





Poachers Face Stiff Penalties

Austin — A new tresspass law will be effective in Texas, October 14, it has been announced by the assistant secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. The law which is covered in HB 36, will become effective without the signature of the governor.

It provides penalties of up to 30 days in jail and a \$500 fine and forfeiture of hunting or fishing license for a period of three years, upon conviction.

The law makes it illegal for any person to hunt, fish or camp on the enclosed property of another person without the consent of the owner or other person in authority.




