## Santa Anna Mars BHS Homecoming By Defeating the Dragons, 20-9

The Santa Anna Mountaineers came from a 9-0 half-time deficit to spoil the Bangs High School homecoming game by defeating the Dragons 20-9. The SAHS victory was the second of three tries and left the Dragons with a 0-1-1 record for the season.

Bangs won the toss and took the Santa Anna kick-off on their own 20, running it back to the 35. In their first series of plays they failed to make

first down yardage and punted to the Mountaineers.

The Mounties had five first downs as they marched toward the Dragon goal line but had trouble before reaching paydirt. A recovered fumble lost S. A yardage and an incomplete pass prompted a fieldgoal attempt which failed.

Bangs took the ball deep in their own territory but failed to make first down yardage again and punted to the Mountaineers. A fumble on the punt and a Bangs recovery led to the first Dragon score as Bangs took the ball across on a long run. The PAT was no good.

Santa Anna had fumbles, penalties and general problems following the Dragon kickoff and Bangs took the ball on the 40. Two first downs for Bangs got the ball into field goal position and the score went to 9 for the Dragons.

Santa Anna ended the series with a punt to Bangs and the Dragons made one first down before having a pass intercepted by David Huggins at midfield.

After five first downs and a determined drive by the Mountaineers, Ricky Beal took the ball over the goal line for Santa Anna's first score. The PAT was no good and the score at half-time was 9-6.

Santa Anna took the kick-off in the second half and made one first down before punting to the Dragons. Bangs took the punt at their 22 yard line and advanced to the 43 before fumbling and losing the ball.

The Mountaineers came to,

life and advanced steadily to the goal line for another TD by Rocky Dean. The PAT again failed and the score, with less than two minutes in the third quarter was 12-9.

The Dragons fumbled the pigskin and Santa Anna recovered and made two first downs before the third quarter ended. Another first brought another TD for Santa Anna on a short run by Ricky Beal. David Horner added two points on the PAT, giving Santa Anna a 20-9 lead.

The last minutes of the game saw incomplete passes, fumbles and only one first down for each team before the game ended without another score.

## Rainfall Soaks Coleman County The Past Week

After months of dry weather during the winter, spring and summer, the Santa Anna area has had additional rain during the past week to bring the year's total to almost normal.

Heavy rainfall Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week was reported in the entire county, with the average amount being seven inches in the three-day period. The largest amount reported was 9.5 inches southeast of town at the R. V. Cupps place on the Trickham road. Five inches fell on Wednesday and the last four and one-half inches fell on Thursday and Friday.

Tanks, creeks and lakes are full and overflowing throughout the community and farmers are anticipating a good season for small grain.

The cotton crop in the area, already smaller than usual because of the spring and summer drought, is heavily infested, according to last reports, and will not be hurt any worse by the rainfall.

Many farmers and ranchers have reported army worms in their fields and pastures, another threat to crops and pastures.

## Santa Anna JP At Texas Tech For Training

Precinct Two Justice of the Peace Ben J. Garrett is in Lubbock this week attending a special seminar for justices of the peace. The intensive training program is being conducted at Texas Tech University and will be the first of two seminars sponsored by the state.

During the last session of the State Legislature a new law was passed which requires justices of the peace to have the special training courses or be licensed attorneys. Expenses for the seminar are paid by the state in order that JPs in office may become accredited.

## CCTC Loan Application Made For Improvements For System

Improvements and updating of the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative is progressing as executives of the group have made application for a 1.7 million dollar loan

from the Rural Electrification Administration recently. The loan will provide extended area coverage, direct dialing and one-party telephones for all CCTC subscribers.

Included in the proposed improvements for the Cooperative will be installation of about 450 miles of buried cable, replacing approximately 430 miles of pole line with wire. Not only is the underground cable cheaper to maintain and longer lasting but it is part of the environmental improvement recommended by the REA and other federal agencies.

Free telephone service all over the county and the economy of the direct long distance dialing are appealing to most CCTC subscribers. The REA goal, set in 1954 when the original CCTC loan was approved, for eventual one-party service. This will be made possible by the new loan.

Work on the new project will be by contract. The engineering on the project is already completed and it is hoped that the money will be available from REA within a year.

