## SEWAGE DISPOSAL PERMIT BRINGS WAVE OF PROTEST

Controversy over the proposed sewage disposal permit for the City of Coleman has been brought to the attention of all people in the area as downstream property owners and others are voicing protest.

Coleman city officials have expressed regret that misunderstanding has caused most of the controversy.

According to Coleman's acting city manager, Roy McCorkle, the permit to dump sewage effluent into Hords Creek is the first step required for approval of a federal grant for financial aid toward construction of a new sewage disposal plant for the City of Coleman. It is not a permit to begin dumping

raw sewage into the creek as has been suggested by many of the permit's foes.

The City of Coleman has been requested to comply with anti-pollution requirements and the present situation has long been inadequate. For over 40 years the overflow from the city sewage ponds has gone into Hords Creek after heavy rains. The new disposal plant would not only help the situation but release only treated, chemically pure water into the creek.

"Property owners on Hords Creek and water users from Lake Brownwood should be the ones most eager to have the proposed permit accepted," McCorkle said.

The areas outlined by Postmaster Gregg are those within which next-day delivery will be provided for mail deposited in the post office in Santa Anna by 4:30 p. m. on weekdays.

## Postal Service Fast Delivery Areas Listed

The new overnight delivery of first class mail, announced recently by Postmaster John Gregg, is to include 13 areas throughout Texas. The overnight delivery of first class zip coded mail from Santa Anna is to benefit the patrons in the postal centers serviced by Brownwood, Fort Worth, Wichita Falls, Stephenville, Temple, Waco, San Angelo, Bryan, Austin, Amarillo, Childress, Lubbock, Abilene and Midland.

The postal service's goal for the overnight delivery was unveiled by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount on August 26. It is planned to have the new delivery system in effect by October 31.

The Postmaster General has pointed out that this program will affect more than half of all first class letter mail sent in the United States, so that every post office in the country will be benefitting from the new service goal.

The areas outlined by Postmaster Gregg are those within which next-day delivery will be provided for mail deposited in the post office in Santa Anna by 4:30 p. m. on weekdays.

## BEARS MAUL MOUNTIES BY 20-6 SCORE FRIDAY

The fighting Santa Anna Mountaineers lost their first game of the season to the Baird Bears by a 20-6 score. The scoring came in the last quarter of play after Santa Anna had held the experienced Baird crew and stopped the predicted passing tactics for three periods of play.

The Mountaineers won the toss and Baird kicked into the end zone. The Mounties took the ball at the 20, and fumbled and lost the ball on the first play.

Baird advanced steadily from the 30 to the three-yard line and were held by the strong S. A. defense and the ball went over on downs.

Four first downs for Santa

Anna took the ball to the Baird 31 where the Bears took the ball on downs. Tony Beal knocked down a Bear pass and recovered a fumble, giving Santa Anna possession at the end of the first quarter. A 15-yard clipping penalty for Santa Anna was impossible to regain, so Ricky Beal punted to the 5-yard line for the Bears.

Baird again had trouble moving the ball past the good Mountaineer defense and punted to Santa Anna on the 35. Three more first downs for Santa Anna got the ball to the Baird 15 before the Bears took possession.

The Bears again felt the strength of the Mountie defense and punted to Santa

Anna just before the halftime.

Baird took the halftime kickoff at their 10 and advanced to midfield before losing possession. Santa Anna failed to make a first down on the series of plays and Baird took a punt on their 28. A penalty for Santa Anna gave Baird another first down before they lost possession on downs.

Santa Anna made two more first downs on series of plays before returning the pigskin to the Bears on the Baird 20. Early in the fourth quarter Baird fullback Cecil Faircloth made a 20-yard end run and the first score of the game. The PAT was good, giving Baird a 7-0 lead with ten minutes left on the clock.

David Horner took the kick-off at the Santa Anna 10 and the Mountaineers made two first downs and advanced the ball to the Baird 45 before punting to the Bears. A penalty for the Bears backed them nearer the goal line in their own territory and they failed to make first down yardage. Santa Anna took the Baird punt at the 45 and made a first down on three carries. On the second play of the next series Rocky Dean took a handoff from quarterback Horner and passed to Danny Valdez just at the end zone. Sophomore end Valdez gave football fans a thrill as he almost fumbled then recovered the ball for the Santa Anna score. The PAT pass from Horner to Tony Beal was incomplete and the score was 7-6 with only two minutes remaining on the clock.

