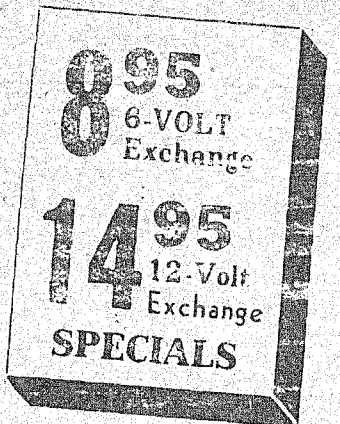
