S-Anna Steer Roper Wins Again

Roper almost repeated his record

James Allen, Santa Anna's own this past weekend as he was RCA cowboy, is back at home for runner-up in the 1972 National climaxed the 1972 season which the winter after covering over. roping finals last weekend was the best season, money-wise, of Allen's.

The Pawhuska roping last weekend moved James from eighth to fifth in the championship standings after he won first in one go-around and fourth in another.

On a new horse, Snip purchased last winter from Bill Pennington of Fort Worth, James won nearly \$13,000 during the season. His other three roping horses, ridden only when he had to, accounted for another \$1,200 during the season.

James attributes his success to Skip, a 10-year-old unregistered gelding that is a half-brother to Micky, the horse on which roper Dean Oliver won five RCA championships. James, a wellknown horse trainer, trained Skip last winter, and thinks he is the hest mount he has ever had

Many of the miles on the rodeo curcuit were in the northwest which included rodeos Oregon, Washington, Montana, Colorado, Nebraska and Oklahoma. At Pendleton James was runner-up for the all-around title which he won in 1971.

Notall the prizes are cash. At one roping James was awarded a pair of silver mounted spurs for tying the fastest steer in the show, and at another roping he was awarded a bronze sculpture of a roper and steer made by a young Western artist and valued at \$1,500. The sculpture is now on display at the First Coleman National Bank in Coleman. The Santa Anna roper was a winner at 12 of the 19 RCA ropings he entered this year.

Allen and Skip will be resting awhile from the lengthy curcuit, then it is back to work on the family ranch and his winter occupation as a horse trainer.

James already has 15 horses to train for steer roping and expects others during the next few months. His wife, Ann, and their four children help with the training process, which includes working the chutes for the roping. Guy, an eighth grade student, is his father's main helper with the horses, and Gip, aged 12, is "the test chute help there is", according to Allen.

Allen's horse training ability was proven when one of the horses he trained was among the mounts in the national finals last weekend. Owned and ridden by Dewey David of Riverton, Wyoming, the Allen-trained horse won in two go-arounds of the roping

James, son of Orville Allen and the late Bertha Allen, has been roping as long as he can remember. He started roping goats from a Shetland pony about the time he started to school. Encouragement from his father and older brother, Willard, now of Brownwood, and help and advice from Max Horne and Tom Kingsbery, have been instrumental in his roping career.

Although James is at home for awhile, the ropings will continue. He will go to Happy later this month for a steer roping and to the big San Angelo Steer roping on November 4 and 5.

The Bobcats scored a touchdown in each quarter of play and all but one extra point was good. The Mounties made some good gains on the ground but could never reach pay dirt.


The Mountaineers get into district competition next week when they host the Ranger High School team on Friday night, October 27. The district games will all begin at 7:30 p. m.



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ISRALE - 9-29-72 Dear Barbara:

Traveling in Israel is an experience that can only be done-but never adequately described. But since your readers are not here eating stuffed squash and falaffel in person, maybe sharing a few impressions with them will be helpful.

Two big impressions: the new and the old. First the the new: Israel has all the marks of progress--from air pollution in Haifa to modern sprinkling systems in the Esdraelon valley. Buildings are going up in every especially highrise apartment buildings. Nazareth, the town where Jesus was raised, for example, was only a tiny village until recently. It now numbers about 55,000 people and is still growning. Tel Aviv, Israel's largest city, was only a stretch of sand dunes along the Mediterranean Sea just 25 years

Some things new are only old problems with modern dress. In every place there are soldiers by the hundreds, many carrying new automatic weapons as they wait for a bus or hitch-hike home for a weekend. Much of the heavy taxation in Isreal is allotted for military purposes. War, however, is old in Israel. At every ancient archeological site, one is reminded of the great battles of Kings Saul and David, and such early leaders as judge Deborah and conqueror Joshua. Life goes on undisturbed here although swept-winged jets roar overhead daily and the evening newscasting report daily skirmishes between Israel and the

of the worle's most historically interesting area.

The old here is really old. When I think of the U.S. and things old. such places as Philadelphia and Boston come to mind with historical sites perhaps three centuries old at most. Here it is common to speak of a city or excavation from 30 or, 40 centuries ago. Many "digs" have produced treasures dating to the times of the patriarchs of the Old Testament -- Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

The influence of many cultures can be seen throughout the land, one wave of people building over the remains of former times and each leaving their mark for today's archeologists and historians and tourists to see and

concerned, let me recommend it highly as very worthwhile and cheaper than in United States, but of course if you want to live high and spend alot, you will have opportunities to do so. No special visa or shots are required, English is widely spoken, and Americans are treated

new to American tastes. Some widely eaten things are familiar: tomatoes, figs, olives, pickles, rice. But there the similarity ends. 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THE BELDEN POLL, a Texas polling organization which has polled voters in this state for many years. recently said that President Richard Nixon would carry 59 per cent of the state's votes with Sen. George McGovern getting 35 per cent and six percentage points divided between others and undecided.

This is pretty close to what was predicted from the end of the Democratic convention when the McGovern forces took over and nominated "the one most likely to fail" to unseat the President.

