

ONE PHASE OF THE EFFECTS of drugs possibly has escaped the attention of many people and that is a newborn baby can come into the world already addicted if it is born to a mother who is an addict.

"Once you've heard it, you can never forget it," said a physician describing the cry of an infant suffering withdrawal pain. If a pregnant woman takes drugs it will automatically addict the fetus, we are told.

Dr. Heinz Eichenwald, chief of staff at Southwest-ern Medical School, said, "we've got at least one in the nursery all the time." It is a situation that physicians look for in diagnosing what they call a "passively addicted newborn.'

The sad thing about it is that such cases are increasing. Last year there were only about ten cases in Children's Hospital, and the year before none that they recognized, but this year is a different story.

Symptoms are enough to shake even the hardest hearted. Muscles in the tiny body are taut, rigid arms and legs flail incessantly, and the high-pitched cry could continue for hours. The babies often well underweight, show their intense hunger by continuously sucking their fists, yet many vomit their feedings before they are finished, and diarrhea further comprimises their tenuous hold on life. Tremors rack their bodies so severe that their bassinettes shake. The only recourse is to keep them under sedation or they would literally "run themselves to death."

So far they have not lost one at Children's Hospital, but if their future is as bleak as their beginning, what do they have to look forward to?

Senate passed its version of the tax bill 22-9 after rejecting six separate attemps to insert a corporation profits levy by narrow (usually 16-15) margins and six other amendments. Only amendment of substance attached in floor deincrease in diesel fuel levy to corporation. make it the same as the gaso-

Here is what the bin (HB 730) now calls for and its board of directors. estimated biennial yield:

- Increase sales tax rate from 3.25 to four per cent, \$288.5 million.
- Increase motor vehicle sales tax to four per cent and bring auto rentals under levy, \$79.4 million.
- Raise corporation franchise tax from \$3.25 per \$1,000 to \$4.50, \$102.6 million over three year period.
- •Increase Cigarette tax three cents a pack to 18.5 cents, highest figure in the nation, with one cent dedicated to park development, \$46.7 million.
- Raise the gasoline tax from five to seven cents a gallon, \$102.1 million.
- Increase beer tax from litation. \$4.30 to \$6 a barrel, \$28.8
- Increase diesel fuel tax one half cent, to seven cents a gallon, \$4 million.