Included in the extensive project will be a new exchange at Lake Coleman, now serving 53 subscribers, replacement of obsolete exchanges at Rockwood and Mozelle, and the renovating and additions to the Santa Anna, Trickham and Valera exchanges. The replacement and additions will be to facilitate the one party system and the direct dialing equipment.

The Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, now serving about 1350 subscribers, is in good financial shape. About 40 per cent of the original one million dollar loan has been repayed without ever missing a payment.

The Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, with main office in Santa Anna, has had fine telephone service since its beginning and has maintained the lowest rates of any rural telephone system. The proposed changes will bring further improvement to the system and be added convenience to all the subscribers.

## Coleman Permit Is Explained By State Official

A copy of a letter outlining the City of Coleman's position on proposed improvements in the city's sewage plant has been sent to Mr. Thomas Wristen, Santa Anna Mayor. The letter, to Joe Paul, manager of the Brown County Water Improvement District, was from Hugh C. Yantis, Jr., executive director of the Texas Water Quality Board.

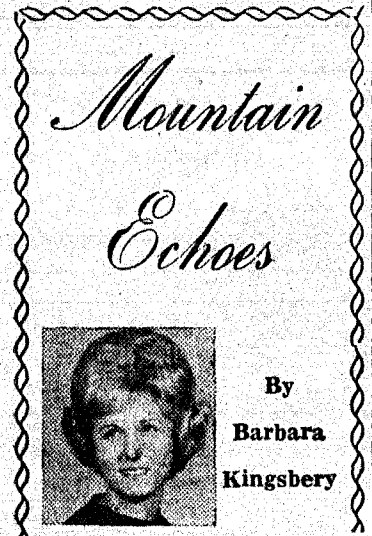
The letter, in answer to a letter written by Paul several weeks ago opposing the proposed sewage disposal permit, points out "there seems to be some misunderstanding as to just what will take place once this plant is in operation."

Yantis wrote he hopes that explanation will serve as reassurance that the end result will be improvement for Lake Brownwood.

Many people in the Lake Brownwood watershed had objected to the approval of the permit which calls for sewage effluent to be released into Hords Creek which runs into the Lake Brownwood. The permit is the first step toward application for a federal grant which would help finance a completely new disposal plant for the City of Coleman.

Mr. Yantis in his letter to Paul stated "that the new plant and improved effluent will vastly improve what small impact the city's (Coleman) discharge has upon the lake.

Copies of the letter were also sent to other officials in Coleman, Brownwood, Bangs, and Early.

A taste of the coming winter early last week, followed by the heavy rainfall, have brought predictions from many area residents about the weather in our community. The rain was appreciated by everyone and the colder weather enjoyed by many of the warmer natured folks.

One prediction on the coming weather was from a woman in the Atwell community near Cross Plains: Frost on October 17.

Optimistic fishermen always carry a scale in their tackle box and now those less fortunate should carry a ruler. One of the new game and fish laws, in effect the first of this month, has to do with the length of catfish "keepers." All catfish must be over 11 inches in length to be legally kept.

Everyone is more aware these days about ecology and the problem of litter. However visitors are still pulling the same old stunts in Texas state parks, according to a recent report from the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Those in charge of maintenance in the parks are still picking up loads of cans and bottles along the roads in camping areas. An increasing problem is the tabs from beverage cans. Some people who would never drop a beverage can on the ground feel no guilt about dropping the small tabs.

Another problem is filter tips from cigarettes which have accumulated for many years. Because most are made from artificial fibers, the filters will not deteriorate, and they are so small and numerous that it is practically impossible for the limited parks staffs to pick them all up.

Somehow beverage tabs and filter tips don't seem to be litter to many people as they carelessly drop them on the ground.

**In Our Opinion**

ACCORDING TO LATE FIGURES from The Tax Foundation, a nationally known research organization, taxes — federal, state and local — now take more than \$33 out of every \$100 we earn. The tax charge against earnings includes not only obvious things like income taxes, social security and sales taxes, but also hundreds of hidden taxes. The old cliché about supporting government by "soaking the rich" is seldom heard anymore, and for a very good reason. If government confiscated all taxable income over \$10,000, it would provide enough additional money to run the government for less than two months.

