## Mountain Echoes

The first general rains in the Santa Anna area fell Sunday, getting the month of August off to a good start, weather-wise. Nearly everyone in the area received two inches of rain. Not much runoff was reported except in the south part of the county where heavier rainfall had been reported last week. Dispositions and attitudes of many local farmers and ranchers were considerably better this week.

Despite the long dry spring and summer and conservation of water in town, some shrubs in town have done well anyway. The M. R. Pollocks on North 7th and Avenue B have crepe myrtle bushes in full bloom across the front of their home. The bushes, in several shades, are a spectacular sight and well worth seeing when you drive through that part of town. Many people have commented on the lovely shrubs.

Just over two weeks remain before the beginning of the 1971-72 school term. Classes for local children will begin on Monday, August 23. Faculty members have a shorter vacation, however, as they will start their work with workdays and in-service training on Monday August 16.

We have gotten several comments about the information printed last week from the 1968 Santa Anna school announcements. There were pages and pages of other interesting information about our public schools from 65 years ago. Board and Tuition were mentioned in the 1968 booklet as follows:

Board and lodging can be had in the best families at from \$10 to \$15 per month. Tuition must be paid in advance.

First and Second grades	\$1.50
Third, fourth and fifth	1.75
Sixth, seventh and eighth	2.75
Ninth and tenth	3.00

The following is from the 1968 booklet's introduction: "Our work will not be for show, but to inspire and raise our pupils to higher planes of intellectual development. The subject matter selected in the preparation of this course of study has that culture value which aims to the child the greatest thinking power."

## SCHOOL BOARD MEETING DATE IS AUGUST 10

The Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees will have the regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, August 10, at 8:00 p.m. The meeting, which is open to the public, will be held at the high school business office.

Routine business will be transacted and the amended budget for 1970-71 will be adopted. The new budget for 1971-72 will be ready for board study and approval. A hearing on the budget for the coming year will be held in September.

The regular meeting date for the school board has been changed from the first Tuesday of each month to the second Tuesday.

## GENERAL RAIN LAST SUNDAY GIVES LOCAL AREA A BOOST

The Santa Anna area and all of Coleman County received the first good general rain in about nine months on Sunday when nearly two inches fell throughout the area. The official measurement in Santa Anna was 1.75 inches.

The Sunday rain added to the spotted showers which had fallen in the community for the past week. The largest total amount in the county was over ten inches at Lea-

day in southern Coleman County. Rockwood and the Colorado River area have had about six inches of rain during the past week.

The community totals have varied, but all have reported at least two inches with some water caught in tanks and creeks.

Mayor Thomas Wristen reported that water level in the Santa Anna City Lake has risen two feet since the rain. Although Lake Brownwood has risen only six inches, Jim Ned Creek has filled, giving Santa Anna a fine water supply. The Santa Anna pumping station at Lake Brownwood is actually on Jim Ned Creek at the head of the Lake.

Farmers and ranchers have benefited most from the good rain and will have prospects for crops this fall and next year. There was almost no harvest in the area this year and prospects for a cotton crop are not good, as the rain fell too late for most farmers.

## Local Draft Board Official Says Draft Calls To Resume

Mrs. Mary E. Sewell, Executive Secretary of Texas Local Board No. 21, serving Coleman and Runnels Counties, says the current Congressional impasse over extending the induction authority has created great uncertainty among draft-age men.

Mrs. Sewell continued, "Selective Service Director Curtis Tarr has recently stressed the importance of explaining to our draft-age men the high probability that draft calls will resume in the near future and that the current impasse in the Congress is not likely to affect and registrant's chance of being drafted."

"Our local board has been specifically instructed to continue to register and classify men, and to order for pre-induction physical examinations those young men who may be needed to fill draft calls in the coming months," Mrs. Sewell said.

Men with lottery numbers through 125 were eligible for induction in June in order to fill draft calls. Since then, the Defense Department has asked Selective Service to draft 16,000 men in July-August. This request is being held by Selective Service headquarters pending final Congressional action on the draft bill, which is expected within several weeks.

