## Junior Rodeo To Start Thursday In Coleman

Teens will have their ups and downs beginning Thursday night when the Coleman Junior Rodeo gets under way.

Steer riding, boot scramble, goat riding, pole bending, goat sacking and calf scramble events are slated for the three-day rodeo which will end Saturday.

The rodeo will be held at the Coleman Rodeo Grounds. Performances will begin at 8 p. m. each evening. A parade will be held in downtown Coleman each afternoon at 5 p. m. Admission prices are \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for children 12 years and under. No reserved seat tickets will be sold.

There will be a senior division with contestants no older than 19 prior to August 20 and junior contestants slated for 11 year-olds and younger and 12 through 15.

Junior steer riding will have two divisions with 11 years and younger, and 12 through 15. The boot scramble is for 12 and under for both boys and girls. A goat roping event will be held for boys and girls 14 and under and will be a tie-down event.

Pole bending will have two divisions, 15 and under and 16 through 19, for boys and girls. Tie-down roping, ribbon roping, wild cow milking, girls barrel race, goat sacking and calf scrambling will be held for contestants up to 19.

## License May Be Suspended For Four Moving Violations

Austin — The Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety cautioned today that a new state law provides for the suspension of the license of any driver convicted of four moving traffic violations within a 12-month period.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. said the new law, passed by the recent session of the Legislature and signed by Governor Price Daniel, August 5, for the first time defines the term "habitual violator." The definition is as follows:

"The term 'habitual violator' as used herein, shall mean any person with four or more convictions arising out of different transactions in a consecutive period of 12 months, or seven or more convictions arising out of different transactions within a period of 24 months, such convictions being for moving violations of the traffic laws of the State of Texas or its political subdivisions."

Garrison said if a justice of the peace or other designated magistrate finds a driver to be an habitual violator, the Department of Public Safety is authorized to suspend the driver's license for any period up to one year.

The new law also establishes detailed procedures for appeals of persons whose licenses have been suspended and requires the courts to give priority to the setting of such cases. It designates local prosecuting attorneys to represent the state in such appeals cases.

## 28 Boys Report For H. S. Football Practice Sessions

As of Wednesday morning 28 boys have reported for football practice. Of this number only three are lettermen from previous years. Seven are Seniors, nine are Juniors, four are Sophomores and eight are Freshmen.

Plans are for the boys to work out twice a day until school begins on Monday, August 31. The morning practice will be held from 8:00 a. m. to about 10:00 o'clock. The evening practice will be from 7:00 p. m. to about 9:00 o'clock.

The new coaches said they would likely use the "T" formation this year, with several variations. They said it would likely be the middle of the first week of school before they make any announcements as to where each boy will play, and then will be subject to change.

Overall the boys show good spirit and seem to want to learn the game. Mostly the team this year will be inexperienced. They have a tough schedule for the season, also.

Local citizens are invited out to watch the boys practice. They will be working under the lights each night.

## Soil Conservation Stamp To Be Issued



Supporters of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District and persons interested in commemorative stamps will be able to purchase a 4-cent Soil Conservation stamp locally starting August 27th.

Although the Post Office Department is printing 120 million copies of the 3-color Soil Conservation stamp, which portrays a modern conservation farm, the edition won't last long.

The stamp is being issued at Rapid City, S. D., on August 26 as a tribute to conservation farmers and ranchers, their local soil conservation districts, and the professional conservationist of state and federal agencies who assist them.

Most everyone in the Central Colorado soil conservation district will want to buy these colorful and historical stamps when they go on sale here.

Those who are interested in a "first-day cover" or a souvenir envelope can mail addressed envelopes plus a remittance for postage to the postmaster at Rapid City, S. D., who will place the Soil Conservation stamp on the envelopes, cancel with a special cancellation mark used only on that day and at that place, and mail as-addressed anywhere in the country.

Supervisor J. B. McCord will purchase the first conservation stamp sold in Coleman. Supervisor Eldon Knox, the first at Burkett, Supervisor J. W. Vance the first at Santa Anna, Supervisor C. M. Garrett the first at Cross Plains and Supervisor Leon Copeland the first at Lawn.

## Boat Registration Due In October

Austin — State Highway Engineer, D. C. Greer, said today that registration of boats would go into effect in October. The new boating act requiring registration was recently passed by the Legislature.

Greer assured boat owners that no penalties or convictions will be involved for this delayed registration date, particularly in view of the fact that the final boat-registration date is March 1, 1960. Other features of the act are now in effect.

Greer explained that boat registration was a little foreign to the ordinary function of the Texas Highway Department, but that the Department was already well experienced in handling this type of operation.

Greer estimated that the registration forms and blanks would be printed and in the hands of boat dealers, county offices, Highway Department offices, and other public offices in October. Ample public notice will be given when these forms are available.

## Two New Coaches Employed Here

The school board has employed two new coaches during the past few days. Both men are here now and working daily with the boys who have reported for football practice. Twenty-eight boys have reported thus far and several others are expected to at least by the time school begins.

