Sunday Papers Not Boxed Now At Local P. O.

Postmaster John C. Gregg stated early this week that the Sunday newspapers received in Santa Anna will not be put in the boxes at the post office any more. It has been determined that the cost of an employee being on duty at the post office on Sunday does not justify the expenditure. Thus, effective immediately there will not be anyone on duty at the post office on Sunday.

Mr. Gregg said that each of the daily newspapers that send any number of Sunday newspapers here has been notified of the change in the Sunday operation. Each has been informed they may leave their Sunday newspapers in the lobby of the local post office and their subscribers may come in and pick out their copy of the newspapers from the bundle.

"We realize this is going to be a handicap to a large number of customers of the post office and the daily newspapers," Mr. Gregg said. "But because of the cost factor we are just not able to continue this practice anymore. We regret very much this decision had to be made."

The Abilene Reporter-News, San Angelo Standard-Times and the Fort Worth Star Telegram are the primary Sunday daily newspapers received in Santa Anna. The bundle of each of these newspapers will be placed in the post office lobby early each Sunday morning. Subscribers are welcome to come in the lobby and pick their newspapers out of the bundles, as each paper will continue to have the subscriber's name and address on them.

People who live on the rural routes will get their Sunday papers on Monday, just as they have been receiving them in the past.

M. L. Guthrie, Sr. Buried Sunday In SA Cemetery

Funeral services were held at the United Presbyterian Church on Sunday for M. L. (Rat) Guthrie, Sr., aged 85, who died early Saturday morning, Nov. 20, in Brownwood Community Hospital. Rev. Bill Weeks, pastor of the church, officiated and burial was in the Santa Anna Cemetery.

Mr. Guthrie was born in Paris, Texas on June 5, 1886. He married Miss Hattie Miles in Santa Anna on June 15, 1918. He had resided in Santa Anna for 68 years and was a member of the Presbyterian Church. He was a retired stockman and real estate dealer.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Montie L. Guthrie, Jr., and Louis Miles Guthrie, both of Santa Anna; one daughter, Mrs. Alice Anna Spillman of Victorville, Calif.; four grandchildren and one great-grandson.

A large number of Santa Anna merchants and interested citizens met last Thursday morning with Mayor Thomas Wristen to discuss and plan the Christmas program for Santa Anna.

Jim Burchfield was named chairman of the general committee and directed the discussion meeting. All merchants attending pledged their support for the Christmas

parade and weekly activities through December.

The initial program will be a big downtown parade on Friday, Dec. 3. Cullen Perry will be parade chairman. Floats, bands, children in costume or on decorated bicycles, and Santa Claus will be in the parade. Cash prizes will be given for entries in the float and children's division.

Plans call for the Chamber of Commerce to entertain visiting band students with a Coke party at the Lions Club building immediately following the parade. Bill Griffin and Bob Burton will be in charge of the party.

The Santa Anna Lions Club pancake fiesta will also be held on Dec. 3, with serving to be during the noon hour and from 5 to 8 p. m. at the Lions Club building.

Drawings for cash and merchandise are planned for each Saturday during December and on Christmas Eve. There will again be a children's drawing for toys. Participating merchants will be giving tickets for the drawing with each purchase in their stores.

A home and yard decoration contest is also planned and the annual downtown window decoration contest will be held.

Santa Claus will be in Santa Anna on Saturday, Dec. 4, 11 and 18, and on Christmas Eve. All children in the community are invited to visit with Santa during those days.

Clubs, organizations or individuals wishing to decorate a downtown store window for the contest should contact Billie Guthrie, Chamber of Commerce secretary. Windows are to be decorated by Friday, Dec. 3.

Play Hico Friday In Bi-District Bid

The Santa Anna Mountaineer football team is preparing for the Bi-District game Friday night with the Hico High School Tigers. The game with the 17-B champions will be played at the Comanche High School stadium at 7:30 p. m. Hico will act as home team for the game.

The Mountaineers are going into the play-off with a 8-2 season record and a 4-0 district tally. Hico has a 10-0 season record.

Santa Anna will be making the second bi-district bid in its history. The 1966 team, coached by Wendell Robinson and Bert Gravitt, won the 9-A championship but was defeated by Ranger in the play-off game at Abilene.

The 1970 team, coached by Terry McIver and David Halliday, was tri-champion of District 18-B but lost the

toss to represent the district in the play-offs.

