City Policeman To Law Course For Four Weeks

Roger Beard, Santa Anna City Policeman, will be in Abilene each day for the next four weeks attending the Abilene Police Academy for instruction in basic law enforcement. Classes start Monday, October 30.

The training for the local law officer is funded through a grant by the West Texas Council of Governments as an aid to small towns. Beard has been serving as local policeman for several months since his discharge from the Marine Corps.

The Santa Anna native replaced Rondoe Horton who served as Deputy Sheriff in Santa Anna for two and one-half years.

Beard informed the NEWS that Billy Timm of Coleman County Sheriff's Department would serve this area while he was in Abilene. Timm is a former Salton Deputy Sheriff and formerly employed by the Coleman Police Department. He may be reached at the Sheriff's office in Coleman or at his residence. Other local requests for law officers may be made through the Coleman Police Department if necessary.

Santa Anna Defeats Ranger, 32-0

Santa Anna football fans watched Friday night while the Mountaineers blasted the Ranger Bulldogs 32-0 in the first district game of the season. Heavy fog at

times almost obscured the action from across the field from the home fans, and light rain fell as the game began but quit by halftime.

It was Ranger's sixth loss of the season and put Santa Anna at 3-3. Santa Anna overpowered the Bulldogs, giving up only 57 yards in total offense while making 269 yards on the ground.

The Mountaineers got two touchdowns in the first quarter when Rocky Dean and Danny Valdez each made paydirt. In the second period David Huggins raced over for another TD. The half-time score was 18-0.

Dean scored again in the third period and Huggins added the two extra points. The final score was on a 12-yard run in the Fourth quarter by David Horner.

Santa Anna FFA Has Winners In State Fair Junior Show

The Santa Anna Future Farmers of America chapter had several winners at the State Fair last week including the champion merino wool lamb shown by Susan Newman. Susan also was awarded the showmanship trophy for the entire junior sheep show at the Fair.

Other winners in the top ten included Sharon McCreary with a Dorset crossbred lamb, second place; Elaine Newman, fourth in Hampshire crossbred; and Ronnie Daniel, ninth place in the crossbred bar row class, 200-212 pounds.

DeAun Long and Hank Wise of the Rockwood 4-H Club also were among the top winners at the Fair. DeAun had third place and sixth place in two of the Angus calf classes. Hank placed third with his lamb in the Suffolk class.

David Horner showed a Hereford steer in the junior show and placed high enough to get the steer in the Friday auction sale. Duane Aldridge's steer lost a

tooth the night before the show, making it ineligible for the show.

In the Friday sale, Susan Newman's champion lamb sold to Southland Life Insurance Company for \$300.

Other Santa Anna exhibitors at Dallas included Lane Guthrie, David Drake, Joe Dean Early, Robbie Drake and Cline Smith.

The Dallas show is the final competition until the Santa Anna youth show which will be held some after Christmas and just prior to the regular winter show circuit.

Scattered Rain Falls In Area

Rainfall was reported in the Santa Anna area during the past week with unofficial reports giving as much as two inches in and around Santa Anna. The Trickham area, usually on the short end of the rainfall, received an inch or more in some places.

The rainfall was not general, however, as only one-quarter inch fell in the Leedy community south of town.

Grainfields and pastures well benefit greatly from the moisture which was the first in several weeks.

Moore Pot Trial Moved To F-Worth

The trial of James Clifford Moore, 33, charged with the possession of nearly a ton and a half of marijuana, has been transferred to Fort Worth by 35th District Judge Joe Dibrell.

Judge Dibrell granted the defense attorney's motion for a change of venue due to the great amount of publicity in Coleman at the time of Moore's arrest in August 1971.

Moore was charged with possession of marijuana after state narcotics agents found three-quarters of an acre of the illegal plant growing in a creek bottom near Burkett in northeast Coleman County.

No date has been set yet for the trial, according to Abilene attorney Davis Scarborough.

Coleman Hospital - 14

Plans to close in the bottom floor of the new portion of Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital were announced last week by Administrator Robert Jameson.

The Coleman hospital board has been advised that the two old wings of the hospital no longer qualify for Medicare requirements.

Also planned are proceedings for making application for Hill Burton funds for the hospital improvement and addition.

Improvements and modifications have been made in recent years in the older portions of the hospital. The original part was built in 1923 and the other in 1935.

The closing of the ground floor of the new wing was planned from the beginning, and the new addition will make about 50 beds, close to the current size.

The Coleman hospital patient load ranges from 20 to 32.

