The four girls and their coach, Miss Zelma Strickland are leaving Thursday (today) after school and will have entries in five events. The four girls from the SAHS team were winners in the district meet at Gold-tiwaite two weeks ago. Tony Allen and LeAnn Bryan are entered in two events. Tony will be in the 100 yard

dash and the 220 yard run. LeAnn will compete in the 220 yard run and the 880 yard run.

Nola Wells is entered in the triple jump and Carol Kingsbery is in high jump.

At San Antonio the girls will compete with only entries from A & B schools. Winners of first through third place in each event will qualify for the state meet.

Preliminaries in the running events will begin at 10 a. m. Friday morning. Field events will start at 2:00 p. m.

Frosh, Jr. High Place At Meet In Dist. 12-B

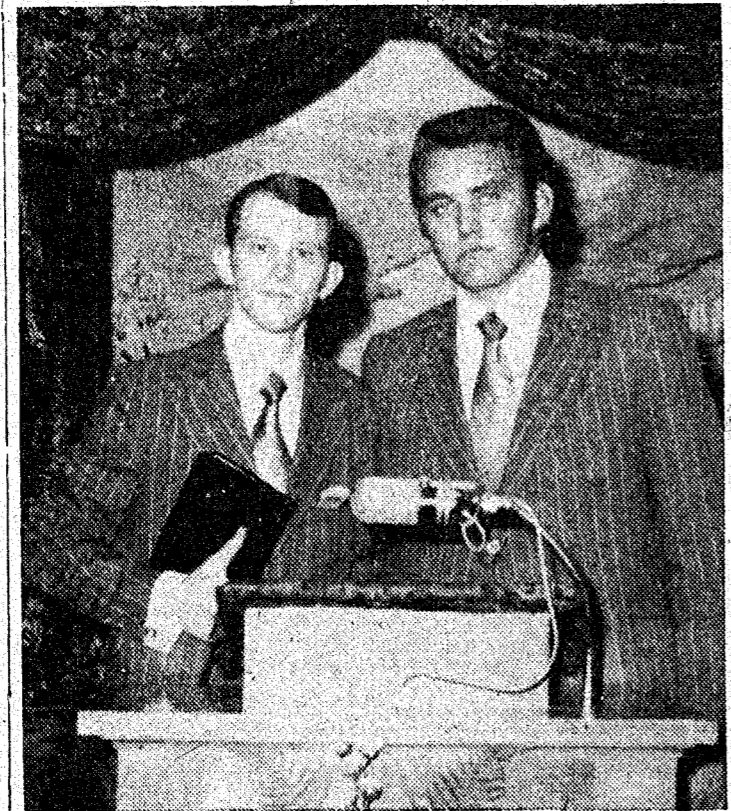
The five-man SAHS freshman track team was second place in the district meet at Rochelle last Thursday, just behind the Gustine freshmen boys. The local tracksters had four first places, winning the 880 and 440 yard relays, 100-yard dash and the 800 yard run.

David Huggins was winner of the 100 yard event and W. T. Young won the 880. On the relay teams were Huggins, Young, Danny Valdez and Duane Aldridge.

Young also placed fourth in the high jump. The fifth member of the freshman squad is Mark Shambeck who participated in the hurdles events.

In the junior high division of the Thursday meet coach Dwight Hudson's team had several winners including a first place in the 880 yard run by Steven Early. The 440 yard relay team placed second and the 880 yard relay was fourth. Boys on the team were Lee Wristen, Guy Allen, Terry Day, and John Rendon. Rendon and Wristen tied for third in the 440 yard run and Glen Kuykendall was third in the chinning event.

The junior high track team members will be participating in events in the Coleman County Little Olympics which will be held in Coleman early next month. The district meet at Rochelle ended the season for the freshmen boys.

Two San Angelo Youths Arrested In Narcotics Raid Near Rockwood

Two San Angeloans, Gary Black and Judith Fairchild, were arrested Saturday and charged with possession of narcotics after being apprehended in a narcotic raid at

an unoccupied house two miles south of Rockwood.

The two were the only persons charged from the party of 21 people who were apprehended in the raid.

