## City Council Limits Hours At City Dump

The Santa Anna City Council met in regular session on Thursday night, Nov. 4, at the city hall. Mayor Thomas Wristen led the monthly meeting.

Minutes of the October meeting were read and approved, and bills and accounts were approved for payment. The Council voted to restrict the hours that the city dump ground is open each day. The new schedule will be from noon to 4:00 p. m., instead of all day.

It was voted to entertain the Pecan Valley Water Association at their monthly meeting. The group is composed of employees of municipal water departments from the central Texas area. The meeting will be held Thursday, Nov. 18, at the Lions Club building.

A report was given on the renovation of the city pumpers' residence at the lake. The Council voted unanimously to prohibit threshing of pecans on city property. The pecans will be allowed to drop naturally from the trees and picked up by neighborhood residents.

The next regular meeting of the city council will be on Thursday, Dec. 9.

was moved to the new location later that year and work began on remodeling and repaving. A new roof was added and the building was given a yellow brick veneer. Partitions were removed and rearranged so that a restroom and four classrooms were included.

The building is completely enclosed except for the entrance doors to give better acoustics and for ease in heating and cooling. The interior is completely paneled.

Further work on the building and furnishings will include landscaping and exterior decoration, addition of a porch and railings, and the refinishing of church pews.

Rev. Ford has served as pastor of the congregation since 1962. Active membership is presently in the 40s.

The old church property has been sold to Lonnie Bledsoe who plans to remodel the building for a residence.

The Santa Anna Mounties took their second district victory Friday night when they defeated the Rising Star Wildcats 15-0 at the homecoming game at the local

stadium. The Friday night victory gave Santa Anna a 6-2 season standing.

The first Santa Anna touchdown was scored in the second quarter when co-cap-

tain Rocky Dean went over from the six yard line. He added another point to the score by kicking the PAT, giving the Mounties a 7-0 halftime lead.

The third period of play was scoreless and in the fourth quarter Tommy Lewis made a run from the eight yard line for the second touchdown of the game. Quick-thinking quarterback David Horner can the pigskin over for two points when the attempted kick for one was fumbled. The game ended with the 15-0 score.

Rising Star now stands 2-7 for the season and 1-2 in district play. The big battle for the championship will take place Friday night at Richland Springs when the two teams meet at Richland Springs. The teams, both undefeated in district play, shared tri-champion honors with Rising Star last season.

Members who received electric service from the Coleman County Electric Cooperative, Inc., in the year 1961 will be receiving more than \$160,000 in patronage refunds sometime this week. The checks are in the process of being mailed at this time.

The amount each member will receive represents about 27 per cent of each dollar spent for electricity by that member during 1961.

Patronage refunds returned to Cooperative members simply represent any money taken in over and above the actual cost of delivering power to the members for that year.

This year will be the 12th consecutive year for the Coleman County Electric Cooperative members to receive patronage refund checks. Cooperative members are still receiving dependable electric service at prices below previous years.

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**In Our Opinion**

THERE HAS BEEN INTRODUCED in Congress a Constitutional amendment which says in simple terms, "No public school student shall, because of his race, creed, or color, be assigned to or required to attend a particular school."

The routine is that it must come out of committee, then be passed by a two-thirds majority of both House and Senate, then by three-fourths of the state legislatures. It would then become the 27th amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

There is one hitch at the present time, and that is, the judiciary committee is sitting on it.

Under the rules of the House of Representatives, the amendment can be forced out of the committee to the House floor with the signatures of 218 members, a majority. So far the petition has been filed and has 115 signatures, however that still leaves 103 needed to force the amendment out of committee.

Bills have been passed by Congress prohibiting the use of funds for the purpose of busing school children, but the Supreme Court has ignored them and went on their merry way ruling that school districts must bus children in order to achieve racial balance. The only alternative seems to pass a Constitutional amendment to put a stop to it.

A recent Gallup poll taken all over the United States, showed that over 75 per cent of the people were against forced busing in order to mix the races, and several northern states such as Michigan and Ohio are finding out that the idea is not so good. The courts originally aimed the decisions at southern states and had the support of the northern congressmen and senators. However, when the shoe got on the other foot and the northern states started reaping some of their own sewing, they began to yell loud and long.

On the recent bill to subsidize school districts who were suffering financially because of busing, the northern liberals voted with the southern conservatives. They felt that in passing such a bill, it would, in effect, condone busing for racial balance.

When the liberals cast their ballots, they were loudly applauded by the conservatives.

