Few aspects of our modern word are more disheartening than the fate of the millions of children who still endure the hardships of times normally associated with war or periods of pestilence because the benefits of drugs, foods and technique taken for granted in more developed areas of the world are so slow in reaching them.

Blindness threatens countless youngsters every year in an age where the eye disease they suffer from trachoma, can easily be cured with aureomycin. Millions of others can become cripples for life for lack of the single shot of penicillin needed to cure their tropical illness, yaws. Leprosy, once a hopeless scourge, is successfully treated with sulfone — provided this wonder drug is available. BCG vaccine protects against tuberculosis, DDT protects against malaria, and very often elementary knowledge of diet is enough to defeat malnutrition among children — that is as long as BCG, DDT and basic nutrition information can be obtained.

For 750 million children — three out of four in the whole world — the best chance to obtain the aid they need is through UNICEF, the United Nations Children's Fund.

So far, through this organization's participation is more than 300 projects in over 100 countries and territories, more than 100 million children have been protected from TB; the vaccine needed for 100 children costs UNICEF \$1. Over 13 million children have been cured of yaws, a shot of penicillin costs UNICEF five cents. Almost 4 million children have been treated for tachoma, the aureomycin costs UNICEF 20 cents per child. Over 800,000 have been treated for leprosy — the sulfone tablets for three years of treatment costs UNICEF \$1.

All of those of us who have a sincere desire to help "all the world's children" will have a good opportunity to do so on Halloween, when the locally sponsored Trick or Treat for UNICEF will bring the children of the town to your doorstep. They will ring our doorbells and hold out little milk cartons with a black and orange label. Each penny we drop into their containers will provide a needy child with five glasses of milk, or contribute to his fight for a healthy, normal life in some other way.

Let us bear in mind all the good that is being accomplished by UNICEF, and when the Children's Fund young Trick or Treaters come knocking at our doors, Saturday, let us help them generously because with just a little from us they can do so much for so many.

Trick Or Treat For UNICEF Will Be Saturday

Saturday afternoon, beginning at 4:30 o'clock little spooks and goblins, spacemen and witches will canvass the town of Santa Anna and townfolks will hear the familiar chant, "Trick or Treat for UNICEF!" All the local children who will take part in the United Nations Children's Fund Halloween program will meet at the Elementary School at 4:30. Adults will drive the children to the parts of town they are to canvass, and will take them back to the school. Rev. Ray Elliott will be at the school building to receive UNICEF funds. Mrs. Roy Horne is the local chairman for the drive.

This has been an annual Halloween affair in Santa Anna for the past several years. Last year more than two million American youngsters participated in the biggest project ever carried out by children to help children.

Each penny collected by the Trick or Treaters carrying the UNICEF black and orange container can mean five glasses of milk for a needy child overseas, or the BCG vaccine to protect him from tuberculosis. A nickel's worth of UNICEF penicillin will cure a child of yaws, a crippling tropical disease.

Mrs. Horne pointed out that UNICEF is not a give-away program. Governments that request its aid spend an average of more than \$2.50 for each \$1.00 received in UNICEF supplies.

You are urged to give as generously as possible when you are solicited Saturday afternoon. If by chance you are missed on the drive, there are a number of UNICEF containers in stores and business houses over town. These will remain out for several days. You are invited to drop your change in them.

Appointment Of Farm Census Crew Leader Announced

Appointment of Mrs. Mary F. Mueller, of Ballinger, Texas as a crew leader for the 1959 Census of Agriculture was announced recently by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas.

Mrs. Mueller will direct a force of census takers who will canvass all farms in Runnels and Coleman Counties. Before assuming her post, she will go to San Angelo where she will receive five days of training by a member of the Census Bureau's staff. Topics to be covered include procedures for recruiting of census takers, census taker training, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports, and the supervision of census takers to insure a complete and accurate count.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operations of the Census of Agriculture. It is her responsibility to recruit and train the census takers and supervise their work; plan and allocate work assignments; review the work of the census takers and take remedial action where necessary, and to conduct difficult interviews.