When new taxes are levied against businesses, they are, of necessity, passed along to customers. Taxes are a major cost of business. All business costs come out of the pockets of consumers. When government performs a service for the citizen, it can be paid for in two ways: higher taxes or inflation. The point to remember is that it is not free.

THERE WILL BE NO brass bands and parades to signify the event. But, October 10-16 has been designated as National Newspaper Week. This year, the theme of the week will be "Newspapers — Growing With America."

During National Newspaper Week, editors must be forgiven if they blow their own horns a bit. For one week, they can offer rebuttal to the cynics who spend the other 51 weeks disagreeing and finding fault with the news or editorial views of the local newspaper. There are thousands of these newspapers in this country, and they stand as a symbol of the independence of our citizens. Beyond that, they are the one and only regularly printed record of the daily events in the life of a community. A community without a newspaper is little more than a name on a map or a collection of dry statistics in the archives of some courthouse. Newspapers are the breath of life.

While we are reminded, during National Newspaper Week, that these newspapers are "Growing With America," it is well also to recall that growth without freedom would mean little — and that newspaper are, in the final analysis, the voices of free men.

Austin — Gov. Preston Smith and State Comptroller's office hold different views on timing of a special session of the Legislature to pass the second half of the 1972-73 budget.

Smith apparently wants to wait until next July — when primary elections are over and a longer-range look at possible tax revenue is available.

Comptroller's aides voiced concern that a session delayed that long could not produce needed new revenue by September 1, start of the state's fiscal year. A sales tax increase, for example, in April would not produce money to the state from merchants until the end of July or early August.

Smith was unimpressed: "He (Comptroller Robert S. Calvert) is not the governor," Smith noted.

Smith's veto of the second year of the biennial spending bill necessitates a complete rewrite in special session sometime within the next year. A special session would have been required, anyway, since the 1971 Legislature did not pass a 1973 welfare appropriation.

"The people are not too anxious to have the legislature in special session," Smith said. "The longer we can delay, the better position we will be in for the Comptroller to give an accurate estimate (for the next year) and to determine revenue needs of the state."

The Governor indicated strongly, however, that if a special session is necessary to redistrict the House of Representatives, budgeting and re-appointment probably will be considered at the same time. He controls the timing and subject matter of special sessions.

"If we can get with one special session, we sure don't want to have two," Smith said.

**COURT REVIEWS DISTRICTS TANGLE** — The State Supreme Court heard a barrage of conflicting arguments as to what should be done about House of Representatives redistricting.

All of these views went before the High Court:

- That it should order a five-member Legislative Redistricting Board to perform "its constitutional duty" and reappointment the House in line with the 1970 census.

- That it should prohibit the Board from reapportioning either House or Senate on grounds that the new census has not been completely published and that redistricting thus should be delayed until 1973.

- That 150-member House districts are required.

- That single-member districts are not required as long as they do not cause discrimination against any group.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Governor Smith named three new members of the Parks and Wildlife Commission under the 1971 act expanding the agency to six commissioners. New members are Max L. Thomas of Dallas, Joe K. Fulton of Lubbock and Robert Burleson of Temple.

(reappointment) to the School Land Board.

Reps. Richard Slack of Pecos and James L. Slider of Naples were reappointed by House Speaker Gus Mutscher to the Texas Legislative Budget Board.

**LAND BIDS TAKEN** — Bonus bids totaling nearly \$4.8 million were paid for oil and gas leases on 68,867 acres of University of Texas land at public auction last week.

Bids brought the Permanent University Fund to a record of \$579.8 million. Average \$69.26 per acre price was the highest the University has received at lease auctions since 1965. Highest bidders for a single tract were Allied Chemical Corporation and Champlin Petroleum Company in a joint offer of \$260,000 for a 320-acre tract in Ward County. If oil or gas production is realized, the permanent University Fund will receive a one-sixth royalty payment in addition to the bonus bid.

The School Land Board will meet October 5 to consider a rule regulating the use of water on state-owned land under oil and gas leases.

**VERNON SITE SELECTED** — Vernon Center South was selected by the Texas Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation as the site for the state's first comprehensive treatment and rehabilitation center for hard core, juvenile drug addicts.

The drug center will contain facilities for housing, educating, treating and training about 350 juveniles 14-21 years of age.