Baird got their second score on a long run by Faircloth in the final 30 seconds of the game, giving Baird a 13-6 margin. The extra point kick was blocked by the Mountaineers.

Ricky Beal took the ball on the kickoff and on the next play the Bears intercepted a pass on the 22 yard line and raced for the third touchdown which with the PAT gave the Bears a 20-6 score. The Mountaineers had time for only one play before the final whistle.

Final statistics showed Santa Anna with 12 first downs to Baird's 10; 192 yards rushing to Baird's 176; and 54 yards passing to the Bears 34.

In other statistics Santa Anna completed 4 of 11 passes and punted four times for a 26 yard average. The Bears made 3 of 12 passes and had an average of 35 on four punts. The Bears had only one penalty for 15 yards while the Mounties had 8 for 100 yards.

Coach J. A. Smalley reported that he was very pleased with the first game and the boys played better than he had expected.

Halfback Rocky Dean was one of the leading ground-gainers and Tommy Lewis also played well. David Huggins, quarterback David Horner and Ricky Beal were outstanding on offense.

Defensive standouts included Ricky Beal, Randy Long, Randall Lovelady, Horner, and Mark Wise.

The Mountaineers will have another tough game Friday night with the Cross Plains Buffaloes. Cross Plains was defeated by Wylie in their opening game and will travel to Santa Anna for the Friday night tilt. The Buffs defeated Santa Anna last year.

## MOORE MERCANTILE CO. SOLD TO LAMPASAS BUYER MONDAY

A change in ownership and announced closing of one of Santa Anna's largest businesses was the main topic of conversation in town this week.

Doug and Louise Moore, long-time merchants in Santa Anna, have announced

that Moore Mercantile Co. has been sold to T. O. Walton of Lampasas. Mr. Walton indicated Monday that he purchased the business for liquidation and does not plan to continue with the drygoods store after the present stock is sold. The liquidation is scheduled to start Friday of this week.

Mr. and Mrs. Moore have been in business in Santa Anna off and on for 15 years. They have had variety and drygoods stores at three locations, moving the last time from the former Purdy Mercantile building to the present location. Mrs. Moore plans to spend her time at home since discontinuing ownership of the business. Mr. Moore is rural mail carrier here.

The mercantile store is closed a few days as the new owner prepares for the liquidation sale. The building and fixtures are also to be sold.

## SA Senior Band To Bowl Game Next Saturday

The Santa Anna senior band will go to Eastland on Saturday for the annual Peanut Bowl parade and football game. Bands marching in the parade will be competing for trophies given to winners in each classification.

The Santa Anna musicians and their director, Aubrey Edwards, will leave at 1:00 p. m. Saturday afternoon. The parade will be at 3:00 p. m. in downtown Eastland.

Following the parade the band will be guests of the Eastland Jaycees for supper. All the visiting bands will take part in pre-game activities and half-time entertainment during the football game that night.

The 1971 marching band has 55 members and are expecting to have another good year in contests after being the highest rated Class B band in this area last year.

## FOOTBALL GAME TO BE FILMED ON VIDEO TAPE

A new video tape filming of the Friday night football game will be used, according to Bob Burton, president of the Santa Anna Quarterback Club. The instant replay-type filming will be shown to football fans immediately following the Friday night game.

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**In Our Opinion**

THE LABOR DAY WEEKEND ended with 11 fewer deaths than the Department of Public Safety had predicted, and apparently both the director of DPS, Col. Wilson E. Spier and Gov. Preston Smith were happy of the result.

Of course it is always tragic when one has to die on the highway because most of the accidents are needless and can be blamed on carelessness, but basing their predictions on past performance, the DPS had estimated that there would be 52 fatalities over the weekend and the total was only 41.

No one, of course, can give the reason for the drop, but one can hope that Texas drivers are becoming more aware of the dangers of highway driving, especially over holiday periods. Maybe the governor's "Drive Friendly" program is taking hold. Let us hope so.

It is a fact that courtesy on the highway is contagious. One can drive along and watch one driver do a good turn for another such as pulling over on the shoulder to let him by, and then the faster driver will find some way to be courteous to another afterwards. Of course there are exceptions to the rule, but generally that will be the case. It just makes a person feel better when he is treated courteously.