According to sheriff's deputy Rondoe Horton, he and deputy H. F. Fenton, Jr., had had the house staked out since Monday when tipped off after plants thought to be marijuana were found growing in containers in the house. The two officers were joined Friday night by a federal narcotics agent who assisted with the arrest at 3:45 p. m. Saturday afternoon.

Black and Miss Fairchild arrived at the house at 3:00 p. m. in the young woman's automobile. The other people arrived soon after that in four other cars, one pickup and one panel truck. In the search officers found some pills, thought to be narcotics, and a package of marijuana in Miss Fairchild's car.

After questioning the young people, mostly students at Angelo State University, the two arrested were taken to Coleman and charged before Peace Justice Walter Holt. Black was charged on two counts and Miss Fairchild was charged on one count and both were released on bond.

None of the group at the house were local people.

Deputy Horton said that the three tubs, one five-gallon can and a stew pan contained about 100 marijuana seedlings which were from new sprouts to three inches in height. According to Mr. Horton marijuana is usually started indoors and then transplanted outside until ready to harvest.

The arrests Saturday make the eleventh in recent months for charges of possession of narcotics within Coleman County.

Douglas Lykins Seriously Hurt In Plane Crash

Douglas Lykins of Hurst, a former resident of Santa Anna, was seriously injured in a plane crash last Friday at a Fort Worth airport. Full extent of his injuries is not known at this time, but he has at least three crushed vertebrae and possible internal injuries. He will be placed in a body cast for several weeks, and is a patient in the Hurst General Hospital.

A friend of Fort Worth had purchased a new plane and asked Mr. Lykins to go up with him for a ride. When they came in for a landing the plane crashed. It is believed there was a malfunction of the landing gear, but cause of the crash is under investigation.

The owner and pilot of the plane sustained a broken back and is in intensive care in a Fort Worth hospital.

Local relatives of Mr. Lykins are his mother, Mrs. R. M. Lykins, Sr., two sisters, Mrs. G. H. Summers and Mrs. M. R. Pollock, and a sister-in-law, Mrs. O. T. Taylor. His wife is the former Gaveva Stearns of Trickham.

SAHS REGIONAL UIL WINNER TO STATE LITERARY CONTEST

One Santa Anna High School student will be in Austin this weekend for the State University Interscholastic League literary contests after winning in regional competition at Stephenville last weekend.

Jim See, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dawson See, was first place winner in the regional science contest Friday. He was first place winner in the district event for two consecutive years but will be competing at the state level for the first time.

Judy Brusenhan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Junior Brusenhan of Rockwood, was second place winner in the informative speaking contest with seven other entries. Judy was first place winner in the district contest.

In the speaking contests only first place entries are

eligible to compete at the state meet.

Modern Cave-Dwelling

"If the present trend in construction costs are not reversed, we will be living in caves before the century is out."

That startling prospect was suggested by the editor of an architect's magazine last summer, following his observation that the richest nation on earth "can no longer afford to build buildings."

All the big factors in construction—land cost, labor and materials cost and mortgage interest—have been rising so fast in recent months that the prospect of widespread cave-dwelling by the year 2000 may not be so preposterous, after all. If present trends are not reversed, as he said.

It's safe to say that a large number of people who might have financed a house a couple of years ago have been priced out of the market by higher home prices, tight money and the inflationary pinch on the family budget. In many cases, family savings for a down payment have been falling behind increases in the amount needed.

When union construction workers can earn up to \$20,000 a year (and \$100 a day on some jobs), and mortgage costs can add \$40,000 to the cost of a \$25,000 home, at the same time inflation is eating into consumers' ability to pay, then there is cause for alarm.

Back to the caves? Maybe. But one question: What kind of wages will the cave-diggers' union demand?

Coleman County has been approved for two phases of the drought program. At the present time the drought in Texas has not been determined to be a disaster. It is considered as an emergency only. If and when the counties in the extreme drought area are considered as a disaster, additional programs will be available for the counties approved.

One of the two programs approved for Coleman County under the drought emergency program is free grazing of CAP land, that is, Cropland Adjustment Program under which eleven farms or

part farms are signed in the county.

The other program is free grazing of set-aside acreage. This program begins now and currently end June 30th.

