Santa Anna High School girls basketball team took its second bi-district title in a row when they defeated the Blanket girls on Tuesday night at the Howard Payne College gymnasium. The final score was 39-32 with Gay Rutherford high point scorer with 15. Scoring 11 points each were Patti Perkins and Sherrie McIver, and Cindy Hartman scored 2.

Also playing in the game Tuesday night, were guards Linda Dean, Debbie Horton, Gayle Robinett, and Tony Allen.

Hampered by numerous turnovers throughout the game, the two teams were tied 10-10 at the first quarter. The half-time score was 22-20 in favor of the Mounties, and at the end of the third quarter Santa Anna had a 29-26 lead over the Tigerettes.

A stalling game was played by the Santa Anna girls during the fourth quarter although they continued to score over the Blanket girls. The local team has won district championships for the last three years and were regional finalists last year. The class B regional tournament will be held in Stephenville this weekend with the teams and schedule to be announced later.

Coach Zelma Strickland was informed Wednesday of the schedule for the regional tournament on Friday and Saturday in Stephenville. Few Candidates Have Filed For April Elections

With less than two weeks remaining before the filing deadline, only one candidate has filed for a place on the City Council ballot and one candidate for the School District Board of Trustees. Thomas Wristen, Jr., has filed for re-election as mayor of Santa Anna.

Mrs. Gale Allen is the only candidate who has announced for a City Council position, with H. A. "Sy" Burden and Louis Miles Guthrie the other incumbents. Mrs. Allen has served since last spring when she was appointed to fill the unexpired term of her late husband.

Mrs. Curtis (Bettie) Bryan of Rockwood has officially filed for re-election to the school board after serving a one-year elected term. Others whose terms expire this year are Joe Wise and Richard Horner. Mr. Wise was unavailable for comment and Mr. Horner stated that he was undecided about running for another term.

Deadline for filing for both elections is Wednesday, March 3. City candidates may get the application forms at the city hall while the candidates for trustee may file for a position on the ballot at the local school business office or at the office of the County Judge in Coleman.

Elections for both the city officials and the school trustees will be held on Saturday, April 3.

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In Our Opinion

ON MAY 18, THE STATE will vote on four Constitutional amendments, one of which we would like to discuss right now.

May 18 a quite a time off but we certainly think the people should inform themselves on the amendments well before the time they have to vote on them.

We are inclined to go along with Senator Henry C. Grover of Houston when he claims that it is an ethics bill designed to raise the pay of the Legislature.

The only way the pay of the Legislature can be raised is by Constitutional amendment. Nothing in this amendment could not be passed by normal procedures except Paragraph 4 under Section 24 which reads: "The commission shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor at an amount higher than that of other members notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary of Article IV, Section 17, of the Texas Constitution."

According to Sen. Grover, there is nothing in the amendment that could not be passed by statute in the Legislature, except the pay raise paragraph.

No doubt there is a need for legislation covering the ethics of our elected officials, especially since the recent scandals over the insurance stock deals.

There is no question that a legislator has to have a supplementary income. If they spend 60 days a year in Austin on \$800 salary, they are not doing too bad. They know they need another source of income, but they should get it from some place that they would not mind the public knowing about. And, the public certainly has no objections to them making additional money legitimately. What we don't want them to do is to use the influence of their office in order to gain in any questionable way.

In other words they should willingly file a financial statement for public scrutiny.

IN THE BEGINNING the design for Social Security was good, in that it gave the elderly an income after age 65 and made them independent so that they didn't have to depend on help from some other source. Also they were able to make a small income before losing any of their social security. But inflation has all but wiped out the benefits. Not only is it impossible for the elderly to get by on Social Security, the limited additional income they can make has remained at about \$140 a month, so that if they work extra their living costs still run more than their income.

Senator John Tower has introduced legislation that would increase their maximum earnings to \$3,000 a year. This would give them a chance to at least have a living while drawing Social Security.

It also would be an incentive for those physically able to do work to make themselves available for employment. In the smaller communities, it is next to impossible to find anyone to work. We read about unemployment, but try to find someone who will do a job and see how much trouble it is.

It also encourages dishonesty, because some will earn more but never report it.

There is always a market for part-time employees, and that would be the category of the Social Security recipient. He would not only earn a little more, but would have a feeling that he is needed, which never hurts one's moral.

Our senior citizens could make a real contribution to the welfare of the community, if we would only let them.

STATE Capital NEWS By VERN SANFORD

Austin — Legislators have cleared major emergency finance hurdles and are moving to other fronts to hold down the size of the tax bill.