The Friday game schedule was made last week by officials from Hico and Santa Anna, with game time set at 7:30 p. m. Admission will be \$1.75 for adults and 75 cents for students with no advance or reserved seat tickets sold. Hico will serve as home team and use the north side of the stadium for the game.

Comanche service clubs, headed by the Comanche Jaycees, are making all arrangements for the play-off game Friday night. They will be in charge of selling the tickets, printing and distributing the programs, ushering and concessions. The host city organizations are also furnishing a trophy for the winning team and the game ball.

Officials for the bi-district game were selected by representatives from the schools. There will be two officials from the Brownwood organization and two from Waco. Plans have been made for a pep rally at 4:00 p. m. Friday afternoon at the Gymnasium. The football team will leave for Comanche at 5:00 p. m.

Santa Anna won the play-off berth by defeating Richard Springs on Nov. 12. However the full District Champ title was awarded after the Friday night victory over the Blanket Tigers by a 53-0 score.

The Friday night game got off to a good start for Santa Anna when W. T. Young raced for a touchdown on Santa Anna's first play of the game. Horner added two points for the early lead.

Blanket failed to make a first down and the Mountaineers took the pigskin to paydirt again via four first downs. Young again carried over the ball for the score, but the PAT was no good.

Rocky Dean was the next scorer, making a 16-yard run for the goal line. In the second period Roy Keeney made another Mountaineer TD and a pass from Dean to Danny Valdez added another two points.

The first half lead was 28-0 for Santa Anna.

Rocky Dean made the first score in the second half and Tommy Lewis put the next score on the board.

In the final quarter, Dean ran 24 yards for a TD and then kicked the extra point. The final score was made by quarterback David Horner. The PAT failed.

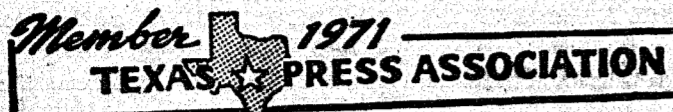

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In Our Opinion

PUBLIC FINANCING of political campaigns in the general election is being pushed in Congress and is cosponsored by our junior senator from Texas, Lloyd Bentsen.

Although some of the arguments sound plausible, there are some questions that makes one wonder.

In the first place, too much money is being spent on political campaigns, especially the presidential campaign, which it is estimated \$100 million was spent in 1968. That is more than 600 times the salary of the office and the money came from contributions from various sources. Now there are many instances where individuals and businesses contribute to a campaign because they feel that the candidate has their point of view, or they feel that he has the interest of the entire country at heart, but there are many times that contributors have strings attached to their gifts.

The biggest contributors of money to political campaigns are usually the ones who expect something for their investment. Not only that, but usually they get it one way or another. National political campaigns are so vast that there is no sure way of knowing the men you are voting for. We have to depend on the news media for most of our information and much of that will vary according to the political leanings of the source of the news — be it radio, TV or newspapers. It isn't that they necessarily slant a news story, but rather that they publish or not publish a story, according to whether it is good or bad publicity. In other words they control the news.

Senator Bentsen claims that the bill for government financing of national campaigns in the general election would place less dependence on the large contributor. He cites the fact that every campaign the expenditures go up and up, and suggests that in the case of or tax money paying for the campaigning, things might slow down. But there are the primaries that still go on, and someone has to pay for them. It might be that the money would just be diverted from the start-to-finish campaign to the primary race.

Another aspect is that my money would finance a candidate for which I would be against. It calls for a large sum for each major party in the presidential election and a smaller amount for lesser known parties. Maybe the major parties won't have a candidate which I can support. What then? My money still goes to help pay his campaign expenses. That wouldn't alter the type of official he would make, but it would be somewhat of a thorn in my own side.

Whether the public funding of campaign expenses would cause a candidate to feel less obligation to any particular group or not is open for debate. It might make them more independent of contributors or it might make them more independent of their constituents.

CAUSES OF INFLATION were discussed this week by Senator John Tower in his weekly newsletter, and although he admitted government spending had something to do with the spiral, but denied it was the major cause.

"The major cause of the inflationary spiral that has plagued this nation in recent years," he said, "is the concentration of economic power in the hands of organized labor."

There is no doubt in the minds of observers that there is much truth in this statement. Labor's recent demonstration of the childish "I'll have my way or take my toys and go home" way in the operation of the Phase II program is a good example of what has been going on for several years.

In many states labor bosses have struck fear in the hearts of politicians by threatening to oppose them in elections. Not only that, but they have controlled much money collected from the rank and file member which has been designated for "political education." They got around laws governing assessment of dues for political contributions by voting for members to "contribute" funds to political "education" committees, as a case in point in the AFL-CIO, their lesser organization is COPE, (Committee on Political Education), which uses its funds to support political candidates.

