### GREAT MEN

It is a source of deep wonder to many how some men find time to do so much. It is worth remembering that great men have but a few hours a day to be "great." Like the rest of us, they must give up at least seven hours a day to sleep. They must dress, bathe, shave, eat, and attend to other matters of a personal nature — visits to the dentist, physician, manicurist, barber, and conferences with their wives about domestic and family matters.

This leaves them not much more than eight hours a day to pursue their greatness. Some of these hours must be given to the job of keeping informed. A better way is to triumph over disappointment by admitting that we are only temporarily licked. At the same time we should look at our defeat as only a preliminary setback, enabling us to analyze the situation better, catch our breath, buckle down, and find some other way to get what we want out of life.

Setbacks, if they come early enough, may prove to be blessings in disguise. Alfred C. Fuller would never have founded the Fuller Brush Company if he had not been fired from the streetcar company where he worked as a conductor for 12 a week. Loss of his job resulted from his surrender to an overpowering urge to run one of the cars.

His search for a new job took him to a brush firm, and a year later he struck out for himself on the path to one of America's great success stories.

B. C. Forbes wanted to become a newspaper man. He had to work for nothing because he couldn't land a paying job in New York. The only place that would even let him work "for free" was a financial paper. From that start he became a business and financial authority.

John Robert Powers, whose school has long trained some of the leading models in the country, met success because he was a poor actor. Freddie March took him aside one day and pointed out that he could not act.

### Charles S. Ramsaur Buried Here Fri.

Funeral services for Dr. Charles Stewart Ramsaur of Dallas, were held at the Hosh Funeral Chapel at 2:30 p. m. Friday, January 29. Dr. Ramsaur died in a Dallas hospital January 27, after a brief illness.

He was born September 4, 1894 in Cedartown, Ga., and moved with his family to Santa Anna in 1909. He graduated from Santa Anna High School in 1912. He entered the University of Texas as a pre-medical student and received his medical degree from Baylor Medical School in 1927. He was a general practitioner at Kerrville for a number of years, and moved to Dallas about 12 years ago.

Dr. Ramsaur was a lifetime member of the Methodist Church and was a Sergeant in the Medical Corps during World War I.

Survivors include two sisters, Mrs. M. J. Norvell and Miss Sarah Ramsaur, both of Dallas.

### Earl Irick Handles 49 Cases in Jan.

Justice of the Peace W. Earl Irick Sr. handled a total of 49 cases in his court during the month of January and collected a total of \$1,033.80.

### License Plates Go on Sale In Santa Anna

License plates for automobiles and farm vehicles are now on sale in Santa Anna. Mr. and Mrs. Montie Guthrie are selling the plates at the Santa Anna Insurance office, located at 615 Wallis Avenue.

The new plates are just the opposite to the 1959 plates, in that they have letters and numerals on a black background. The new plates must be on all vehicles by midnight April 1. Everyone is urged to purchase their new license plates as early as possible, and avoid the rush of the last few days. Numbers issued for Santa Anna are from DH 4500 to DH 4999.

John Skelton, County Tax Assessor-Collector, said trailer owners should remember that trailers with a gross weight of 4,000 pounds or more must be titled before they can be registered. This should be done at the county tax office.

In connection with selling license plates, Mr. and Mrs. Guthrie will also render state and county taxes during the period they are selling license plates. All personal property should be rendered during this time. Your property must be rendered in order to claim your homestead exemption.

### Wreck Friday About Noon

Three cars were damaged considerably about 12:20 p. m. Friday, January 29, when William H. Adcock, 59, manager of a gin at Wingo, crashed into the rear of Tommy Upton Jr.'s car and knocked his car into the rear of Mrs. Mildred Cammack's car. The accident happened just east of the intersection at North Houston Street and Wallis Avenue.

It appears that Leland Thompson was attempting to make a left hand turn off the highway, going toward his home. Thompson saw the Adcock car was going to attempt to pass him and he pulled back to his right to avoid the collision. Apparently Adcock realized Thompson was attempting to turn and he made a deeper turn to his left, but crashed into the Upton car, which was parked in front of the Cammack home. All vehicles in the accident were headed east.

Thompson's vehicle was not involved in the accident. Heavy damage resulted to the Adcock and Upton cars, and lighter damage to the Cammack car. The accident was investigated by Deputy Sheriff Bud Simmons. No charges were filed.

### Widows of Some Veterans Entitled To G. I. Loan

A reminder was issued by P. J. Mims, manager of the VARIO in Waco that the widow of a World War II or of a Korean-Conflict veteran may be eligible for a GI loan if the veteran's death was service-connected.