Driving Course To Be Offered Adult Drivers

The Texas Insurance Board approved in August a program whereby licensed drivers could qualify for a ten percent reduction in car insurance premiums upon the completion of the Defensive Driving Course developed by the National Safety Council.

The Region XV Education Service Center has decided to become involved in the effort as a means of being of service to the school districts in the region and to the lay public wherever the needs exist.

A. L. Newman has been certified as an instructor in the program and each community has an opportunity to set up a course for the public if there are enough participants. A minimum of 25 and maximum of 35 are set for the course.

All classes in defensive driving are sponsored by the school districts in which they are taught. Facilities for the classes are furnished by the school district and the classes will be taught after 5 p. m. or on Saturdays.

Eight classroom hours are required for the course at a cost of \$10 per participant, which includes anyone with a valid drivers license.

Supt. Cullen Perry is seeking interested adults who wish to enroll in the program and asks them to notify the school business office as soon as possible.

The defensive driving course has been offered in larger towns in the area and is available here for the first time.

The dates and hours for the class will be set after response is tabulated.

Bank Deposits All-Time High At SA National

Deposits at the Santa Anna National Bank showed an all-time high at the October bank call, a reflection of the increase in all banks in Coleman County.

Deposit at the Santa Anna bank totaled \$3,515,809 in October, an increase of \$177,000 during the past six months.

Loans at the Santa Anna Bank are down from the April call by \$127,000.

Deposits in the two Coleman banks and in Santa Anna totaled \$27,839,000 as of October 10. Although loans were down at the local bank, they were higher at the two Coleman banks.

Heart Surgery Being Planned For Local Boy

Ronnie Yancy, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dee Yancy, was in San Antonio last week for a check-up and tests at Santa Rosa Hospital. Doctors confirmed he has a hole in his heart and will need corrective surgery.

Ronnie will return to the hospital for further tests next month and is planning to have the surgery next summer.

November 14 Is Date Here For Blood Bank

The Blood Bank in San Angelo will have a mobile unit in Santa Anna on November 14. They will be at the Lions Club building from 3:00 P. M. until 8:00 P. M.

Blood may be given and designated to the account of any person, but primarily this effort is to help the families of those in our town who have had to have a lot of blood prior to the surgery. They are Stephen Early, Mrs. C. R. Owen. Blood may be given to the account of either family.

All persons who plan to give blood should notify Bill Brewer, phone 348-3725 or 348-3754, so that the blood bank will know how many donors to prepare for, and so that a schedule can be set up.

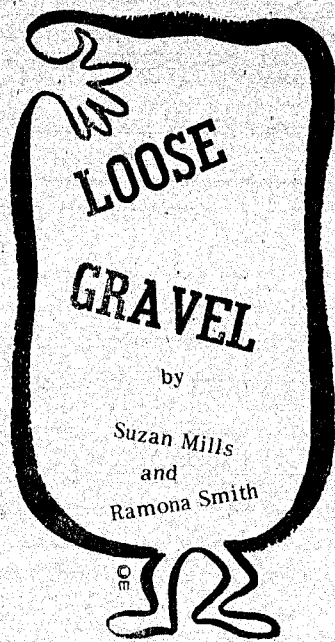

But it just doesn't seem to be right. Being creatures of habit and resistant to change, November 11 just sticks in our minds, and since all holidays were changed to they would fall on Monday, they just don't seem the same.

However, whatever day we observe, let us not forget that it is up to us to stand up for freedom—the least we can do in return to those who gave so much to preserve it. Some of us may be uncertain about many things in America this day, but we are not uncertain about the respect and honor we owe to those who have served our nation in war and peace—the Veterans of America. We should be concerned about those who still wear the scars of battle in our 167 Veterans's Hospitals, realizing that freedom extracts a price and those men paid and are still paying for the privileges of freedom which we enjoy.

To our men in uniform today, we can offer our thanks for they are ones who stand between us and the submission that our enemies would gladly put us under.

Teddy Roosevelt told it like it was when he said "speak softly and carry a big stick." There are those today who would have us drop to a second rate power, but we didn't become the greatest nation in the world by being second in anything. Once we cut our defenses to a second place in the world, we also cut our place in the world to second in all things. There is no way this writer could support any program that would drop us to second in anything and that includes our military might.

If the day is to come when we won't have to fear an increase in those veterans we honor because the world seeks peace, then let us remember that we will never achieve it by giving in to those who would destroy us, but stand ready to defend our honor at all costs.



