MOUNTIES DEFEAT BANGS 12-7

Whether or not Santa Anna wins the whole thing or shares the District 10-A football title depends on the outcome of the Friday night game with Cross Plains.

The co-champion title and chance to represent the district in the playoffs was cinched Friday night when the Mountaineers defeated the Bangs Dragons 12-7 at the homecoming game. The

victory leaves Santa Anna 4-0 in conference play while Bangs dropped to the 1-3 mark.

Ranger is the contender for the co-championship as their only defeat came from Santa Anna. They meet Early this Friday night.

In the Friday night football game, Santa Anna scored early in the first quarter when Danny Valdez made a TD. The try for extra point failed.

Bangs scored in the third period and their PAT was good, giving a slim 7-6 lead.

In the final period quarterback David Horner went over for another score for the final 12-7 mark. Linebackers Tony Beal and Rocky Dean were standouts for the defense. Beal was credited with 11 individual stops and 11 assists. Dean made eight tackles and nine assists.

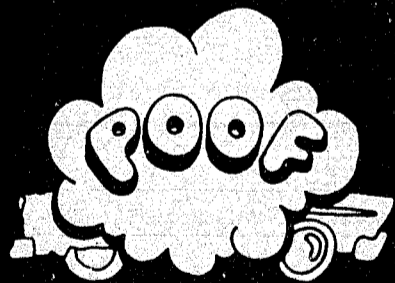

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In Our Opinion

THINGS HAVE COME to a pretty mess when one becomes afraid to get on an air liner for fear that he will end up in Cuba or worse, lose his life.

This past week three high jackers took over a plane in Alabama and had it flown all over the central United States and to Cuba. They shot the co-pilot and three passengers were wounded and taken to a hospital after the plane landed on a foam-covered runway at Havana.

All three hijackers were known criminals, two of them out on bond in a rape case and the third an escaped convict who left prison each day to attend school.

We don't know what the answer is, but we place the blame for such actions on the leniency of Supreme Court decisions concerning criminals and the fact that law enforcement officials find their hands tied so much of the time because of small technicalities in the wording or laws. It would seem that the courts have actually encouraged the criminal element by going overboard to protect them, and at the same time left the impression that law enforcement people are a bunch of sadists who delight in mistreating their prisoners.

The fact is that very few policemen have any joy at arresting anyone, and if the law wasn't broken, they wouldn't have to. Of course we have had cases where they were brutal beyond any need to be, and have gone overboard in making arrests. But that is by far the exception, not the rule.

It may come to the point where we will have to have plain-clothes policemen on all air liners, armed and ready to kill any would-be hijackers. That would seem the only answer at this time. Something is going to have to be done that will make hijacking so hazardous that no one will try it. It would be hazardous for passengers and flight personnel as well for a while, but maybe it eventually would stop the practice.

The three involved in the hijacking last week were evidently not of sound mind. They showed all the indications of insanity. But sane or insane, we cannot continue to let this kind of activity continue.

The methods of screening passengers has not worked, it seems, as they are still able to get on a plane with arms on their person or in their luggage. These three passed through a scanner as they got in the plane, so that does not seem to solve the problem.

I guess they will have to shake every passenger down before he gets on the plane and check his luggage to make sure there is no gun in his possession.

The death penalty for the hijacker seems to be the only penalty suitable.