Furthermore, Mims said, the fact that the deceased veterans might already have obtained a GI loan does not effect the widow's eligibility for one.

However, if the widow herself is an eligible veteran, she accrues no additional GI loan rights because of her husband's death.

GI loan applications from such widows of World War II veterans must be filed by July 25, 1960. Eligibility for Korean service extends to February 1, 1965.

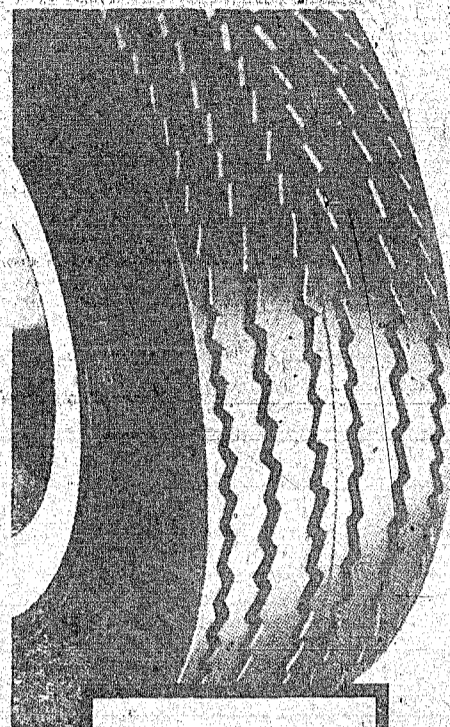

### Select Adapted Varieties for Best Cotton Production

College Station — Selection of adapted varieties of cotton can boost cotton yields, grade and profit. Cotton variety recommendations for Texas vary with soil types, climate conditions and farming practices, points out Glenn Black, associate ex-

tension cotton specialist.

The increase in mechanical harvesting should cause producers to give consideration to varieties best suited to the type of machine they plan to use. The picker varieties have open-type bolls and the stripper types have storm-resistant or storm-proof bolls in line with mechanization practices. Black says cotton should be planted in 40 inch rows with three to four plants to the row foot. Grass and weeds should be controlled for efficient machine operation and for the production of good quality cotton.

Black suggests that farmers interested in cotton yield performance should ask the local county agent for a copy of Bulletin 877, "Performance of Cotton Varieties in Texas, 1954-56."

**459 Arrested For Violation Of Game Laws**

Austin - Many hunters and fishermen are still trying to get by without buying a license, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. During December 98 persons were arrested for failure to possess licenses. For the month there were 459 arrests.

He warned that all persons fishing outside their home counties, or anyone fishing with a rod and reel must have a license, unless they are under 16 or over 65 years of age. The license costs \$2.15 for either resident or non-resident and includes saltwater as well as fresh water fishing.

Headlighters also figured heavily in the December arrests, according to the report. There were 67 convictions for headlighting at night. There were 26 charged with killing spike bucks. Exceeding the bag limit on quail brought fines to 22 persons. Ten hunters were fined for "killing doves" out of season.

Automobile hunters accounted for 19 fines. Fines were paid by 14 for killing turkey hens.

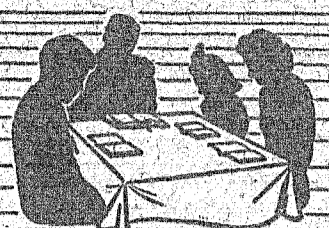

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## Census Takers Get More Personal Each Year

The census taker is getting more personal all the time.

The ancient Romans simply counted noses and property, chiefly for the purpose of taxation, according to World Book Encyclopedia.

William the Conqueror compiled a little more information

on who-owned-what when he decided to spread some payola in the form of land, among his followers, at the expense of the nobility. When his officials finished adding up the English people and their possessions in 1086, they had two huge volumes called the Domesday Book.

European cities kept to the bare facts when they began to count their population in the 1400's and 1500's. The first such count was taken in Nuremberg, Germany, 1449.

Three hundred years later Sweden compiled the first national census, based on parish records.

In 1790, the fledgling U. S. government sent out 17 marshals and a few hundred assistants to count the population in order to provide a basis for taxing the states and to determine the number of representatives they would have in Congress.

The first great invasion of privacy occurred in 1850, when census takers began to write down the names of all the people in the country. They also classified the population according to age, sex, race and place of birth.

Soon the "enumerators" were poking their noses into such matters as occupation, education, income, marital status and the fertility of women. In 1950 they wanted to know about your plumbing.