R. C. Smith of Ranger has been employed as head coach. He arrived here Tuesday morning. Mr. Smith has one year of coaching experience, that being at Farmersville, Texas.

He is married and has one daughter. Mrs. Smith is visiting relatives in California at the present time. She will join him here in September.

He is a graduate of Ranger Junior College and North Texas State College at Denton. He has a Bachelor of Science degree and also his Master's degree and has served an enlistment in the Navy.

He will teach Math in high school in connection with his duties as head coach.

The assistant coach is Douglas McArthur. He arrived here Monday morning in time to work out with the boys at their first practice session. McArthur's home is in Spur, Texas, where he graduated from high school. He is a graduate of Abilene Christian College, where he received his Bachelor of Science degree and has 18 hours toward his Master's degree.

Mr. McArthur is married and has one daughter. They plan to move here during the weekend and will live in the Charlie Wristen house being vacated by former head coach Jack Rucker.

He took part in all sports in high school and participated in football and basketball in college. He also lettered in track in college.

In addition to his coaching duties, McArthur will teach a part of the History and Science in high school.

He has three years teaching and coaching experience at Spur.

**Sportsmen—Fish Can Recognize Colors!**

Did you know that nine members of Yale's 1948 football team wore contact lenses? The French Olympic swimming champion, Jany, also wears them.

Vision is the keystone of both human and of individual progress. It shows us form, brightness, color and motion. It enables us to study, play and work. It brings us over 80% of our knowledge.

If we didn't have our good vision we might lead the life of, for instance, an oyster, which has no vision at all. How far in this world can an oyster progress? It has no eyes. Millions are hatched out each year, but only comparative few live because the rest are gobbled up by their natural enemies. Having no eyes, oysters can only open their shells and depend on the sea to wash their food to them. So what does an oyster have to look forward to? At best, it can only find its way into an oyster stew or grace some banquet table — on the half shell.

Let's go a step higher than oysters. Most fish have eyes. There are some cave fishes which are entirely blind and other types which have only vestiges of eyes, but most of the fish we're apt to come in contact with have eyes.

Of possible interest to fishermen are some of the peculiarities about the vision of fish. Fish are mostly nearsighted. This is usually no handicap because water is not as good a conductor of light as is air and, consequently, objects have to be at a closer range in order to see them. Fish do have a system of focusing for different distances although it is much inferior to ours (and they don't have bifocals to replace it if it wears out).

Also most fish have color vision. Their sensitivity to color, however, varies among species and even among individual fish of the same species since some fish are easier to teach colors than others. Of course, there are variations among humans as to sensitivity to colors, too.

Maybe you wonder how fish are taught to recognize colors. It is really very simple. They are put in a tank of water after their sense of smell has been completely desensitized. Colored food containers are also put in the tank. The fish soon learn which containers to leave alone and which will provide food. Even though the colored containers are switched to different positions they still go to the proper colors for their food.

Sharks and their cousins, the rays, are color blind, and, as most fishermen know, find their food mainly by sense of smell.

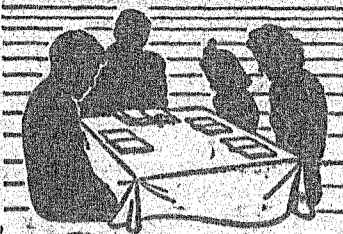

**FHA Operates With Fewer Employees**

Farmers Home Administration will operate its program in Texas this year with 117 fewer employees than it had a year ago at this time according to a statement this week from Walter T. McKay, the agency's State Director. Since the break of the drought, the agency, statewide, has reduced its force by more than 27 percent and has discontinued 7 of its field offices on a full-time basis.

Insofar as the employees who lost their jobs, McKay said that in practically every case the training and experience they gained during their employment with Farmers Home Administration enabled them to step into jobs with banks, RCA's and other private and cooperative credit institutions — many of them at salaries better than they had with the Government.

In connection with the services available to farm families, there will be no change according to McKay. He said that during the past three years more than 12,000 farmers and ranchers paid their loans in full to Farmers Home Administration, and for the most part had reached or regained a position where private and cooperative sources can now handle their credit needs.

Farmers Home Administration will continue to make loans to eligible applicants for farm and home operating expenses, for the purchase of livestock and equipment needed to put their farm programs on a sound basis and to finance farm real estate purchases and improvements.

**Poachers Face Stiff Penalties**

Austin — A new trespass law will be effective in Texas, October 14, it has been announced by the assistant secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. The law which is covered in HB 36, will become effective without the signature of the governor. It provides penalties of up to 30 days in jail and a \$500 fine and forfeiture of hunting, or fishing license for a period of three years, upon conviction.

The law makes it illegal for any person to hunt, fish or camp on the enclosed property of another person without the consent of the owner or other person in authority.

The new law is enforceable by any peace officer and arrests may be made without a warrant.

# Student Guidance: What Parents Can Do

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the sixth and final article on student guidance.

By Dr. Edward C. Roeber

As a parent, just how far would you go in gambling with your child's future in school or in a career? If someone asked you such a question, you would answer it like other parents. No parent wants to take unnecessary chances on anything as important as his child's personal satisfaction and success both in school and at work.