It is the hope of most people who still feel that this country should be ruled by a government of the people, by the people and for the people, that the two new nominees for the supreme court will be approved and will unbalance the ultra radical decisions that have been coming out of the court in recent years. They both have records of rulings on cases before them according to the written law, and not what they think it should be. Many times in the last decade, justices have been, and many times it has not been the intent of the law, and certainly not to the letter.

If the Constitution is not completely clear on a law, then the justices have to judge as to the intent of Congress when it was passed, but far too often they have used this excuse when it was not necessary and have, in effect, actually legislated law that was not there. After that, judges in all courts, study decisions made in prior cases and use them as precedents in making decisions.

This law business is getting so complicated that the lawman doesn't have a chance and the "Philadelphia lawyer" doesn't do much better.

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Austin — A blue-ribbon study commission has come out strong for state constitutional revision and widespread restructuring of the state and local governmental system.

The Texas Urban Development Commission, winding up an 18-month study which enlisted the services of experts and laymen, handed its 200-page report to Gov. Preston Smith.

Smith, commending the body for charting "a clear course for those in government to act on," announced appointment of a 17-member, permanent Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. The latter will follow up on the report of the study group headed by Arlington Mayor Tom J. Vandergriff as chairman and Dr. Earl M. Lewis of Trinity University in San Antonio.

"The Texas Constitution," said the Commission, "should be thoroughly changed to allow state and local governments to exercise more initiative and to be more responsive to current and future demands but at the same time free to be truly responsive to changing needs and emerging problems."

Among 50 major recommendations were the following:

- State government should begin moving toward a new organizational and management system and consolidation of urban services in about 20 existing agencies.
- The governor should have more power over budgeting and appointments and removal of state agency governing boards chairmen.
- Local governments should be reorganized to meet specific local needs and granted greater fiscal authority through additional revenue sources and property tax overhaul.
- Growth of special purpose districts must be checked.
- Urban growth planning programs and coordinated land planning should be launched at all levels of government.

**APPOINTMENTS** — George E. Stanley of Port Arthur was named to the Veterans Affairs Commission, succeeding the late Charles C. Ford of Longview.

Governor Smith named 10 members of the Criminal Justice Council executive committee and designated L. O'Brien Thompson of Amarillo as chairman.

Smith appointed an 18-member study committee on traffic court reorganization.

Lawrence L. Jester has been designated district engineer of the State Highway Department's Atlanta district on retirement of G. A. Youngs.

William G. Reid of Austin will serve as general counsel for the recently-established Criminal Defense Lawyers Association.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes named committees to study the system of state licensing and examining boards and retirement benefits for employees of public educational institutions.

**BONDS SOLD** — Continuation of the veterans land program was assured by sale of \$20.8 million in bonds.

The low bid of 4.8893 per cent effective net interest was submitted by a group of 50 investors. The constitutional ceiling on interest rates is 4.5 per cent for the program.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the sale means the program can operate until

almost the end of 1972 when Texas voters will have a chance to pass a constitutional amendment to raise the interest rate ceiling to six per cent.

The Veterans Land Board is constitutionally authorized to sell another \$70.7 million in bonds. More than 43,500 Texans have bought land under the program.

**A NEW GOVERNOR** — Texas will have a new governor briefly in December — when Sen. W. E. (Pete) Snelson of Midland takes over as chief executive for the day.

Snelson, as president pro tempore of the Senate, is third in line for the governorship. Governor Smith and Lieutenant Governor Barnes will absent themselves for the state December 4 so Snelson can have the honor of serving as governor. He represents 35 counties of the 25th senatorial district.

**COURTS SPEAK** — The State Court of Criminal Appeals upheld Texas' abortion law, and said the state has the right to prohibit operations, in a decision conflicting with a June 18, 1970, three-judge court ruling at Dallas.

The Court of Criminal Appeals also reversed a Waco marijuana conviction due to improper questioning of witnesses by the prosecuting attorney.

State Supreme Court heard arguments in a suit seeking to nullify University of Texas acquisition of a 588-acre Odesa site for the new UT-Permian Basin campus because of the proximity of oil and gas equipment and a potential safety hazard.

**AG OPINIONS** — The governor can commute death sentences to life imprisonment even though convictions are on appeal, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

- A new "surtax" on misdemeanor and felony convictions (\$2.50 to \$10) cannot be assessed for offenses committed prior to last August 30, date the law went into effect.
- Issue of tax cancellation certificates are authorized, and should cover all tax certificates showing no taxes due which had been previously and lawfully issued.
- Computation of actual interest expense incurred and to be recovered as an item of selling price on long term federal water contacts shall be made by applying the cumulative average effective rate to only that portion of the "direct cost" of the facility which is attributable to Texas Water Development Fund money.

