S.A. Stock Show Set December 30; **Three New Directors Elected**

The Santa Anna 4-H and FFA Livestock Show and Youth Fair will be held on Saturday, December 30, according to Billie Guthrie, secretary of the Santa Anna Livestock Association. The date was set at a meeting of the directors and officers of the group last Thursday night.

Three new directors were elected for three-year terms. They are W. D. Aldridge, Roland Duus and Glen Scarborough. Tom Newman was re-elected president of the group; Floyd Smith was reelected vice-president; and Billie Guthrie was also re-elected secretary.

Other directors of the organization are Tom Newman, Max Eubank and Joe Guerrero, two years remaining; and Floyd Smith, Quinton Daniel and Darrel Cupps, one year.

The FHA and 4-H foods, clothing and crafts exhibit will be held again this year in conjunction with the livestock show. The exhibits will be in the new agriculture building.






Aerosol Spray Can Be Toxic

"The following article is taken from a ''Heart Research Newsletter" by the American Heart Association.

"There are 110 documented cases of youngsters dying suddenly after sniffing airplane glue, aerosol sprays and the fumes of certain solvents. Two AMA research grantees, working independently; have completed experimental animal studies that point to the fatal mechanism: irregular heart rhythms triggered by the gas used to propel the sprays. The most, common propellant is Freon; the gas is also added to various glues and solvents to speed up evaporation and drying.

The AHA-supported studies suggest that the gas slows the electrical conduction system of standstill.

Some Benefits Changed With New SS Ruling

The increase in widow's benefits has attracted much of the earlier publicity, and is not as wide-reaching as earlier reports implied. The widow who does not become entitled to such benefits until age 65 will get 100 percent of the retirement benefit the husband was receiving, or would have been receiving had he been retired. IF the widow benefits start at age 62, she gets 82.9 percent of the husband's rate. If she starts her checks at age 60. she gets 71 1/2 percent of the husband's rate. Widow's benefits that start at ages between 60 and 65 get rising percentages of the 100 percent amount. First checks showing these changes will be received in February 1973, for



Dear Editor:



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IT WOULD BE HARD for the best political strategist to analyze the results of the general election, and determine just what the voters are saying.

Some things, however, are perfectly clear, and should be taken as a mandate by the administration and Congress as well. One thing was made perfectly clear - the people of the United States are tired of the socialistic trend in this country and their rejection of Senator George McGovern should be enough to convince both President Nixon and Congress.

On the other hand, the Democrats have maintained control over Congress and indicates that the presidential landslide was not so much a victory for the Republican party as a person victory for the President.

The same was true in Texas where the President carried the state by 66 per cent, yet it remains overwhelmingly Democratic in Congress.

As far as the Democrats are concerned, there has always been a lot of room for differences of opinion, but the present party leadership is so far out of step with the people that they don't even resemble the rank and file membership of the regular Democrats in Texas.

There needs to be a complete reorganization of the party from the national level down, and a return to the middle of the road philosophy that has been the traditional beliefs of Democrats in the past. The party itself was not severely damaged in the election, only the group who took over, the national convention and led the party down the road toward socialism. In the process they lost most of the people who have

John Connally was criticized by some of the liberal element for the stand he took, but the results show that most of the regulars was behind him. Only those who feared that their political career would suffer if they didn't support the ticket backed the national organization.

As far as the party is concerned we predict that the Connally-type Democrats will take over the state. machinery two years from now, and there will be a trend toward conservatism nationally in the party. If this doesn't happen the Democrats can kiss the presidency good by e again in 1976.

What they need is a strong man as a candidate. They have not had one since Lyndon Johnson and it is thought by many that he succumbed the pressure to follow the Kennedy philosophy when he became president.

Probably the strongest man the Democrats have had in recent years was Harry Truman, and in our opinion he made one of the best presidents in this century.

Maybe John Connally is the next one. There is no doubt that he is a strong man, and his political philosophy is very close to the majority of the people of this nation.



Some sixty thousand Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop. or livestock questionnaire during the last half of November or December. West Texas which is west of a line from Fort Worth to Del Rio will receive its questionnaries about December first.

This roundup survey of agricultural crop production and livestock numbers is made annually by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting, Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, are joined together to provide a continuing program of information on Texas agriculture.

. Texas has two hundred fiftyfour counties, and producers are selected in the samples proportional to size of operation. The small producer sampled represents many others of comparable size while the very largest producers may represent only themselves. Therefore, n is equally important for all farmers

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Power Pollution

Everybody is for motherhood and apple pie but against air pollution. Or is everybody?

Apple pie is holding its own but even motherhood has its opponents these days. As for air pollution, a study of private power companies across the country was normal. Stocker and concluded they are lagging far behind in the fight to combat pollution.

The year-long, independent study, released by the Council on and yearlings fully steady. Economic Priorities -- a nonprofit organization financed by foundations--focused on 124 plants that generate one-quarter of the nation's electric power. Among these plants, the report said, nearly half continue to burn high-sulphur oil or coal, pumping huge amounts of sulphur dioxide into the air. Sulfur oxides can dissolve marble and eat away iron and steel. They can limit visibility and cut down the light from the sun. Even low concentrations can injure the delicate tissues in our lungs.

In addition, 81 percent of the plants and no controls at all for emissions of nitrogen oxides, the gases that help form smog. And only a third of the power plants had adequate controls for soot. According to the study, most companies were spending only a fraction of one percent of their combined gross operating revenues on antipollution research and development.

Spokesmen for the power plants have strongly criticized the study, predicting that the price of electric power could more than double by 1990 and blaming environmentalists as one cause of actual or threatened power shortages.






