## Slick Highway Causes Mishaps

A rain-slick highway was reported to be the cause of three-vehicle accidents early Wednesday morning 3 mile east of Santa Anna.

According to Highway Patrolman Butch Wampler of Coleman, the series of mishaps began at 3:00 a.m. yesterday when a truck tractor with a double trailer hook-up overturned in the ditch at the roadside. The truck had skidded on the slick highway and jack-knifed before overturning, wrecking one of the trailers and damaging slightly the cab portion and second trailer.

The big rig, driven by James Howard of Dallas, belongs to East Texas Motor Freight. Mr. Howard was not injured in the accident.

At 3:45 a.m. another truck tractor, owned and driven by William Hixon, of Kansas City, Mo., overturned at the same location. The truck and trailer turned on its side, blocking the highway.

A Stevens ambulance from Coleman, approaching the accident scene at 3:57 a.m. drove head-on into the overturned truck blocking the highway. The driver, Dalton Eugene Traylor, and a passenger, Jesse Griffin, both of Coleman were uninjured in the accident but the ambulance sustained about \$500 damage in the collision.

Mr. Hixon, the only person injured in the accidents, was taken to the Coleman hospital by a second Stevens ambulance where he is being treated for cuts, bruises and abrasions.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers were literally "passed by" Friday night by the Early Longhorns as the agile Early team took a 12-6 victory. The Longhorns scored in the first and final quarters while the Mounties made their

lone score in the third quarter. Early won the toss and started a determined drive for the goal line, reaching paydirt after three first downs. The PAT failed. The Mountaineers took the

Ricky went over from the two for the TD but the PAT was unsuccessful.

Early and Santa Anna each took turns with the ball during the last quarter with Santa Anna making two first downs and Early getting their second TD of the evening on a pass play and long run by Early's Jack Williams.

The game ended with Early on top by 12-6, giving them a 4-1 season to Santa Anna's 3-2.



Channel Catfish

Restocked In W-Texas Lakes

A few weeks ago, a West Texas catfish would have been up to his whiskers in sand.

Now there is water in the west, and catfish in the water.

More than four tons of channel catfish have been stocked in Nasworthy, North Concho and Twin Buttes reservoirs near San Angelo, brought from the federal hatchery at Uvalde.

To go with this shipment, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will ship all available surplus catfish fingerlings from other regions of the state to various West Texas lakes which were dried up, or almost dried up, during the drought.

The federal hatchery's contribution was 9,430 pounds of channel catfish weighing from approximately a half-pound to one and a half pounds each. With this size catfish, a spawn is expected by next year.

North Concho received 5,550 fish, Nasworthy got 3,000 and Twin Buttes 11,986. All three of these lakes went virtually dry last spring, officials said.

The number of state-raised fish to be distributed to newly-filled West Texas area lakes will depend on the number available after regular stocking programs have been completed.

Anglers are reminded by department officials that any catfish under 11 inches in length must be returned to the water.

**In Our Opinion**

PRESIDENT NIXON has revealed his plan to stop the inflationary spiral following the price and wage freeze, and as usual, there are many who don't believe it will work, and others who have put up a howl that it is unfair.

One thing for sure, the way things were going was not working, and the least we can do is give this one a chance.

Naturally there will be some sacrifices, because the price and wage freeze caught some just as they were going to get raises or were going to increase prices, and of course this puts them in a position of not being able to do so, and they are unhappy.

However, it is the opinion of most that sacrifices made now will pay dividends later on. Most of the people this writer has talked to are willing to go along and see. Also it seems that Congress will support the President, that is a majority. There are some who would criticize a perfect solution.

It is sad, but to far too many public officials, it is not what is good for the country, but what is good for the party. That fact alone does more harm to the people of this country than most any other thing, it would seem.

May we suggest that we withhold judgement of the suggested solution to our problem until we see how it will work?

Above all, organized labor should have a wait-and-see attitude instead of jumping on the plan before it starts.

A BOUQUET is due Senator Lloyd Bentsen this week as he has introduced legislation in Congress that would be a help to law enforcement officials and the courts in criminal cases in this country.

There have been many cases where confessed criminals are released because of minor technicalities under the exclusionary rule. That is where law enforcement officials commit some minor error or infraction in gathering evidence and that proof must be suppressed, no matter how conclusive it is. It doesn't matter whether the infraction was intentional or not, it is still thrown out by the courts.

