Farmers and ranchers have long felt the effects of the extended dry spell, as the almost non-existent rainfall during the past months has failed to produce water for livestock and rural homes, and fields and pastures are now almost bare.

Many rural homeowners are having water hauled for their home use and some stockmen are selling their livestock because there is not water or pasture.

The present drought has been compared to the drought of 1917-18 when many area livestock owners drove their stock to Home Creek to water.

Even the drought during the '50s did not cause the inconvenience now at hand because the few rains during that time produced water in the tanks and lakes.

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**In Our Opinion**

**POLLUTION SEEMS TO BE** a popular topic of discussion, and the fact that it is not a great problem in our area gives a clue to one of the things that contributes to the problem.

It has been reported that 70 per cent of the American people live in only one per cent of the land. That in itself is a good indication of the problem.

During the last 40 to 50 years there has been a mass exodus from rural areas to the urban. Few small farmers are still operating and the former rural population has gone to the city and the industrial areas to work. Where there used to be a family on every 100 acres or so, now one man will tackle a section or more and with mechanized equipment, he can handle it. So the labor force has migrated to the city where industry has offered them employment and the problem of pollution has increased with this migration.

So, the easy answer to pollution would be for people to move back to the rural areas, but that won't happen, even though there has been some trend to that end. Quite a few people are commuting from surrounding areas and working in the cities.

Of course, along with pollution this movement to the cities has increased unhealthy living conditions and crime.

Movement of industry out of the congested areas would also be a help in the problem of pollution, and there has been a bill for rural development through limited tax incentives introduced in Congress, co-sponsored by 47 Senators. This bill would give tax incentives for job-producing enterprise in non-metropolitan areas.

The National Federation of Independent Business, an organization made up of small businessmen over the country, is sponsoring a program of education on this matter called "Operation Build America."

If the trend could be implemented, many of our pollution problems would disappear.

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AS APRIL 15 comes around the popular topic of conversation is income taxes.

With salaried people it is not such a complicated matter, but for the small business man who do not normally have access to the tax expertise of the bigger companies, it poses a real problem.

Most of them do not want to cheat the government, yet they do want all the deductions they are entitled to. Most of them pass over deduction they could take, but don't know how.

It has been proposed that a special position of "small business tax analyst" be established in the Treasury Department to focus attention on the problem of small business, but many of the small business people don't look with favor on it because from past experience, they have found that these bureaus usually cost them in the long run. In a recent survey only 38 per cent of them favored it compared to 53 per cent against. Much of the needed action would require Congressional action, and until the top dogs of the department want to see the problems facing small business, then nothing will be done, special section or not.

The small business man cannot afford the time to really do justice to tax aspects of his business nor can he afford the cost that a tax expert would require, in order to have the same advantages that a big corporation can afford. Consequently the small man carries a far heavier load of the tax burden than he should. The amount of paper work required by the federal, state and local taxing bodies grows all the time with new reports, more often, is creating an alarming problem so far as small business is concerned. It has gotten to the point where the owner or his bookkeeper are spending a majority of their time working for the government.

What can be done? Not much until Congress realizes the plight of the little man and comes to his aid — if it ever happens.

STATE **Capital NEWS**

**Austin** — Serious financial business faced the Legislators on their return to the capitol after spending the Easter holiday with the homefolk.

A Senate sub-committee immediately began drafting a tax bill which is expected to exceed \$550 million. That is the minimum amount needed to balance the upper house version of the budget, from a smorgasbord of proposals already aired.

Both the House and the Senate are due to take up and pass their respective appropriations bill already drafted and moved the issue of budgeting into a 10-member conference committee of top legislators.

Big battle in the Senate, over revenue-raising, may be on a liberal-backed proposal to levy a new corporation income tax. More than a dozen votes are regarded as firm for the corporate profits tax, with three or four more senators rated as "possibles."

Senators are cool toward the \$492.5 million tax package sent over earlier from the House — first, because they regard it as inadequate and, second, because it places the bulk of the load on consumers and students. Bill would raise the sales tax three-fourth of one per cent to four percent, hike college tuitions and mark up the corporate franchise tax 50 cents per \$1,000.

Earlier, and for the first time, the Senate voted against permitting floor amendments on tax proposals which have not been subject to public hearing.

