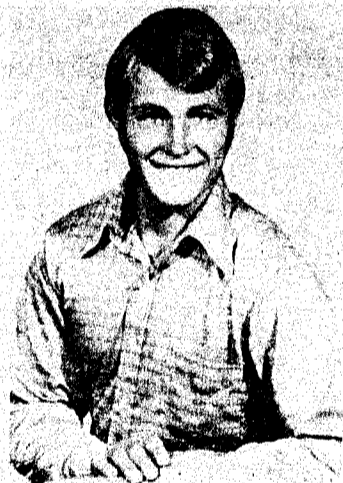
Local Minister Gets Appointed To Waco Board

Leann Bryan To Participate In State 4-H Dress Revue

A Santa Anna High School senior will be among the 46 girls from throughout Texas who will participate in the 1972 State 4-H Dress Revue held during the State Fair in Dallas October 5-7.

Leann Bryan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Bryan of Rockwood, was the top winner in the district dress revue in Abilene last month and is one of more than 16,000 girls and boys who enrolled this year in the 4-H sewing projects.

Three top winners and runners up of the state contest will be announced at a special press luncheon Oct. 6 at 1 p. m. in the Baker Hotel after a morning of judging events.

The 46 finalists, including the top winners, will model their fashions for the public at 10 a. m. and 11 a. m. the next morning in the Women's Building Auditorium on State Fair grounds.

Top winner of the state revue is awarded a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress Nov. 26-30 in Chicago, according to Mrs. Becky Culp, Texas Agricultural Extension Service clothing

specialist and 1972 State 4-H Dress Revue chairman.

In the wool division--for all wool fashions--the top two winners will receive bonds from the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association.

In the cotton division--for all cotton and/or cotton blend fashions--the top two winners will receive cash awards from the Texas Cottonseed Crushers Association. Leann's entry was winner of the district cotton award.

"Winners are selected by the finalists themselves who actually judge each other," she noted. "They consider the garment's overall appearance, suitability of fabric, style and color for the individual, choice of accessories and poise of the contestant."

Sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the State 4-H Dress Revue is an annual feature during Rural Youth Day at the State Fair of Texas.

Contestants in the revue will begin arriving in Dallas Oct. 5 and attend a welcoming program that evening in the Baker Hotel.

Coleman County Fair Saturday

The big annual Coleman County Fair will be held next Saturday at the rodeo grounds at Coleman. Activities are slated to begin about 9 a. m. Saturday morning and continue through the day.

Booths and displays will be open to the fair visitors all day with the women's building and entries to open after judging is completed.

The youth horse show will be held as an added feature of the fair, with entries expected from all the surrounding area. This is an Open Youth Horse Show with trophies awarded in every class.

Overall awards to the top junior and senior will be trophy blankets.

Entries will be received up till 9 A. M. Saturday.

Classes for Grade and Registered Mares and Gelding will be judged first. Performance classes in Western Pleasure, Reigging, Barrel Racing and Pole Bending will begin immediately after the Halter Show.

Keith Barnett of Abilene will judge the all-youth show.

Entertainment is planned throughout the day, including a talent show with local and area

entries. Tickets to the fair entitle each visitor to a barbecue dinner and entry to all the exhibits and shows. Children's tickets also include one free ride.

Entries are being sought for the women's division of the fair, with competitive divisions to include ceramics, crochet and knitting, needlework, flower arrangement, golden age, creative hobbies, wool and home canning.

Non-competitive divisions include art, antiques and 4-H.

SDA Asian Educational Fund Will Aid Several Countries

The members of the Santa Anna Seventh-day Adventist church still remember the disastrous tidal waves and wars which ravished Bangladesh, India, and Pakistan, and they plan to continue to do something about it September 30.

"When disaster strikes there is frequently a massive outpouring of sympathy and emergency aid but concern usually vanished with the headlines," says Mrs. C. P. Wenzel who will be superintendent of the Santa Anna Sabbath School.

The Seventh-day Adventist church has been helping six villages in Bangladesh return to

normalcy. It has been operating sewing centers to enable Bangladesh refugees to become self-supporting.