Although parents would like to help boys and girls, they do not always know where to go for professional assistance. In some larger communities, they may find vocational counseling services near their home. But even these services have their limitations, not in quality but in finding one when a decision has to be made. School and career planning takes place over a long period of time. One visit to a counseling service is not going to settle issues once and for all.

Unfortunately, not all students and parents can find good guidance and counseling in their schools. A study, sponsored by the U. S. Department of Labor in 1955-56, indicated that there was an average of 700 pupils for each counselor—and not all of these were adequately trained for their work.

Recently Dr. James B. Conant, after a study of selected schools, recommended a full-time counselor for every 250 to 300 pupils in a high school. It is clear that we need many more counselors for the schools of America.

For more than twenty years some of the State Departments of Education have been trying to encourage local schools to provide good counselors and develop the right kinds of guidance for youth. At the present writing not many more than a half dozen have had state-wide success.

Just last year the Congress of the United States saw the need

for more and better counselors. As a result, it provided money for counselor institutes in many parts of the country. This summer there will be nearly fifty such institutes in thirty-seven states and territories.

Although the institutes are going to help provide more and better counselors, they are not going to train as many as will be needed in the schools.

Many schools can help themselves by encouraging teachers to take some form of special training during summers. Or several small schools can pool their resources and share the time of one good counselor.

It would be very advantageous if all students had something tangible that they could read, go over with their parents, and discuss with fellow students.

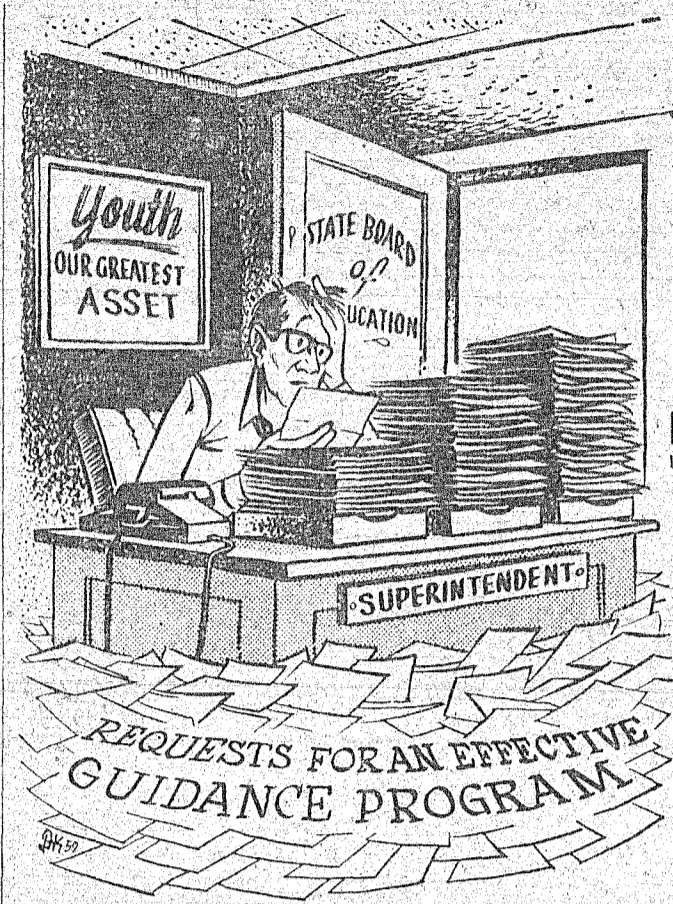
Homeroom teachers can multiply the effectiveness of a guidance counselor by participating in short daily discussions with their students. Such discussions should cover current educational and vocational opportunities for young people.

Discussions of this type would not be designed to replace a guidance counselor. They would be designed to help him. These discussions would commence in the first year of high school and continue until graduation.

Such a program would help students organize their thinking about the future and enable them to see their counselor about specific problems.

The biggest problem is lethargy on the part of parents and community leaders. They are willing to gamble with the lives of boys and girls. They fail to see that money spent for a counselor and guidance materials today may save money tomorrow. Joe, for example, may learn to use his talents and become a taxpayer rather than a drain on welfare funds.

If parents really want counselors and specially trained teachers in their schools, they can do something about it. They



always have a right to make their wishes known to local schools and State Departments of Education.

Local school officials and the school board are usually sensitive to what parents want in a good school. The old saying, "Let George do it," isn't going to put one counselor in a school.

Letters to the State Department of Education can give parents some idea as to what state-wide plans are now being made for the improvement of school and career guidance. State school officials might also like to know what parents want in all schools of the state.

Even with good counselors school career planning is now a

tough job and will be much harder in the years ahead. Young people will have to plan for a future which is still obscure. But the more difficult the future the more need there is for adequate planning.

Are we as a nation willing to cast adrift our most prized resource, the boys and girls of America—and gamble that all works out well for them? Or do we want them to have some vocational guidance—to have the materials and counseling so they can find goals and know how to reach them?

This is still America. As parents, you have a right to register your vote by letter and telephone.