Here are some of the major tax proposals which have been made to the Senate State Affairs Committee:

- A corporate profits tax of six per cent, which would produce an estimated \$600 million in two years.

- A corporate profits tax boost, to gross about \$39.5 million.

- Increase the sales tax to four per cent, to bring in \$279.8 million.

- Two cents a gallon gasoline tax increase, to promote \$92 million to the state and \$30 million to cities and counties for highway matters.

- A beer tax boost to \$10 a barrel, \$95 million.

- Pipeline tax, \$30 million.

**APPOINTMENTS**—Rep. Menton J. Murray of Harlingen was named to head the new five-member House general investigation committee.

House Speaker Gus Mutscher designated Murray as chairman and the following representatives as members of the panel: DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi, James Nugent of Kerrville, Jim Slider of Naples and Clyde Haynes Jr. of Vidor.

Gov. Preston Smith approved appointments of J. C. Chalmers Jr. of Marlin, Clarence Gaskamp of Brenham, Bruce Campbell Jr. of Knox City and Burford I. King of Fort Worth to the Board of Directors of the Brazos River Authority. Reappointed were R. E. (Gene) Chambers of Wichita Falls, Albert Brannan of Comanche and Glynn A. Williams of Bryan to the same Board.

Reps. Tommy Shannon of Fort Worth and Phil Cates of Lefors will serve on a committee to select an official Texas State Artist. Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes will designate two Senators and Governor Smith will appoint the fifth member.

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**AMENDMENT FIGHT LOOMS**

Battle lines are forming for the May 18 constitutional amendments election. Conservation leaders and Texas AFL-CIO executive board have declared war on Proposition 4, which would create a \$100 million bond fund to assist local governmental units with sewage treatment plant construction.

AFL-CIO also announced opposition to an amendment creating a state commission to set legislator's pay and ethical standards for officials. Support was given to raising the welfare ceiling and the amendment which would allow constitutional changes to be proposed in special sessions as well as regular legislative sessions.

Governor Smith announced appointment of Richard D. Brown, executive director of Texas Municipal League, to head a Committee on Clean Water, promoting passage of the water bond amendment which would also raise the maximum interest rate on Texas Water Development Board bonds from four to six per cent.

A committee of 12 will serve as the coordinators of Texas Citizens for Welfare Reform, promoting passage of Amendment 3 to raise the aid ceiling.

**COURTS SPEAK** — State has given notice of appeal in an historic federal court case at Corpus Christi where a three-judge panel held that Texas' annual voter registration requirement is unconstitutional.

State Supreme Court reversed the decision of a Dallas civil appeals court, directing a new hearing in the civil breach of contract action against Texas Rubber Supply Inc.

Court of Criminal Appeals ordered a new trial for a Texarkana man convicted of murder on grounds that the trial court did not rule correctly on whether a statement by the defendant was voluntary and that the man should be heard on the issue of accidental shooting.

Fifty-sixth district court of Galveston County has enjoined the Gulf Chemical and Metallurgical Corporation near Texas City, directing it to install specified air pollution abatement equipment by September 10.

Third Court of Civil Appeals was told, in arguments by attorneys, that the defunct Sharstown State Bank did not adequately check the identity of a man who gave it \$470,000 in surety bonds.

**BONDS FAIL TO SELL** — A \$25 million offer of Texas Water Development Bonds failed to draw bidders. It was

felt that the four per cent ceiling on interest discouraged buyers.

Board members said another offer will be made later in the month if a "favorable" market develops.

A representative of a Dallas bank was about to offer a bid, but moments before the opening he announced he had changed his mind. Board succeeded in selling \$15.1 million worth of bonds late in February at 3.9984 per cent.

**AG OPINIONS** — Several domestic relations and juvenile court judges stand to lose retirement benefits if their courts are converted into state district courts of general jurisdiction, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

- A bill providing for a county civil service system in counties over 300,000 is constitutional.

- Legislation seeking to prohibit State Board of Insurance members or employees from receiving compensation from any insurance company within six years after they leave their state posts is unconstitutional.

- Grayson County commissioners court may legally employ an attorney to make investigation for a grand jury.

- Petroleum products shipped out of state from F. O. B. loading points in Texas do not constitute receipts for business done in Texas under the franchise tax law, because physical possession occurs outside the state.