Wouldn't it be nice if every driver would try this out and see how far it would go?

AN EXAMPLE OF WHAT organized opposition can do when governmental bureaus cook up some of their unworkable programs, was exhibited last week when doctors and pharmacists met and announced that they would not go along with the Welfare Department's new vendor program.

Their reasons, all seemingly valid to us, was that the program is completely unworkable in that the paper work required of the doctors and pharmacists takes more time than seeing the patient or filling his prescription. Not only that but the people the program is designed to help are getting the short end of the stick.

Recipients are limited to two prescriptions per month that will aggregate not over \$12.00. Anything over that requires special approval of a board. They set up nine additional boards over the state and their administrative costs come out of the original appropriation, which will not be a small amount. Last year the vendor rolls had about 252,000, but this year, apparently from pressure from HEW they have been expanded to about 700,000 which include many categories that have never been under that jurisdiction before.

It all boils down to the fact that they would take less money to pay medical costs for more people and pay administrative costs for more bureaus, which, if they follow the usual pattern, will grow and grow each year.

What will happen if the doctors and pharmacists refuse to go along. The program will have to be changed and simplified.

The central Texas group met and decided not to go along and many other parts of the state are doing the same.

People are going to learn one of these day that they will have to get together and stand for what is right if they are not to be taken over by bureaucratic government. That not only goes in this case but in many others where big government has completely ignored the wishes of the people, spent their tax money and have done exactly what the few bureaucrats wanted to do.

The trend toward socialism is going to have to be stopped or else this country will soon be in the same boat as any other totalitarian country. We will be run by the government, told what to do by the government, fed by the government, and buried by the government. That is a day I don't want to see!

WHEN IS DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME going off, a fellow asked the other day. Well, we answered, that won't be until the last Sunday in October.

"For crying out loud," he exclaimed, "I will be eating breakfast in the dark a long time before that."

It is true that six months of daylight savings time in this part of the country is a mighty long time. We start in April when 8:00 o'clock comes pretty early and don't end until October when the same thing is true. During the summer months it is not so bad because the sun is pretty far up when we go to work.

"What I would like to know," said one fellow, "is who is getting the daylight saved?" We wonder, too. What is the advantage to the ordinary mortal when he gets up an hour earlier and, if he gets his sleep, has to go to bed an hour earlier. What has he saved? Nothing but the feelings of the politicians who thought this mess all up.

**STATE Capital NEWS**

Austin — A major court decision last week left up in the air the question of how Texas is to achieve a valid reapportionment act for both houses of its legislature before next year.

State Supreme Court agreed with an August 2 Austin district court finding that a House redistricting bill passed this year is unconstitutional because it unnecessarily split up 23 counties.

The decision left unanswered how the bill should be corrected or if it should be re-done before 1973. Basic questions are these:

- Should House reapportionment and state Senate redistricting (left un touched by the Legislature) be the subject of an emergency special session?
- Should the five-member constitutional Legislative Redistricting Board take on the job, since no valid reapportionment was done by the Legislature in the first regular session after the 1970 census?
- Should the Legislature forget about reapportionment before 1972 elections and wait until the 1970 census statistics are all complete and published?

Gov. Preston Smith and Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin once more are on opposite sides of a controversy.

Smith says the Redistricting Board has the "duly constituted responsibility" under the constitution to redistrict, and a special legislative session on reapportionment would be unnecessarily costly.

Martin stated in a brief before the Supreme Court a special session "would seem the only correct possibility, but this, too, could become the subject of litigation."

A High Court ruling in another case challenging the Redistricting Board's authority may hold the key as to whether it can proceed, whether the Legislature must take over now or check the task until 1973.

A note of urgency is injected into the issue by the fact the Board is directed by the constitution to do whatever it is going to do by late October. Furthermore, legislative candidates appear to face a November 7 deadline for establishing residence in the district they choose to represent.

**ANTI-POLLUTION PERMIT USED** — Texas Air Control Board has put into operation a far-reaching construction permit system to help control and prevent air pollution.

Since August 30, (any industry that will omit air contaminants into the atmosphere must get a Board permit before starting any construction. Similar permits are necessary to modify or change existing contaminant causing facilities.

Permits apply to specific, individual manufacturing processes, not entire industrial plants or complexes. Exceptions for minor contaminant-causing plans will be listed later. Applicants have 60 days after construction is completed to apply for operating permits.