A \$34.9 million appropriation bill to avert reduction in aid to needy families with dependent children passed both houses and went to Comptroller Robert S. Calvert for certification.

Before he would accept the bill, Calvert advised passage of another which would re-align priorities in the state's massive omnibus tax clearance fund. In effect, this would permit turning over to welfare some \$35 million that normally would go to the teacher retirement fund between April and August.

Teachers association and retirement fund an estimated formal objection to the latter, although it would cost the retirement fund an estimated \$100,000 to \$600,000 in short-term interest. However, the fund will be repaid in full when the ultimate new tax bill goes into effect on September 1.

While these measures were moving methodically through the House and Senate, the House passed a bill to establish a \$185 million bond plan to finance construction on eight new college campuses. Bonds would be repaid from tuition, and would cost taxpayers little. Final approval of the plan in the Senate would relieve the tax bill of a heavy load in order to build new institutions already authorized by the 1969 Legislature.

Still another potentially important money bill won quick Senate approval. It would require all cities and counties population 10,000 and above, to report to the state all welfare spending for the medically needy. If federal officials will agree, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes proposes subsequent legislation to require all these local funds be routed through the state treasury, where hopefully they would attract an extra \$100 million in two-to-one matching federal aid.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Preston Smith nominated Lester Clark of Breckenridge to succeed David E. Clemens of Mineral Wells on the Texas Water Quality Board.

Dr. Charles Max Cole of Dallas was named to succeed the late Dr. Noble Price of Lamesa on the State Board of Health.

Smith also sent these additional appointments to the Senate for confirmation: Stephen Willis Simmons of El Paso to succeed Jamie C. Boyd as 34th district attorney.

Elo J. Urbanovsky of Lubbock and Gene Ray Hend-

ryx of Alpine to the Texas Conservation Foundation.

Dr. Denver Fred Wendorf of Dallas, Dr. William Curry Holden of Lubbock and Dr. William Newcomb Jr. of Austin to Texas Antiquities Committee.

J. Wonne Hand of Dallas, James M. Ray of Austin and Dr. Bobby Gene Smith of Arlington to the Crime and Narcotics Advisory Commission.

Edwin A. Flieller of Floresville to the San Antonio River Authority board of directors.

Warren Woodward of Dallas and Truett Smith of Wylie were selected Texas Industrial Commission vice chairman and secretary-treasurer.

"PEOPLE'S LOBBY" FORMS — A new liberal group — including representatives of labor, ethnic and environmental interest — has organized an "issues-oriented" people's lobby.

About 300 attended the organizational meeting. Former U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough and former U. S. Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark were the main speakers.

Congressman Bob Eckhardt of Houston was named temporary chairman and State Sens. Barbara Jordan of Houston and Joe Bernal of San Antonio, temporary vice-chairmen. Twelve steering committee members were chosen to work with them.

By a divided vote, the group decided to steer clear of candidate endorsements (although there was plenty of speculation at the meeting that Yarborough may run for governor in 1972) and concentrate on specific legislative goals.

COURTS SPEAK — Houston's Kirkwood Civic Club, which insures enforcement of deed restrictions and sponsors lawn-beautification contests, is not exempt from the state franchise tax, says the State Supreme Court.

A letter terming a woman an "undesirable" renter (filed with an apartment association) was a privileged communication and not libelous, High Court ruled in another Harris County case.

Supreme Court dismissed

for want of jurisdiction a San Antonio-Bexar County dispute over a cancelled incorporation election for "Hills and Dales Community" along Interest 10.

Brownsville lawyer ordered disbarred by a district judge lost his appeal to the Supreme Court.

In Cherokee County deed-interpretation case, High Court concluded that iron which can be produced only by surface-destroying strip-mining is not a mineral.

Third Court of Civil Appeals held that Humble Oil and Refining Company is entitled to get back \$92,000 in taxes paid (the state, plus interest, on oil and gas leases at Corpus Christi Naval Air Station.

Third Court agreed that Mertzon Independent School District had the right to annex Barnhart ISD.

AG OPINIONS — State Comptroller is required to pay counties 25 cents for registration of voters under 21, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that: Comptroller does not have the affirmative duty to withhold issuing state warrants to agencies of the state where an employment - discrimination complaint has been lodged.

Exchange of real estate between Dalhart and the Dalhart school district requires publication of a notice and a public hearing.

Omnibus crime control grants can go to non-profit groups, individuals and non-state supported schools if qualifications are met.