- Texas Fine Arts Commission may publish in its newsletter the text of legislation relating to fine arts and solicit comments; but it may not argue the merits of a bill.

**Federal Tax Questions And Answers**

Q) Do I have to report interest from U. S. Savings Bonds on my tax return?

A) Yes. Interest earned on your Savings Bonds is taxable and must be reported. However, you have the option of reporting the interest each year as the redemption value increases or all at once when the bonds are redeemed, or

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mature, whichever is earlier. If you elect the yearly method of reporting, you must continue it even for all future bond purchases.

To report the interest from the Savings Bonds, add it to your other interest income, and enter the total on line 14 of Form 1040. If your total interest income is over \$100, the amounts and source must be reported on Schedule B, which should be attached to your Form 1040.

Q) Because I am suffering from a deficiency disease, my doctor prescribed vitamins for me. Is the cost of the vitamins deductible on my tax return?

A) Yes. Items such as vitamins and iron supplements prescribed or recommended by your doctor are deductible as medicines and drugs. Then, to the extent that medicine and drug expenses exceed one percent of your adjusted gross income, they may be included with your other medical expenses. Medical expenses in excess of three percent of your adjusted gross income can then be deducted on your tax return if you itemize deductions. More information on the rules for deducting medical expenses can be found in Publication 502, Deduction for Medical and Dental Expenses, available free from your local IRS office.

Q) My son works during the day but is taking college courses at night. May I still claim him as a dependent regardless of how much income he had?

A) No, you may not claim him as a dependent if he had income of \$625 or more and was 19 years of age or over at year-end. If your child was a full-time student during any part of each of five months of year, you may claim him as a dependent regardless of age or income provided you

meet all the other dependency tests. However, if your child is employed full-time during the days and attends school during the night, he is not considered a full-time student.

Q) I am married and filing a joint return. My wife had no income last year. Does she still have to sign the return?

A) Yes. A joint return must be signed by husband and wife even though only one had income.