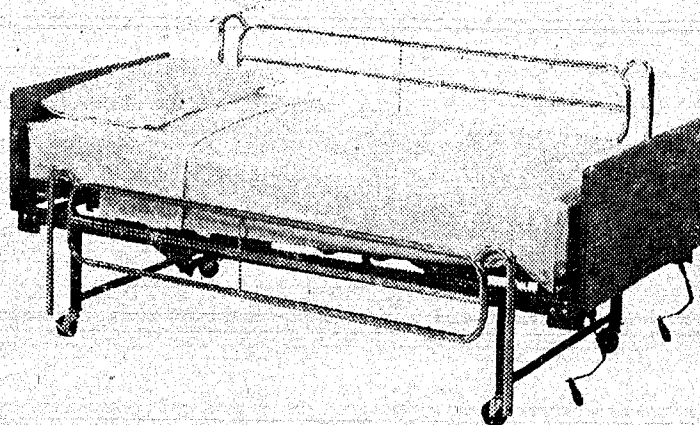

ASCS News

The U. S. Department of Agriculture today announced a 1973 Rural Environmental Assistance Program (REAP) that will strengthen conservation and diminish air and water pollution.

Through REAP the Federal Government shares with farmers the cost (usually on a 50-50 basis) of carrying out needed conservation and environmental protection measures on their farms. Practices emphasized are those which help to provide long-range preservation of the environment and return greater benefits to the public.

The initial funding level for 1973 will be \$140.0 million, the same as the initial funding for last year's program. The 140 million Administration to hold down federal spending to help control inflation and reduce the need for a tax increase. A final decision regarding the program level will not be made until determinations are made on overall spending targets.

Farmers will receive Federal cost-sharing for these new practices: (1) Installation of excess water management systems where they are essential to combat adverse environmental conditions such as water pollution from contaminated water runoff caused by high water table, or

incomplete recycling of animal or human waste, sedimentation, and salinity or alkalinity; and (2) use of conservation tillage on a demonstration basis to reduce soil loss from land devoted to intertilled (row) crops.

Also, the 1973 REAP expands the authority to cost-share for practices to solve agriculture-related air pollution problems. In the past, cost-sharing for pollution abatement was limited to those practices with soil and water conservation benefits.

County committees will develop their 1973 programs within National program guidelines and will have opportunity to keep some or all of their 1970 county practices as was the case for 1971 and 1972.

The following conservation and environmental protection features will receive high priority during the coming year: Establishing permanent vegetative cover; improving or protecting permanent vegetative cover; developing facilities for livestock water; water impoundment reservoirs; constructing terrace systems; diversion terraces, ditches or dikes; permanent wildlife habitat; animal waste storage and diversion facilities; sediment retention and water control structures; sediment or chemical runoff measures; disposal of cropland or woodland residues without burning; and disposal pits for solid waste.

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service administers the program through its farmer-elected committee system.

Sleeping Can Be Hazardous

Sleeping can be a hazardous activity. Especially for certain patients with severe lung disease who take sleeping pills.

The chief function of our lungs is to deliver oxygen and remove carbon dioxide from the blood. When we sleep, though, our breathing changes. The oxygen level in our blood drops. Carbon dioxide increases. This tilt in the balance of gases in the blood happens to everyone during sleep. But people with severe respiratory disease already have this imbalance of blood gases even when they are awake. Does sleeping cause an even greater tilt?

Until recently, no one had explored this question. But Dr. Benjamin Interiano of the University of Rochester Medical Center conducted experiments with patients with severe lung disease as well as those with heart disease and obesity with obesity problems. The comparisons during sleep were surprising.

Dr. Interiano found that during sleep obese patients had drastic drops in oxygen levels, almost four times greater than that of normal subjects. Drops for patients with congestive heart failure were almost as great. Both could profit from oxygen therapy at night. But among patients with severe respiratory disease, changes in blood gas levels during sleep were not much different from normal subjects.

Nobody knows why, but Dr. Interiano speculates that an unknown protective mechanism prevents further imbalance of blood gases in respiratory patients while they are asleep. Curiously enough, the protective mechanism can be blocked by taking sleeping pills. Some effect from the pills causes a precipitous drop in oxygen levels and a rise in carbon dioxide. With such patients, taking the pills may cause serious complications.

To find out more about the lungs and how they work, contact your local tuberculosis and respiratory disease association. It's a matter of life and breath.

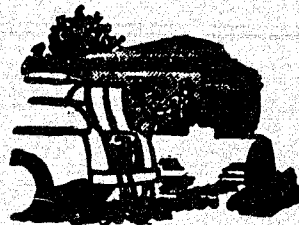

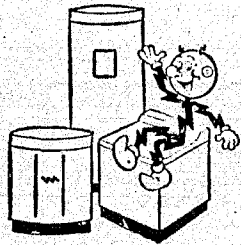
