Santa Anna Girls Win Divisions In Local Track Meet Thursday

The Santa Anna girls track teams won both the junior high and high school divisions in the Santa Anna track meet last Thursday.

The Richland Springs boys won the high school division and the Cherokee boys took the junior high boys honors.

Despite cold, windy weather, teams from six schools were on hand for the afternoon and evening events. Schools represented included Bangs, Blanket, Cherokee, Richland Springs, Mozelle and Santa Anna. There were no entries in the girls divisions from Mozelle.

Santa Anna High School girls had a total of 181 points. Blanket was second in the division with 128.

In the junior high girls division, Santa Anna had 144, followed by Blanket with 120. Richland Springs had 118 points to win the high school boys division with Mozelle second place with 104. Cherokee junior high boys had a total of 148 points with the Santa Anna junior boys runners up with 108.

Three of the four high point individuals in the meet were from Santa Anna: Elizabeth Morris won first place in

each of the events she entered, totaling 44 points for herself and the team. Tony Allen was high point girl in the high school division with 39 points.

In the junior high division,

Lee Wristen led with 30 points, followed by Jody Day with 28. Rodriguez of Cherokee High School topped that division with 33 points.

Joe's Pharmacy Sold To Barkley Brothers

Robert and David Barkley, owners and operators of the Phillips Drug in Santa Anna, have announced their purchase of Joe's Pharmacy in Santa Anna from Joe Riley. The transaction was effective Saturday, April 1.

The Barkley brothers have moved the new pharmacy stock, prescription files, etc., to the Phillips Drug location as the Riley building and fixtures were not included in the sale.

Joe Riley will be devoting full time to farming and ranching operations, according to reports from the Barkleys. He had operated the pharmacy since April, 1966.

Robert and David Barkley took over the operation of the long-time Santa Anna busi-

ness in 1967 upon the retirement of their father, Calvin Barkley, who purchased the business 11 years ago.

Phillips Drug Co. has been in continuous operation in Santa Anna since 1887 and is the oldest business establishment still in operation in Santa Anna. For many years Phillips Drug had telephone number 1 and post office box number 1.

There will be no changes in operation or personnel at the Phillips Drug, according to David Barkley.

Dalhart Honor Presented To S-Anna Native

Mrs. Ola Polk Phillips, a native of Santa Anna, was named outstanding citizen of the year in Dallam and Hartley Counties at a banquet and program in Dalhart recently.

A school teacher and school counselor in Dalhart, Mrs. Phillips is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Polk of Santa Anna.

She and a twin brother, Otho, now of Abilene, graduated from Santa Anna High School and moved to Abilene. She graduated from Hardin-Simmons University in 1929 and began her teaching career in a Dalhart elementary school. She married Orville Burton Phillips in Dalhart in 1932. He died of a heart attack in 1967.

Mrs. Phillips has been with the Dalhart school system for 42 years, serving on the high school faculty for most of that time, teaching Spanish, English, algebra and general business.

For 20 school terms she was a class sponsor and also directed the chorus, boys quartet and girls sextette. For the past 14 years she has been high school counselor and director of the testing programs.

A talented musician, Mrs. Phillips has served as organist at the Dalhart First Baptist Church for 36 years as well as having taught Sunday school. She is a member of several service and professional organizations and in 1969 was honored as teacher of the year in Dalhart.

Mrs. Phillips and her late husband are the parents of a son, Jimmy, studio manager for an Amarillo TV station.

Woman Charged With Murder; Victim's Body Found South of SA

A 40-year-old Brady woman, Lillian Grace Ashabraner, has been arrested and charged with murder with malice in connection with the death Saturday night of Mrs.

Ima Lee Hammack, 57, of Abilene. Mrs. Ashabraner is being held in the county jail at Coleman and has been denied bond by Judge Walter Holt of Coleman. She will be

held in jail until appearing before a grand jury.

