Some conditions in this country make us wonder how much we have to celebrate. Not only is partriotism Brownwood during the week-"old fashioned" but the trend of government in the last two or three decades would make the farmers of our end. Constitution turn over in their graves.

For, regardless of so-called "civil rights" legislation there has been a constant loss of freedom for the general other towns represented run of citizens in this country duing the last 40 years.

It started in the early 1930's when we were in the Abilene, height of the great depression, and the federal government were forced to take action. But as the years went shaw, Winters, Stephenville, by more and more bureaus have been activated until Austin and Como. we are bureaued to death.

Then during the 60's there has been a growth of a group we look upon patriotism as passe. They have one goal in mind, that is get everything they can for themselves, giving nothing in return. They believe that any person who is willing to work for what he gets is a sucker, a member of the "establishment."

But most of us realize the great advantage of living in this country and would like it to retain a semblance of freedom for its people, where one may benefit from his own labors and has the freedom to do his work without government interference, as long as it is legal, moral and within the capitalistic framework.

We must remember that America didn't grow to a great nation because of material resources alone. The basis of its growth and greatness can be attributed to many factors, among them the initiative of a people willing to work and sweat for what they got.

Another factor in this country's greatness can be traced to the fact that fredom of the press was one of the basic freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution, along with freedom of speech, freedom of worship, which is something that most countries of the world do not

This year July 4 is on Sunday, and how appropriate it would be for the Christian people of this nation to make it an "honor America Day." No doubt some ministers will slant their sermons in that direction, but we need to be made cognizant of the privileges that are ours, at least those which are still available, and have not been taken away from us.

We still believe that the vast majority of people in this country believe in and love their land. It is still

the coutry with the most freedoms in existance.
Whatever our feeling about it, there is a right way and wrong way to change it. That is the legal way. We can't go along with those who would do it through force.

LAST WEEK this writter attended the summer convention of the Texas Press Association in Austin, and along with many informative speakers, the meeting was educational as well as recreational.

On the first night of the convention the association named Miss Phyllis George of Denton, Miss America, as

the Texan of the year. This young lady won the hearts of the newsmen with her glowing personality, her friendliness, and her sincereity. We couldn't help but be impressed as she was awarded the plaque naming her Texan of the year, big tears ran down her cheeks, displaying her humility and appreciation for the honor. 