## Recent Rural Land Tax Increase Postponed At Meeting Last Week

After two days of hearings, including a county-wide session last week, members of the Coleman County Commissioners Court passed a resolution to postpone the action taken on June 7 increasing valuations on rural

property to 20 percent of current market value.

An over-flow crowd of interested citizens attended the county-wide meeting on Tuesday of last week at the County courtroom. The group of tax-payers were protesting

the recent action by the Board of Equalization to increase renditions from 10 percent of fair value to 20 percent of fair value.

At the special session last Wednesday night the commissioners made plans to have a fair and accurate appraisal of rural property.

The resolution is as follows: Whereas, On June 7, 1971, we, the County Commissioners of Coleman County, Texas, in a regular meeting, voted to increase the rural property valuations in Coleman County, Texas, to 20 percent of current market value; and

Whereas, We, the Commissioners of Coleman County, acting as the Board of Equalization of Coleman County have held public hearings on July 27 and 28th, concerning the increase in rural property valuations with interested citizens of Coleman County, and

Whereas, the necessity for further evaluation and appraisal of rural property in Coleman County, Texas, has become apparent as a result of said public hearings and conferences, and additional time is needed for said evaluation in order to equalize land valuations in Coleman County, Texas, and

Whereas, the Commission-ers have also taken into consideration the current drought conditions in Coleman County, Texas, and the effects of the drought on the current economic conditions in Coleman County;

Now therefore, We, the Commissioners of Coleman County, Texas, do hereby postpone the increase in rural property valuations as passed in our meeting of June 7, 1971, pending a further appraisal and evaluation of the rural property in Coleman County, Texas, and resolve that immediate action shall be initiated by the County Commissioners to have a fair and accurate appraisal, made or adopted, of the rural property in Coleman County, Texas, prior to enacting increases in rural property valuations in Coleman County.

Done and entered on this the 28th day of July, 1971, in Special Session at Coleman, Texas.

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**In Our Opinion**

WHILE HIGH EMPLOYMENT is generally considered as a major reason for the ever-growing welfare rolls, evidence now appears that among a large share of welfare recipients, the incentive to work is lacking.

Several states are being pushed to the brink of bankruptcy because of high and increasing welfare costs.

Recently a survey was taken among business men in California, of the welfare-plagued states, to see how many welfare recipients really want work, in the opinion of the employers.

Far too many, according to the survey, are looking for a job merely to fulfill their requirements for unemployment insurance, and as soon as they are fulfilled, they quit and draw them.

Another impression of the employers were that many, who were referred by state unemployment offices, are poorly dressed and unkempt when they apply which would indicate that they really are not expecting to be employed.

"Those who are really seeking employment," one of the polled employers said, "strike out on their own and do not depend on the state's employment help." It was said that also those who sought employment agencies usually were really seeking work.

Governor Reagan contends that the biggest force blocking welfare reform is the army of social workers who wish to keep the case load factor high by encouraging welfare recipients to "demand their rights" rather than rustle a job.

One of the big costs in welfare now seems to be the top-heavy administrative costs. After money is appropriated for welfare, far too much of it has to go to administrative costs, and that is a good place to start cutting.

Old age assistance could be put on a computer and a lot of case workers cut off the pay roll. As it is now, the workers are supposed to investigate each recipient every few months to see if they are still eligible. Very few ever become ineligible once they are put on the rolls, so why all the continuing investigation. Also those who are blind and disabled could also be computerized and then only new applicants would need to be investigated.

True, some cases of welfare need to be watched, those who are able to work, but claim welfare because of unemployment, and aid to dependent children, but the work force to watch these cases could be a lot smaller.

Any case worker who encouraged a person to continue on welfare instead of finding a job should be fired on the spot.

There is no question in this writer's mind that welfare rolls could be pared considerably if only those deserving persons were kept on, and the "Cadillac" families were cut off, but until state agencies began to really try to cut the rolls, there will be nothing but the continuing rise in the rolls.

And on the average, you and I will support one additional family along with our own.

Some years ago a clerk in a bookstore, unpacking a shipment of new books, found one on the subject of "estate planning." Thinking it must be about the landscaping of large homes, he placed it in the gardening section.