An ex-convict, although pardoned by governor last May 26, must wait three years to get wine and beer retailer's

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52 of this Constitu-

permit. Money held by the Texas State Board of Examiners in Optometry cannot be spent without legislative authority. Fees collected from adult probationers may be used for paying probation officers' salaries, his office help, travel expense and training.

State Board of Examiners of Psychologists cannot certify psychologists who don't have a master's degree. State Health Department can require the seal of a licensed, professional engineer on plans for hospitals and other institutions.

OPEN MEETING AMENDMENT PROPOSED — A bill require notice before and posting of minutes afterward concerning closed-door meetings of public agencies was heard by the House State Affairs Committee.

Closed meetings now can be held legally to discuss personnel, real estate or security matters.

Bill by Rep. Dave Allred of Wichita Falls would ban these meetings, but would require notice in advance that they are to be held. Within three days, under the bill, minutes sketching the action which took place in the closed meeting would have to be made public. Bill went to sub-committee for study.

Meanwhile, Sen. Mike McKoll of Dallas introduced a bill (SB 314) to require publishers, broadcasters and billboard concerns to change their "lowest" rate for political advertising. Bill proposes \$100 fine and recovery action for "excess charge."

FIRST BILL SIGNED — First bill of the legislative session — reopening voter registration through February

was signed into law by Governor Smith.

Voters who register this month cannot take part in elections before April. Those who registered before the close of the old deadline, in January, can vote by March 1.

SHORT SNORTS Legislature has resolutions calling on U. S. Secretary of Agriculture to allow Texas more time to comply with federal meat inspection standards before taking over the inspection program. Senate approved constitutional amendments to require annual sessions of the legislature, repeal of the annual voter registration requirement and to allow 18-year-olds to vote in all elections.

A fish kill (with rotenone) is scheduled at Lyndon B. Johnson Reservoir near Marble Falls, March 27-28, to rid the lake of rough fish. Hundreds of fishermen are expected to be there with nets.

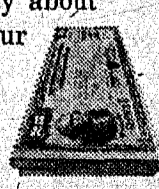

The Agriculture Act of 1970 provides for better farming on the part of all producers who participate in the cotton, wheat or feed grain programs. The cotton payment yield will finally be based on the actual cotton produced on the farm. In order to receive payment, the cotton must be farmed in a workmanlike manner.

In order to receive history under the feed grain program, the grain sorghums must be farmed with the expectation of producing a grain crop. Planting for the purpose of grazing will not qualify for feed grain history.

The set-aside acreage for cotton, feed grain and wheat must be representative of the farm as to productivity. The acreage set-aside must be cropland and is expected to produce as good a crop as the land on which the cotton or feed grain is planted.

The final approved percentages of set-aside for the 1971 programs as follows: cotton, 20 per cent of the base allotment; feed grain, 20 per cent of the base, wheat, 75 per cent of the allotment.

Under the 1971 program, set-aside acreage cannot be moved after designated. If a producer has only wheat, the set-aside acreage must be designated at the time of the certification of the wheat crop is made.

Feed grain bases and wheat allotments with the yields, required set-aside, payment rates and conserving bases will be mailed on or before February 25.

The conserving base is an important part of compliance with any or all of these programs. It is necessary that this acreage be treated in the way the programs provide. A copy of these specifications will be mailed or given to you at the time you sign your intention.

Farmers may now file a disaster report on wheat prior to the time the wheat land is actually plowed. If sufficient wheat has been planted

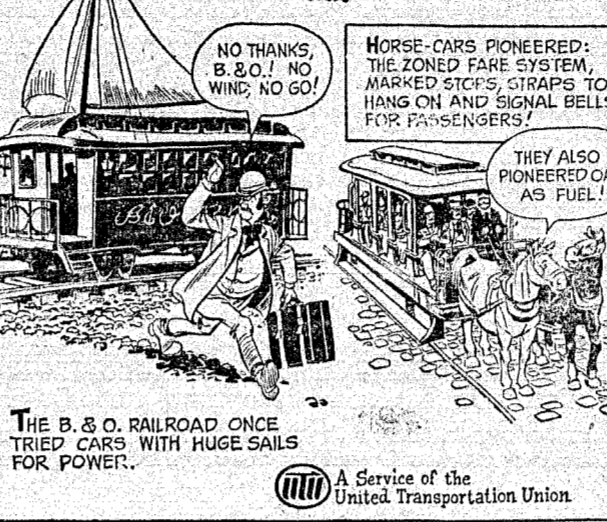
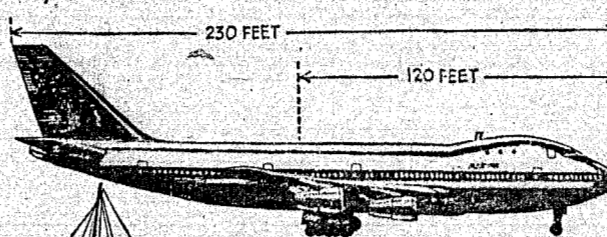