This year they're going to find out whether you're really keeping up with the Joneses. A sample of the population will be asked whether they own a washing machine, a clothes dryer, a food freezer and air conditioner... and the number of cars in the family garage.

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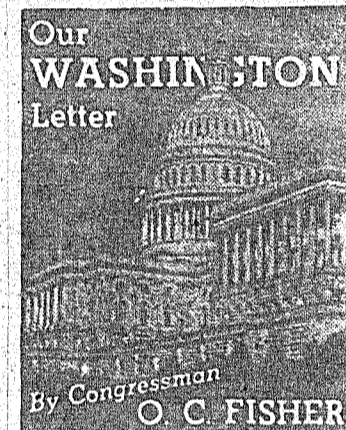

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AFTER ONE MONTH of the New Year Congress is grinding along — slowly. As anticipated, Old Man Politics is taking a hand in nearly every bill that is being pushed. It's always been that way, on Presidential election years. It is part of our system.

Every four years — and sometimes in between — so-called civil rights bills are in the forefront. A mild sort of bill was reported by a House committee last year and is before the Rules Committee — the clearing house for bills that reach the floor. But the rules committee is not a political committee and is not easily rushed. It is reluctant to advance politically-inspired election-year measures. And so it has taken no action on the bill that is the answer to some of the politicians' dreams.

Over in the Senate, all sorts of concessions have been offered under the guise of civil rights — vote-getting concessions. And a bill is expected to pass that body. And the House is expected eventually to approve one. The moderates will attempt to weed out the extreme proposals that would adversely affect freedoms and the rights and responsibilities that were supposed to have been guaranteed to the States in the Constitution.

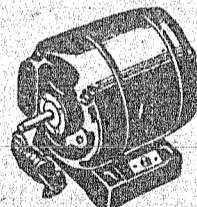
## Game Department Survey Scheduled

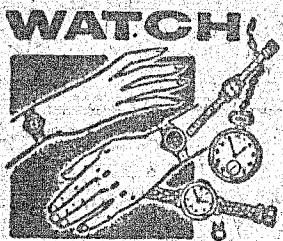

# New Pension Law And Its Effects On Vets, Dependents

## PART IV

(How will it effect me? Many



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thousands of veterans and their dependents are asking this about the new pension law recently enacted by Congress. The Santa Anna News asked the Veterans Administration for answers to basic questions about this complex legislation. Here are the answers in the fourth of five installments.

Q. There is talk of increased eligibility for widows and children under the new pension law. How many will be affected?

A. The VA estimates that approximately 200,000 widows and children, survivors of veterans who died after serving in World War II and the Korean Conflict will become eligible for pensions after July 1, 1960, when the new system goes into effect.

Q. Don't they receive pensions under the present law?

A. Only if they can show that the veteran had a service-connected disability when he died.

Q. But the widows and children of deceased World War I veterans do not have to prove any service-connected disability to obtain a pension, do they?

A. No, they do not. And after next July 1, survivors of World War II and Korean conflict veterans like survivors of World War I veterans will have to show only that the veteran had 90 days of wartime service (or a disability discharge), was not dishonorably discharged, and that their annual income is within the limits prescribed by law to indicate the need for a pension.

Q. How much pension does a widow receive now?

A. A widow with no children receives a pension of \$50.40 a month. A widow with a minor child receives \$63 a month, and if she has more than one minor

child, she receives an additional \$7.56 for each extra minor child.

Q. What is the present limit on annual income for widows drawing pensions?

A. A childless widow may at present receive a pension if her annual income is not more than \$1,400. A widow with children may be eligible for a pension if her annual income does not exceed \$2,700.

Q. How will the new law change all this for a childless widow?

A. Under the new system a childless widow will receive \$60 a month if her income is not more than \$600 a year; \$45 a month if her annual income is more than \$600 but not more than \$1,200; and \$25 a month if her annual income exceeds \$1,200 but is not more than \$1,800. If her income is more than \$1,800 a year she is not eligible to receive a pension.

Q. How will the new law affect a widow with children?

A. Under the new system a widow with one child will receive \$75 a month if her annual income is not more than \$1,000; \$60 a month if her annual income is more than \$1,000 but not more than \$2,000; and \$40 a month if her annual income is more than \$2,000 but not more than \$3,000. If she has more than one minor child, she will receive an extra \$15 a month for each additional child. A widow with a child or children is not eligible to receive a pension if her annual income is more than \$3,000.

Q. What is the income limit for orphans, and how much do they receive under the present law?

A. At present orphans of veterans are eligible for pensions if their outside income is not more than \$1,400 a year. Pension payments are \$27.30 a month for one orphan; \$40.95 a month for two; \$54.60 for three, and an extra \$7.56 for each additional child. Q. What are the income limits and pension payments for orphans under the new system?