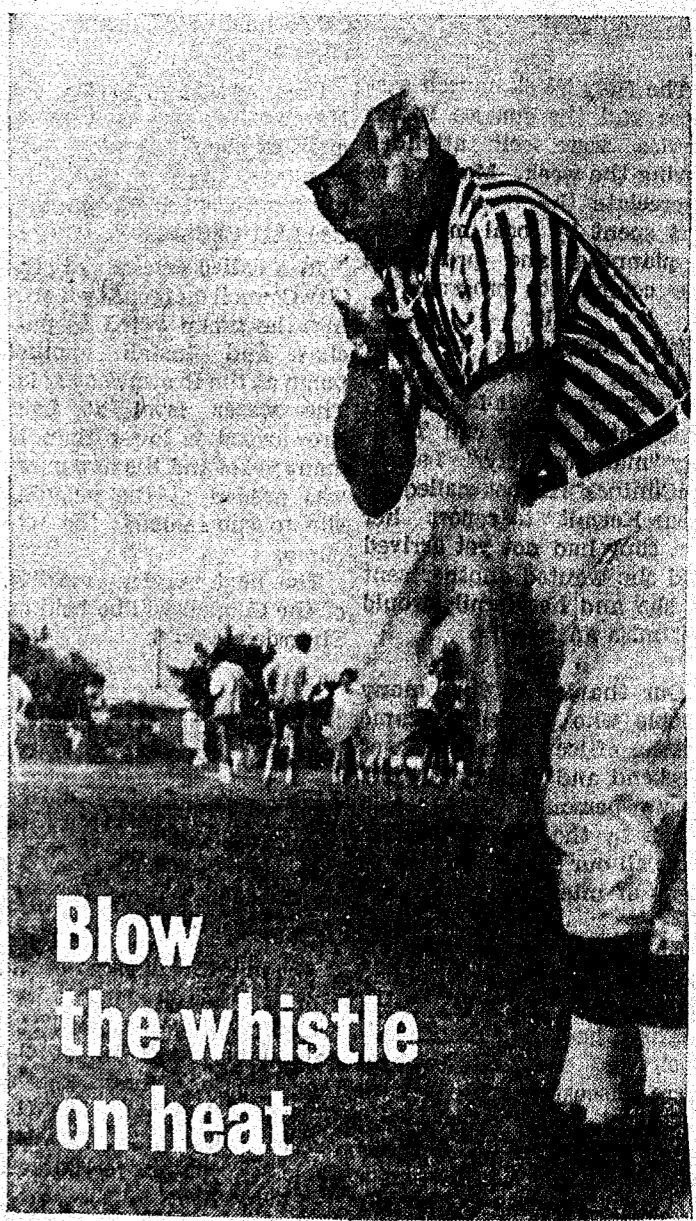

**Do you know who Gertrude Ederle is?**

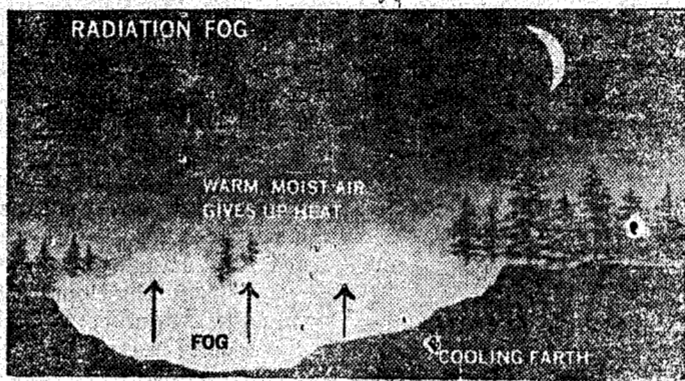
Gertrude Ederle was the first woman to swim the English Channel. Only five men had accomplished this. On August 6, 1926, the 19-year-old swimmer entered the Channel at Cape Gris-Nez, France, and swam to Dover, England. The distance across the cold, choppy waters was about 20

miles. Gertrude made the crossing in 14 hours and 31 minutes. She broke the men's record by more than 2 hours.

"Trudy" Ederle was born in New York City in 1907 and learned to swim at her family home in New Jersey. So, the first woman to swim the English Channel was also an American.

**Do you know about radiation fog?**

One of the main types of fog is called radiation fog. During the day evaporation along bodies of water makes the air above heavy with water vapor. After sunset, night may come on without a warming blanket of clouds. Then the moist air gives up some of its heat by radiation (just as your radiator gives off heat). As the moist air cools, it reaches a point beyond which it can hold no more moisture. When this happens, the water vapor condenses out and forms fog droplets.

Your Debts and Four Privacy

Window shoppers passing a neighborhood hardware store were startled to see a hand-lettered sign among the pots and pans.

"Harold Jackson," it read, "has failed to pay his bill. This sign will stay right here until he pays up."

Jackson himself soon found out about the sign. But instead of paying the bill, he filed a damage suit against the hardware dealer. Grounds: invasion of privacy.

And, even though the dealer protested that his sign "told nothing but the truth," the court ruled in Jackson's favor. The court said the debt was none of the public's business.

In most states, the law frowns on the general publicizing of a private debt. Although the debtor does indeed owe the money, such tactics are considered unfair and oppressive. Even a limited publicizing may be unlawful, if there is no real justification for it. Thus:

neighbor's house to take calls from a persistent creditor. The creditor also took great pains to let the neighbor know exactly why he was calling.

Here too, when the debtor sued, the court decided the calls were an unlawful invasion of his privacy.

"The defendant's tactics," said the court, "were deliberately intended to shame and harass the plaintiff into paying. Defendant clearly exceeded the bounds of reason."

The fact remains, however, that a debt is supposed to be paid—and that a creditor is entitled to put pressure on to collect it. One debtor went to court to complain of receiving a jarring telegram from his creditor. It said: "Must have March payment immediately or legal action." But the court could see nothing unlawful in the telegram. "A creditor has a perfect right to threaten legal action," said the court. "There are some shocks, inconveniences, and annoyances which members of society in the nature of things must absorb."