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Fighting Back

Pacificts speak of turning the other cheek. Does the law call for that kind of forbearance? Or may you, when struck, lawfully strike back?

Generally speaking you may indeed strike back. Your act of violence is forgiven if it is inflicted in your own protection. Courts often refer to the right of self defense as "a primary law of nature."

But it is a right with very distinct limits. Defending yourself is one thing; escalating the conflict is quite another. Take this case:

Janet and Marge were in love with the same man. During an argument, Janet began pulling Marge's hair. Marge retaliated by grabbing a pistol and shooting Janet in the leg. Could Marge justify her action as self defense?

No, ruled a court, because Marge had used considerably more force than the situation called for. When that happens, as one judge put it:

"The character of the combat is changed. The assaulted becomes the assailant."

Furthermore, the right of self defense lasts only as long as the danger lasts.

Suppose a schoolboy hits a passing pedestrian with a snowball. Could the man chase the boy and give him a thrashing in the name of self defense? No, because the danger is ended. The man's motive would be not to defend himself but to punish the boy.

Of course it may be difficult for the person attacked, in the heat of an encounter, to measure his danger. Therefore, the law usually gives him the benefit of the doubt.

In one case a grocer and his wife, taking home their cash receipts late at night, were accosted by a group of rowdies. When one youth laid hold of his wife, the frightened grocer shot and wounded him.

As it turned out, the victim had just wanted to ask for directions. Nevertheless, the grocer was held liable in court. The judge said self defense may be exercised not only when there is danger but also when there reasonably appears to be danger. And in this case, the danger did seem real.

A few prisoners have made it back. They talk about bamboo cages. Vicious beatings. Malnutrition. Humiliation.

But the North Vietnamese will tell us nothing. And it's this silence that makes our appeal more urgent.

For the families at home, there is no word on who's alive. Who's dead. Or even who's being held. There is nothing. Except the anguish of not knowing.

Maybe you can change this. By writing to the one man who can change it: The President of North Vietnam.

Ask him to release the names of prisoners, allow them to write to their families, and let the Red Cross inspect the prisons to

insure proper medical treatment and living conditions.

Remind him that he is bound by the 1949 Geneva Convention which his country signed. And by the Istanbul resolution.

North Vietnamese leaders do care about American public opinion. And if they think they can gain something by bowing to it, they will.

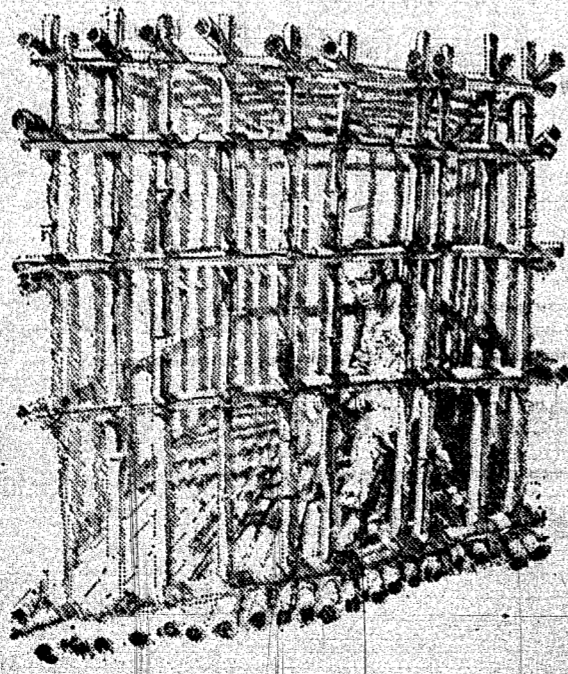
But one letter won't do it. Or a thousand. Maybe it will take millions. So we've got to write now. All of us. And often.

Write a letter tonight. And send it to: Office of the President, Democratic Republic of Vietnam, Hanoi, North Vietnam.

It'll cost you a quarter. But it might save a life.
