840 Pancake Tickets Sold In Contest

This team came out on the short end of the ticket selling contest, to see who could sell the most tickets to the annual Santa Anna Lions Club Aunt Jemima Pancake Sale, to be held through most of the day Friday.

A total of 840 tickets were sold, with Roy Horne's team accounting for the sale of 533 tickets. This leaves a balance of 252 for the losing team. The contest closed Tuesday at noon.

Time To Get Christmas Mail On The Way

"The time has passed to talk about 'Mailing Early for Christmas'." Postmaster Lee Strother said this week, "but our patrons can still help the Postal Service avoid a tremendous last-minute pile-up of Christmas mail by sending all packages and cards right now!"

To the inevitable last-minute mailers he suggests that Air Mail postage be used on all gifts and cards going to distant cities.

The Postmaster said that Regional Postal officials were expecting the Christmas mail volume this year to break all previous records. And this mail load is expected to hit its peak next week.

He cautioned local post office patrons to make sure that all packages are addressed carefully and that zone numbers are included on mail going to large cities with zoned delivery.

"There is still time to mail cards for local delivery," Mr. Strother said, "but they should all be in the mail by the end of next week."

He recommended that cards going out of town be sent by first class mail (4c postage) in order that they may be returned or forwarded in case the addressee has moved. And he pointed out that it is quite proper to affix your return address on Christmas cards.

The Santa Anna Post Office offers window service from 8:00 a. m. until 5:30 p. m. during week days and from 8:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m. on Saturdays.

State Capitol NEWS

Austin, Tex. — Ordinarily, between Thanksgiving and Christmas, politicking takes a back seat to holiday preparations in the Capitol.

This year a lot of people are more concerned with what sort of "gifts" they'll get in January. Gov. Price Daniel has called special elections to fill the three

legislative vacancies for Jan. 9. For the several candidates already actively running for these offices, election would be a highly acceptable post-session "present."

Governor Daniel also has written members of the Legislature asking how they feel about having a special session early next year to raise money for higher teachers' salaries.

Some already have stated, bluntly and publicly, that this is a "gift" they could pass up. It would force them to choose, right before running for reelection, between disappointing the teachers and passing a new tax, which always makes somebody unhappy.

Several have said that they feel the matter of teacher raises either should have been settled during the sessions last spring and summer or should be postponed until the next regular session. After statewide elections, it's pointed out, legislators might have a clearer idea of what all the people want.

Other lawmakers, however, say they feel teachers should have an immediate raise.

Talk now is that, if the special session is called, it will be about Jan. 12, just after the special elections.

For state officials in general, holiday dreams are focused, not on Dec. 25, but Feb. 1 the last day to file for a place on the primary ballot. For the candidates, no "visions of sugar plums" can compare with the hope of having Feb. 1, end with no tough opposition in sight.

COMMISSION STUDIES GAS PRICES

Railroad Commission is now considering the record of nearly a year's heated discussion over whether Lone Star Gas Co. should be allowed to raise its rates.

More than 300 Texas cities are affected.

Lone Star is asking to increase rates from 30 to 40 cents per 1,000 cubic feet. It says that 9 cents of this is swallowed up by the higher prices it must pay for

gas at the wellhead. It is asking also that some system be established to adjust prices to customers automatically when costs to the company go up significantly.

Attorneys for the affected cities charge that the gas company is trying to put an unfair share of the costs on householders rather than on the big industrial consumers.

LAWS CLARIFIED

In a series of opinions, mostly concerned with new laws passed this year, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has ruled:

1. That parts bought for repair of air conditioners are not subject to the new 3 percent sales tax on air conditioners. All parts sold for the original installation are taxable.

2. That the law creating a Texas Coordinating Commission for Health and Welfare Services is unconstitutional. Commission would have been made up of persons from both the legislative and executive branches of government, thus violating the "separation of powers" principle of the constitution.

