The W. M. Morgans have an unusual plant at their home on South Houston Street. A "yard-long" bean plant, from seeds brought here from Oklahoma, produced a good crop of beans during recent weeks. The local product didn't quite get to be a yard long—but many pods measured up to 27 inches.

The bean is edible and is snapped and cooked like any snap beans. They have a flavor similar to beans or black-eyed peas, according to Mrs. Morgan.

The unusual beans grow on a high trellis and were gathered by draping them over the arm, like so many limp snakes!

Mrs. Morgan saved seeds for replanting next spring.

## S. A. Exhibitors Have Winners At State Fair

A number of Santa Anna students were among the winners at the State Fair in Dallas last week in the sheep and swine divisions of the livestock show.

In the junior division sheep show on Wednesday, 515 lambs were exhibited by 4-H and FFA students from over the state. The Santa Anna FFA had nine winners in the fine wool class which was the second largest class of the show with 92 entries. Local winners are the following: Sharon McCreary, 7th; Carol Kingsbery, 9th; Susan Newman, 10th; David Morgan, 11th; Lane Guthrie, 14th; Raymond Holland, 19th; David Morgan, 26th; Cline Smith, 28th and Carol Kingsbery, 39th.

Ribbons were presented the top 60 lambs in the class and all lambs placed were included in the auction sale.

In class 2, sixteen entries were exhibited and ribbons were awarded the top 15. Tony Owen was the only local winner, placing 11th.

In the Dorset crossbred class, Raymond Holland had 6th and Lane Guthrie the 9th place entry. Hank Wise of the Rockwood 4-H and Tommy Culppepper of the FFA had 8th and 9th places in the Dorset Purebred class.

Elaine Newman's crossbred Hampshire lamb was judged 11th in the class and her purebred Hampshire placed 20th. Ruben Valdez had a 46th place entry in the purebred Lamb class.

Hank Wise had a 5th place entry in the Shropshire crossbred class, and Elaine Newman had the 5th place entry in the Southdown class.

In the swine division Randal Lovelady showed the 3rd place Chester White barrow, medium weight, and Mark Shambeck had the 12th place entry.

In the heavy weight crossbred class, David Cupps showed 20th.

Ronnie Daniel exhibited the 16th place Hampshire light weight and Randal Lovelady had 25th place in medium weight.

Tommy McIntire had 9th and 10th in the Yorkshire division.

The State Fair is the last in the fall stock shows. The next show will be the Santa Anna 4-H and FFA event in late December or early January.

The Santa Anna Junior High football team defeated the Goldthwaite JHS team on Tuesday night 34-6, their first victory over the junior Eagles in nine years. The game at the local stadium was played during a rainstorm with occasional high wind and cool temperature.

The first Santa Anna touchdown came early in the first quarter when Jody Day went over for 6. The try for extra points failed.

The second TD for the Mounties was made by Randy Burfield with one minute left in the first period. The two-point conversion was good, giving 14-0 for Santa Anna. With five minutes left in the second period, Jody Day intercepted a Goldthwaite pass and ran for a TD. The PAT was not good.

With just 30 seconds left in the second period the junior Mounties scored their fourth TD on a run by Randy Burfield. The two point conversion gave Santa Anna a 28-0 score at halftime.

Goldthwaite made their only score of the game during the third period of play. The Santa Anna boys advanced to the Eagles three-yard line on the next series of plays, but were held without scoring.

With five minutes in the last quarter, Jody Day ran back a Goldthwaite punt within three yards of the goal line.

Lee Wristen carried over the TD on the next play, giving a 34-6 final score.

Coach Dwight Hudson's team will end the season next Tuesday night, Nov. 2, with a game at Early. The game was scheduled for last week but was postponed because of rain.

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*In Our Opinion*

AN IMPORTANT question in the next presidential campaign may be the busing of school children. Although the publicity on this problem has calmed down a little, there are still cries from every part of the nation and from every race, including Blacks, Mexican-American, and Chinese.

There seems to be very few in any group who favors the busing of children in order to achieve a racial balance, yet the HEW, the NAACP and a few other lesser-knowns, still push the project and regardless of his statement that he does not favor busing, President Nixon has done nothing to stop or even slow down the situation.

For that reason there are many people who are saying privately that they may consider supporting George Wallace for president in 1972, should he run. And it's a pretty sure thing that he will.

Some seem a little embarrassed to come out for Wallace, because the news media has pictured him as a demagogue and a racist, but many are disappointed in Nixon and so far the Democrats have come up with nobody, and I mean nobody.

However, the Alabama governor has gained a lot of support in his dogged resistance to the high-handed tactics of the HEW and their pressure through the justice department. A lot of newspapers over the nation from Maine to California, have applauded his efforts to halt busing, because as the Santa Monica (Calif.) Evening Outlook said editorially: "This time he's right. Many will look upon Gov. Wallace's challenges as a politically motivated tactic designed to enhance his attractiveness as a possible presidential candidate in 1972, but that doesn't detract from the validity of his position. This time he has more right on his side than wrong."