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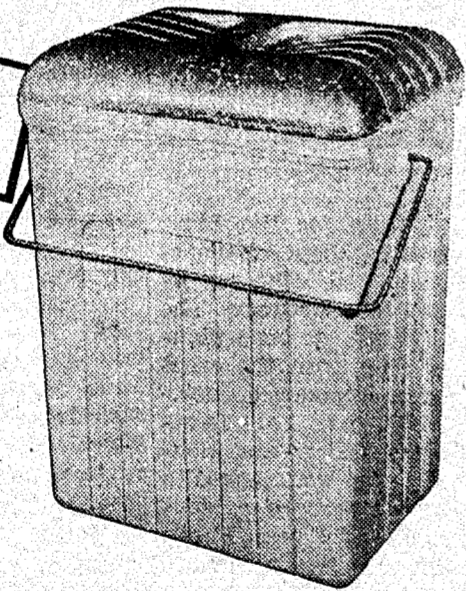
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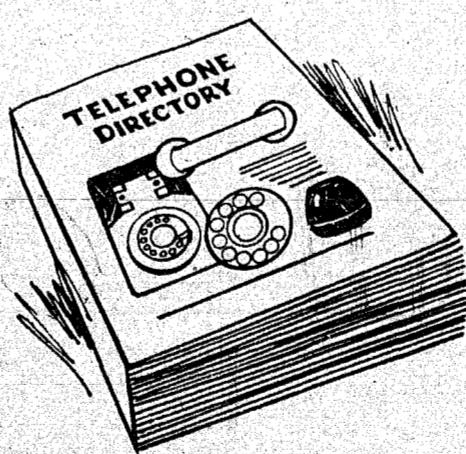

## Accent On Health

One of nature's deadliest phenomena is the tornado—a violent, destructive whirling wind that strikes almost without warning and seemingly at random, sweeping everything out of its path as its whiplash tail moves in a narrow path over the land.

The tornado that struck the city of Lubbock last year, like the earlier disasters in previous years in Dallas, Waco, and San Angelo, once again reminded Texans that disaster health planning is the difference between safety and catastrophe.

The Texas State Department of Health has joined with other state and federal agencies and medical associations to see that all areas of the state are prepared in case of a disaster. Consequently, Texas is meeting the 1971 tornado season with one of the world's most complete storm warning systems, and a well-oiled public health relief organization.

Texas' "local severe weather warning system," the first established anywhere in the world, now has radar storm

warning sets in almost all major cities in the state. These stations are all connected by teletype and radio. Any station is able to instantly appraise all other stations of a tornado traveling in their direction. All communities in the vicinity of the twister can be warned of the tornado's approach through normal channels, or through special warning devices.

If worse comes to worse, and a tornado does strike a community, the Texas Health Department stands ready to provide vaccine and public health engineering and emergency nursing know-how to stem the threat of disease or further complications while disaster relief is underway.

The National Weather Service has developed a new system of terminology to accurately inform you of the severe weather conditions around you.

A "Severe Weather Watch" indicates that weather conditions are such that severe weather could develop in the immediate area. A "Severe Weather Warning" means that severe weather has actually developed, and care should be taken. A "Severe Weather Alert" is a warning that severe weather is moving directly into the area.

The same holds true for tornado warnings. A "Tornado Watch" indicates the possibility of conditions existing that could lead to the development of a tornado. A "Tornado Warning" means that a tornado has actually been sighted in the area, and extreme caution should be taken. A "Tornado Alert" means to act fast, a tornado is in the immediate area.

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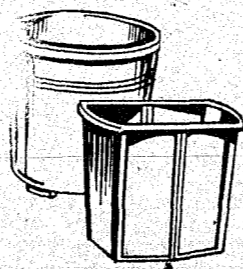
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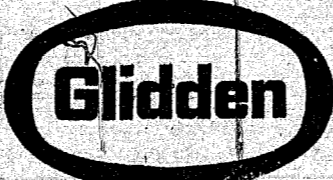

Rankin McIver, chairman of the Coleman County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, also advised farmers that their set-aside land must be acreage that was either in nonconserving crops planted for harvest last year or was used as diverted acreage under the farm programs last year.

He suggested that producers who have any doubt about whether their proposed set-aside acreage will meet the qualifications should check with the County ASCS office as soon as possible.

McIver pointed out that at the time producers come into the County office to certify their set-aside acreage, they must specify precisely where the set-aside acreage is located. Final dates for certification are: wheat, May 1; cotton and feed grains, August 1.

After a producer has certified, if a mistake is found in his set-aside acreage he could lose some or all of his farm program payment.

"A farmer who is not quite sure whether his set-aside meets all requirements would be well advised to check with the County ASCS office ahead of time. Also, he can request measurement service, which, if followed, will give him a guarantee that he has enough set-aside acreage. Measurement service is offered by the ASCS office at cost," Mr. McIver said.