Funds raised in this week's appeal will be used to strengthen and enlarge educational institutions in Southern Asia which it is believed will bring more lasting relief through enlightenment.

"Every day is a disaster for millions of the illiterate, impoverished people of Bangladesh, Burma, India, and Pakistan," says Superintendent Wenzel. "By our gifts we hope to improve both the quality of existing educational institutions and open doors for more students."

"More skills and greater knowledge, we believe, will help these people become more self-sufficient and possibly find a defense against future disasters," she states.

By giving regularly each week members of the Seventh-day Adventist Sabbath schools around the world raised \$15,505,000 to help eliminate ignorance, superstition and distress in 1971.

In Our Opinion

THE STATE LEGISLATURE got off to a slow start and so far have apparently accomplished nothing.

Many were somewhat put out by the governor calling a special session in the first place, but many of us who have had some dealing with insurance companies in Texas believe that the state does need some new legislation.

It would seem that competitive rates would keep the costs of insurance down, and that would be far better than having the rates set by a board every year. This country was founded and grew to great stature on competitive marketing, and in most things competition left to itself will keep prices within reason.

The only big problem with that is that after the government has stepped in and interfered with production to a point of forcing prices up because of increased costs, the producer has no choice but to step up prices to meet the costs.

Whether this is the problem in insurance would take an expert to predict, but something has stepped up the costs of that commodity everywhere. We can't remember a year when the cost of insurance has not risen in the last ten years at least.

Many independent agents have suffered the independence of insurance companies to the point that they have lost business to mutuals who can charge lesser rates. It is possible that if they were left to set their own rates the competition would keep rates down.

We have yet to be convinced that no-fault insurance is the answer. In many states it has proved to be the most costly of all, and they have wished they had not gone to it.

Maybe a special session to consider insurance is the answer and will give the law-makers time to really study the problems and the answers. It would be hard to conceive a state in much worse shape than Texas.

Million Mark Is Passed By Savings Assn.

Immature Lungs

While the fetus is still tucked safely within the womb, tests can detect respiratory disease. The next step? Delaying birth until the tiny lungs are better developed.

A California research team has developed a quick and inexpensive test to determine which babies might have hyaline membrane disease, a respiratory ailment that takes the lives of 28,000 infants each year. The disease, an immaturity in development of the lungs, afflicts premature babies.

Normally, a special chemical lines the air sacs in the lungs and prevents the sacs from sticking together and collapsing. But in hyaline membrane disease the chemical is missing. The collapsed sacs cannot hold air; the infant cannot take in enough oxygen.

The necessary chemical lining comes when the fetal lungs

mature. The chemical itself is similar to agents in detergents that help sustain the foamy bubbles. If the chemical is in the lining of the lungs of the fetus, it will also be present in samples of the amniotic fluid that surround the unborn child. Mixing the fluid with a small amount of alcohol in a test tube and shaking it to produce bubbles is a way to spot the chemical. If bubbles are still present at the end of 15 minutes, the lungs have proper lining.

Dr. Alan J. Margolis, an obstetrician at the University of California, says in cases of spontaneous premature labor delivery of the baby might be postponed by certain drugs if the test shows that the infant would have hyaline membrane disease if born at that time.

Women who smoke have more spontaneous abortions and premature births than women who don't smoke. See you local tuberculosis and respiratory disease association for facts about lung disorders as well as smoking.

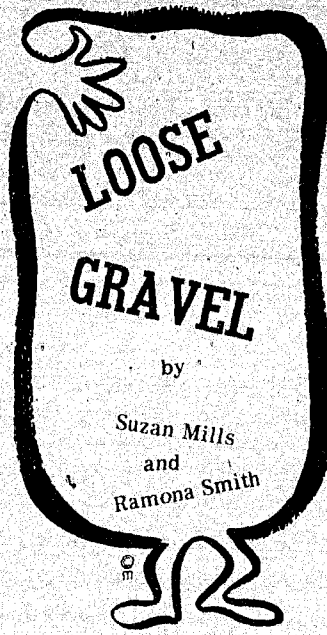
R'Wood Native 'Hop' Ashmore Dies Monday

Cotton producers expecting a cotton yield adjustment for the 1972 crop must follow these instructions.