And so goes the comment with very little of a derogatory nature being written about the governor, and much said in his favor.

The two major political parties had better wake up or they might find that the ten million votes Wallace received in the last presidential election is just a drop in the bucket.

They continue to try to cram liberal candidates down the throats of a conservative majority, and whether that is believed or not, the majority of citizens in this country are more conservative than liberal.

Regardless of what they do, however, we are going to see many people from all parts of the nation and from all races who will stand up and be counted for Wallace in the next election. Wallace has spent the last four years campaigning and he has made a lot of tracks all over the nation. A lot of people don't go along with the stories of the last campaign. They are beginning to believe it will take someone like the governor to straighten this country out and give it back to the people.

FOR SOME REASON or other, I would like to know why, we observed October 25 as Veteran's Day instead of the usual November 11.

This is just another example of how government bureaucracy can mess up the whole country over something that they have no business sticking their nose in. But regardless of the uninvited interference, we hope all of us will remember those who have given their lives and health for the defense of this country. We have lost many thousands in the wars that have defended this country and a lot of our soldiers have lost their health because of injury during war time.

So let's take time to salute those who made the great sacrifice. "There's no greater love than this, that a man lay down his life for a friend."



Austin — Ballot order has been selected for 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on at the November 7, 1972, election.

Major changes, including authorization for a constitutional convention, four-year terms for major state officials, higher state bond interest ceiling and equal rights for women are included in the list.

The amendments, in the order they will appear on the ballot, follow:

1. A salary raise for legislators from \$4,800 to \$8,400 a year.
2. To abolish Lamar County hospital district.
3. To provide for compensation of all justices of the peace on a salary basis.
4. To establish a constitutional revision commission and call a convention to revise the state constitution in January, 1974.
5. To allow tax exemptions for disabled veterans, their surviving widows and children and widows and children of armed forces personnel killed on active duty.
6. To provide a minimum \$3,000 property tax exemption for resident homesteads to those 65 and over.
7. To guarantee that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed or national origin.
8. To provide four-year terms for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller, treasurer, land commissioner, secretary of state and other statutory state officers.
9. To allow soil and water conservation district directors to hold, or be compensated for, more than one office.
10. To require that proposed constitutional amendments be described twice in clear language by statewide newspaper publication (633 papers).
11. To fix an annual salary of \$22,500 for speaker and lieutenant governor.
12. To permit state employees to serve on local governing boards.
13. To set a six per cent weighted average annual interest rate for constitutionally authorized bond issues.
14. To allow counties to reduce their permanent school fund and distribute money to independent and common school districts on a per-scholarship basis.

**DEMOCRATS ELECT**—Feuding Democrats settled a row over election of a new chairman with unexpected calm.

At a Dallas meeting, the State Democratic Executive Committee named Roy Orr, 39, mayor of DeSoto, chairman, rejecting Gov. Preston Smith's preference for Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Orr won by a razor-thin 32 votes to 30 over the veteran statewide official. Backers of both argued that their man would be the best choice to unify the state party for election-year battles ahead. White had backing of liberal and some moderate and conservative members of the committee. Orr drew support of most SDEC conservatives and some moderates.

Both candidates, the winner and the loser, pledged future cooperation with all factions.

Orr succeeds Dr. Elmer Baum of Austin as SDEC chief until the September, 1972, state party convention.

State Board of Barber Examiners—Thomas J. Hullum of Burnet.

Joe Reeder Jr. of Knox City was named 50th district judge succeeding Lewis Williams of Knox City who resigned.

**COURTS SPEAK** — The State Supreme Court affirmed lower court findings that state employees are constitutionally banned from city council service.

In another new decision, the High Court set a hearing November 3 in the controversy over whether 588 acres were legally acquired at Odessa for a new University of Texas of the Permian Basin campus.

Third Court of Civil Appeals here held a law preventing vending machine owners from holding financial interest in taverns is constitutional.

The death penalty conviction of a Refugio County man for slaying a sheriff and a deputy sheriff in 1969 has been upheld by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

**DISASTER AID APPROVED**—Texas Employment Commission will pay disaster unemployment compensation to persons made jobless by tropical storm Fern September 9-September 30 in 14 South Texas counties.

Counties covered in the assistance plan are Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Nueces, Refugio, San Patricio, Jim Wells, Hidalgo, Starr, Willacy, Jim Hogg, Live Oak and Calhoun.

Special aid determined in accord with U.S. Labor Department regulations will correspond in amount and duration to benefits paid under the state unemployment insurance program and manpower development and training act. Maximum is \$45 a week for 26 weeks.