3. That members of the State Board of Insurance can be paid their regular \$50 per day fee for work on Saturdays.

4. That a juvenile offender arrested during the night can be held in jail until taken before the judge the next morning.

5. That county funds can be used to pay all or part of the hospitalization insurance premiums for county officials and employees.

6. That a veteran who refuses to execute a contract under the veterans land program after purchase has been approved forfeits his percent down payment and portions of the closing fees.

RECORD SALES SEEN

Totals thus far indicate Texas should hit an all-time high in retail sales in 1959, says the Bureau of Business Research.

BBR's estimate of total 1959 sales, based on the good showing of the first 10 months, is \$13,658,000,000. This would be 8 percent better than last year.

## State Gas Tax Hike Opposed By Car Dealers

Austin — Opposition to any increase in the present State tax of 5 cents per gallon on gasoline to retire a general fund deficit or to expand any non-highway program was expressed this week by C. B. Smith of Austin, President of the Texas Automotive Dealers Association.

Mr. Smith said in addition to speaking for the automobile retailers he believes he is expressing the opinion of the overwhelming majority of motor vehicle users who must absorb any increase in gasoline or other road user taxes.

The federal government until recently levied a 3 cents per gal-

lon tax, in addition to the state tax. The federal tax was increased to 4 cents by the last session of Congress for benefit of the U. S. Highway Trust Fund, making a total of 9 cents per gallon paid by consumers in Texas. The extra penny is supposed to expire in May of 1961, but Mr. Smith pointed out that very few federal "temporary" taxes have turned out to be anything but permanent taxes.

Net state collections from gasoline taxes in Texas for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1959 were \$169,640,025, by far the largest single item of income from within the state. The gasoline tax ostensibly was levied as a road user tax to be paid in proportion to a person's use of the highways, Mr. Smith pointed out.

Yet, he said, out of last year's total gasoline tax collections the sum of \$42,210,006 was derived

to the general fund for purposes not even remotely related to the building or maintenance of highways.

"The automobile is a necessity," Mr. Smith said. "It is a direct means of making a living, or the only means of getting to the place where one makes his living, for untold thousands of Texans today. Including federal and state taxes from start to finish, it is estimated that taxes represent nearly one-fourth the value of every motor vehicle."

"Talk within our State of using an increase in the gasoline tax as a means to provide additional revenue for non-highway functions of government is of grave concern not only to those who sell motor vehicles, but to those who must use them over the highways in essential endeavors."

If additional revenue is needed for general government purposes, Mr. Smith said, it should be collected on an equitable basis. This does not result, he said, when a portion of a road user tax is diverted from building highways to non-highway purposes.

Texas' most immediate problem as regards state finances is in the general revenue fund. The Texas highway program has been maintained on a pay-as-you-go basis, and none of our difficulty is chargeable to the highway program or the highway user, he said.

"The inequity of further taxing gasoline for general fund purposes is easily illustrated," Mr. Smith said. "For example, under our system of diverting one-fourth of the gasoline tax to the general fund, the user who drives 50,000 miles per year is required to pay the general fund 50 times as much as the one who only drives 1,000 miles per year."

### Lime Gives Efficient Fertilizer Use

College Station — An application of limestone can mean more economical crop production and efficient use of fertilizer, says W. F. Bennett, soil chemist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Fertilizer applied on acid soils can give disappointing results. Production will continue low and the return for money invested in fertilizer also will be low, Bennett advises.

Where lime is needed, economic returns may range from two to five dollars for each dollar spent for limestone. Some farmers, points out the chemist, have received even higher returns. Others have received less, especially where limestone was applied on areas not deficient in lime. If lime is needed, it will increase plant growth by causing favorable chemical, physical and biological changes in the soil. These changes, continues Bennett, also result in a more efficient uptake and use of fertilizer nutrients by plants.