MH-MR Commissioner Dr. David Wade said the proposed program will push Texas into national leadership in treating and rehabilitating young drug users.

**GRANTS TPOVED** — Texas will get \$411,675 in new federal grants to fund two Office of Economic Opportunity program this fiscal year.

One of the grants provides \$237,700 in new funds and \$22,300 in carry-over money for state agency assistance. A second for \$96,000 (including \$12,025 in carry-over cash) will finance a state special technical assistance program.

OEO will use the money to provide technical aid to 47 Texas community action agencies and nine limited purpose agencies representing 75 per cent of the population.

**AG OPINIONS** — A state agency which prior to the presidential wage-price freeze order paid insurance premiums for individual employees in excess of \$12.50 a month can continue to do so, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held in recent opinion.

Newly-employed persons are entitled to the same coverage provided prior to the August 15 freeze for other employees similarly situated, Martin said.

In a separate new opinion, Martin said a county Auditor is not authorized to require as a prerequisite to his approval of a claim or items of expense that a requisition be signed and approved by him at the time a purchase is made or expense incurred.

**CARS IMPORTANT AT TEXAS TOWNS** — About 2,600 Texas communities have no other mode of transportation available other than highways, Texas Highway Commission Chairman DeWitt C. Greer noted in a recent speech.

While the population of the state has increased an average of 162,000 a year for the last decade, Greer pointed out that motor vehicle registrations jumped by 284,000 last year. Unless the highway system is continually expanded and modernized, warned Greer, Texas will face a "crisis in mobility."

**SHORT SNORTS**  
 Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall entered the lieutenant governor's race last week.

Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert announced he will not be a candidate for re-election next year, and Associate Justice Joe Greenhill said he will seek the chief justice's post.

Texas Research League will make a new study of major alternatives in state-local financing of public school education.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has available for distribution a new 40-page magazine-size bulletin on "Freshwater Fishes of Texas." Comptroller Robert S. Calvert is requiring certification on every state voucher that the purchase is in compliance with the wage-price freeze — in spite of some protests.

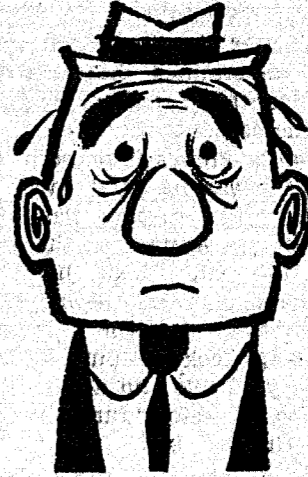

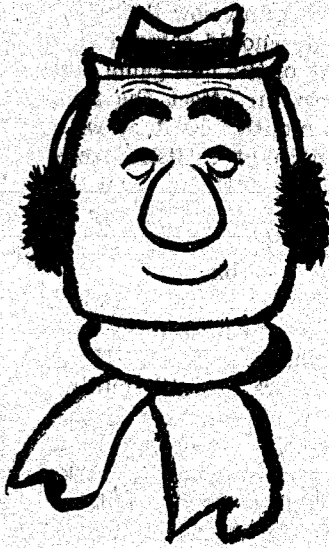

Cotton growers who do not expect to harvest any cotton should file in the ASCS office

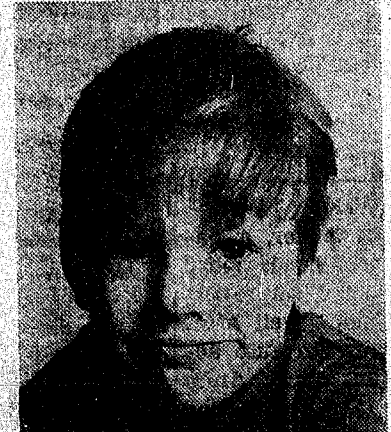

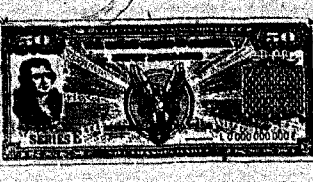

## Well, What Do You Know?

What is the shape of a falling raindrop?

Small droplets of water within a rain cloud are round in shape. These small drops of water join, forming larger drops called raindrops. When raindrops fall through the air, they flatten out. As a result, a raindrop is shaped much like a hamburger bun. A raindrop is not shaped like a pear, as is commonly thought.