Eligible include those who no longer have jobs or a place to work as a result of the storm or who were unable to reach work, who were injured or who were made heads of households as a result of deaths in the disaster.

**ALLOWABLE REDUCED** — For the seventh consecutive

month, Texas Railroad Commission reduced the statewide oil allowable.

A cut of .7 of a per cent sets the November production factor at 62.5 per cent of potential. The allowable has been slashed 19.6 per cent since last April.

A maximum production of 3,275,749 barrels daily will be permitted under the November controls, compared with 3,305,129 this month.

**BOND SALE OFFERED** — A total of \$31.5 million in veterans land program bonds will be offered for sale November 1.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said sale of additional bonds is necessary to continue the program under which 20,000 applications for low interest rate land purchase loans have been made since last February. The interest ceiling on the bonds is 4.5 per cent.

**APPEAL FILED** — Texas is appealing U.S. Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe's decision to impose a 10 per cent penalty on the state's share of highway construction money from the federal trust fund.

The threatened cut — because Texas has not enacted a billboard control law under the highway beautification act — would cost the state about \$24 million a year. The appeal to Volpe noted legislative efforts to comply with the federal requirement and asked a decision on the penalty be withheld until the next regular legislative session.

**SHORT SNORTS**

The Legislative Redistricting Board barely made its October 23 deadline for reapportioning the House of Representatives. The new Senate districts were announced a week earlier.

Enrollment in Texas junior and senior colleges reached an all-time high of 479,807 this fall.

The School Land Board will offer 401,847 acres of state land for lease at its oil and gas lease sale December 7.

John W. Berry of Conroe received the 1971 Lady Bird Johnson Highway Beautification Award and \$1,500 cash prize.

Agriculture Commissioner White says pink bollworms and too much rain are threatening the Texas cotton crop.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held that the bailiff of a district court need not be a deputy sheriff and that Bexar County

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Hospital District may not change the month of selection of its depository after selection for a two-year term in February, 1970.

Gerald McCathern of Hereford and Worth Jones of Hart were selected to the Board of Directors of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

**Infestation By Army Worms Is Possible Now**

Recent rains over much of the state have revived ranges and pastures and brought on lush growth. These green grasses appeal not only to livestock but to army worms as well. The pests have come on the scene in several areas of the state in recent weeks.

"Army worms generally appear in late summer and early fall where lush growth appears in grasses and forage crops," explains Dr. John Thomas, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Small grains planted for fall and winter grazing are especially susceptible to damage. Plants can be stripped of their foliage in short order."

Army worms reach a length of about 1½ inches when mature. Young worms are less than one-half inch long. Their color ranges from pale green to almost black. Thomas explains that the worms have two characteristic markings. Three parallel yellow lines extend along the back. A prominent white inverted "Y" also appears on the front of the worm's head.

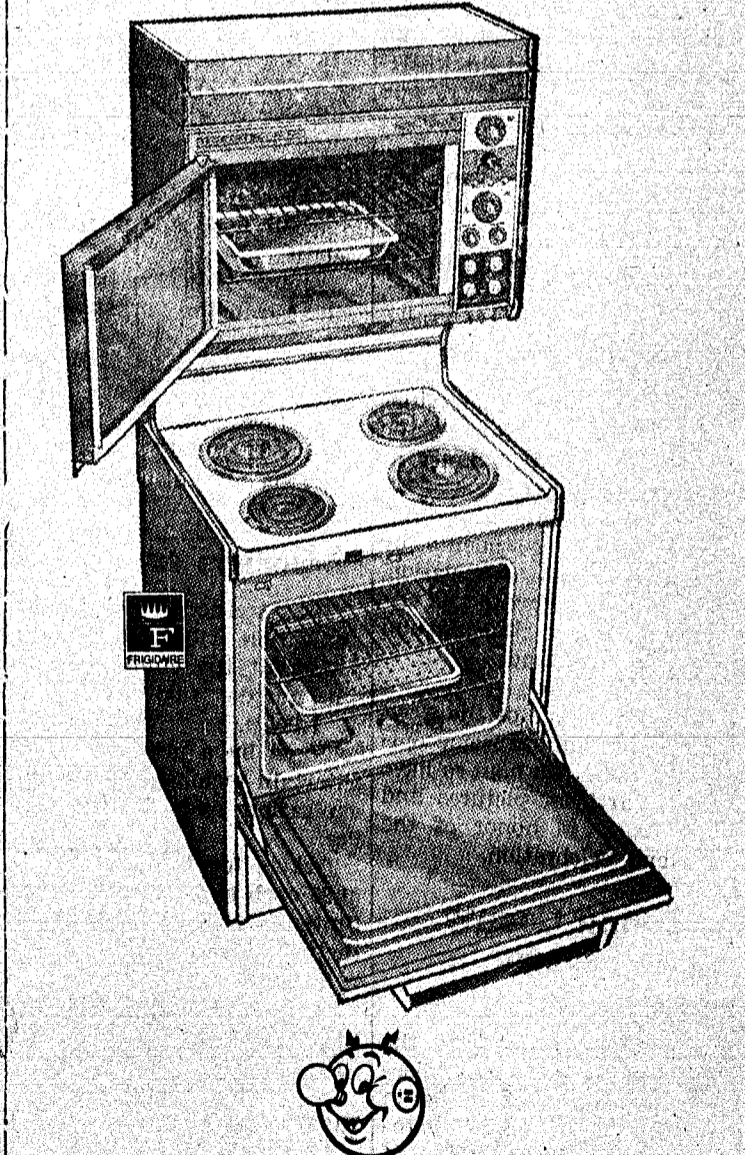
According to the entomologist, army worms can be effectively controlled if measures are taken as soon as infestations appear. Applying 1½ pounds of Sevin (80 percent wettable powder) per acre usually gives adequate control. Toxaphene at three pounds of actual material per acre is also effective but there can be no grazing by dairy animals or animals that will be slaughtered in 56 days. Parathion and methyl parathion can also be used but have a 15-day waiting period prior to grazing or harvesting. Both are extremely hazardous to applicators and are subject to drift. Thomas cautions producers to follow the manufacturer's directions on the label of any of these materials.