**PESTICIDE DECISION PUT OFF** — The new State Pesticide Advisory Committee delayed its decision on banning DDT for household uses. No recommendation was made because the Environmental Protection Agency has not made its official rulings on DDT, committee chairman

Dr. Perry Adkisson of Texas A&M University said.

The five-member committee will meet again December 7 to consider the matter. Texas Department of Agriculture, charged with administering the state law on pesticides, asked advice from the advisory panel authorized by the Legislature this year.

**HUNT INVITE "DISAPPEARS"** — State legislators and officials who had been invited to hunt on state game management areas found the invitations suddenly withdrawn after newspapers publicized them.

Parks and Wildlife Department Executive Director James U. Cross issued the invitations, although other would-be deer hunters are required to draw for the limited number of free permits in the areas. PW Commissioners expressed doubt special exceptions could be made for state officials and legislators, so the bid was unceremoniously taken back. One commissioner called for Cross's resignation over the incident, but the new director said he plans to stay on the job.

**POOL MEET SLATED** — Complaints about the new Texas catastrophe pool insurance plan will be aired at a public hearing here December 7.

The State Board of Insurance announced it will "consider all aspects" of the plan approved by the Legislature for 14 seacoast counties this year.

Texas Association of Insurance Agents will offer testimony and stress "positive steps" that can make the pool work as intended.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Attorney General Martin lambasted the new state code of ethics for public officials as a "virtual mishmash" and predicted a court effort by one or more political subdivisions to invalidate it.

State health authorities rechecked September rabies tests after a faulty lab check came close to letting a case of the deadly disease escape detection.

Three railroad union legislative boards have merged into a single United Transportation Union, Texas Legislative Board to represent 12,000 railroad and bus line employees on legislation.

Dear hunting, one of the state's biggest businesses — involving 510,000 "customers" who spend about \$88 million in two months on 37 million acres of leased land — gets under way this weekend in most counties.

Governor Smith declined the request of New York Attorney Roy Cohn for a special investigating committee to look into Attorney General Martin's probe of the \$228 million Moody Foundation, saying he has no authority to name a committee with subpoena power.

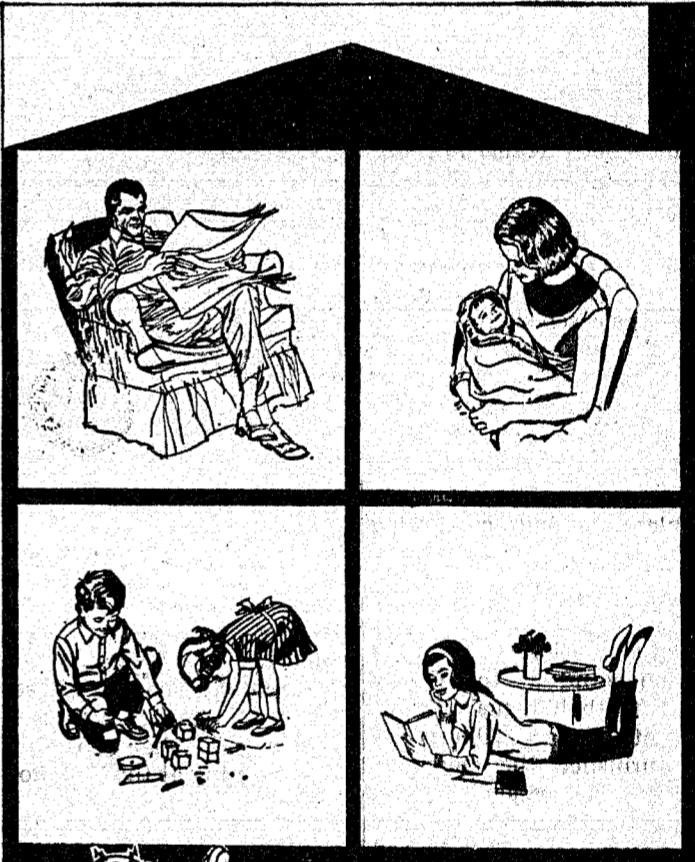

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# ASC News . . .

Washington, Oct. 18—Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin today announced a feed grain program for 1972 designed to increase farm income and reduce carry-over stocks.

The new program raises the grain set-aside to 25 per cent of the base (20 per cent this year), 40 cents per bushel for corn and 32 cents this year, brings barley into the feed grain program, adjusts loan levels for grain sorghum and barley (consistent with the feeding value of corn), extends farm stored grain resale provisions, and offers farmers two new options to set aside additional acreage beyond the minimum qualifying 25 per cent.