Producers in the voluntary feed grain, wheat and cotton programs for 1971 set aside a percentage of their land to conserving uses, and will also maintain their farm's conserving base acreage. On the rest of their acreage they may plant as much feed grain, wheat, cotton or any other crop they choose, with the exception of quota crops. Quota crops include peanuts, tobacco, rice, extra long staple cotton, and sugarcane, which may be planted only on farms with allotments of these crops.

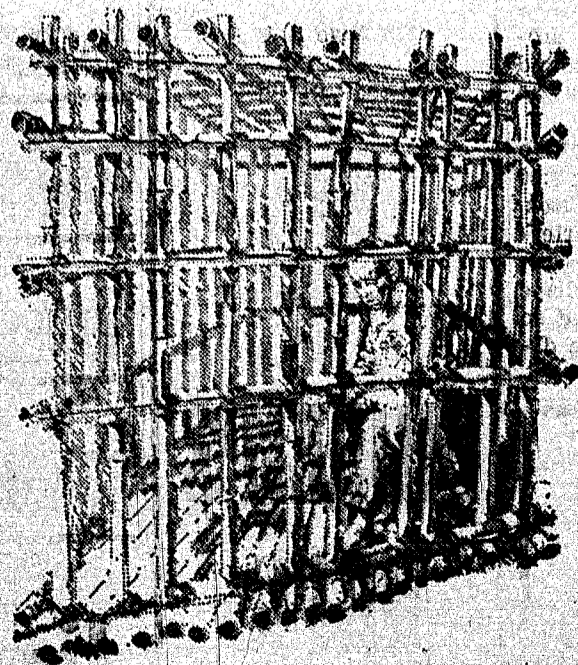

## Through The Wringer

Short of money? Unable to make ends meet? Don't worry, you have plenty of company these days.

Maybe what you need is more income. After all, you can only cut expenses so far. Nearly every businessman is trying to generate more income, aside from sales. His accounts receivable, money due him from work completed or goods delivered, often represent a tidy sum, and a potential source of cash to relieve the strain.

The trouble is, in times like this when nearly everybody is financially strapped, collections on credit sales tend to be slower, not faster, and add to the businessman's financial problems, not ease them.

But the Federal government has no such problem. When it decides to maximize its income flow, it simply issues a regulation to accelerate tax paying. Since the Federal tax take has increased every year within memory, the speedup brings tomorrow's extra dollars in today.

Once upon a time the government required employers to deposit withheld employees taxes and the employer's share of Social Security every quarter. Then, the larger companies were required to pay monthly, which brought more dollars in faster. Now, the largest companies pay taxes twice a month.

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## Reduced Rates On FLB Billing

Leslie Bryant, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, announced that the Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 7½ per cent. This reduction will be effective on installments maturing on or after June 1, 1971, and affects more than \$110 million in variable rate loans to over 3200 Texas farmers and ranchers," Bryant stated.

The variable rate loan, which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July 1969, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. This is the second time since January 1 that the billing rate has been reduced and the third such reduction in the past year. "This action is in line with the bank's policy in providing farmers and ranchers credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices," Bryant stated.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans on farm and ranch lands throughout Texas. The bank has over \$540 million in volume of loans outstanding. The local association makes and services loans in Coleman and Callahan Counties.

## Special Courses For Teachers of The Handicapped

Applications are now being taken for a Region 15 project designed to assist the classroom teachers' work with handicapped children.

Elementary and junior high school teachers in the Education Center Region 15 service area are eligible for participation in the program. Application forms are available in the office of the local superintendent of schools.

Twenty participants will be provided 12 semester hours credit from Angelo State University upon successful completion of project activities. The project, dubbed "Educate the Exceptional" is in its third year of operation.

Teachers will go through a six-week summer institute at ASU beginning May 31. The institute will emphasize the teaching of children with learning disorders, handicapping conditions, and educational impairments. Six semester hours credit will be provided.

During the 1971-72 school year inservice activities will be provided semi-monthly. Programs will be designed to reinforce theoretical concepts via demonstrations, micro-teaching, consultative assistance in combination with special seminars and lecture programs.

On-site activities will consist of regular assistance in the classroom, relative to diagnosis, techniques, methods and materials. A mobile diagnostic van will be available for use in this phase of the project.
