**Coleman County** Fair Plans Are In The Making

The Coleman Betterment Council is continuing plans for the upcoming Coleman County Fair which will be held at the Coleman Rodeo Grounds on Saturday, September 30.

The booth sales committee reports that booth sales seem to be about normal with 25 booths already recorded.

Price of tickets for this year's fair will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for children ages six through 12. Tickets will be stubbed so that one portion will provide a barbecue dinner for the holder.

Asection of each childrens ticket is for one free amusement

Board will be followed and everyone admitted to the fairgrounds must have a ticket.

Main entrance to the fair will be at the south gate of the rodeo grounds. The east gate will be used for entries and exhibitors in the Women's Hobby and Craft Show, and the north gate will be used for horse show entrants.

A number of new kiddle rideswill be provided at the fair this year, and children will be charged 15 cents each or two for 25 cents.

The entertainment committee for the fair has reported that several musical groups have been booked so the music will appeal to a wide range of people. In addition there will be a radio broadcast live from the booth and from the stage inside the pavillion.

### THE SANTA ANNA NEWS

WITH SCHOOL getting underway again this year the bussing demon again rears his ugly head.

Again the courts are ordering bussing in schools and school boards are hard put to finance that along with competent education facilities in the schools. They are having to spend money that should be used for teachers and textbooks on the purchase and operation of busses to satisfy the court orders.

Although President Nixon and many in the House and Senate have pushed for legislation that would end forced bussing, the courts continue to ignore them. The House recently passed the Equal Educational Opportunities Act which would bar bussing in the elementary grades and restrict junior high and high school bussing to the next nearest school. So far the Senate has not acted on the measure, but proponents hope for action this year.

However, if it does pass the Congress we must remember that the SupremeCourt still has the power to rule any new law unconstitutional, so the great need is for a constitutional amendment to end the forced bussing once and for all.

Amendments have been introduced in both the House and Senate for such action, but there has been no progress so far on either.

The Amendment procedure is cumbersome, requiring two-thirds vote by both House and Senate and ratification by three-fourths of the states, and that will take a lot of time, even if it passes. The need is for legislation that the Supreme Court would favor, and that is what some are working for now.

The thing boils down to the fact that school boards are spending a lot of money on bussing that could be used to improve our educational system. Bussing has not proved to be of value wherever it has been instituted, and in our opinion is a vast waste of tax money, which already is spread too thinly in our educational systems.

The answer is a high quality educational system in our neighborhood schools, and that is how it should be.

PEOPLE WHO HELD elections in the Democratic primaries are still waiting for their pay, we learned this week. The court order that stopped the way the primaries financed the election has caused a vast shortage of funds to the point where a good percentage of the bills were not paid.

They might get away with it one time, but with the general election coming up, who will they get to work? There are not many people who will be willing to spend a long day at the polls and then not get paid.

The State Legislature appropriated funds for election expenses, but they failed to grant enough to pay the costs. Most of us are uncertain as to just how election expenses will have to be paid-but those who still have money coming will probably not worry about it until they get paid.

Election judges may be hard put to get help on October 10.

### SD Adventists Have Education On Drug Abuse

"The older generation must remove our youth's excuse for pot smoking," says Pastor Sam Miller of the Santa Anna-Coleman Seventh-day Adventist church.

"Young people have pushed for legislation of marijuana because their parents use alcohol," said Miller, "And the kids have a point. It's forced this nation to focus on alcoholism which is more of a menace than many people want to admit.'

The church leader emphasized that Adventists have no quarrel of which is worse, alcohol or pot. "Both are drugs which do not help the nation's health," stated Miller.

The church has introduced several programs aimed at solving the problems. Besides such rehabilitation programs as the 5-Day Plan to Stop Smoking and the Four-Dimensional Key to Cause of Alcoholism, Adventists maintain a vigorous education program on drug abuse. .

"We'd like to put the brakes on before the next generation is. hooked on alcohol, tobacco and drugs," added Miller. "Much information young people get is one-sided--the glamorous ads, the example of social drinkers, or peer pressure to smoke or drop a little acid."

Adventists "Listen" magazine, which promotes the value of an unhooked life. The monthly journal features

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fact articles, personal experiences, and personality sketches of athletes and other teen heroes who endorse this way of life.

The magazine was the first to publish the revolutionary studies of Dr. Melvin H. Knisely, professor and researcher at the University of South Carolina. Knisely's studies, reported in Reader's Digest (June, 1970, Alcohol and Your Brain) indicate that drinking damages the brain permanently from the first drink.

"We religiously believe," stated Pastor Miller, "that a life without false dependencies is going to have fewer conflicts, more meaning. This, besides freedom from adverse effects of alcohol, tobacco, and narcotics, is going to make for better health." He added "We think that is part of what Christ meant when He talked of the 'more abundant

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





### **ROTC Provides Scholarships** For Education

Male high school students who will graduate in 1973 and are interested in flying are eligible to apply for an Air Force ROTC four-year college scholarship.

One thousand four-year college scholarships are available for students who will enroll in the Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps at one of the colleges and universities in the United States and Puerto Rico which offer the four-year program.

The scholarships will be awarded to qualified students who agree to become Air Force pilots or navigators after college graduation.

Each scholarship pays full tuition, laboratory fees, and textbook reimbursement. In each scholarship addition. student receives a monthly nontaxable susbistence allowance of \$100.

All applicants for a scholarship must qualify on the Air Force Officer Qualifying Text and on an Air Force medical examination. A special committee of Air Force officers will evaluate all students who apply for a scholarship. They will consider the student's scores on the American College Text or the Scholastic Aptitude Test, high school grades, extracurricular activities and personal references.

Interested students must submit their applications postmarked no later than November 15. Application forms and additional information may be obtained by writing Directorate of Admissions, Air Force ROTC, Maxwell Air Force Base. Alabama 36112.
