A) Yes. The Revenue Act of 1971 made it a misdemeanor for any person engaged in the usiness of preparing tax rearns, or providing services in nnection with such a busiss or for any person who eives compensation for fill-; out a return to disclose Jeral tax return information use it for any purpose other n to assist in preparing the urn. Violations may be nished with a \$1,000 mine a year in prison or both.

Keep Your Home Safe

According to the adage, a man's home is his castle where he and his family are safe. However, the modern residence is not necessarily that danger free – particularly from excessive noise levels hearing ability—according to the Beltone Crusade for Hear-

In the kitchen the range vent fan, the mixer, the blend-er, wall exhaust fan and electric knife sharpener all can produce sound levels either exceeding, equalling or very equalling the 85 (dB) level. When several of these devices are operating at the same time, the noise level can far exceed the danger point. In addition to kitchen

sounds, such common household items as power tools and power lawinmowers can gen-erate sounds well above 100 (dB). Crusade officials urge the use of protective ear plugs when devices producing more than 100 (dB) are in use.