After completing her training, Mrs. Mueller will return to her district where she will spend several weeks recruiting census takers, and training them in preparation for the start of the field canvass on November 18.

They should be received by Monday or Tuesday of next week. These certificates may be redeemed for a value of \$25.00 when Cooperative members purchase an electric range, electric water heater, food freezer, or an electric clothes dryer at any of the Authorized Willie Wrethand Dealers listed below. Also included on the "Bonus Bucks" is a certificate which gives each member a chance to win a free electric appliance valued up to \$300.00.

According to Don Hart, Power Use Advisor for the Coleman County Electric Cooperative, twenty-one dealers are participating in the "Bonus Bucks" promotion. These dealers will redeem the "Bonus Bucks" as cash with the purchase of any of the four major appliances mentioned. Contracts have been signed between the dealers and the Cooperative which will assure members of the best values now and good service in the future. There are dealers in Coleman, Ballinger, and Winters who are participating.

In Coleman the dealers are: Marrs Furniture Co., Goodyear Service, Coleman Furniture and Appliance, Sears-Roebuck and Co., Western Auto, J. E. Stevens Co., Whites Auto Store, Geo. D. Rhone Co. and Gray Mercantile Co.

These Bonus Bucks will enable Cooperative members to enjoy these savings of \$25.00 on the four listed appliances from only the participating dealers. Only one certificate can be spent on each appliance purchased. However, the Cooperative has extra "Bonus Bucks" for those who wish to purchase more than one appliance.

This offer begins November 1, 1959 and will expire January 15, 1960. The Cooperative will also give 100 KWH of free per month for four months for each appliance purchased during "Bonus Bucks" months.

The only requirement on the part of the member is that the electric power to operate the appliance be purchased from the Coleman County Electric Cooperative.

EYES and VISION

Every Normal Eye Has A Blind Spot

Did You Know: That in spite of his fine intelligence, your dog could not read a printed book, even if some means could be provided for teaching him? He, like other animals, is unable to see the sharp detail close up which is necessary for reading.

QUESTION: A friend and I argued on whether or not the normal eye has a blind spot. I say it does not. What about it? M. A.

ANSWER: You lose. In each normal eye there is an area at the back of the eye ball where there is absolutely no vision. This is the place where the 2nd Cranial Nerve or Optic Nerve, enters the eyeball as a tightly packed "cable" of tiny individual nerves each of which ends in one of several of the tiny cells that turn light into the nerve impulse which the brain interprets as vision.

There are none of these terminal cells directly over the nerve entrance and thus there can be no vision. This blind area at a distance of one yard is an oval approximately 5 inches high and 3 inches across for

each eye. Having never had vision in this area we are not aware of any loss. In fact, most people, like yourself, M. A. are unaware such an area exists.

The tiny nerves and cells which receive the light are fed by little arteries and veins lying on the surface of the nerve layer. It is these nerves, blood vessels, and tissues which the optometrist examines when he looks into the eye with the little black instrument containing the bright light. At least, this SHOULD be a part of the examination if it is properly done.

This tiny window, the eye, is the only place in the body where live tissue, blood vessels, and nerves can be watched at their work cutting into the body. Many times signs of disease or other general health conditions and abnormalities are found on examination of these tissues. We may tell you more in future columns about these conditions of the body which affect the eye, why, and how.

It might be truthfully said that the eye is almost as useful for looking into as for looking out of... I said ALMOST.

Q. CAN MORE THAN ONE PERSON USE THE SAME ACCOUNT?

A. Yes, this type of checking account is called a "joint account." It is opened by two or more persons — husband and wife, partners or designated officers in a business or club. However, only persons whose signatures have been authorized properly are permitted to sign checks.

Q. WHAT IS A "CERTIFIED" CHECK?

A. A "Certified Check is one which you write on your account and then ask us to stamp "Certified" on it. The amount then is deducted immediately from your account. In some cases where you are not known, persons will accept a "Certified" check readily because they know that funds are available to cover it. If you decide not to use it, never destroy a "Certified" check — redeposit it in your account.