**HEALTH STUDY ON** — New studies to find ways of meeting health service, staff and facility needs of Texas' rural population will be undertaken by the Research Institute for Systems Development at Texas A&M University.

The study will be conducted in the West Central Texas area, centered around Abilene which has both rural and urban characteristics typical of many regions.

Fewer than half of Texas' 492 hospitals meet federal medicare requirements for

health and safety, so the project will focus on health facilities and services considered below medicare standards. Texas has more than twice as many qualified hospitals as any other state.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Carl E. F. Dally of Houston and District Judge Tom G. Davis of Vernon are new commissioners on Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

Six directors and two assistants to the executive office of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department were named this month. They are:

- Roy T. Huffman, director of current operations; George H. Cook, assistant for legislative affairs; George C. Adams, assistant for land acquisition; Ron D. Jones, director of planning; John D. Macklin Jr., director of personnel and administration; Richard A. McCune, director of information and education; Samuel W. Kendrick Jr., director of support services and Clayton T. Garrison, director of finance and data processing.

John D. Townsend has been named assistant commissioner for planning and coordination for the State Department of Public Welfare.

Governor Smith named James D. Eppright of Dallas to the Texas Tourist Development Board and reappointed Dan Sanborn, McAllen. He appointed to the State Board of Dental Examiners Dr. William J. Kemp of Haskell, Donald L. Brunson of Baytown, James S. Rogers of Amarillo (six-year terms); Dr. Sam H. Rabon of Kingsville (four-year term) and James E. Bauerle of San Antonio (two-year term).

**\$150 MILLION BOND ISSUE POSTPONED** — University of Texas regents postponed until October 22 consideration of an overall plan for marketing the first block of \$150 million in bonds authorized for new college construction.

About \$30 million in bonds apparently will be sold by December. They are backed by tuition revenues. Money will go to build new institutions of UT at San Antonio, Dallas, Houston, Odessa and El Paso. The bonds were authorized by the 62nd Legislature this year to build newly-authorized institutions.

**DAM AUTHORIZED** — In spite of opposition by landowners, Texas Water Rights Commission voted to permit construction of a dam on Martin's Creek in Rusk County by three electric power companies.

Dallas Power and Light Company, Texas Electric Service Company and Texas Power and Light Company plan to build the dam 17 miles north-east of Henderson for a major power plant.

Landowners expressed fear the lake created by the dam would flood their pastures, destroy timber and prevent Martin's Creek from continuing to provide water for livestock. The companies pledged to try and prevent or mitigate damage.

**D.A. STUDY PENAL CODE** — District and county attorneys have launched their own committee study of needed changes in the penal code. They fought a sweeping controversial revision of the code during the legislative session this year.

District Attorney Tom Hanna of Beaumont was selected

as chairman of the committee in the first meeting last week. Prosecutors indicated they prefer a simplified, "more responsive" new code to the version introduced in the 1971 Legislature which had been five years in the making.

**INDUSTRIES GET AWARDS** — Five Texas industries will receive special 1970 Governor's Industrial Expansion Awards at ceremonies in connection with the Governor's Conference on Industrial Expansion October 13-14 here.

They are Jimmy Dean Meat Company of Plainview, Levi Strauss and Company of Amarillo; Sprayberry Handbags Inc. of Clifton; Gorman Peanuts of Gorman and Vintage Homes Inc. of Breckenridge.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall has promised an announcement for lieutenant governor here September 23.

Attorney General Martin held the State Board of Insurance can make rules for safe movement and operation of mobile gasoline service units.

Governor approved state participation in a \$3.5 million federal pilot program of bank loans for businesses and residents of poverty areas. (Houston and Laredo banks will be among sources of loans.)

Rio Grande Valley farmers suffered a \$150,000 to \$175,000 loss on harvested cotton due to recent heavy rains, reports Texas Agriculture Department.

Grand Prairie Bank and Trust Company seek a state bank charter.

Shoup Voting Machine Company submitted its mechanical voting device for special inspection by the Secretary of State.

Public hearings were held this week (starting September 14) on \$23.3 million worth of new school textbooks.

## Let's Go Boating!



### CHECK BOATING RIG AT MID-SEASON

Periodically checking your boating rig is one of the best ways known to assure a full season of uninterrupted boating fun. The boat, motor, trailer, and all related equipment should be inspected regularly. At about mid-season, however, it's best to go a little further and examine the rig even more closely.