Monday we received an official notice from the State Distaster Committee approving Coleman County for Livestock Feed Program. Before we can initiate this program, it must be approved in Washington. We are expecting approval within a short time.

This part of the emergency program contains this assistance: for hay the government will pay a limit of \$20.00 a ton on transportation cost. If a rancher hauls his own hay, an allowance of six cents a hundredweight is paid to the livestock owner upon presentation of proper freight bills.

The other part of the Livestock Feed Program contains assistance in purchasing milo, oats, and corn, if available.

Primary foundation herds consist of the breeding stock plus young animals kept for breeding purposes. This type livestock will be permitted 5 pounds of grain a day. Assistance for milo is \$1.61 per hundredweight.

Assistance for oats is 59 cents a bushel or \$1.85 per cwt.

These figures represent 80 per cent of the county loan rate plus price support.

Livestock owners will be notified when Coleman County is approved for livestock feed.

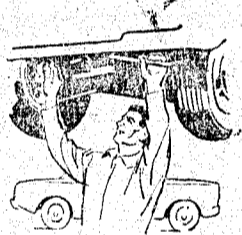
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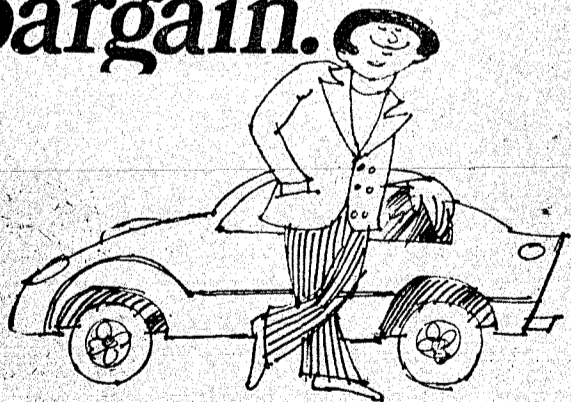
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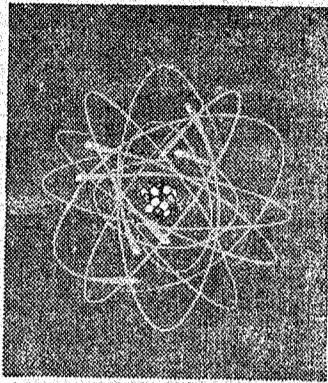
Well, What Do You Know? fun, games and knowledge

What do you know about atoms?

At one time or another you may have taken apart a toy or a clock to see what made it work. The result was simply a collection of parts—wheels, screws, and pins. If you were clever enough, you put them back together again and rebuilt the toy or clock. Or perhaps you made something else out of them.



Modern scientists have learned to do much the same thing with matter. Matter is anything that takes up space and has weight; it can be a liquid, a solid, or a gas. All matter can be split into smaller and smaller pieces. A molecule is the smallest piece that keeps the characteristics of the original substance.

With special equipment a molecule can be broken down into still smaller parts. These

are atoms. If all the atoms of a molecule are put back together properly, they will form the same molecule. But if the atoms are rearranged, a different kind of molecule will be made. This is why atoms are called the building blocks of matter.

Do you know how April got its name? No one really knows how April, the fourth month, got its name. Some people think April was named for Aphrodite, the Greek goddess of love. Others think that the name came from a Latin verb meaning "to open" or a Greek word meaning "the opening." In fact, the Greeks called the season of spring "the opening."

In any case, though spring officially starts in March, April really ushers in this season of growth for all nature. In the plant and animal kingdoms, April is a time of "opening."

Do you know what gerontology is?

Gerontology is a fairly new science that studies aging. The word comes from the Greek *geron*, "an old man." The aim of gerontology is to find out as much as possible about aging in man and animals. Eventually, gerontologists hope to find ways of slowing aging down and of making people stay healthy longer.

Low Tar Level And Nicotine

Do cigarettes with low levels of tar and nicotine make any difference?