The arrest was made at 2:45 a. m. Tuesday at the suspect's home on Brady Lake. The suspected murder weapon, a .22 revolver, was recovered at a private residence in Abilene, officers revealed.

The victim's body was found seven miles south of Santa Anna at about 7:30 Sunday morning. Relatives of the dead woman became concerned when she failed to arrive at the Brady Lake cabin from Abilene and they started traveling the woman's proposed route. Mrs. Hammack's two small dogs were found along the roadside near where the body was discovered, and a further search disclosed her blood-stained glasses and a shoe.

Highway Patrolman Butch Wampler and other officers were called to the scene at about 3:15 a. m. Sunday and the body was found by Wampler and Coleman City Police- man Billy Timms after sun-up Sunday morning. The woman's body was found 30 feet off the right side of Highway 283, besides the fence and covered with grass. The site where the woman's body was found is less than a mile toward Santa Anna from the Home Creek bridge.

An autopsy report showed the victim was shot once in the left temple and three times in the back of the head.

Mrs. Hammack's car was found Sunday night in a shopping center parking lot in Abilene. Officers discounted a robbery motive as the woman's purse and other effects were still in the blood-stained vehicle.

Making the investigation were Sheriff Corky Chapman and deputies H. F. Fenton and Rondee Horton. Texas Ranger H. R. Block of Brownwood also assisted other officers with the investigation. Mrs. Hammack was a native of Coryell County and had lived in Abilene since 1943. She is survived by her husband, two sons, and one daughter. Funeral services were held in Abilene Tuesday afternoon.

INCUMBENTS RE-ELECTED TO S-ANNA CITY COUNCIL

A light turn-out of city voters Saturday returned the three incumbent City Council members to office as they were unopposed on the ballot. The three, Glen Copeland, Glen Pope and H. A. Burden were seeking re-election to the council.

Forty-six ballots were cast in the election and there were no write-in votes.

Copeland and Pope will each begin their third terms in office and Burden will be serving his second term. Mr. Copeland has been mayor pro-tem for the past year.

Other members of the council who have another year in office are Gale Collier Allen and Louis Miles Guthrie. Also with another year in office is Mayor Thomas Wristen.

Max Eubank and Floyd Smith Chosen for S. A. School Board

Max Eubank and Floyd Smith were elected to the Santa Anna Independent School District board of trustees in the annual election on Saturday. The two polled the most votes of the five candidates in the contest.

Eubank received a total of 132 votes and Smith was second with 91. Incumbents Buddy Neff and Jesse Williams had 56 and 27 respectively, and Mrs. Carmen Rendon re-

ceived 49. A total of 181 votes were cast in the election. There were no write-in votes.

The two newcomers will take their places on the school board at the next regular meeting on Tuesday, April 11.

In another election Saturday, Cecil Horne was chosen for Coleman County School trustee position. He was unopposed on the ballot and received 44 votes in the Santa Anna election.

In Our Opinion

THE SPECIAL SESSION of the Texas Legislature really got down to business when they opened last week and gave the people an example of what they can do if they want to get the business over with.

Many of us get a little tired of the foot dragging that is evident sometimes in the regular session of the legislature both in the house and the senate. Sometimes it seems like they are doing everything they can to stir up disputes with each other or the governor, and rather than try to get the work done.

The new speaker, Rep. Rayford Price, has indicated that the house is going to be run on the up and up, with no hanky panky since he has been elected and we applaud him for it. When a legislator is faced with a bill of which he has never heard until it comes on the floor of the house, he can't be well informed enough to know how to vote on it.

This writer knew Price when he was a student at the University of Texas and has a lot of faith in him. We believe he will help to return integrity and honesty to the house of representatives.

One of the most promising happenings reflected in the opening of the special session was the public vote for the speaker. Many people wanted to know who their representative voted for.

Price said he hoped to restore an element of trust within the house during the short session so that they could get on with the work of the state. Apparently he is going to be able to do just that.

