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A SO-CALLED GROUP OF AMERICANS called on other countries to help them in demonstrations ed. against the United States Sunday.

In Versailles, France, the group, who called themselves the American Delegation to the World Asembly for Peace and Independence of Indochinese Peoples, and down the filing fee law relied who numbered 139 people, asked the group to back a series of demonstrations they plan between March 25 and May 15.

Third they will demonstrate against the payment of income taxes on April 15. We wonder why, as they don't pay any. Part of their group is the National Welfare Rights Association which is on the receiving end rather than on the paying end.

Fourth, on April 22 they plan mass demonstrations against the war in Vietnam, for withdrawal of troops and aircraft from that country.

And last on May 15 they plan to demonstrate against American corporations manufacturing arms, specifically those connected with the war.

This group, who are obviously Communist oriented, are putting out a lot of effort to destroy the only country that would not put the whole bunch before a firing squad on a moment's notice. The Red countries that they support would put a stop to their antics so quick they wouldn't know what was happening. Yet they use the freedoms of this country for their ow

Safety Group Says New Law Not Being Met

Austin - An informal roadside survey made recently by the Texas Safety Association shows that some Texas gravel truck operators and other loose material haulers may be unknowingly violating a new

The statewide safety group in a release from their Austin headquarters today said the law is one passed by the last session of the legislature governing the loading and hauling of loose materials including gravel, sand and dirt. The law does not apply to agricultural products.

The law requires that the trucks be loaded no higher than six inches below the top of the sideboards when left uncovered. Higher loads must be covered by canvas to prevent spillage. If materials fall from a truck because of improper loading, both the hauler and the the loader are liable under the law. Fines for the first offenses can be from \$25 to \$200, subsequent offenses carry fines of not less than \$200.





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