A. Under the new system orphans will be eligible for pension

if their outside income is not more than \$1,800 a year, not counting their own earnings. Payments will amount to \$35 a month for one orphan plus \$15 more for each additional child, divided equally.

## Buoys to Mark Fishing Reefs Off P. Aransas

Austin — An application will be made to the Coast Guard and Corps of Engineers immediately for permission to install a buoy marker over the artificial fishing reef off Port Aransas, according to the director of marine fisheries of the Game and Fish Commission.

This reef was created last year by the dumping of 600 old car bodies at a 10 fathom depth near the whistling buoy off Port Aransas. Although fishing conditions around the reef were materially improved, fishermen without sonic equipment have difficulty in finding it.

A temporary buoy marker will be installed as soon as permission can be received, the director said. Meantime, plans are going forward to purchase a permanent type buoy, which will cost upward of \$2,500.

There are at present two other car body reefs off the Texas coast. One is near Port Isabel. This reef is not too difficult to locate. It is close enough to land to be located by triangulation.

The other reef is near Freeport, not too far from a known natural reef. It is fairly easy to locate.

Fishermen who have been making good catches around the reefs are loud in their praise of improved fishing. Although the reefs were at first planned to improve snapper fishing, it has been found that many other fish are also caught around them, including kings and mackerel. The old car bodies provide a haven for small fish, which are food fish for the larger species. This brings in the larger fish.

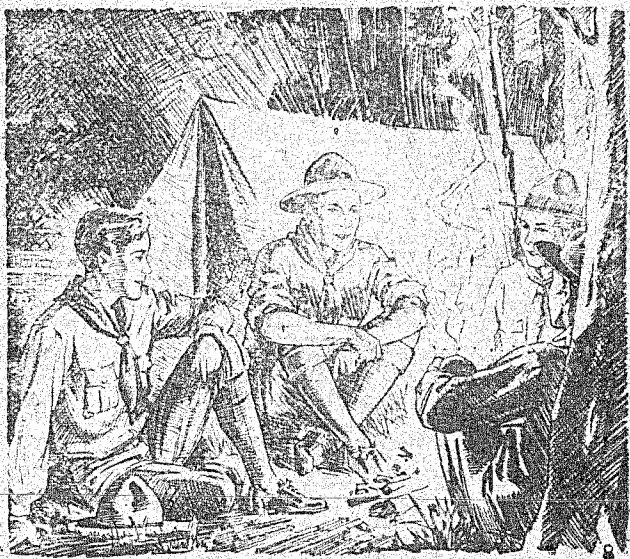

### Widows of Veterans May Be Eligible For GI Loans

A reminder that the widow of a World War II or of a Korean-Conflict veteran may be eligible for a GI loan if the veteran's death was service-connected and was issued by the Veterans Administration.

Furthermore, VA said, the fact that the deceased veterans might already have obtained a GI loan does not affect the widow's eligibility for one.

However, if the widow herself is an eligible veteran, she accrues no additional GI loan rights because of her husband's death.

GI loan applications from such widows of World War II veterans must be filed by July 25, 1960. Korean-Conflict eligibility extends to Feb. 1, 1965.

### Series of Meetings To Acquaint Vets, Widows With Law

The VA Regional Office in Waco, Texas, is planning a series of meetings throughout the Central Texas area to acquaint veterans and widows with the provisions of the new VA pension law which goes into effect July 1, 1960.

J. J. Mims, Manager of the Waco Office, announced today there would be an opportunity for everyone interested to learn more about the new VA pension law by attending an open meeting to be held in Brownwood, Texas, February 4, 1960 at 2:00 p. m. o'clock in Brownwood Hotel.

This new legislation, known as Public Law 86-211, is especially important to some 7,000 Central Texas veterans, their widows and dependent children, who are now receiving pension payments. It is also of particular interest to widows and dependent children of WWII and Korean veterans who may have been previously denied benefits.

Some veterans and widows will get an increase in benefits under this new law. On the other hand, it will be advantageous for some to continue receiving benefits under the present law. Those who are receiving must choose the law under which they wish to receive benefits.

Others previously ineligible because of the amount of their annual income may be eligible under the new law as income limitations have been increased up to \$400. Also, widows of WWII and Korean veterans are now eligible for pension benefits if their income permits.

All veterans and widows who believe they may be affected and others who are interested in learning more about benefits available under the new VA pension law are encouraged to at-

tend.