In the first place, it is pretty hard for any party to unseat a president after his first term, unless he has been pretty terrible, and most will agree that Mr. Nixon has not been that bad. Further, with a pretty large segment of the population bordering on the conservative, McGovern's political ideology just won't get him elected.

We will be the first to say that some of McGovern's idea are not bad. It is mainly the extreme that he goes to in what he proposes. There is no one who would say that the administration can do no wrong. There are complaints that come from all segments of the population, and the minority groups of this country have been the "fall guys" for years and years. We agree that they deserve a better break than they have gotten. However, we can't go along with a large guaranteed income that will go to anyone without any effort on their part, whether they be white, black, brown or yellow. Say what you will, the WPA required those on its rolls to do some work for their money, and as a consequence, many civic projects became a reality that would never have happened without them.

If either administration would come up with a plan that would require those on welfare, those physically able that is, to do something to earn what they get, then they would get some support from every segment of the population, all races, and all creeds.

Another thing that divides the country is the Viet Nam war and there are extremes on both sides of that. Some of us who would like to see the end of the war believe that there is an "in-between" area from the two extremes. There are those who want to end the war by capitulation to the enemy and hoping that they will "do right" by us, and there are those who would have us go "all out" in trying to destroy the enemy. We believe that both are wrong, but that we do need to keep enough pressure on the north to cause them to want to negotiate an end to the fighting.

Most Americans are not brutal, even though you would sometimes think so at a football game. We don't enjoy reading or seeing pictures of the suffering in either north or south Viet Nam, but history has borne out the saying "War is Hell" and we have grown accustomed to brutality in war time. The human element in each of us seeks revenge for the killing of civilians in the south until we will overlook the same thing in the north. And we will not condemn the south for their killing and overlook the same thing from the

It just boils down to the fact that what Nixon has done will more nearly coincide with the thinking of the average citizen than will the theories that have been put forth by McGovern.

If things don't change radically, you can count on a Republican President for four more years.

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
Local Ladies Attend WSCS District Meet

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
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Darlyne Jones, Doyle Bothwell Wedd Recently in Cotton Center





The additional set-aside provision is again being offered under the 1973 wheat program to encourage retirement of additional land to prevent excessive wheat production. An acreage up to one hundred fifty percent of the domestic allotment may be set aside for payment if the set-aside base is this large or larger. We feel that it is very important that you understand the method for determining the base from which voluntary additional set-aside may be made.

The first consideration is the 1972 wheat acreage certified as planted for harvest. Secondly, the

1972 additional set-aside is added in and the total of the two constitutes the 1973 set-aside base. However, in cases where the 1972 certified acres plus additional set aside is less than the allotment, planting credit given to prevent allotment loss, (substitution, prevented planting, failed acreage, grazed off acreage) will be used to the extent needed to bring the set-aside base up to the domestic allotment.

You will notified on November 1 of your 1973 set-aside base for your farm. From this you substract any intended 1973 additional set-aside and the result is the wheat permitted acreage you can have remaining for harvest. The 1973 set-aside base

is important only to those who wish to offer additional acreage for payment in excess of that requires to participate in the program. If you elect to set-aside only the required or minimum acreage, you will still be eligible for wheat certificates and your wheat acreage is not restricted.

If you planted less wheat, or lost wheat acreage in 1972 because of drought, flood, hail or other natural disaster, you can request consideration for a possible adjustment in your 1973 set-aside base. Requests must be filed within fifteen days from the date of the letter to be mailed November 1.





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SDA Minister Speaks Against **Any Addiction**

"The older generation must J. S. Martin of Santa Anna and remove youth's excuse for pot Herman L. Martin of Garland; two smoking," says Pastor Miller of the Santa Anna-Coleman Seventh-day Adventist church.

Young people have pushed for legalization of marijuana because their parents use alcohol," said Miller. "And the kids have a point. It's forced this nation to focus on alcoholism which is more of a menace than many people want to admit."

Adventists, the church leader emphasized, have no quarrel with which is worse. "Both are drugs which do not help the nation's health," Miller said.

The church has introduced several programs aimed at solving the problems. Besides such rehabilitation programs as the 5-day Plan to Stop Smoking and the Four-dimentional Key to the cause of alcoholism, Adventists maintain a vigorous education program on drug abuse.

"We'd like to put the brakes on before the next generation is hooked on alcohol, tobacco, and drugs," said Miller. "Much information young people get is one-sided-- the glamorous ads, the example of social drinkers, or peer pressure to smoke or drop a little acid."

Adventists support "Listen" Magazine, which promotes the value of a nonhooked life. The monthly journal features fact articles, personal experiences, and personality sketches of athletes and other teen heroes who endorse this way of life.

The magazine was the first to publish the revolutionary studies of Dr. Melvin H. Knisely, professor and researcher at the University of South Carolina. Knisely's studies, reported in "Reader's Digest" (June, 1970, Alcohol and Your Brain) indicate that drinking dangers the brain permanently from the first drink.

"We religiously believe," stated Pastor Miller, "that a life without false dependencies is going to have fewer conflicts, more meaning. This, besides freedom from adverse effects of alcohol. tobacco, and narcotics; is going to make for better health. He added, "We think that's part of what Christ meant when He talked of the "more abundant life."