The proof is not yet in. But recent evidence presented by Dr. Ernest L. Wynder, president of the American Health Foundation, suggests that low levels of tar—the substance most associated with lung cancer—may slightly reduce a smoker's risk of developing that disease. But the slightly reduced risk is apparent only in smokers who have used filtered cigarettes with low levels of tar for at least 13 years. The research was published in a September issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Experiments with smoking dogs who developed lung cancer and emphysema show similar effects. Cigarettes with filter tips that reduce the tar content caused less extensive

lung damage than nonfiltered cigarettes.

Nicotine, however, is the compound most smokers get hooked on. Nicotine constricts the small arteries, cuts down on the flow of blood through the body, triggers a discharge of sugar from the liver into the bloodstream. Researchers also suspect that the hormonal upset in the blood caused by nicotine may be detrimental to normal functioning.

Lower doses of nicotine probably cause less distress to the body. But people hooked on nicotine tend to smoke more cigarettes when they switch to ones with low levels of nicotine. So they wipe out any benefits.

Tars and nicotine, however, are only two of the dangerous ingredients in cigarette smoke. Carbon monoxide reduces the oxygen-carrying capacity of the blood. Chemicals called phenols first stop and then destroy the small hairlike mechanisms, cilia, that keep the lungs clean and ward off infection.

There are no safe cigarettes—regardless of the levels of tars and nicotine. To find out more about ways to quit smoking, contact your local tuberculosis and respiratory disease association. They have some timely suggestions.

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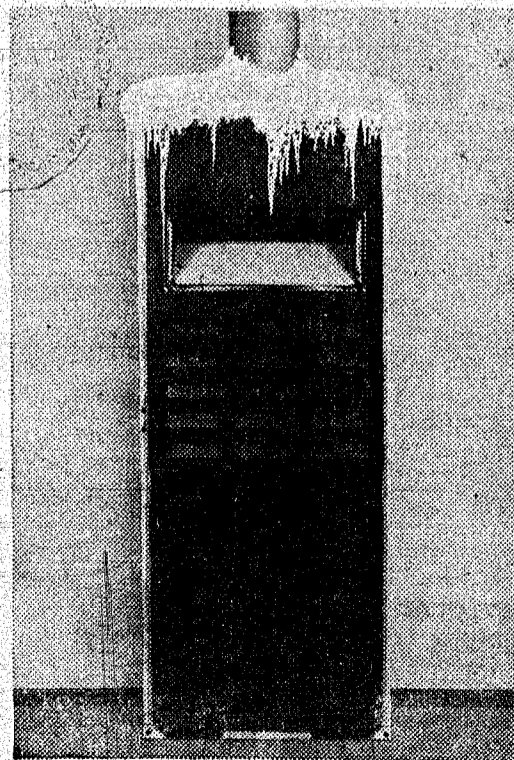

Two From CCTC In Washington At Conference

Omar Burleson, O. C. Fisher and W. R. Poage, Congressmen and Senators Loyd Benson and John Tower were visited in Washington, D. C., April 19 and 20 by Thomas Wristen and Glen Copeland of the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative.

Wristen and Copeland were in the nation's capitol for the second annual Legislative Conference of the National Telephone Cooperative Association.

The congressmen and senators were among more than 100 legislators visited by the members of the telephone association.

The purpose of the visits was to acquaint members of Congress and the Senate with facts concerning the REA Telephone Loan Program. Coleman County Telephone Cooperative is a borrower from REA.

Among important pieces of legislation discussed with the lawmakers were the Telephone Bank bill and the annual appropriations bill which finances the REA Telephone Loan program.

The Telephone Bank bill, which has already received the approval of the House and Senate, would establish a new financing institution to provide capital to the nation's small rural telephone companies.

Passage of this bill is needed if rural telephone companies are ever to be able to provide their subscribers modern telephone service.

Talks about appropriations centered on the need for continued 2 per cent financing for REA Telephone borrowers as well as the need to increase the level of loan appropriations.

The President's budget for the up-coming fiscal year calls for loans totalling \$125 million. This is the same amount as was asked for last year. Congress appropriated an extra \$5 million last year, which the Administration has frozen.

The backlog of loan applications now totals more than \$450 million—at least a 4 year wait at present funding levels.

It is hoped that between the Telephone Bank and increased appropriations the wait for funding can be cut to less than one year in the future.
