Leisure time that results in 14 rugs valued at \$102.40 is time well spent, thinks Mrs. A. M. Daniels, home industries demonstrator in the home demon-stration clubs of Lynn county.

While corn in Guadalupe cou-Henry Pfannstiel had 50 acres home Sunday. on terraced land that stood the drouth and promised 10 to 15 bushels per acre without any late rain, says the county agent. July rains came and the crop made 28 bushels more per acre than unterraced land.

"It's hard to make a profit now in dairying but it can be done by proper feeding with home grown feeds, the members of the Wheeler County Pure Bred Sire Association agreed in their recent annual meeting. It is a good time to buy good bulls, they said, and commended the county agent for organizing another bull circle last summer.

Instead of giving her cull hens away this fall in market sales Mrs. Tom Johnson of Edorado canned 32 pints of chicken products by home demonstration methods. She now has on pantry shelves sandwich meat, roast, soup, and giblets.

An old chicken house was rebuilt into a modern A and M roof type house at a cost of \$5 last spring by Howard Sport of Bagwell's community in Red River county with the help of the county agent. Mrs. Sport, after de-lousing the flock of 140 and feeding them well from self-feeders, reports clearing \$38 above feed cost from eggs, in addition to having all the family could eat.

Wharton -A total profit of \$359.69 from three years of 4-4 club work has been made by Irene Garrett of the Lawson 4-ri Club in Wharton county, according to Miss Madeline Rector, nome demonstration agent. Most of Irene's profits were realized from a poultry llock she started three years ago when she won a trio of Black Austrolorps at a local fair. She made a profit of \$54.54 on her flock this year and has on hand 34 pullets and two cockerels. In addition to her poultry work Irene has this year canned 212 containers of food and beautified her yard by movvard larger, planting 45 foundation shrubs and laying a brick

Goldthwaite —That apples can be raised in Mills county commercially as well as for home use has been shown by J. J. Cockrell who this year sold 250 bushels of apples from 98 Golden Delicious trees for \$500, says W. P. Weaver, county agent. The trees were planted 9 years ago and take up three acres of land. Mr. Cockrell has added a few more trees each year. Three other farmers in the same community 12 miles south of here are also making a success with apples, Mr. Weaver states.




