## Mountain Echoes

It's rodeo time again in our area. The big 34th annual Coleman Rodeo will get underway next Wednesday night, July 7.

In addition to the rodeo, many interesting and entertaining activities are planned for the week, proclaimed "Western Week" in Coleman County.

The official rain measurement for the showers last week was .55 inch. Everyone agreed that more rainfall was received here in town than anywhere else — including at the official gauge — and over two inches was the general "unofficial" measurement. The official total for June for Santa Anna is 1.1 inches.

Farming is almost at a standstill in the community as surviving cotton and other crops are suffering from lack of moisture. One unproductive stock farmer stated that the tax refund from his tractor gasoline would be the only farm income this year!

Local fishermen have reported better catches than usual during the past few weeks. Of course some of the fishermen can just dip the fish out of the nearly-dry ponds.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials have asked that fishermen not "stock" public waters with fish they have caught — or at least not without checking with local authorities first.

Some well-meaning sportsman recently decided to stock white bass in the North Concho Reservoir, not knowing that the lake was the site of a department walleye experiment.

The lake had been stocked with about 700,000 walleye fry. The white bass is an extremely predatory fish, and the ones dumped into the lake are expected to wreck havoc with the tiny walleyes.

The decorative planter boxes along the downtown street are very attractive with a variety of plants now in bloom. One of the most attractive is at the City Hall where city secretary, Pauline Garrett, has pink and red geraniums blooming profusely.

## Annual Coleman Rodeo July 7-10 Highlights County Western Week

Next week, July 5-10, has been designated Western Week in Coleman County. The annual Coleman Rodeo will be held July 7-10 and many other activities have

been scheduled in conjunction with the annual event. Connie Griffis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mark Griffis of Coleman, will reign as queen of the rodeo. Weldon Davis is

president of the Coleman Rodeo Association.

Tom Kingsbery will serve as arena director this year. The RCA-approved rodeo will have calf roping, bareback, saddle bronc and bull riding, bulldogging and barrel racing. The performances will begin at 8:00 p.m. each evening at the big dustfree arena south of Coleman.

## THE NEW U.S. POSTAL SERVICE WILL GO INTO EFFECT TODAY

On July 1, the U.S. Post Office Department will fade into history after nearly 200 years of service to the American people. A new organization, the United States Postal Service, will take its place as an independent establish-

ment of the government. Presumably, it will provide better, faster, more dependable mail service. Plans are being made for major improvements in mail service.

To mark the inaugural date, the Postal Service will have a limited number of souvenir envelopes available free on July 1 only. In addition, for stamp collectors, a limited number of cancelled first day covers will be made available for the cost of an eight cent stamp.

Postal patrons in Santa Anna are invited to ask postal clerks for the souvenir envelopes and stamps on Thursday. It is also planned to have a display of large replicas of U.S. postage stamps which have been issued during the past 35 years.

On July 1, at ceremonies in Washington, the new 8 cent stamp will be issued and made available at post offices all over the United States. It will carry the emblem of the U.S. Postal Service — a stylized eagle poised for flight.

## DPS Predicting 48 Fatalities During Weekend

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents over the long July 4th holiday weekend will claim 48 lives in the Lone Star State. In addition, Speir said it appears that between 6:00 p.m. Friday, July 2 and midnight Monday, July 5 — the official holiday weekend — these same collisions could result in hundreds, perhaps a thousand or more injuries; and a monetary loss running into the millions of dollars.

Speir said as many DPS patrolmen would be on duty as possible, including some from uniformed services other than the Highway Patrol. He noted that many local law enforcement agencies will place similar special emphasis during the holiday period.

The Department of Public Safety will also conduct its "Operation Motorcade" program during the holiday which, in cooperation with local police agencies and the news media of Texas, attempts to focus public attention on accident hazards through the rapid compilation and release of information on fatal traffic mishaps during the period.

"We are hopeful," Speir said, "that all street and highway works will make the slogan 'Drive Friendly' a reality during the July 4th weekend."

The July meeting of the Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees will be held on Thursday night, July 8, at 8:00 p.m. All school board members are urged to attend and visitors are welcome to be present.

The new open-air dance pavilion at the rodeo grounds will be opened after the rodeo each night.

The Coleman Chamber of Commerce has helped with the planning of the week's program. Tuesday, July 6 will be the date that local businesses are asked to display western decorations, and the "western wear law" will go into effect. Persons in Coleman not wearing western clothing will be put in "jail" operation from 3:00 to 6:00 p.m. each day.

The first of two big parades will be held Wednesday afternoon at 5:00 p.m. Riding clubs from throughout the area will be present for the opening day.

A talent program at 6:00 p.m. Thursday will include western bands from Santa Anna, Coleman, and Talpa. The program will be held on the courthouse lawn. Wagons and buggies belonging to George Havens will be on display.

The second parade will be held on Friday afternoon. Floats, antique cars, square dancers and horseback riders will take part.

A beard growing contest will be held with judging to be at 4:30 Saturday afternoon. Three categories will be included including the most kissable, the cleanest or neatest, and the most bushy or grizzly.

After the beard judging there will be a downtown square dance beginning at 5:00 p.m. The Coleman Swinging Stars have invited clubs from the area to be present for the festivities.