This has been the criminal's greatest loophole in getting away with crime and there is no way to count the criminals who have been turned loose because of some slight technicality that keeps the prosecution from using conclusive evidence.

Of course, everyone will agree that the rights of the accused must be protected, because that is an important part of the design of our democratic form of government. In most less free countries, the accused has no rights, so the guilty verdict is easy. But it is not necessary to go overboard at the expense of society to the point where justice is not evidenced.

Senator Bentsen has introduced legislation that would amend the Exclusionary Rule by providing the courts an opportunity to weigh the seriousness of the offense charged to the accused against the nature and circumstances of the offense committed in gathering the evidence. The court would then be able to make reasonable decision on admitting the evidence involved.

Most of us, I am sure, are tired of criminals being released on such technicalities, and feel that it is about time something is being done about it.

Want to help? Write your senator and other senators supporting the measure. Then to your congressman.

**STATE Capital NEWS**  
By VERN SANFORD

A new year-round voter registration law went into effect for Texans on October 1.

Predictions are that it will make significant changes in the political structure of the state. New rules governing the operation of political party conventions also will begin operating next year.

These major provisions in the new voter registration act are noted:

- Voters can register at any time (except for a temporary cutoff 31 days before each election.) Registration is good for three years, and is automatically renewed by participation in an election during that period. The old registration period, one of the shortest in the nation, was October 1-January 31.
- Eighteen-to-21-year-olds may register and are eligible to vote in local, state and federal elections under a new U.S. constitutional amendment.
- Roving or resident registration deputies may sign up voters anywhere — apartments, union halls, club rooms, dormitories, industrial plants, office buildings, supermarkets or private residences. The law provides that "no voter registrar shall refuse to deputize a person." This is expected to increase sharply the use of deputies to round up voters.

Predictions range upwards of five million total eligible voters in 1972, an increase of a million over 1970.

Voters must have resided in the state a year and in a county for six months to qualify for local election participation. Those who have lived in Texas more than 30 days but less than a year before the November 1972 general election can vote for presidential and vice presidential candidates under special residency registration with county clerks.

• Doug Crouch to succeed Frank Coffey, who resigned, as Tarrant County (Fort Worth) district attorney.

• Drs. Walter H. Fischer of Temple, Sterling H. Pruitt of Fort Worth and Harvey H. Kennedy of Longview to the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

• Lt. Col. Belisario D. J. Flores of San Antonio as chairman of statewide Veterans Day activities October 25.

John W. Cardwell, former Georgetown newspaperman, was named deputy director of the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity.

Lawrence Miller Jr. of Dallas is new chairman of the Texas Real Estate Commission.

Joe Teller, Texas Water Quality Board deputy director, was selected for Water Pollution Control Federation of American executive committee.

**STATE TO FIGHT FOR TREASURE** — The state is prepared to go to the U. S. Supreme Court to get title to all artifacts recovered from Spanish galleons which sank off Padre Island more than 400 years ago.

Texas Antiquities Committee was told a decision is near by Brownsville federal court in a long legal dispute over the treasure. Platoro Ltd., a Gary, Ind., salvage firm, recovered the valuables in 1967 and proposes a 50-50 split with the state which demands the entire treasure.



### NOTICE OF HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT OR CONSTRUCTION

The Texas Highway Department is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvement on U. S. 84 from near the East city limits of Santa Anna, East 7.2 miles to the Brown County line. The proposed highway project will follow the present route Eastward. Since the Bureau of Public Roads has approved the design for this project, the Highway Department will begin work on the next phase of engineering necessary for the improvement of this project.

Plans provide for rebuilding of the highway to modern design requirements for a four lane divided highway with no frontage roads. Work is to be scheduled such that the present facility will be utilized to carry traffic during construction of the additional lanes. The existing facility will then be overlaid and improved to serve as two lanes of the completed four lane facility.

The completed four lane facility will be four 12 ft. traffic lanes (two either side of a common centerline) with 6 ft. inside paved shoulders and 10 ft. outside paved shoulders. The inside paved shoulders will be separated by a 64 ft. depressed divider.

Some 12 acres of additional right of way, a maximum of 125 ft. wide, will be required to the South side of the present road just East of Santa Anna for the transition from two lanes to four lanes. The two new lanes will be built to the North of the present road for the remainder of the project. This will require a strip of additional right of way approximately 125 ft. wide North of the present right of way.

Maps and drawings showing the proposed geometric design, information on environmental studies and other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineers office at Coleman, Texas. Maps have also been placed on file with the city of Santa Anna.