If the boat has been left in the water for several weeks, chances are the hull has become fouled with marine growth. Such fouling has a tremendous effect on a boat's performance and speed, according to engineers at Evinrude Motors. Therefore, the hull should be scrubbed periodically or washed down after each boating trip.

At mid-season, outboard motor spark plugs should be removed and inspected, cleaned if necessary and replaced if they appear defective. This applies even if the engine has not been used much. Also check the fuel system—tank, lines, carburetor and fuel filter—to make sure they are free from foreign or gummy deposits.

Inspect the lubricant in the lower gear case to see that it is free of water or air bubbles and change it if necessary. Your motor owner's manual will also list other points that require mid-season lubrication. The propeller is extremely important, especially on larger engines. If it is nicked or bent, it should be repaired or replaced.

Check the trailer for loose rollers, fenders and nuts and bolts. Be sure the winch line is in good condition and that the winch is properly lubricated. It is also a good idea to pull a wheel and inspect the bearing.

Give life jackets and buoyant cushions a complete check to see that they have not become damaged or mildewed. Replenish the supplies in your first aid kit. See that the fire extinguisher is properly charged and readily available. Inspect your tool kit to see that it is complete.

Look for loose screws, trim and accessories on the equipment. About this time of the year, the rig could probably use a good polish job, too. With everything in shipshape condition, you will be all set to enjoy the remainder of the season without problems.

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# Coleman County Newsletter

SEPTEMBER, 1971

The Coleman County Historical Survey Committee will meet on September 22 in the Court Room of the county court house. Routine business will be heard and the public is welcome, as at all meetings of this group.

Speaker for the afternoon will be N. W. Purcell, who will tell stories of pioneer days in the Mount View - Robinson Peak section. George W. Baker, who was Mr. Purcell's great-grandfather, came to Coleman County while the town of Coleman was mostly a tent-town; his land records and the history of his church and school activities make interesting listening.

This meeting will be at 4 p. m. at the court house, and it is hoped that you will be there.

The Coleman County settlers who broke the sod to plant their crops had fabulous results. It is told of a farm containing 640 acres of land in the Shields community that the cotton crop the first year paid more than the land had cost.

R. T. Haynie was such a farmer. He had come here in 1897 with his family, and bought a large place north of the Santa Anna mountains, and built a good house. J. C. Crump, a Kentucky man, had owned the place but was homesick for Kentucky and Haynie was in luck. Anything would grow in this area then, and Haynie set out a 5-acre peach and plum orchard, a row of walnut trees from the road to the back of the two-story house. He was a Mississippi man who had been used to large plantations, and he plowed the Coleman County grass and planted nearly a half-section in cotton.

The Haynie family lived well in their nice homestead. In the back yard was a large one-room rock house with a good chimney, which they used for a servant house, and nothing was lacking to provide the home and farm with all they needed. Mr. Haynie bought a beautiful buggy with purple upholstery for the use of his two teenage daughters, and their buggy horse was a handsome black. The children attended the Santa Anna school in the early years of this century, and a sadness came to the home in the loss of a 13-month-old boy, Alton, who is buried in Santa Anna cemetery.

In 1904, Haynie's fields seemed to turn to cotton, he had more than 100 bales open and could not get pickers, as all the other farmers were kept busy with their own crop. But he was a man of action. He went to Waco and chartered two railroad cars, a passenger car for pickers and a baggage car for their bedding, and hired 30 men, all negroes, to come to work for him.

There was an ugly element

in Santa Anna who did not want to pick the cotton, but did not want Haynie to bring his men to pick it, either, and they met and agreed to prevent the new workers from getting off the train. Haynie heard of this, and by telegraph he arranged for the sheriff and several deputies to be waiting, four wagons from the farm to be ready to transport his men, and also for himself and several of his year-round employees to be deputized. This sheriff must have been Jim Sanders, a noted lawman, who served about that time.

With such careful preparation, of course there was no trouble, though the children and Mrs. Haynie were filled with apprehension. But the workers left the train and got into the wagons, their baggage was loaded in, and they and their guards drove along the dirt roads without incident to the Haynie place. The same lawless element who had threatened the trouble also caused Mr. Haynie to keep armed guards around the home until all cotton was picked and the men paid the 50c a hundred which was the wage at that time.