He would hardly make that mistake today. Estate planning has come into its own, used by thoughtful people everywhere to preserve assets during their lifetime and to pass them on wisely — and economically — at death.

One reason for the growth of estate planning is the growth of estates. Nowadays even the ordinary citizen is likely to have an estate of substance. It may well include not only a home and a savings account but also personal life insurance, group insurance, stocks, pension plan benefits, profit-sharing options, and social security rights.

Another reason is that estate planning has become far more sophisticated. Its techniques have gone well beyond the traditional "testamentary trust" for a rich old lady and

"spendthrift trust" for a rich young man.

Unfortunately, there are pitfalls aplenty for the amateur planner. For example; many people think avoiding probate is the same as avoiding taxes. But the federal estate tax is based on the entire estate, whether it passes through probate or not.

Likewise, many people think life insurance is not taxable. But life insurance proceeds are included in determining a person's gross estate for federal estate tax purpose unless he has retained none of the incidents of ownership of that policy.

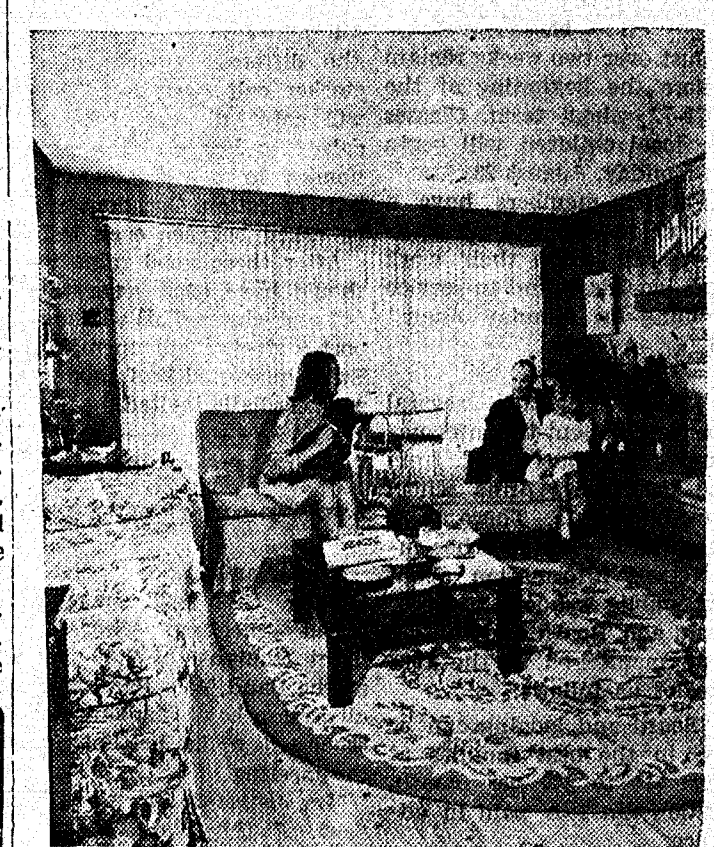
True, it may be sensible in certain circumstances to avoid probate. And it may be possible in certain circumstances to avoid taxes on life insurance. But clearly this is a field in which the layman needs expert help.

Much information is available from trust departments, accountants, insurance men, and investment counselors. The ultimate adviser, however, should usually be an attorney, since he alone is fully qual-

## Who Qualifies For Benefits?

For the past several weeks we've been looking at some national statistics about who qualifies for disability insurance benefits under social security and what type of disability do they have. Here is some more national data:

Of some 33,000 awards in a recent year because of malignancies, 4,300 involved the lungs; 2,489, the breast; 2,479, bronchus and trachea; 1,899, large intestine; 1,368, rectum; 1,304, brain; 1,082, larynx; 1,067, stomach; 1,056, prostate; no other one location accounted for as many as 1,000 awards.

Accidents, poisonings, and violence accounted for 19,815 award actions.

Certainly no conclusions are to be drawn from the fact that 10.2% of disability awardees have educations of fourth grade or less; 17.2% educated through grades 5-7; 19.7%, grade 8; 10.1%, grades 9-11; 17.5%, grade 12; 7.7%, one or more years of college; the other 6.5% of unknown education.