To more accurately determine limestone needs and whether or not an application would prove profitable, Bennett suggests that a soil sample be taken from areas where a lime

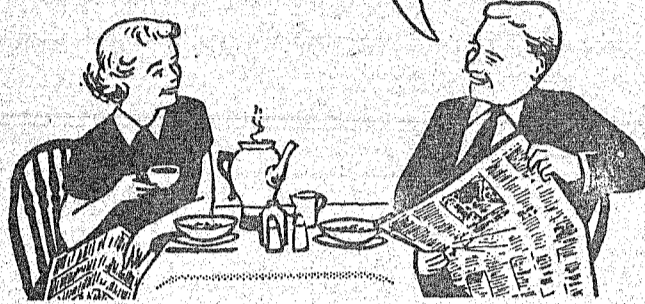

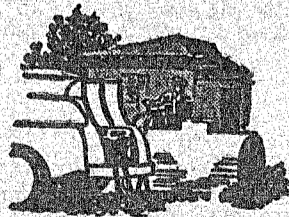

deficiency is suspected. If fertilizer has not been giving the response expected, the lack of limestone could be the limiting factor.

Bennett points out that soil samples taken now can be handled by the laboratory in about two weeks. This would allow plenty of time to get an application of limestone on the soil, if it is needed, well ahead of next spring's crops.

### For A Merry Christmas - Make It Safe

It would be interesting to discover, in this era of motivation research, what the word "holiday" means to most people. What is the first thing that flashes to mind when the word is mentioned?

**TESTS SHOW VALUE OF NEW SOYBEAN VARIETY**

College Station — Hill, a new, widely adapted soybean variety with many desirable characteristics has been released by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and nine state agricultural experiment stations, including Texas.

The new variety is recommended for most of the High Plains and part of the Rolling Plains. It is high yielding, early maturing, and resistant to lodging and shattering of pods. It is resistant to bacterial pustule, wildfire and frogeye, all major diseases of soybean foliage, and to Phytophthora rot, a fungus that attacks the roots and stems. Hill also is resistant to purple seed stain and has shown evidence of resistance to the root-knot nematode.

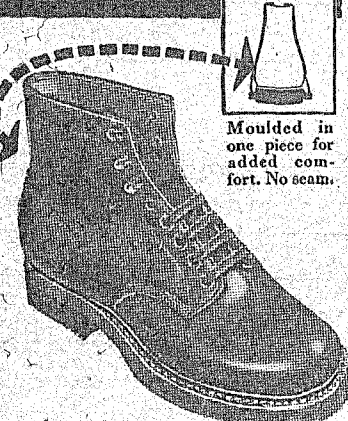

**You Are The Key To Your Own Safety**

Austin — Six hot tips for good weather driving were offered motorists today by J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association.

Based on scientific research by the National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards, under actual driving conditions and during tests conducted by professional drivers and engineers, the cardinal rules for safe winter driving are listed as follows:

1. You are the key to your own safety. Driving conditions definitely are less favorable in winter. It's up to you to winterize your car, winter-wise your driving techniques and determine to do your best to avoid accidents.

2. Rely on good tires and tire chains. Have good tires. You may prefer snow tires for winter, but you still should carry reinforced tire chains for the more severe conditions which can and will develop from time to time. Even with the help of snow tires, or the much greater help of re-

inforced tire chains, you should reduce speed on snow and ice.

3. Keep windshield and windows clear. Be sure your wiper blades are in good condition, and that wiper arms have adequate pressure to sweep snow and sleet off rather than slide over it. See that heater and defroster are working smoothly. Clear snow and ice from the windshield and all windows of your car before venturing onto the highway. Ventilate to keep your windows from fogging.

4. Get the "feel" of the road. In order to avoid unintentional sliding or spinning of your wheels, try the brakes or gently press the accelerator while driving slowly and as traffic and highway conditions permit. Then adjust speed to a comfortable, safe rate governed by the existing road and weather conditions.

5. Follow at a safe distance. Keep a good margin between your car and the vehicle ahead. It takes chainless cars from three to 12 times more distance to stop on snow and ice than it does on dry pavement.

6. Pump your brakes. A pumping action permits you to maintain better steering control on ice or slippery snow. A fast application and release of the

brakes — one or two times per controlled steering while second — will give you short intervals of maximum braking effort separated by short intervals
