**AUTO ACCIDENT FIGURES** tell the story of the "War of the Roads in 1971," and war it is! In the single year of 1971, the death toll on US highways surpassed total GI fatalities in nine years of Viet Nam combat. During 1971 as estimated 55,000 Americans died in auto accidents and nearly five million were injured.

In addition, in some 22 million accidents, the total economic loss was estimated at \$16.4 billion.

It is a sad commentary on human sensitiveness to tragedy that while a great many people will ignore commonsense rules of caution on the highway until it is too late. They are extremely aware of bruises on their pocketbooks, and this, alone, should make them drive more sensibly.

One of the better things that Governor Preston Smith came up with was the "Drive Friendly" slogan. No doubt it has helped some in Texas.

One of our big problems that aggravates the highway accident is drinking drivers. Texas, as well as other states, needs to do something to prevent drinking people from driving on the highways. With legalized liquor by the drink, what to do is a big problem.

Another thing that is to Texas advantage is good highways. Texas has become number one in interstate highways, with some 2,413 miles already in use and including those already designated as interstates totals 3,176 miles.

The interstate system is the safest highway design to date. It not only saves on accidents but is more economical to drive one. The Texas Highway Department claims that the average motorist will save \$75.00 per year per car by driving on interstates.

Texans should be proud of their highways. One only needs to cross the state border to see the difference. Also most Texas interstate highways are toll-free. You don't find so many of these in other states. Our neighbor to the north is a prime example. Most of their really good highways are toll roads.

When you get on the highway, show friendliness and respect to those you meet or pass. It pays high dividends.

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THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE officer of Time, Incorporated, Mr. Andrew Heiskell, recently delivered a commencement Address at Hofstra University. The subject of his talk was freedom of speech — and the press. The bulk of his remarks dealt directly with public attitudes and government strictures that he feels pose a threat to the free press as we have known it in the United States. He noted with concern a public opinion survey that showed "an astonishing 55 percent of the American public did not think that the press even in time of peace had the right to report any story the government felt harmful to the national interest." He added, "If that survey accurately reflects public opinion, we are in trouble, for we have forgotten the fundamental values upon which this nation was founded."

There is no question that the press has its shortcomings; but, on the whole, the American public, through its free press, is better informed and thus better armed against oppression than virtually any other nation on earth. Mr. Heiskell noted the results of a study conducted by the Freedom of Information Center at the University of Missouri. "That study," he commented, "determined that less than one half of the world had a free press. . . . Weighing negative factors that ranged from direct government control to concentrated ownership, from organized self-regulation to highly restrictive libel laws, the study concluded that only 16 nations — one of them the United States — could be rated free to a high degree. Since then, a free press has practically disappeared in most of Latin America. These results indicate that free . . . press may be more fragile and unique than we like to think." Of all our freedoms, nothing lies closer to the heart of liberty itself than a free press.

STATE *Capital* **NEWS**

Austin — County political party chairmen have been advised how they can collect state funds for paying May 6 primary election expenses.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock advised the local party officials to prepare immediately detailed estimates of their outlays.

Bullock sent out forms and these instructions immediately after Gov. Preston Smith signed a new law providing \$2 million in state aid to finance the primaries:

- Only when sworn estimates are returned and reviewed will state checks be prepared in the amount of three-fourths of the total expense. Additional warrants will be drawn after the election.

- Prior expenses (before the new state financing law) which exceed the amount of candidates' filing fees and contributions will not be paid by the state — unless cancelled and re-negotiated on new contracts.

- The new state law does not permit any state reimbursement of expenditures for precinct of county conventions or for paying executive committee members for attending meetings.

- State funds can be used to pay for "necessary and legitimate primary expenses" like ballot printing, polling place and voting machine rental, purchase of election sets, stationery, telephones, office rental and compensation of election clerks and judges.

- After the primaries, the secretary of state will require sworn verification of every expenditure made out of the primary fund, together with supporting receipts and cancelled vouchers.

- Estimates of June 3 runoff primary expenses will be required at a later date through the same procedures.

**EMPLOYERS PAYING LESS** — Texas employers are paying less unemployment tax per worker than those of any other state, Texas Employment Commission reports.

The state average is \$9.17 per worker covered by unemployment insurance, according to a 1970 TEC survey.

Comparatively, Alaska, at the top of the scale, pays out \$276.18 per worker to support

state benefits; California, \$97.41 and Virginia (next lowest to Texas), \$11.89.

W. S. Birdwell Jr., TEC employer representative, credited the low rate to unusual stability in employers and the work force, as well as a high degree of cooperation in the U.I. program.

TEC collects taxes from more than 162,000 Texas employers covered by the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act. Taxes are based on rate of worker turn-over generally. The minimum tax is 0.1 per cent and the maximum four per cent.

**RADIOACTIVITY NOTED** — Air sampling stations in Abilene, Amarillo and Fort Worth observed a "slight" rise in radioactive fallout which they attributed to the Chinese Lop Nor nuclear test of March 18.

Texas State Department of Health reported the findings on March 26. The increases were not regarded as presenting any public health hazard, but simply as evidence of sensitivity of the air sampling network.

Stations are part of a comprehensive radiological surveillance activity conducted throughout the state. They are operated by local health departments in cooperation with the Texas Department of Health and the Environmental Protection Agency's Las Vegas off-site monitoring network.

**COURTS SPEAK** — The State Supreme Court ordered a full trial of a Methodist Church dispute over \$140,000 in trust funds.

In another case, the High Court reversed a trial court judgement and set aside a Railroad Commission order requiring owners of 26.6 acres of Wharton County mineral interests to pool their holdings

with 15,342 acres in another oil producing unit.