A recent year's disability awards showed 256 allowances per 100,000 population in Texas, with the national average being 276. West Virginia was highest, with 425 awards per 100,000 population.

In the 15 counties serviced by the Abilene Social Security Office, our latest figures show 2217 persons getting monthly disability insurance benefits from social security. In addition, 1643 of their dependents (wife and children) get benefits. The disabled persons receive \$274,000 per month with about one-half that much additional paid to the various dependents.

## Cooking Class Ended Tuesday

Fifty-one commodity food recipients participated in the series of four cooking classes, one for each food group, conducted by the County Home Demonstration Agent during July.

The average attendance for each of the four classes, Santa Anna and Coleman combined was 26, or 13 for each of the eight meetings.

Demonstrations using donated foods were given at 7:00 p.m. each Tuesday in the Santa Anna Housing Development and 3:00 p.m. each Thursday in the Coleman Multi-Purpose Center.

All 25 commodities available for distribution during July were included in one or more recipes prepared for tasting.

Fourteen pages of recipes were mimeographed. Eight hundred copies were distributed to participants. The mimeograph included the recipes prepared and others adapted for using commodity foods.

Approximately 1000 copies of the "Food for Thrifty Families Series" were also distributed.

512 families were certified to receive commodities in July. 512 invitations were used as stuffers for boxes of donated foods as they were picked up by the families. Four additional requests for recipes have been received — one by mail, one office call and two by telephone. Some participants requested copies for neighbors, friends and relatives.

Certificates were awarded to 22 persons who attended as many as three classes. Ten of this number attended all four classes.

The attendance increased from six in the first lesson to 14 in the fourth class at Santa Anna. Coleman attendance showed an increase from 15 to 22.

Principles of food preparation, meal planning, storage, and nutrition were incorporated throughout the series. The posters, "Results of Poor Eating Habits" were used in the final lesson.

# STATE Capital NEWS

Austin — Competition is shaping up in the top two state races for 1972.

State Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso emerged recently as a possible candidate for the Democratic U.S. Senate nomination.

Christie, a 38-year El Pasoan, said he would be reluctant to abandon his state senate place, but he is keeping a close eye on U.S. Senator John Tower's activities in the Senate and considers him vulnerable to contest by a strong Democrat.

Christie's statement was seen as a trial balloon aimed at detecting just how serious Democratic leaders are about fielding a candidate against Tower — and whether they would consider him as the man to unite behind.

Meanwhile, Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde is declaring his candidacy for governor and asking support in a series of statewide speeches.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, of course, announced his candidacy for governor in mid-June, and already is campaigning (with time out to get married: to the former Mrs. Nancy Sayers of Austin, a longtime friend.)

Former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough is still leaving the door open for either a senate or gubernatorial race.

Gov. Preston Smith hints, from time to time, he may seek re-election.

Houston Post President William P. Hobby is the only announced candidate to succeed Barnes as lieutenant governor, but a lot more are expected to follow.

**COURTS SPEAK** — State Supreme Court upheld an intermediate court finding that an individual has no vested "property rights" to welfare aid.

In other recent decisions, High Court held:

- A 1966 constitutional

amendment does not outlaw use of market value to determine tax value of agricultural land. Kerry County ranchers and contended valuation should be determined on net income per acre from agricultural use only.

- Beaumont Baptist minister of a church moved into a residential neighborhood cannot be held in contempt of a court order which blocked construction of an animal health clinic on same site.

- Texas law does not require a father to support his illegitimate children. (Only one other state fails to provide for such support.)

- Contractors cannot collect on an insurance policy as the result of fire at a missile site near Abilene from which they had been hired to move property.

- Austin district judge cleared the way for an appellate court test of whether the legislature in effect repealed penalties for possession of LSD and certain other illegal drugs.

- Driver who failed to prove the other party in a traffic accident was not insured cannot collect on his uninsured motorist policy.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Governor Smith announced the appointment of Mrs. Mary Nell Garrison of Austin to the Board of Regents of Midwest University, Wichita Falls.