The big house is gone now, the orchards and the walnut trees. One of the Haynie daughters, Mrs. Edna Haynie Keller, lives in Oklahoma City and was 80 years old on September 13; a nephew of hers still owns some farm property probably a part of the big place that R. T. Haynie bought in 1899. In talking of the Haynie family, this writer has met several people who remember the fam-

Coffey; in 1868 John Coffey improved on this a little by choosing C3 and Isaac Blackwell used the brand BBB. Malcom Hunter, the operator of the stage stand on Mud Creek, used HH; H. M. Bagley's brand was B2, W. Beddo's was Hat, probably a picture of a hat, drawn with a running iron, and James Callan's cattle wore IXL. John F. Hart used JF and a heart, and his sister Fanny used J Heart J. E. Y. Brown used YB, Enoch Fiveash used simply L, which wasn't a good idea as some people used L with something else after it. Pld Cox branded with a big P and Lewis Ledbetter used a figure of a boot. All these were before 1870. We wonder if, in 2071, somebody will be wondering and studying our cattle brands of today.

### NOTICE OF HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT OR CONSTRUCTION

The Texas Highway Department is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvements on U. S. 84 from near the East city limits of Santa Anna, East 7.2 miles to the Brown County Line. The proposed highway project will follow the present route Eastward.

This project will be developed in cooperation with the Bureau of Public Roads and financing of construction will be 50 per cent State and 50 per cent Federal; therefore Bureau of Public Roads' approval has been requested.

Plans provide for rebuilding the highway to modern design requirements for a four lane divided highway with no frontage roads. Work is to be scheduled such that the present facility will be utilized to carry traffic during construction of the additional lanes. The existing facility will then be overlaid and improved to serve as two lanes of the completed four lane facility.

The completed four lane facility will be four 12 ft. traffic lanes (two either side of a common centerline) with 6 ft. inside paved shoulders and 10 ft. outside paved shoulders. The inside paved shoulders will be separated by a 64 ft. depressed divider.

Some 12 acres of addition right of way, a maximum of 125 ft. wide, will be required to the South side of the present road just East of Santa Anna for the transition from two lanes to four lanes. The two new lanes will be built to the North of the present road for the remainder of the project. This will require a strip of additional right of way approximately 125 ft. wide North of the present right of way.

Maps and drawings showing the proposed geometric design, information on environmental studies and other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineers office at Coleman, Texas. Maps have also been placed on file with the city of Santa Anna.



## Larger Number Of Screwworm Cases Reported

Livestock producers over the state are urged to be on the alert for screwworms as numerous cases continue to spread over the Hill Country, Edwards Plateau, Big Bend and South Texas areas.

Officials of the Mission Screwworm Program report that 19 cases were confirmed during the week ending Sept. 3, making this the worst week since the last week in December, 1968. Furthermore, 16 cases were confirmed during the past Labor Day weekend. Texas thus far has recorded 138 cases with the U. S. count at 161.

And the situation could worsen, according to officials. Screwworm outbreaks traditionally occur in late summer and fall, so producers should check their animals periodically and treat any wounds found. Spraying of herds is also recommended and operations such as dehorning and castrating should be delayed until cooler weather sets in. All man-made wounds, such as those resulting from shearing, etc., should be treated.

Pets, such as dogs and cats, should also be kept under constant watch, add the officials.

Any larvae collected from wounds should be sent to the Mission Screwworm Laboratory for identification. The mailing address is Box 969, Mission, Texas. Collection kits and vials are available from local county agricultural agents.

Counties in which screwworm cases were confirmed last week include Presidio, Maverick, Crockett, Terrell, Bowie, Kinney, San Saba, Uvalde, Lampasas and Val Verde. Two cases were also recorded in Little River County, Ark.

## Dwight Eppler Mishap Victim At Arlington

Dwight Eppler, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Eppler of Rockwood, was slightly injured in a hit and run accident at Arlington on Sunday night, Sept. 5. Dwight, a student at the University of Texas at Arlington, was riding a bicycle home from church when he was struck by a pickup truck, which left the scene of the accident.

Dwight was treated at a hospital for a head injury which required a number of stitches, and his watch and glasses were broken in the mishap.

According to his parents, Dwight is getting along well and is now back in class at UTA.