Q. WHAT ARE CASHIER'S CHECKS?

A. A Cashier's or Bank Check is one which you ask us to draw upon our bank, not on your account. You then pay us the amount of the check or have us deduct it from your account. It is used where you do not wish to carry cash and feel that this type of check will be more acceptable than your own.

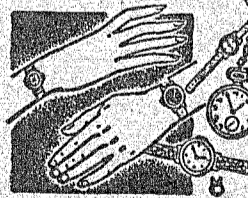

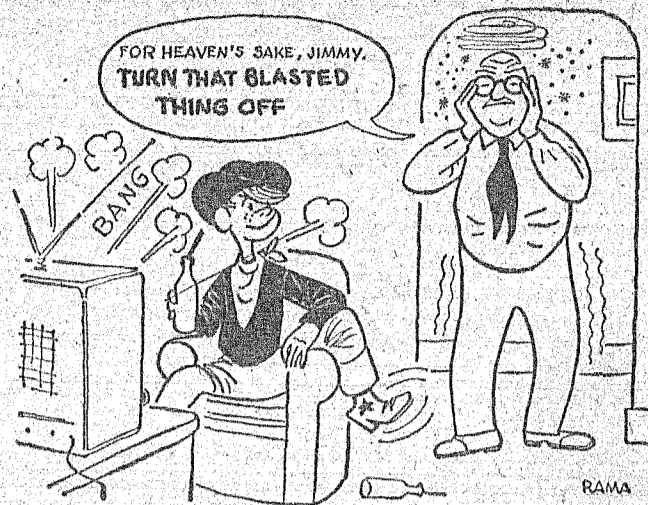

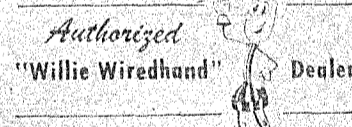

grant from the National Science Foundation. The twenty teachers are serving an eight-state area composed of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas. "Nearly a quarter of a million students will benefit from the Traveling Science Teacher Program during the current school year," says Dr. Robert C. Fite, program director. By the end of the spring term each traveling teacher will have visited approximately 30 schools, a total of 600 altogether. Santa Anna High school is fortunate to have been selected to receive the program this year since twice as many applications were received as could be scheduled.

Seniors Eligible To Compete For 4-Year Scholarships

Senior students at Santa Anna high school are eligible to compete for more than 100 four-year college scholarships offered by General Motors under its National Scholarship Plan, according to Mr. Pearce, Counselor.

The competition is open to high school seniors who are United States citizens and who plan to take the College Entrance Board examination for admission to the college of their choice, or who arrange to take the examination in order to compete for a GM award. There is at least one GM award in each state and more than 50 winners chosen at large. Seniors awarded scholarships under GM's National Scholarship Plan may attend any college or university of their choice and pursue any course of study.

More than 400 students are now attending 113 colleges and universities under the Plan, initiated in 1955. Their career objectives include engineering, medicine, law, the sciences, journalism, teaching, music, religion and other worthwhile fields.

Selection of award winners in the GM National Plan is made by a group of leading educators representing various parts of the country.

Full details of the competition, including registration dates for examination are available in Mr. Pearce's office.

General Motors offers other scholarship opportunities. Under its College Plan 304 four-year college scholarships are awarded annually by 181 colleges and universities located in 50 states and the District of Columbia. A list of the participating colleges may be obtained from the counselor's office. Selection of award winners under the College Plan is made by the respective colleges and universities. Students wishing to be considered under this plan should apply directly to the college of their choice.

Awards under both plans range from \$200 to \$2,000 per year depending on the student's needs.

The ball was brought out to the 20-yard line. The Eagles gained 4-yards in three tries and attempted a punt that netted them only 2-yards, to their 26-yard line. The Mountaineers received a 5-yard penalty on the first play, then the Eagles received 5-yards on the next play, and the Mountaineers lost 7-yards, then gained 9-yards, but could not go any further and the ball went over. Goldthwaite took the ball on their 24-yard line and in 10 plays drove the distance to the goal line. The try for extra points was good and the Eagles led 8-0.