Smith also announced these recent appointments:

- Louis Shanks of Austin, State School Land Board.
- Frank Medina of Austin, Dr. James W. Suffield of Beaumont and Logan W. Wood Jr. of Houston to new Texas Board of Athletic Trainers.
- Charles Freeman of Pleasanton to Board of Directors of Evergreen Underground Water Conservation District.
- Bruce Street of Graham and A. M. Willis of Longview to North Texas State University Board of Regents (reappointments).
- William Harold Pieratt Jr. of Giddings and Taylor H. H. Jobe of Gladewater to the State Board of Pharmacy.

**SENATE "RATED"** — League of Conservation Voters rated 11 senators with perfect vot-

ing records on seven selected environmental issues this year.

Eight others were given a passing score, and 12 flunked (with less than five favorable votes out of seven). Seven of the latter group who registered two or less votes deemed correct by the environmentalists were put down as having "abominable records."

Senate's record, said the environmentalists, was better than that of the House, though only a "fraction" of strong pollution-control and conservation bills ever passed either house.

**LABOR'S ELECTION DAY** — August 14 is a major election day for organized labor.

APL-CIO will select new officers as its state convention in Dallas at that time.

H. S. (Hank) Brown is stepping aside as president. Candidates to succeed him are Roy R. Evans, now AFL-CIO secretary-treasurer, and Harold Tate, the organization's education director since 1964. Candidates for secretary-treasurer include Sherman Fricks (Evan's running mate), Harry Hubbard Tate's ticket mate) and Henry Munoz Jr.

Brown threw his support to Tate, but Evans claims he is ahead.

**EXAMINE HUNT LANDS** — Parks and Wildlife Director James U. Cross and Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong made a helicopter tour of the Canadian River bed to inspect an area involved in a controversy over free public hunting.

Parks and Wildlife Commission June 4 ordered a stop to hunting on stateowned river beds and public lands.

After heated protests from the Panhandle, Commission indicated it might switch its position for Canadian River lands. PWC staff was directed to get more information and make its recommendation at a meeting this month.

**BRAND RECORDING NECESSARY** — Cattlemen must record their brands and marks, including locations on animals, with county clerks after August 30.

## ASC NEWS...

by Joe K. Taylor

Here is a report on the national feed grain and cotton production.

Corn leaf blight and dry weather reduced 1970 feed grain production to 150 million tons, about nine percent below the large 1969 crop. The indicated production, together with stocks of old grain, gave a supply for the 1970-71 marketing season of 208 million tons, 17 million below a year earlier.

Although demand for feed to continue strong, smaller supplies and higher prices may cause domestic use and exports to fall a little below the 1969-70 levels. Total usage, however, is expected to exceed 1970 production by a considerable margin, and this will cause a drop in carryover from 48 million tons in October 1970 to perhaps 34 million tons next October, the lowest carryover since the mid-1950's.

Because of the smaller feed grain crop and higher feed prices, livestock-feed price relationships are less favorable than in 1969-70. Livestock production was above a year earlier, especially in the latter part of 1970, but indications are that farmers will adjust their feeding operations downward in response to the higher feed costs.

We estimate the 1970 cotton crop at 10.2 million bales, about three percent more than the 1969 crop. Both acreage and average yield were up slightly from 1969.

To help insure adequate

supplies, we increased the 1970 upland cotton national acreage allotment by six percent, an increase of one million acres. This led to plantings of about 11.9 million acres in 1970, slightly above 1969. The indicated national acreage yield of 441 pounds per harvested acre is moderately above the 434 pounds of 1969, but well below the 516 pounds in 1968. Weather and insect problems throughout much of the Cotton Belt again restricted yields.

Demand for U.S. cotton weakened slightly during 1969-70. Our exports remained at the low 1968-69 level of around 2-3/4 million bales and domestic use declined to eight million, compared with 8 1/2 million the previous year. Increased supplies of foreign-grown cotton were mainly responsible for continuing small U.S. exports last season. During the 1970-71 season, reduced supplies of competitive cotton abroad should mean larger markets for U.S. grown cotton, with exports totaling perhaps 3 1/2 million bales.

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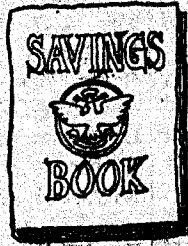

measuring not only the level of pollutants in the air but also their effects on common materials.

