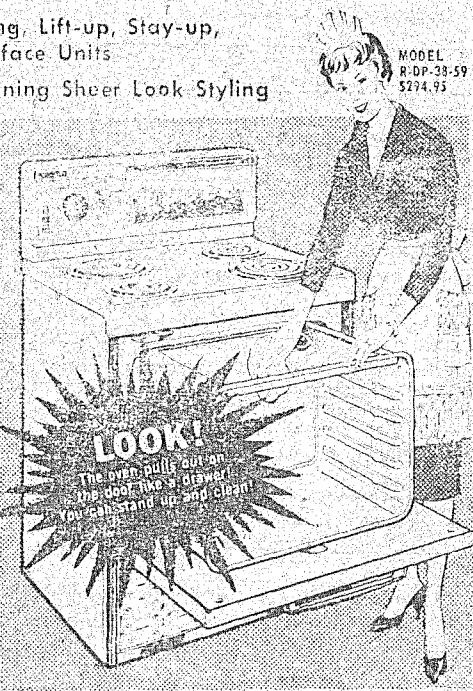

OUR WASHINGTON Letter

REFUGEES from behind the Iron Curtain have come to America as immigrants in vast numbers, since World War II. Official records reveal that of the 1.8 million immigrants from Europe between 1946 and 1958, 456,000, or 25% of them, came from behind the Curtain, chiefly from Poland which furnished 209,000.

During that same period, 282,000 immigrated from the United Kingdom, 377,000 from Germany, and 212,000 from Italy, etc.

These figures tell only a part of the total immigration story, however. Many have been admitted from Western Hemisphere countries, including an average of 50,000 annually during the past five years from Mexico. Puerto Ricans have literally swarmed in, at a rate of up to 100,000 a year.

THE RECENT PASSAGE of the Landrum-Griffin bill regarding to observers a classic example of the workings of American public opinion. YOUR EYES and VISION

Intelligent School Child Failure

Did you know: The Bible says "where there is no vision, the people perish." You can find it in Proverbs 29:18.

People often ask us to explain to them just what is meant when their case is diagnosed as Hyperopia, Myopia, Astigmatism, Presbyopia, etc. As a matter of fact, we don't often use these technical terms to the patient. We usually use the common names, such as Far-sighted, Nearsighted, etc., and still most patients are not sure just what the condition is although the name does sound more familiar.

A most frequently found abnormality of the eye is Hyperopia, commonly called Far-sightedness. Hyperopia in the young is actually a phase of growth, since 80 to 90 percent of all eyes are Hyperopic at birth. As the child develops, the Hyperopia decreases and the eye may gradually become either normal or Near-sighted. But at age 16 approximately 48 percent are still Hyperopic.

In hyperopia, the light-focusing surfaces of the eye when relaxed are not curved enough to bring the light to a sharp point by the time it reaches the retina or nerve layer at the back of the eyeball. This means that when the focusing muscles of the eye are relaxed the vision of the far-sighted person will be blurred.

Many hyperopes, far-sighted people, can and do overcome this blur by using the focusing muscles. This constant use of these muscles may not cause discomfort if the eyes are used

only for distance seeing and if the amount of hyperopia is not too great.

Near vision such as reading, desk work, school work, etc., normally requires work from the focusing muscles of the eye. If on top of this work, the muscles must also make up for hyperopia then the load is often too great and difficulties arise.

Symptoms of the eye strain caused by hyperopia can be in many forms. An intelligent school child may make poor grades as a result of his "dislike" for reading and writing. A skilled worker may injure himself or others on a dangerous job or otherwise do poor work because of uncomfortable, unsure vision. A housewife may be unable to sew or read for more than a few minutes without becoming sleepy or irritable.

Eye discomfort in the above examples may be so vague that the person cannot quite put his finger on the trouble exactly, which is one of the best reasons for regular periodic eye check-ups.

More severe symptoms such as frequent headaches, especially at the back of the head or across the brow; tired, red eyes; styes; nausea; dizziness; and inability to see near work can be caused by higher degrees of hyperopia. Not all these symptoms need be present in the same individual.

The same symptoms also often indicate the beginning of a need for bifocals at about age 40 to 45.

If the above symptoms arise from conditions other than in the eye your optometrist will recognize this fact and refer you for other professional treatment.

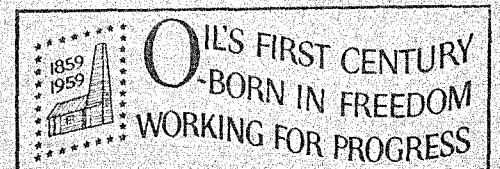