In other cases last week, the Supreme Court:

- Upheld a \$158,651 judgement against the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway Company resulting from flooding of two Lubbock apartment houses with water from the roadbed.

- Agreed customers of a Port Arthur restaurant who got sick after eating there should collect damages.

- Held a Lubbock policeman had a right to reinstatement in his job after 18 years active duty with the Air Force.

An Austin district court refused to order a May 6 Democratic referendum on Daylight Saving Time.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals found alteration cost on clothing is not subject to the state sales tax.

**AG OPINIONS** — The Texas Department of Public Safety may administer certain tests to determine whether accident-prone drivers can operate cars safely on completion of a rehabilitation program, and courts can require attendance at the latter, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin, concluded:

- A new law prohibiting reproduction for sale of sound recordings without consent is constitutional.

- License fees imposed on nursing home administrators may not be paid by a state agency.

- Extension of four justice precincts by arm-like appurtenances cutting across election precincts in Smith County violates the election code.

- Arlington Park Corporation is exempt from the franchise tax in its strictly-public-interest operations.

- Falls County certificates of obligation may not be purchased by the permanent school fund of the county.

- A "group" of state employees for insurance payroll deductions may be any number over one. Policies of wholesale, franchise or employee life insurance cannot be issued to state employees so as to authorize payroll deductions or state contribution of premiums.

- Hemphill County commissioners may spend money to pay part of a museum manager's salary in Canadian.

- Texas Structural Pest Control Board has no authority to prorrate amount of license fees regardless of date of an application for initial or renewal licenses.

- Voluntary non-profit community crime-watch groups serving individual citizens need not obtain a license under the Private Investigators and Private Security Agencies Act.

- Persons treating lawns or trees around homes with pesticide, and who are not regular employees of the owner or tenant, or otherwise exempt, are subject to licensing under the Texas Structural Pest Control Act.

**APPOINTMENTS** — New House Speaker Rayford Price named Rep. Bill Finck of San Antonio chairman of the powerful House appropriations committee, Rep. Don Cavness of Austin speaker of pro tempore and Rep. Ed Howard of Texarkana chairman of the administration committee.

Gov. Smith appointed William R. Parker Jr., of Houston to the Pan American University board of regents.

The Governor placed Dr. Frank J. Allick of Dallas on the Texas Woman's University board.

Smith also appointed Richard N. Countiss of Spearman 84th district attorney.

Richard G. Leard of Tyler is new Texas Air Control deputy executive secretary.

**VISITORS BOOM ECONOMY** — More than 22.6 million visitors came to Texas last year and spent an estimated \$1.85 billion. The number was up seven per cent over 1970 and the dollar amount 25 per cent.

Both figures were new records, according to Texas Tourist Development Agency and Texas Highway Department. Last year's visitors paid \$166 million in direct state taxes. The Highway Department figured average spending per person per day among auto travelers was \$14.92. Visitors spending has increased 170 per cent since 1964.

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
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
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# Trickham News

## Grant Jones Gives Views on Senate Post

Voters who believe in economy and honesty in government will vote right if they vote for Grant Jones as State Senator from District 24 in the May 6 Democratic Primary Election.

That's the message in a statement outlining Jones' platform and position issued for release today in the 13 county district composed of McLennan, Coryell, Lampasas, Hamilton, Mills, San Saba, Brown, McCulloch, Coleman, Menard, Taylor, Concho and Runnels Counties.

"Economy and honesty in government starts with the man elected," said Grant Jones, pointing out that his spending of expense money, automatically available to each legislator, was the lowest of any member of the House of Representatives at the last audit. His spending of our money for expenses has consistently been with the lowest.

Grant Jones said he thinks "each spending or taxing proposal must be examined as carefully as possible to determine the impact on the taxpayer."

1. An example of his "economy thinking" is the work he did on a bill so that deserving students can receive state tuition money to attend private colleges. Jones said this saves taxpayers money over expanding and building fully-tax-supported schools.

2. Jones said he believes Texas must build and strengthen vocational Texas State Technical Institute because Texas has a critical need for technical skills.

"Because I am sensitive to our economy," said Jones, "I do not favor a state income tax—corporate or personal. Forty of 44 states that have adopted corporate income taxes have found it necessary to broaden the income tax to a 'corporate and personal' tax within a very short time. Twenty-seven within the same year."

Jones said another reason he is against a state income tax is because it would slow down the growth of business and industry in Texas and the creation of good jobs would be slowed down.

"Of course I am for good job opportunities," Jones said, "and recognize the right of employees to form or to join a union; however, I strongly support the Texas right to work law because I feel that no employer should have the right to enter into a contract that requires workers to pay dues

Grant Jones was elected to the 59th Legislature and has been re-elected to four terms since then. He has served on State Affairs Committee, Constitutional Amendments Committee, Banks and Banking, Higher Education, Privileges, Suffrages and Elections and as Chairman of the Claims and Accounts Committee and the Urban Affairs Committee. He also has served two terms on the Legislative Council.

His studies at SMU were interrupted by World War II and he flew as a pilot in the European and South American Theaters. After World War II, he returned to SMU and received his BBA degree. He earned his masters of business administration degree from the graduate division of the University of Pennsylvania.

Presently a partner in Abter Insurance, an independent agency, Jones has served as president of the Texas Association of Insurance Agents. He is active in the Methodist Church and civic work. Mr. and Mrs. Jones have one son, Morgan Andrew, a law student at Texas Tech, and a daughter, Janet, a freshman at SMU.