The Mountaineers returned the kick-off to their 36-yard line, but couldn't gain a first down and punted out of bounds on their 34-yard line. The Eagles gained 5-yards, then took a 15-yard penalty back to their 24-yard line. On the third play the Eagles fumbled and the Mountaineers recovered on the last play in the quarter on the Eagle 45-yard line.

The Mountaineers picked up 5-yards, then had a pass intercepted on the 33-yard line and returned back to the 44-yard line. The Eagles drove to the Santa Anna 18-yard line and were penalized 15-yards. A long pass put the ball on the 9-yard line, then two plays later they crossed the goal line and made the extra points.

The Mountaineers took the kick-off on their 6-yard line and returned to the 26-yard line. Failing to gain, the Mountaineers attempted a punt that was partially blocked that lost them 8-yards and gave the Eagles the ball on the Mountaineer 22-yard line. Four plays later the Eagles scored again and made the extra points.

The Mountaineers took the kick-off on their 1-yard line and returned to their 4-yard line. Picking up 8-yards in three tries, the Mountaineers punted to their 32-yard line. Goldthwaite completed an 8-yard pass as the first half ended.

The Mountaineers took the wind to begin the second half and kicked to the Eagle 21-yard line, with a return to the 36-yard line. It took the Eagles 12 plays to cross the goal line again, and the extra points try was good.

The Eagles kicked to the Mountaineer 20-yard line. Failing to gain, the Mountaineers punted to the Eagle 20-yard line. The Eagles gained up to the 39-yard line, then fumbled with the Mountaineers recovering on the 32-yard line. A pass was good for 22-yards, to the 9-yard line, then the Mountaineers fumbled and the Eagles recovered on their 7-yard line. The quarter ended with the Eagles in possession on their 11-yard line.

Failing to make a first down, the Eagles punted to the Mountaineer 16-yard line. The Mountaineers made two first downs and gained to their 41-yard line, then lost 5-yards and couldn't make up the loss, then punted to the 28-yard line with a return to the 36-yard line. Donald Williams intercepted an Eagle pass on the 46-yard line and returned the ball to the 41-yard line. The Mountaineers lost 7-yards, then gained back the loss and punted to the Eagle 11-yard line, with a return to the Eagle 29-yard line. 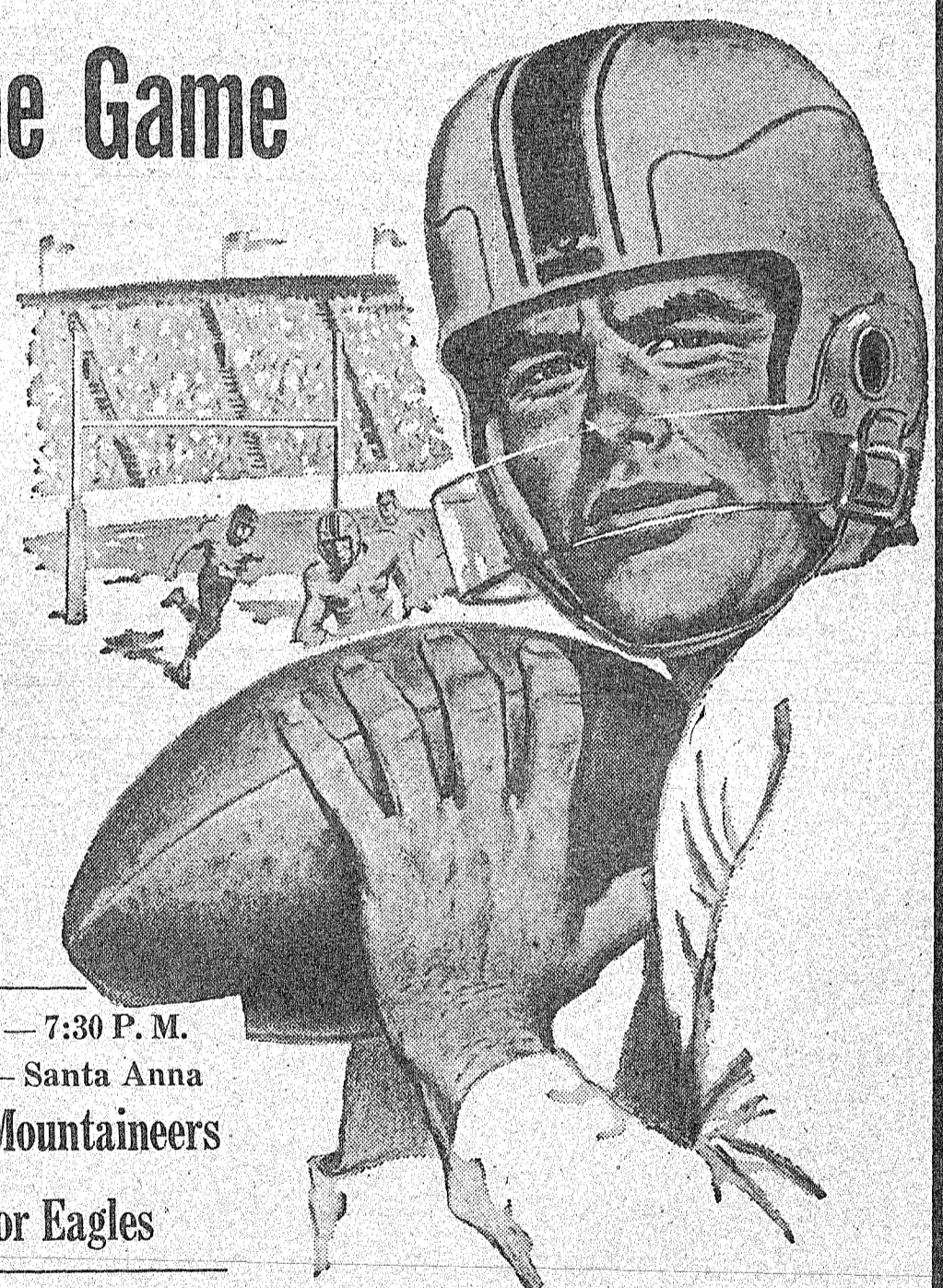