"Army worms are mainly night-feeders but are also active on cloudy days," adds Thomas. "Grasses should be inspected frequently and carefully to detect army worm activity, especially during cool, wet weather."

## ASC News . . .

Some 65,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire during the last half of November or December. The year-end survey on sheep and goats will be made in late December.

This round-up survey of agricultural crop production, livestock numbers and cash receipts from farming and ranching is made annually by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, are joined together to provide a continuing program of information on Texas Agriculture.

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### FICKLE TRAFFIC LIGHT

For a few dazed moments after the collision, Charles could not quite figure out what happened. Then he remembered: the traffic light had changed directly from green to red, skipping amber. Unable to stop, he had rolled into the intersection in front of an oncoming truck.

Blaming his accident on the fickle signal, Charles determined to seek damages from the city. But at a court hearing, the City denied liability.

"We can't be held legally liable every time a signal gets out of order. We would be swamped with lawsuits."

However, Charles' attorney proved that this particular signal had been malfunctioning for a full week before the accident. The court concluded that the city was guilty of negligence, and granted Charles' claim.

Some cities still retain their "sovereign immunity" against being sued. But in most places, a motorist can indeed collect damages for an accident caused by a traffic light or a stop sign that has been neglected.

There have even been cases holding the city liable when a stop sign was obscured by foliage. Thus:

A motorist hurt in a crash blamed it on the fact that a stop sign was hidden by the leaves of a tree. In its defense, the city pointed out that the tree was growing on private property — "out of our jurisdiction."

Nevertheless, the court imputed that even if the city could not have trimmed the tree, at least it could have chosen a better place to put the sign.

Of course, the city is not liable if there is no causal connection between its negligence and the accident. In another case, a fallen stop sign had been left lying on the ground for weeks. One day a motorist failed to halt at the corner and struck a car in the crossing.

But it turned out that the motorist, who lived in the neighborhood, knew perfectly well it was a stop street—even without seeing the sign. The city was duly cleared of responsibility. The court said the sign simply had nothing at all to do with the accident.

## CANDY ADDICT HAS PROBLEMS

Ex-smokers switch to all kinds of substitutes. Like licorice drops. It sounds harmless. But sometimes it isn't.

According to a recent United Press International report, one man was rushed to the Bryn Mawr Hospital in Pennsylvania as an emergency patient. He had most of the signs of a heart attack, but diagnostic tests showed no attack had in fact occurred.

However, the heart muscle was behaving badly. The man's body chemistry was too alkaline, and the potassium in his blood was at a critically low level. There were also symptoms of kidney failure.

After 24 hours of tests, the patient happened to mention that he had quit cigarettes three months earlier and now ate licorice drops instead. Surprised by the serious interest of the examining physicians, he said he had been eating about a quarter of a pound every day for months.

As a result of this case, the word is being spread through the medical world to watch out for licorice addiction in ex-smokers. Licorice depletes the amount of potassium in the blood that is necessary to keep the heart pumping.

Once the diagnosis of "licorice intoxication" was confirmed it took 33 days in the hospital to restore the normal level of potassium in the man's blood. But at the end of that time, all his symptoms were gone.

Too much of any one substitute for cigarette smoking can have ominous repercussions. But quitting smoking accompanied by sensible substitutes, is an essential step toward health.

To find out more about the hazards of smoking and how to quit as painlessly as possible, check with your local tuberculosis and respiratory disease association. It's a matter of life and breath.