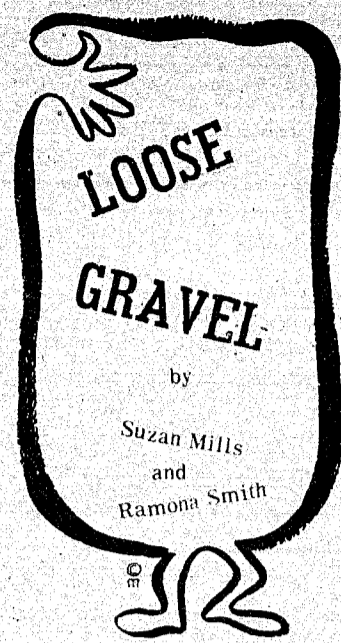

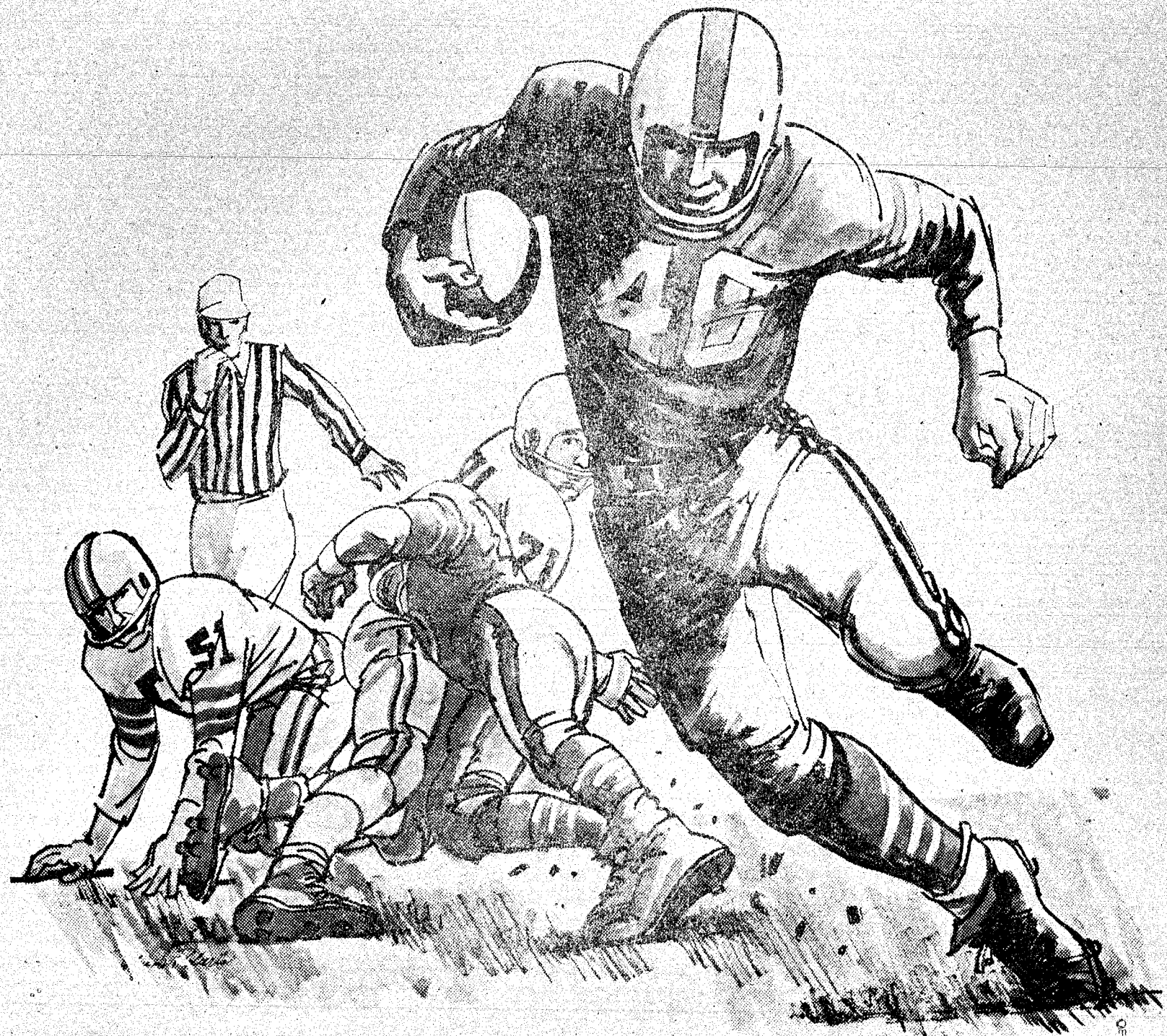

Mrs. Martin is a former teacher in the Santa Anna schools and also taught at Trickham.

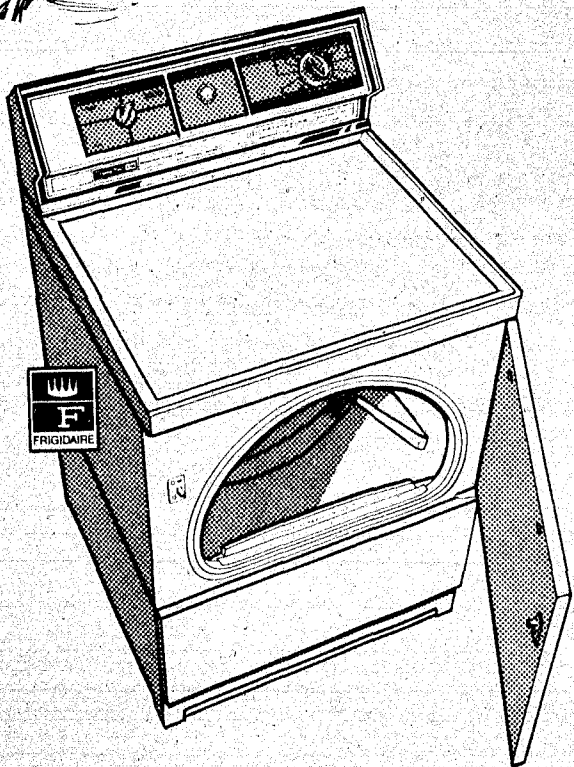

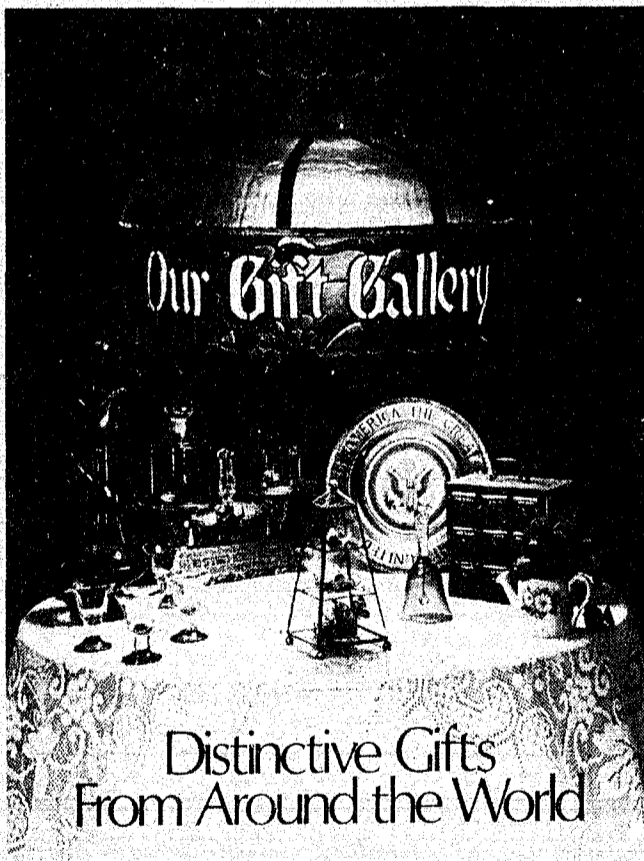

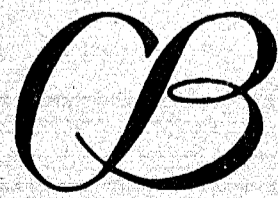