The whole thing boils down to the fact that labor legislation needs to be brought up to date. Most of it was passed back in the days when organized labor was more or less at the mercy of management, and needed some help to keep its head above water. But since that time the pendulum has swung to the opposite side of the clock and now management is at the mercy of organized labor. In fact labor could render this nation unproductive in 24 hours, and then where would we be?

Maybe Congress better forget their fears for once and vote for the best interest of the country as a whole.

PUBLIC FINANCING of political campaigns in the general election is being pushed in Congress and is co-sponsored by our junior senator from Texas, Lloyd Bentsen.

Although some of the arguments sound plausible, there are some questions that makes one wonder.

In the first place, too much money is being spent on political campaigns, especially the presidential campaign, which it is estimated \$100 million was spent in 1968. That is more than 600 times the salary of the office and the money came from contributions from various sources. Now there are many instances where individuals and businesses contribute to a campaign because they feel that the candidate has their point of view, or they feel that he has the interest of the entire country at heart, but there are many times that contributors have strings attached to their gifts.

The biggest contributors of money to political campaigns are usually the ones who expect something for their investment. Not only that, but usually they get it one way or another. National political campaigns are so vast that there is no sure way of knowing the men you are voting for. We have to depend on the news media for most of our information and much of that will vary according to the political leanings of the source of the news — be it radio, TV or newspapers. It isn't that they necessarily slant a news story, but rather that they publish or not publish a story, according to whether it is good or bad publicity. In other words they control the news.

Senator Bentsen claims that the bill for government financing of national campaigns in the general election would place less dependence on the large contributor. He cites the fact that every campaign the expenditures go up and up, and suggests that in the case of tax money paying for the campaigning, things might slow down. But there are the primaries that still go on, and someone has to pay for them. It might be that the money would just be diverted from the start-to-finish campaign to the primary race.

Another aspect is that my money would finance a candidate for which I would be against. It calls for a large sum for each major party in the presidential election and a smaller amount for lesser known parties. Maybe the major parties won't have a candidate which I can support. What then? My money still goes to help pay his campaign expenses. That wouldn't alter the type of official he would make, but it would be somewhat of a thorn in my own side.

Whether the public funding of campaign expenses would cause a candidate to feel less obligation to any particular group or not is open for debate. It might make them more independent of contributors or it might make them more independent of their constituents.

CAUSES OF INFLATION were discussed this week by Senator John Tower in his weekly newsletter, and although he admitted government spending had something to do with the spiral, but denied it was the major cause.

"The major cause of the inflationary spiral that has plagued this nation in recent years," he said, "is the concentration of economic power in the hands of organized labor."

There is no doubt in the minds of observers that there is much truth in this statement. Labor's recent demonstration of the childish "I'll have my way or take my toys and go home" way in the operation of the Phase II program is a good example of what has been going on for several years.

In many states labor bosses have struck fear in the hearts of politicians by threatening to oppose them in elections. Not only that, but they have controlled much money collected from the rank and file member which has been designated for "political education." They got around laws governing assessment of dues for political contributions by voting for members to "contribute" funds to political "education" committees, as a case in point in the AFL-CIO, their lesser organization is COPE, (Committee on Political Education), which uses its funds to support political candidates.

The whole thing boils down to the fact that labor legislation needs to be brought up to date. Most of it was passed back in the days when organized labor was more or less at the mercy of management, and needed some help to keep its head above water. But since that time the pendulum has swung to the opposite side of the clock and now management is at the mercy of organized labor. In fact labor could render this nation unproductive in 24 hours, and then where would we be?

Maybe Congress better forget their fears for once and vote for the best interest of the country as a whole.