If he is successful as it seems, maybe it will help to lift the uneasiness felt by all Texans about their legislative body. There has been a feeling of mistrust among most of the people of the legislative branch of the state and if the legislature continues to act in a business-like way and operates in an orderly fashion, it will tend to alleviate the feeling of mistrust among the people.

It won't happen over night but we wish our new speaker the best in his efforts to improve that branch of the legislature.

DESPITE OBVIOUS OPPOSITION the House Rules Committee has scheduled public hearings on April 11 on H. R. 7130 which would increase the minimum wage to \$2.00 an hour. The current rate is \$1.60.

To the wage earner that sounds like a good deal, but don't be misled. Anytime the minimum wage goes to \$2.00 an hour the pressure of organized labor for an increase in their wage scales will grow and grow until they get further increases and that additional pay the small wage earner gets will go down the drain in increased costs.

How Congress can pass such a bill in the face of the President's wage freeze is something else. How is the government going to justify a 22 per cent increase in the minimum wage when they are asking management to keep their increases to 5 per cent.

Government spending has had a lot to do with keeping inflation going up and up, but one of the biggest influences in the inflation spiral has been the continued push by organized labor for more and more wage increases. The biggest cost of producing any item is labor costs and that is reflected in the price of very item you buy.

Organized labor is protected by law to the point that they can bring any industry to its knees, forcing it to accept wage contracts that go beyond any rational relationship to productivity. These settlements drive prices up and in turn feed fuel to inflation.

The time for the labor law reforms is long past and if Congress doesn't get some action going on new labor legislation this nation is going to suffer far more than they realize.

Sen. John Tower has introduced some new legislation including removing the power of the labor controlled National Labor Relations Board, but so far Congress has not acted.

Austin — State lawmakers polished off billboard control and primary election finance legislation in a three-day special session — and added far-reaching procedural reform rules for good measure.

They will be back to work in June on budget and tax matters.

In their "mini-session", the legislators — many anxious to get back to the campaign trails — logged these accomplishments:

- They provided for emergency state financing of the May and June primary finance measure will be necessary next year.

- They moved to meet federal highway beautification requirements by out-lawing billboards within 660 feet of major highways and providing for screening of junkyards. The measure will cost the state about \$5 million a year in condemnation costs for five years. But it will prevent a \$24 million loss of federal highway construction funds for non-compliance with regulations.

- Both House and Senate adopted joint rules including sharp limitations on powers of conference committees to write new legislative matters without majority permission.

- The House also accepted rules installing a limited seniority system for committee assignments, reducing the number of committees from 46 to 25 and providing for electronic recording of House and committee proceedings.

- Legislators also made Texas and eighth state to ratify a proposed federal constitutional amendment guaranteeing equal legal rights for women.

Highlight of the opening day was election of Rep. Rayford Price, 35, of Palestine as new speaker of the House. Price won 77-65 over Rep. L. Dewitt Hale of Corpus Christi. He succeeds Rep. Gus Mutscher of Brenham who resigned after his conviction for bribery conspiracy.

ALLOWABLE ADJUSTED — Texas Railroad Commission decided to hold the oil allowable for the big East Texas Field to 66 per cent during April instead of the 100 per cent fixed for the rest of the state.

An increase for the East Texas Field was postponed pending completion of a study.

Chairman Byron Tunnell said the nation has "far too much at stake" in East Texas "to risk reservoir damage through excessive production rates."

For the first time since 1948, the Commission fixed a 100 per cent production factor for this month.

COURTS SPEAK — Major sections of Texas vagrancy laws were held unconstitutional by the State Court of Criminal Appeals which said the act makes it a crime to be unemployed or poor.

Texas Supreme Court declined to order two aspiring candidates' names placed on the May primary ballots. One failed to post a filing fee or petition of candidacy. Another was refused a ballot because he was already a member of a utility district board.

The High Court set for May 10 a hearing on an appeal involving the City of Amarillo's power to tax a Masons' Lodge building and three lots owned by the order.