Santa Anna people are invited to participate in all the Western Week activities and help make the rodeo celebration a success.

(The following was written by Mrs. Archie C. Smith of Fort Worth while she served as Americanism chairman for the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary.)

Hello, remember me? Some people call me Old Glory, others call me the Stars and Stripes; also I have been referred to as the Star Spangled Banner. But whatever they call me, I am your flag, or as I proudly state, the flag of the United States of America. There is something that has been bothering me, so I thought that I might talk it over with you. Because it is about you and me.

I remember sometime ago — I think it was Memorial Day — people were lined up on both sides of the street to watch the parade. When your daddy saw me coming along waving in the breeze, he immediately removed his hat and placed it against his left shoulder so that his hand was directly over his heart. Remember?

And you — I remember you. Standing there as straight as a soldier, you didn't have any hat but you were giving the right salute. They taught you in school to place your hand over your heart. Remember

little sister — not to be outdone, she was saluting the same as you. I was very proud as I came down your street. There were some soldiers home on leave and they were standing at attention giving the military salute. Ladies as well as men all paying me the reverence that I deserve.

Now I may sound as if I am a little conceited. Well, I am. I have a right to be. Because I represent the finest country in the world, the United States of America. More than one aggressive nation has tried to haul me down but they all felt the fury of this freedom-loving country. You know. You had to go overseas and derend me.

What happened? I'm still the same old flag. Oh, I have a couple more stars added since you were a boy. A lot more blood has been shed since the Memorial Day so long ago. Dad is gone now. The old landmarks were gone, but in their place, shining majestically in the sun, were a number of new buildings and homes. Yes sir, the old town sure has changed.

But now I don't feel as proud as I used to. When I come down the street, you just stand there with your hands in your pockets and

give me a small glance and then look away. When I think of all the places I have been, Anzio, Guadalcanal, Korea — and now Vietnam. Then I see the children running around and shouting. They don't seem to know who I am. I saw one man take his hat off and then look around. He didn't see anybody else with theirs off so he quickly put his back on.

Is it a sin to be patriotic any more? Have you forgotten what I stand for? Have you forgotten all the battlefields where men fought and died to keep this nation free? When you salute me, you are actually saluting them.

Take a look at the Memorial Rolls sometime. Look at the names of those that never came back. Some of them were friends or relatives of yours. Probably went to the same school with some of them. That's what you are saluting. Not me.

Well it won't be long until I'll be coming down your street again. So when you see me, stand straight, place your hand over your heart and you'll really see me waving — my salute to you. And I'll know that you remembered.

*In Our Opinion*

NEXT SUNDAY is July 4, American Independence Day.

Some conditions in this country make us wonder how much we have to celebrate. Not only is patriotism "old fashioned" but the trend of government in the last two or three decades would make the farmers of our Constitution turn over in their graves.

We can't help but wonder what the reaction would be if we could bring back to life some of the Pilgrims who came to this country so they could have freedom. For, regardless of so-called "civil rights" legislation there has been a constant loss of freedom for the general run of citizens in this country during the last 40 years.

It started in the early 1930's when we were in the height of the great depression, and the federal government were forced to take action. But as the years went by more and more bureaus have been activated until we are bureaured to death.

Then during the 60's there has been a growth of a group we look upon patriotism as passe. They have one goal in mind, that is get everything they can for themselves, giving nothing in return. They believe that any person who is willing to work for what he gets is a sucker, a member of the "establishment."

But most of us realize the great advantage of living in this country and would like it to retain a semblance of freedom for its people, where one may benefit from his own labors and has the freedom to do his work without government interference, as long as it is legal, moral and within the capitalistic framework.

We must remember that America didn't grow to a great nation because of material resources alone. The basis of its growth and greatness can be attributed to many factors, among them the initiative of a people willing to work and sweat for what they got.

Another factor in this country's greatness can be traced to the fact that freedom of the press was one of the basic freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution, along with freedom of speech, freedom of worship, which is something that most countries of the world do not grant.

This year July 4 is on Sunday, and how appropriate it would be for the Christian people of this nation to make it an "honor America Day." No doubt some ministers will slant their sermons in that direction, but we need to be made cognizant of the privileges that are ours, at least those which are still available, and have not been taken away from us.

We still believe that the vast majority of people in this country believe in and love their land. It is still the country with the most freedoms in existence.

Whatever our feeling about it, there is a right way and wrong way to change it. That is the legal way. We can't go along with those who would do it through force.

LAST WEEK this writer attended the summer convention of the Texas Press Association in Austin, and along with many informative speakers, the meeting was educational as well as recreational.

On the first night of the convention the association named Miss Phyllis George of Denton, Miss America, as the Texan of the year.

This young lady won the hearts of the newsmen with her glowing personality, her friendliness, and her sincerity. We couldn't help but be impressed as she was awarded the plaque naming her Texan of the year, big tears ran down her cheeks, displaying her humility and appreciation for the honor. She is not only a beautiful and talented girl, but is the example of what every man would want in a daughter. We think she summed up the situation when she said of her parents, "they raised Robbie (her younger brother and I with affection and firmness. We knew the rules and observed them." Wouldn't it be great if every parent would follow that example in the rearing of their children?