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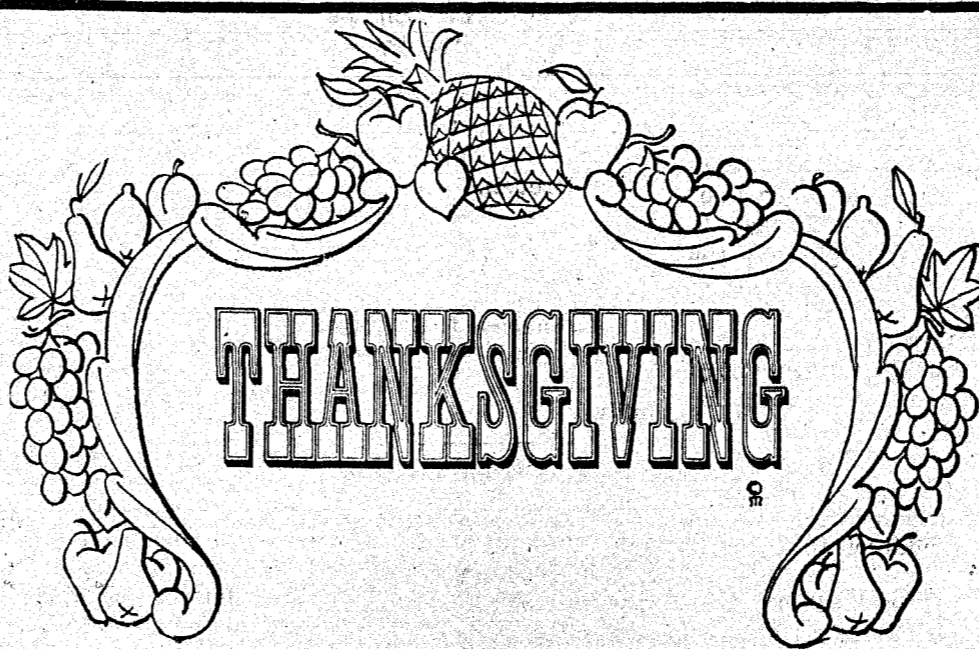

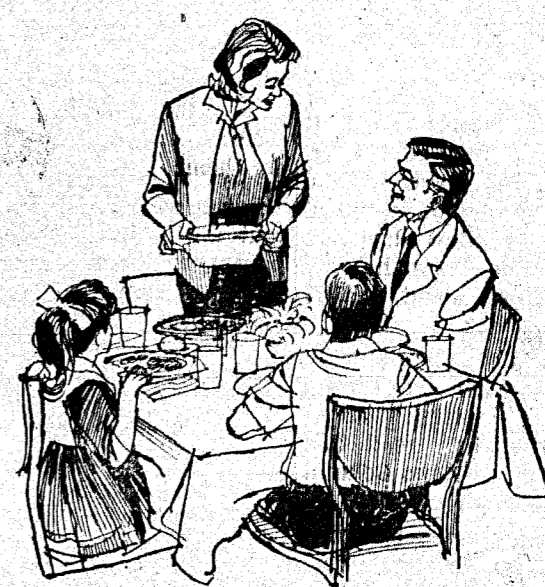

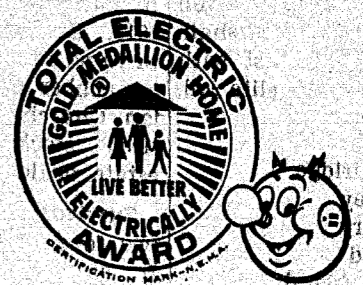

The local group voted to have the annual Christmas tree and party on December 20.

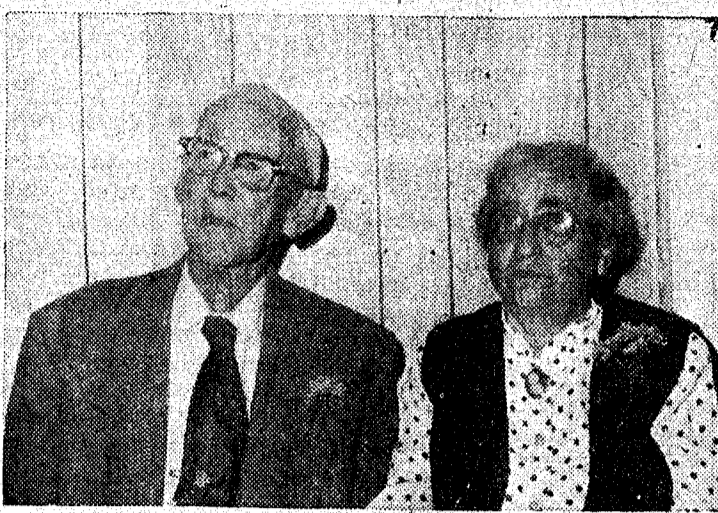

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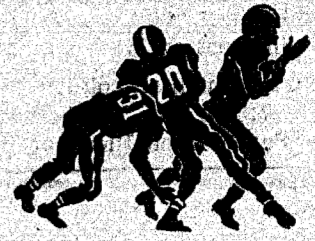
