THE RESULTS of the age of permissiveness was demonstrated last week when Arab terrorists killed eleven Israeli athletes in Munich.

The whole world was shocked at such blatant disregard for human life, and if the radicals thought they would receive any sympathy from the people of the world by such tactics, they were disillusioned. Every country, even their own race, was shocked and saddened by such action.

Disregard for law and order in many countries of the world has grown to a point where something needs to be done. It is not only in such countries as the mid-east or nations who are having strong political uprisings, but it is also prevalent in our own country.

Picking up a newspaper the other day we glanced over the front page and all we could see were headlines of killings either by thugs or radicals. There was not a story of good news on the entire page.

One man predicted that before long we will have to go back to the days of the old west when everyone carried a pistol on his hip, and only the strong survived. We hope that will never happen, but situations in the cities are such that one dares not walk down some city streets after dark alone.

Although in some of our smaller towns we have some vandalism, we usually don't have to fear for our lives, but the way things are going, we wonder how long it will be until we do.

Permissiveness starts at home and we feel that if parents were more interested in their children growing up to be responsible citizens, there would be many less delinquent adults. Back in the "olden days" when we were in school, if a teacher had to get on us for something, we also would catch it at home. Not any more. Now if a teacher calls down a student in school, he has to answer to the parents, too. That encourages disobedience and the results are showing up in some of the youth today.

Of course, it is not only youth who are showing the sign of radicalism. Many dissillusioned adults have become soured and their behavior is not commendable.

The adult example is important and should be one that the youngsters could look up to. Instead, many times adults set an example that is what NOT to do, rather than what to do. How can we expect better from our children?

Dr. J. Cabansag Guest Speaker For Auxiliary

The Ranger Park Hospital Auxiliary met Thursday afternoon for the first time after the "summer slump." A nominating committee was elected. The three on this committee were "Mrs. Snook, Mrs. Ed Jones, and Mrs. Annie Mae Wall. They will give a report at the next meeting, the first Thursday afternoon, October 5, at 4:30.

Dr. John Cabansag, who has recently come to our area, was the guest speaker.

He said, "We are living in a rapidly changing world, science and technology have made great advances that have affected our lives.

"In the field of medicine the past 25 years or more has given us the wonder miracle working drugs like the antibiotics, tranquilizers, and others. Some of the common diseases that used to plague us have almost been under control. Poliomylitis for example which was most dreaded in the past in becoming less, due to Salk Vaccine. And there are others that I am not going to enumerate. At present we have automated blood tests which are installed in different big centers or cities. These things have greatly helped detect diseases in their early stages. One example of this is diabetis melitus.

"The sick, whether mentally, emotionally, or physically, need different kinds of treatment. The mentally and emotionally abnormal person need time, understanding and sympathy. They are the most misunderstood persons by the layman. The chronic mental disease takes a longer course of treatment in an institutional setting.

"Let us remember that most of the emotional problems of today can be traced to lack of love. Parents so often are too preoccupied with other pursuits which results in the neglect of their children. They have no time to-play with their children or to teach or discipline them. When they grown up some will have emotional problems.

"The aging segment of our society seems to have benefitted from the public welfare assistance program initiated in recent years. They can now seek medical assistance without much strain with their pocketbook. They have medicare assistance program. For the indigent the medicaid program has been a greathelp. And probably in the not too distant future the National Medical assistance for the entire population which are being studied at present in congress, will be available.

"The opportunity of service is at everyone's door. It depends on how much we want to be involved. The spare time on our hands can be put to loving service for the unfortunate and the sick. The joy of service cannot be measured by material goods. The happiness it
