The figures showed larger schools operating on an annual lower per-pupil amount. Abilene's cost is about \$630. Other schools in the Class B classification which have high pupil costs include Highland, near Sweetwater, with \$1,665; Paint Creek with \$1,674, and Blackwell with \$1,475.

The other Coleman County schools reporting in the questionnaire included Coleman with 1,230 pupils at \$663 per pupil cost; Novice with 105 pupils at \$1,200, and Talpa-Centennial with 121 students at \$1,197.

Despite the apparent economy of the local school district, a better than average program is conducted in athletics and music, along with adequate maintenance and upkeep of the school propertv and facilities, and high scholastic achievement by the students.





U.S. wheat producers are being offered as additional option to voluntary set-aside wheat cropland in 1972. Since the 1972 wheat program was announced on July 16, 1971. wheat export prospects have dimmed with the uncertainty of the dock strikes. In addition, farmers harvested a large 1971 crop. To meet these changed conditions, the U.S. Department of Agriculture today authorized additional voluntary set aside of wheat cropland equivalent up to 75 per cent of a farm's domestic allotment, in a move aimed at preventing excessive production of wheat in 1972. The payment rate will be 94 per cents per bushel times the farm's established yield times the acreage voluntarily set aside.

The 1972 national domestic wheat allotment is 19.7 million acres, and the required set aside acreage necessary to qualify for program participation is 83 per cent of the farm domestic allotment, the maximum provided by law.

Producers of winter wheat. who already have planted their 1972 crop on 42.2 million acres, can designate acreage for set aside if it is acreage planted to wheat and the growing wheat is of average quality for the farm. The planted winter wheat cropland voluntarily set aside from production in 1972 can be used for grazing or otherwise disposed of by the certification dates established by State ASC Committee or, if pastured, by the beginning of the non-grazing periods which vary from state to state.. This is in accordance with the Agricultural Act of 1970, and is the same procedure followed in previous program years.

In the winter wheat area. which includes Texas, producers at program signup time will need to designate the acreage involved, Spot checks of the acreage will begin immediately following signup.

VEHICLE EQUIPMENT TAIL LAMPS

After Jan. 1, 1972, every motor vehicle, trailer, semitrailer and pole trailer, and any other vehicle which is being drawn at the end of a combination of vehicles, shall be equipped with at least two red tail lamps, except that passenger cars and trucks manufactured or assembled prior to model year 1960 shall have at least one red tail

### REFLECTORS

Every motor vehicle, trailer, semi-trailer and pole help they received during the trailer shall carry on the Christmas project. With rear, either as part of the tail everyone's help the girls lamps or separately two or more red reflectors.

### STOP LAMPS

### R-L MUSHROOM SALAD

- 1 pound fresh mushrooms
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 cup sliced celery 1 teaspoon chopped shallots
- 1 tablespoon minced parsley ½ pound cherry tomatoes

Slice mushrooms thinly, place in cold water, add lemon juice. (This will prevent mushrooms from turning black while salad is being prepared). Slice celery very thin, drain mushrooms, mix with celery, shallots and minced parsley. Add vinaigrette, and garnish with cherry tomatoes, Serves 4.

- 34 cup olive or salad oil 1/4 cup vinegar 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar 1/8 teaspoon rosemary (ground)
- ¾ teaspoon pepper Mix the oil and vinegar with salt, pepper, sugar and rosemary.

### TROPICAL CHICKEN

2 whole chicken breasts 1/2 cup sliced celery 1 cup bean sprouts

4 ounces snow peas

3 tablespoons olive oil

1 teaspoon salt 1 cup chicken stock 1 teaspoon soy sauce

2 tablespoons cornstarch 2 tablespoons cold water 1 small can of pineapple cubes

Skin and bone the raw chicken breasts and cut into small pieces. Cut celery crosswise into 1/4 inch pieces. The bean sprouts are ready to use. Remove the ends and any strings from the snow peas. Heat the three tablespoons of olive oil with 1 teaspoon of salt in a medium-size heavy skillet. When it is hot add the chicken and cook and stir for about 1 minute. Add the celery. bean sprouts and 1 cup of chicken stock, cover and cook for two minutes. Add the snow peas, cover and cook for 3 minutes. Blend together adding 1 teaspoon of soy sauce, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, and 2 tablespoons cold water. Add and stir until the sauce thickens. The dish is now ready to be served. Drain juice from can of pineapple cubes. Garnish dish with pineapple cubes. Serve with plain boiled rice. Serves 3 - 4.

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

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