Form ASCS-574, Application for Acreage and Yield Adjustment, must be filed before any cotton acreage is put to other uses.

Farmers desiring to graze, shred or plow-up their cotton must file the above form and the cotton crop must be inspected by an employee of the County Committee before the crop is put to another use.

At the time of harvest or after harvest, the above form must be filed for yield adjustment.

The producer must also give and substantiate a good and sufficient reason for his reduced yield, and furnish sufficient evidence to establish that the crop was planted and cared for in a workmanlike manner.

These provisions will be in writing by the farmer and signed. We are listing below some of the cotton loan rates for cotton stored in Brownwood:

For Middling one inch cotton, the loan is 19.55 cents a pound.
For light spotted middling

For spotted middling one thirty-one thirty-seconds, the loan is 16.50 cents a pound.

Any cotton with a micronaire

differential of below 3.5 or above 4.9 an additional discount is made.

All cotton producers have been notified of their responsibility to insure that cotton pledged to CCC is bagged in specification bagging and bale ties. The ginners of the county have signed an agreement that they would wrap all cotton in approved bagging and ties.

An estimated 40,000 people are engaged in cotton ginning.

Buttry's Grandson Operates Machine For Plane Upkeep

Mrs. Carl Buttry shares some information on the duties of their grandson, Corporal Jerry Halmon, who is stationed at Iwakuni, Japan.

He is one of three Marines currently trained for operation of the 1st MAW's Spectrometric Oil Analysis Program (SOAP) lab, and the only one in Japan.

Quoting from the Marine paper, "One Marine and a \$65,000 machine are predicting the future for planes of the 1st MAW. The costly machine checks samples from engines of Marine a-6 jets and can indicate wear, contamination or one of many things causing trouble. The spectrometric oil analysis is an aid to safety and maintenance. It can locate a potential trouble area within an engine long before the engine reaches the point of in-flight failure."

Jerry has been in the Marines two years and was a jet mechanic when request came from Headquarter Marine Corps asking for volunteers to retrain as oil analysis technicians. He is the son of Mrs. Elton Casey of San Angelo, and his wife Berverly, lives in San Angelo.

More Cases Of Emphasema

One cigarette upsets the flow of air and blood in your lungs. Years of smoking can cause emphysema. And in the last decade, deaths from emphysema almost tripled in this country.

To investigate the relationship of smoking and emphysema, two prominent researchers—Dr. Oscar Auerbach and E. Cuyler Hammond—studied whole-lung sections from autopsies of 1800 men and women. Then they checked the lungs for the degree of emphysema that might be present. Later they found out from relatives the smoking habits of the dead persons.

How closely did smoking habits correlate with the extent of emphysema in the lungs? Very closely.

Of the persons who had never smoked regularly, 90 percent had no emphysema at all. The air sacs, where oxygen and carbon dioxide are exchanged, were not damaged and torn. The walls of the small blood vessels around the air sacs were not abnormally thickened. In contrast, of the persons who smoked 20 or more cigarettes a day for years, 99 percent had some degree of emphysema. And twenty percent

of these smokers had advanced emphysema. Their lungs looked lacy, dotted with holes where thousands of air sacs had ruptured and broken. Among persons with the same smoking habits, the degree of emphysema in their lungs increased with age and the number of years they had smoked cigarettes.

Other studies cited by the U.S. Surgeon General show the chances of dying from emphysema are 25 times greater for people who smoke two packs a day than for nonsmokers.

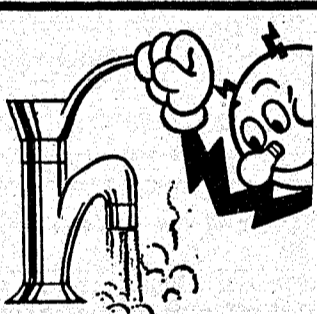