How can you tell a butterfly from a moth?

Many butterflies and moths look very much alike. Yet it is possible to tell them apart. In general, butterflies are brighter in color than moths. Butterflies are active during the day. Moths are active only at night. Butterflies and moths differ in other ways, too. Moths have thicker, more hairy bodies. A resting moth usually folds its front wings back upon its hind ones. A butterfly at rest leaves its wings full and erect. A butterfly's antennae (feelers) have slightly enlarged tips. A moth's antennae do not; in some moths the antennae have feather-like plumes, but the tips are never enlarged.

What is static?

Static is a crackling, hissing, or crashing noise that

interferes with radio reception. Static usually comes from electrical disturbances in the atmosphere, such as those during a thunderstorm. People often make static when they use a device that produces electric sparks. Anything from combing your hair to using an electric shaver may produce static.

Who was Molly Pitcher?

Molly Pitcher, whose real name was Mary Ludwig Hays McCauley, was a heroine of the Revolutionary War. When her husband, John, went to fight in the Revolution, Molly went to the army camp to take care of him. At the battle of Monmouth on June 28, 1778, Molly ran back and forth all day long bringing water from a well to the hot, thirsty soldiers. Seeing her, the soldiers cried "Here comes Molly with her pitcher!" Soon they were just calling "Molly! Pitcher!" and that's how she won her battle name.

During the battle, Molly's husband was killed, and she stepped up to the cannon to take his place. As long as the battle raged, Molly loaded and fired with the rest of the soldiers. Today there are monuments at Monmouth and at her grave, honoring her as a brave fighter. There are songs about her, too.

# AUDIO CENTER IN OPERATION ON HPC CAMPUS

A new hearing and speech center which will provide mid-Texas residents with a service previously available only in metropolitan areas has been opened at Howard Payne College, according to Dr. Guy D. Newman, HPC president.

The center, equipped with facilities that supply both diagnostic and therapy services for persons with speech, hearing and language disorders, is headed by Frank Brister, a member of the college's department of oral communications faculty.

Brister is one of only about 1,000 persons in the U. S. who hold certificates of competence in the area of audiology from the Speech and Hearing Association of Washington, D. C.

According to Brister, the center is equipped with an Allison 21-A Clinical and Research Audiometer. The unusual instrument has been installed on the first floor of Cuggin Theatre, site of the hearing and speech center.

The audiometer enables the center to offer pure tone, speech and discrimination and site of lesion examinations, as well as evaluations for hearing aids.

The center is closely connected with Howard Payne's expanded program of oral communications. A B. A. and B. S. degree are available in speech and hearing therapy under the new curriculum.

"The center gives the Brownwood and Brown County areas services heretofore available only in the large metropolitan regions of the state such as Abilene, Austin, Fort Worth and Dallas," Brister explains.

Brister says that according to national statistics, approximately 10 per cent of the residents in any community have some type of speech,

hearing or language disorders and need professional help. "In the new center, if a person needs a hearing aid, for instance, we'll do a complete evaluation of his hearing which will be better than he can get anywhere except possibly at a very large medical center," Brister says. He notes that the HPC center can do tests which persons with hearing loss would need before purchasing hearing aids or before being treated by a physician.

"We will have different brands and models of hearing aids on hand in the clinic," Brister says. "We can try them on people here and determine which ones do the best for each individual."

Brister explains the center is designed especially for children with speech disorders (stuttering), articulation disorders and delayed language problems. For adults, he says the center can help those which stutter and have voice problems, as well as those suffering from "aphasia," a disorder often resulting from strokes.

According to Brister, the center's program has been set up along the lines of principles laid out by the Texas Education Agency. HPC representatives met with TEA officials in Austin to insure the program adhered to the organization's specifications.

The idea for the center was an outgrowth of conferences involving Dr. Newman and Dr. Henry C. Lindsey, HPC's academic dean. Brister was called to head the program because of his background. Formerly, he served as clinical audiologist at Middle Tennessee State University as a clinical director for both Mississippi State College for Women and the Jackson Speech and Hearing Clinic in Jackson, Miss.

He also has worked in the area of hearing and speech therapy as a private practitioner for three years in Gulf Port, Miss.