WASHINGTON AND
"SMALL BUSINESS"
By C. WILSON HARDER

If the Congress that recently ended goes down in history, as perhaps it should, it will go down as the Congress that killed the bogey man.

And that bogey man was the myth that politically the power of the labor bosses was invincible. By a vote almost as unanimous as that which declared war on Japan the day after Pearl Harbor, this Congress passed a new labor bill.

Many had said this would never happen. Yet the new labor bill contains provisions that were overwhelmingly favored by nation's independent businessmen voting through the National Federation of Independent Business.

Actually, the new labor bill is more of a victory for small business than perhaps any segment of the economy.

The provisions of the new bill which puts a strong ban on secondary boycotts, cracks down on blackmail picketing, and permits state government to step into labor disputes that the National Labor Relations Board felt were too minor for their attention, are real victories for small business.

For example, consider the ban on secondary boycotts. Many retailers have been severely abused by the evils this part of the law corrects. As is customary in business, the average retailer will place orders for merchandise long in advance of the selling season of that particular merchandise.

Then, when the selling season

did arrive, it was often found the supplier of the merchandise was involved in a labor dispute with union bosses.

Independent retailers were then threatened with all kinds of reprisals by the labor bosses unless they refrained from selling the goods in their warehouses. This was a vicious, unwarranted practice that independent business, through the National Federation of Independent Business has long fought against.

States should probably lose no time now in setting up their own labor laws and administrative procedure, now that the new labor law provides that states can intervene in labor disputes that the National Labor Relations Board has refused to handle, largely because the National Labor Relations Board rulings on the size of the dispute it would handle.

As a matter of fact, in those industrial states where there are not adequate provisions for handling local labor disputes, or where the procedure has been withered by atrophy due to federal interference, special sessions of the state legislatures should be held immediately to make the necessary provisions.

Thus a bogeyman dies, an object lesson for all who have claimed that no one could be elected to Congress without labor boss support.

With overwhelming evidence to the contrary established, it remains to be seen if businessmen will abandon their long standing sense of futility to take a more active interest in government. Abuses that have threatened very existence of independent business can be corrected by concerted action.
