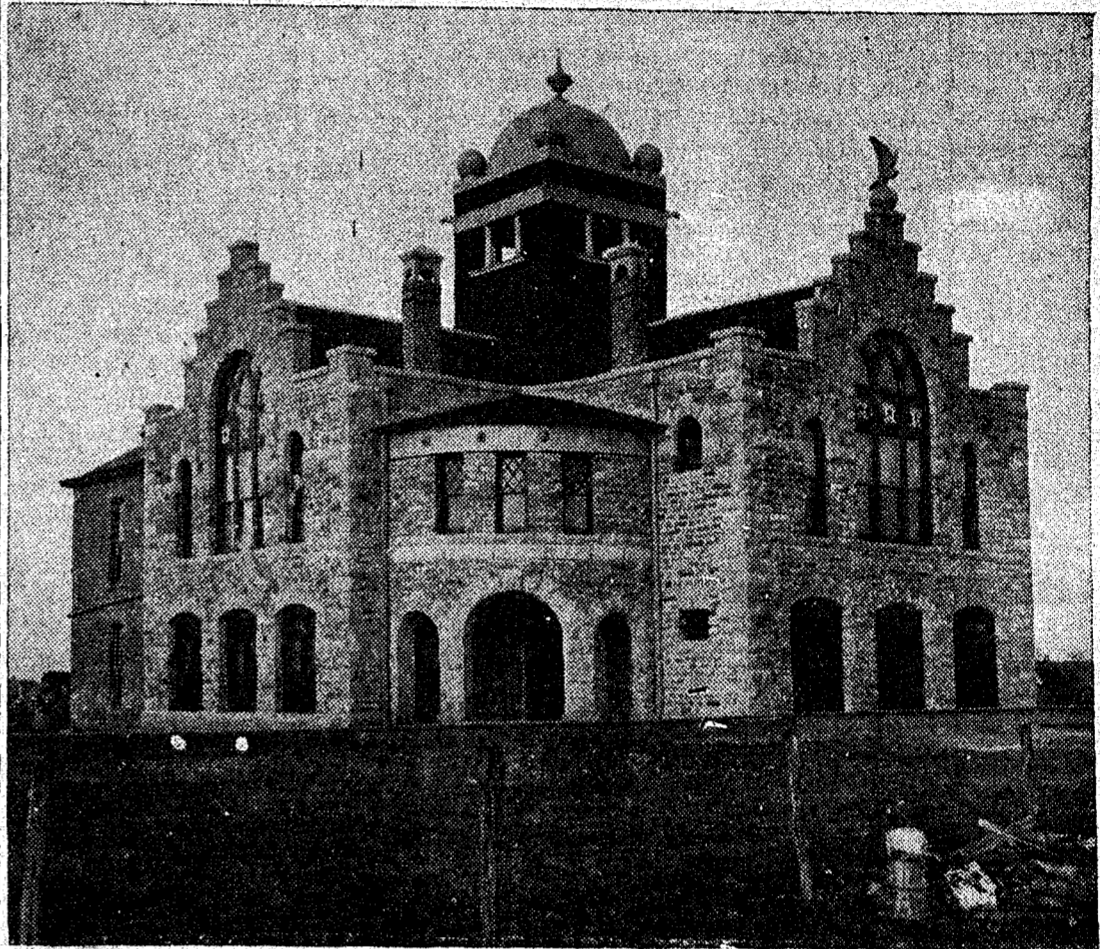
Friday Parade A New Feature Of Homecoming

In Our Opinion

MAYBE CONGRESS is finally waking up to some facts that have been evident to some of us for a long time.

There is no way you can buy friendship, whether you are an individual or a nation. That is what we have been trying to do with foreign aid for many years, and most of the nations we have helped have turned against us in the long haul.

The sad awakening came at the vote of the United Nations when they voted in Red China and expelled the Nationalists. George Bush said several nations promised to support our stand, but when the voting came, reneged. That is a prime example of the trust you can put in most of the Communist countries. Their word is just about as good as no word at all.

Not only have we been shelling out to those who would cut our throat at the drop of a hat, but we have been paying the major portion of the expense of the United Nations, while most of the others do not even pay their allotted share. When a big deficit appeared in operating expense, who but Uncle Sam picked up the tab.

President Nixon was critical of the Senate when they voted to cut off foreign aid, but we applaud them. At a time when the balance of payments is running in favor of other countries and causing problems at home, we had better keep our dollars over here as best we can. Cutting off foreign aid will help that to the tune of about \$15 billion.

At the same time, it is our hope that Congress will cut our contribution to the United Nations to our allotted amount, and if they get into trouble financially, let them sink or swim. We are somewhat pessimistic about the good, if any, the UN does anyway. It seems to be a sounding board for commie propaganda as much as anything else.

There are some nations who have been our friends and whom we do not begrudge the aid that has been given them. But by and large, we feel that it has been money down the drain.

What we had better do, if we just have to spend that money, is to put it into modern military equipment, that might help us stay up with the Reds in military might. It is a known fact that Russia has been creeping up on us every year, and if the present trend continues, it won't be very long before we will be the underdog.

But, you know, \$15 billion would help a little in cutting the national debt, cutting the taxes of overburdened individuals and businesses, or, if Congress keeps pushing up the minimum wage, it would help pay the welfare bill that it would create.

CONGRESSMAN OMAR BURLESON says in his report this week that about 75 per cent of the people support the price-wage freeze and also Phase Two even though we don't know just what it will be.

Inflation hurts everybody, yet nobody wants to do much about it. People seem to think it is as sure as death and taxes, but there is something we could do if everyone really wanted to pitch in and help.

This would mean that the manufacturer would hold the price line, merchants would be satisfied with what they have been charging, and wage earners would need to be willing to forego wage increases. Also professional people would keep their fees set. Everyone is involved in setting prices, but each of us seems to feel that the "other" guy should be the one to give in order to stop the rising cost of living.

Why don't we want to join the cause? Cooperating for the common welfare is the best way to help ourselves.

The problem is: Who starts the ball rolling? Until more people feel that self-sacrifice is the solution, it won't start. The human factor that self preservation is the first law of nature will have to be put in its true perspective before we realize that what is good for the majority is good for us.

But that is the way it works in the long run.
