State Supreme Court has refused to overturn a lower court ruling that Dallas was not entitled to a court order freeing it from the effects of the state's anti-integration law. A law, passed in 1957 says that a school district that integrates without a local option election shall lose its state aid. For Dallas this would be some \$2,600,000 a year

A grant of money from the Veterans Administration to aid in acquiring specially adapted housing is now available to certain blinded veterans as well as eligible veterans who have lost Cost: \$21,000,000 a year, of which the use of both, legs, the VA said.



### Farmers Have Choice of 2 Dates For Filing Returns

Self-employed farmers who report their earnings on a calendar year basis have a choice of due dates for filing their income tax returns and paying the social security tax, R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of the Abilene social security office said today.

A farm operator may either file his return and pay the tax on his 1959 earnings on or be-fore February 15, 1960, or file an estimate of his tax and pay this amount by January 15, 1960. If he chooses to file an estimate he can then file his return and pay any balance due by April 15,

Only total earnings up to a maximum of \$4,800 a year should be reported for 1959. The social Farm Property security tax on 1959 self-employment earnings is 334 percent. While the social security tax goes up to 4½ percent on self-employment earnings on January 1, this increase will not affect the farm operator's report on his 1959 earnings.

## **Blasting Caps Injury Many** Each Year

J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association issued a warning today against blasting caps used which each year blind or main many youngsters in the United States

These caps which are used to detonate charges of dynamite may appear to a boy or girl to be harmless, but "in the hands of an inexperienced person they are extremely dangerous," the safety expert said.

In a statement directed to both adults and boys and girls Musick warned, "anyone finding a cap should not touch it, but should simmediately report it to the police or some other law en-forcement officer.' These officers know how to dispose of them without harm to anyone.

Some boys and girls do not know a blasting cap when they see one. Others know the caps will explode but are unaware of the grave danger involved. The detonation of a blasting cap sends pieces of metal flying out in all directions with the speed of a rifle bullet. These metal fragments can injure or blind a person even at a distance of

Blasting caps are copper or alhandle between 100 to 999 head uminum cylinders about as big each, and many more such feed around as a lead pencil and lots with capacities of less than from 1 to 6 inches long. There are two kinds of caps. The "ordinary cap" is exploded by a Business finds, that increased burning fuse inserted in the open end. The other kind is an electric blasting cap. It has wires coming out one end. When electric current is applied to the wires the cap explodes. Blasting caps are used in mining, quarrying and construction work, land clearing, oil prospecting, pipe line laying, and many other necessary jobs in industry and agriculture.

Skilled blasters who work with caps handle them with as much care as they use with dynamite. Some boys and girls, however, think of them as fascinating

Blasting caps sometimes are lost or stolen. Youngsters find them and think it would be fun to hit one with a stone or pick at it with a knife or nail. This is almost sure to explode the sensitige charge in the cap.

Musick says the only safe advice for a boy or girl is "DON'T TOUCH BLASTING CARS