The program is designed to achieve a feed grain set-aside of at least 38 million acres in 1972 compared with 18.2 million acres this year.

The new program continues corn loan levels at \$1.98 (No. 2 basis) and the guarantee at \$1.35 per bushel. The soybean loan level will be maintained at \$2.25 per bushel.

The feed grain program will work this way:

1. During sign-up, starting Jan. 17, a farmer can decide whether to set aside a minimum 25 per cent of his feed grain base acreage to qualify for loans and payments.

Loans will be \$1.08 per bushel for corn (No. 2 basis), the same as in 1971; \$1.79 per hundredweight for grain sorghum (\$1.73 in 1971); 86 cents per bushel for barley (81 cents in 1971) and 54 cents and 89 cents per bushel, respectively, for oats and rye (the same as in 1971).

Set-aside payments will be 40 cents per bushel for corn, 32 cents per bushel for barley, and 38 cents per bushel for grain sorghum. These are paid on the established farm yield times one-half the barley, corn or grain sorghum base. Payments in 1972 will again be made to farmers as soon as possible after July 1.

2. At sign-up time, the farmer can agree to set aside an additional amount of acreage, up to 10 per cent of his corn or grain sorghum base and up to 20 per cent of his barley base. The government will accept this additional voluntary acreage set-aside at sign-up time and will make set-aside payments for corn of 52 cents per bushel times the established farm yield on the additional voluntary set-aside acreage. Set-aside payments for barley will be 42 cents per bushel and for grain sorghum 49 cents per bushel, also figured on the established farm yield times the additional voluntary set-aside acreage.

3. Also at sign-up time, the farmer may offer to set aside still another 5 per cent or 10 per cent of his corn or grain sorghum base acreage. The Secretary of Agriculture will announce by the middle of

March, whether to accept any of the additional acreage. This will give the Secretary greater flexibility in reducing acreage to make the program most effective. Set-aside payment rates will be the same for this additional voluntary set-aside as under option No. 2 above.

Payments to farmers under options No. 2 and 3 will also be made as soon as possible after July 1.

Sign-up period for the 1972 Feed Grain and Cotton Programs will be January 17 through February 25, and there will be no extension.

The 1972 Feed Grain Program is designed to achieve a feed grain set-aside of at least 38 million acres, compared with 18.2 million acres this year. With new options presented to farmers for 1972 the Secretary of Agriculture must have set-aside commitments by February 25 to enable him to determine whether to accept farmer offers of optional set aside if sign-up is short of the desired 38 million acres.

To do this it is imperative that we have an early sign-up. Farmers have from now until January 17 to make their plans and to sign up within the allotted period.

It is necessary to set-aside at least 38 million acres this coming year to help offset the record corn production of 1971. Also, the basic goals of the 1972 Feed Grain Program are to give farmers more opportunity for decision making on their farms, and to protect and improve their incomes.

The 1972 Feed Grain Program will reduce carryover stocks, help keep our agricultural production in line with anticipated needs, and will encourage farmers to put greater reliance on the marketplace as the principal source of farm income.

A farmer may choose between option one and two, or three when he signs his intention form.

The payments will be figured from the set-aside acreage provided necessary feed grain crops have been planted. For the provisions of the third set-aside, please contact the ASCS office.

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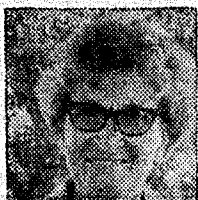

## Nabers Gives Rayford Price Endorsement As House Speaker

Brownwood, Texas — Calling reform in the Texas Legislature one of the most vital issues in state government, Representative Lynn Nabers today said he would support the election of Representative Rayford Price of Palestine for House Speaker.

Representative Nabers said the past session clearly spelled out many of the inadequacies of the legislature, and the need for reform in State government.

Nabers said he believed Rep. Price has proposed a sensible platform of reform recommendations that can insure that elected officials speak for their constituents and do not become the unwilling pawns of self-serving cliques who use veiled threats to subvert democratic processes.

"It's time to restore the balance of power that the spirit of the Texas constitution demands," Nabers said, "and I am convinced that Rep. Price has the leadership talent and integrity to do this."

Some of the Price recommendations, Nabers hailed as meaningful to constructive government include adoption of a fair and workable code of ethics for members of the legislature and the institution of a limited seniority system.

Rep. Nabers said Price also proposes to limit conference committees to adjustments in legislation differences between the House and Senate and reduce the number of House committees by more than half.