AG OPINIONS — Texas Air Control Board can pay court costs in civil penalty

pollution-control suits from its operating expense fund, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held. In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

- It is unlawful to hunt deer with dogs in Shelby County.

- Texas National Guardsmen from other states are eligible for resident students tuition status in state-supported colleges and universities.

- A person who holds a voter registration certificate is eligible for a junior college district trustee office if he lives in the district.

- A criminal conviction for traffic violations would not qualify as a "hearing" subjecting a person to requirements of the Texas Motor Vehicle Safety-Responsibility Act.

- The legislature cannot appropriate funds to pay primary election expenses incurred by local political parties in the past.

INSURANCE HEARING PUT OFF — A schedule March 29 hearing by the State Insurance Board on a proposed increase in home insurance was indefinitely postponed amid talk of compromise.

Board Chairman Larry Teaver sought a year's delay in applying a rating factor providing for rate additions due to inflation and rising construction costs. He had been outvoted by two other Board members on postponing use of the inflation factor.

"The Board is taking a thorough look at all of the factors involved with rating and working toward solutions to complex and complicated problems that arise when considering rate adjustments," Teaver said.

Teaver contended the Board's refusal earlier to suspend the inflation trend factor would cost Texans an additional \$27 million in premiums next year, when a \$14 million reduction could have been named under his own recommendations.

TRAFFIC TOLL REVEALED — A total of 3,594 persons died in Texas motor vehicle accidents during 1971, according to Texas Department of Public Safety tabulations.

DPS Director Col. Wilson E. Speir said the death toll represents a one per cent increase over 1970, when 3,560 died on the streets and highways.

Speir noted that vehicle miles driven increased from 68 billion in 1970 to more than 70.7 billion for 1971 — a four per cent rise in driving. At the same time, the number of licensed Texas drivers rose by nearly 324,000 to a total of almost seven million. The death rate per 100 mil-

lion miles of travel actually decreased three per cent from 5.2 in 1970 to 5.1 in 1971, Speir said. The death rate in 1966 was 6.2. Of the 3,594 deaths in 1971, 2,184 occurred on rural roadways and 1,410 in urban areas. There were 2,993 fatal accidents and 394,166 total accidents last year. Speding and driving while intoxicated were listed as primary violations in fatal mishaps.

EVENTS CALENDAR PUBLISHED — Texas Highway Department lists nearly 950 "happenings" in its Calendar of Events from April 1-September 30.

Old and new events include the 104th Washington County Fair in Brenham, the First Annual Howdy-Roo Festival at Marble Falls and the First Annual State Arts and Crafts Fair at Kerrville.

Tourist bureaus of the Highway Department reported that many of the 1.36 million tourists who stopped for services in 1971 requested information on events.

Among new listings are the First Statewide Folklife Festival at the Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio; the annual slingshot championships at Carrizo Springs; the state frog-jumping contest at Refugio and the Spring-Ho Festival at Lampasas.

FIRE ANT ON RAMPAGE — Imported fire ants are migrating from East Texas west to the Dallas-Fort Worth area and south as far as Corpus Christi, warns State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

The fire ant is now found in 55 Texas counties and infests 16 million acres, White reported. White said future of the only bait used to control the ants — Mirex — is pending before the Environmental Protection Agency. The Agriculture Department now distributes the bait to designated officers in infested areas.

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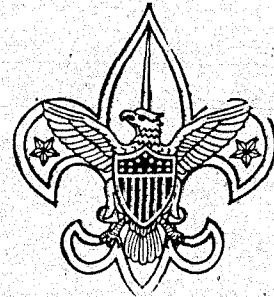

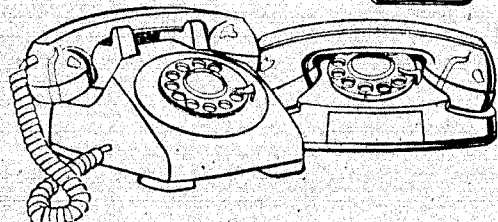