The idea was simple but effective: place a number of common materials in an "effects package", expose them in comparable locations, and set up a formula to translate the raw data into an index of the actual effects of air pollution. The packages were placed in 40 locations across the state. They are simple enough to maintain that school children can operate them, and in some cases are doing so.

The package contains fabric samples, a Petri dish of lead peroxide, rubber strips, a sticky-paper jar, and silver, steel, and zinc plated.

The package measures wind-driven dust particles by registering the average number of particles per square inch on the sticky-paper jar. The effect on fabrics is determined by measuring the loss of light reflectance from two fabric

samples. Effects on metals are registered by measuring the weight loss of the steel and zinc plates, and the percentage reflectance loss of the silver plate. The atmosphere's effect on rubber is measured by the depth of the cracks in the rubber strip. The amount of sulphur compound in the air is determined by measuring the amount of sulphur that has reacted with the dish of lead peroxide.

These measurements can then be related to the rusting of plant machinery and automobile tires, and to drapes, furniture, upholstery, and clothing.

On a scale with zero at the bottom and ten at the top, the lowest yearly average in the state in 1970 was 1.8, and 6.5 was the highest. The State-wide average in Texas for 1970 was 3.6.

## Accent on Health

A jar, a small plastic dish, some scraps of rubber, cloth and metal — package them all together into a box and you have not a boxful of junk but a useful new tool in the Texas Health Department's efforts against air pollution.

Applying the maximum pollution-control muscle where it will do the most good is a job that can't be accomplished without realistic data. That boxful of odds and ends is one of the ways of obtaining that data.

The traditional method for obtaining air pollution data is the high volume air sampler, a bulky metal box that yields rate, and lead in the air around it. There are now some 39 such devices across the State of Texas.

Health authorities soon found they could devise a method to determine where real pollution was worse, and where it was a danger to health and property.

The Texas Health Department's Air Control Division developed a new system of

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

## New TEA Plan To Aid Local School Districts

A new accreditation plan which for the first time will give local school districts and the Texas Education Agency computer data to point up the early warning signs of possible weak points will go into effect throughout the state this September.

The data-based system, developed by the Texas Education Agency division of school accreditation, was approved last month by the State Board of Education.

Designed to provide local school leaders as well as the Agency with up-to-date analyses on a scale impossible up to now, the new plan will make the whole accreditation process a more realistic tool for improving Texas public education, according to H. E. Phillips, accreditation division director.

"The machine will give us a more scientific analysis of information we need to decide on the schools to be visited by accreditation teams," Phillips points out. "But, we won't make our judgments on the basis of computer data alone. These will still be based on what we see in the schools."

Statistics from reports sent by individual school districts to the Agency each year will be lumped into five major categories: professional staff, curriculum, instructional resources, facilities, and pupil personnel services.

Twenty major items, each serving as a gathering point for many bits of information, are expected to provide the clues to any points of imbalance in an individual school district or even one campus in that district.

"During this first year we will take a careful look at all the highs, all the lows, and even the super-normal figures," Phillips points out.

"When a district degrades sharply from the rest of the state in a number of ways we think could be detrimental to its instructional program, we'll go out and take a look in person as soon as we can." The number of exceptions, the extent of each one, and the apparent correlation between exceptions will be analyzed for each district.

"This detailed computer analysis of reports will tell us more about Texas schools than we have ever known in advance of an actual visit by an accreditation team," Phillips says.

"For example, if we find a district has an extremely low bonded indebtedness and a high per pupil maintenance budget, team members will know it probably has a physical facilities problem before they ever leave Austin."

Accreditation teams, which include staff members from a number of Agency divisions, have been visiting about 200 of the more than 1,100 Texas school districts each year.

Phillips anticipates a similar number of visits during the 1971-72 school year, including a number of follow-up checks on districts which have been warned that their accredited status is in danger.

During this first year, team members will be checking both the schools and the computer program to make sure the data analysis is giving the Agency the kind of reliable information it needs to modernize its accreditation process.

"We believe the new state accreditation plan will allow us to make reasonable predictions as to how well a school is serving its students — and how we may be able to help it serve them better," Phillips added.
