## Mountaineers Lead District After Defeating DeLeon 6-0

The mighty Santa Anna Mountaineers remained at the top of the District 10-A totum pole this week as they defeated the DeLeon Bearcats 6-0 at DeLeon Friday night. Santa Anna now stands 3-0 in district play, the only undefeated team in the district.

The Santa Anna score came on an 80-yard touchdown run by Rocky Dean in Santa Anna's second play of the game. The try for extra points failed, and neither team could get on the scoreboard the rest of the evening.

Members of the Jacksonville choir will be guests in the homes of church members on Thursday night and are also to be feted with a supper at the church fellowship hall following the concert, Thursday night.

## Mountain City Day Care Center To Open On Monday, November 13

The Mountain City Day Care center is to open at the Santa Anna Community Civic Center next Monday, November 13. Attendants will be at the center from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m. each weekday for the convenience of working mothers in the community. Children from one year of age are eligible for the care, but registration forms must be filed and requirements met before children may be left at the center.

Mrs. Rodney Dean has been named coordinator for the center. Mrs. Norman Anderson and Mrs. Dillard from the Coleman Central Texas Opportunities Center will be attendants.

Children kept at the center will be provided with a noon meal and

two snacks during the day. The cost will be \$1.50 per day per child for those on the regular weekly care, and children kept one day at a time or on an hourly basis will be \$2.50 per day.

About 20 children are expected at the center, although some of that number have not yet been enrolled.

The Day Care Center will be located in the classroom portion of the former Armory building, and the equipment and supplies are being put into place this week.

Volunteers from the community will be needed to assist at the noon hour and during the afternoons, and anyone interested should contact Mrs. Dean or Mrs. Anderson. Registration forms are available at the City Hall.

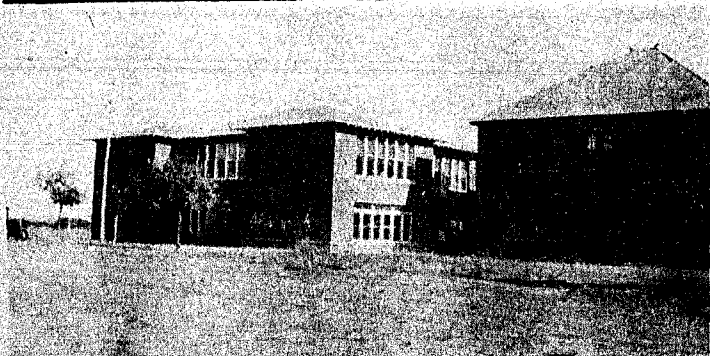
Mr. Sparkman will be introduced at the Friday night football game and have the formal presentation at the Saturday morning business meeting.

But whatever the outcome, it will be something we will have to live with from two to four to six years, and we will just have to make the best of the decision, regardless of whether we agree or not.

But one thing we should do is be willing to abide by the decision of the majority, whether we agree with it or not.

The President elected should be our president whether we voted for him or not and the same should be true with the Governor, Senator, or whoever.

The official will be our duly elected representative in his particular job and will be put there by a majority of the voters, so we should back him.

There are some people in this country who would put selfish interests above what is good for the country and when they don't have their way they want to tear down instead of support anything the opposition wants to do regardless of whether it is good or bad.

We have men in Congress who will vote with the party strictly for political gain and never consider what is best for the country they claim to represent. The same goes for the state legislature and other offices. We are thankful that there are no more of them than there are, and would like to see the day when there are none.

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## 1918 Seventh Grade History Has Interesting Information

The following is taken from the Seventh Grade Class History published in the NEWS in 1918. The article was written by Eugene Polk, class reporter.

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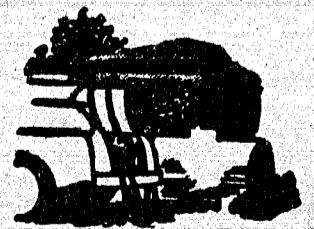

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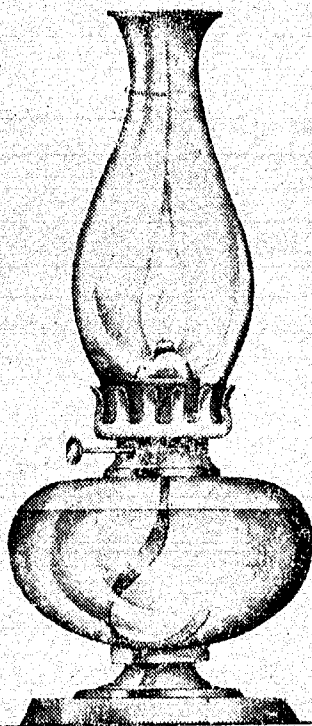

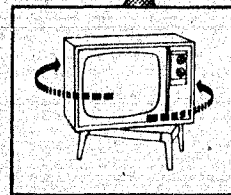

Always shut off the power. Many accidents involve running machines, especially corn harvesters. Stop the machine before you unclog, adjust or lubricate it even to brush or pull out a corn stalk.

Keep your guards on. Shields and guards are on your equipment for your protection. Never operate without them. Be alert to belts, chains, and gears while you are working.

Leave the little one at home. Youngsters like to ride with daddy, but riding on or playing near powerful farm machinery is not for small children. Keep them out of work areas.

Be prepared. Your equipment might be in fine shape but how about you? If possible, avoid operating equipment when you are ill, taking strong medications are tired, or when worry, emotional upsets and other problems are severe enough to make it difficult to be a safe operator.

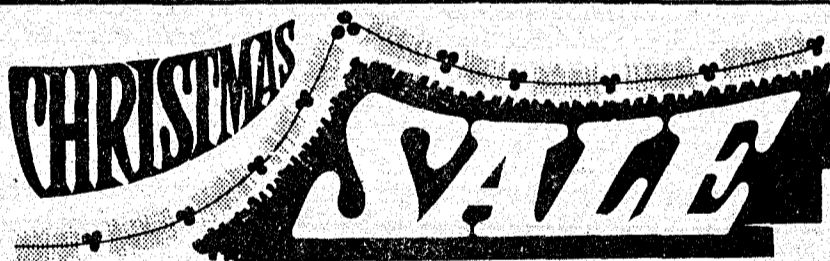
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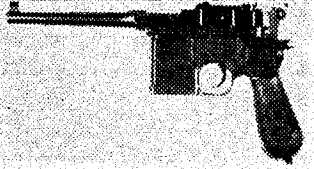

**Dying To Smoke**

More than 300,000 Americans die prematurely from the effects of cigarette smoking each year. But not many smokers believe it can really happen to them.

Maybe that is one reason why smokers persist in a habit that snuffs out life too soon. Like most people in our culture, they tend to deny the prospect of their own death. To a very great degree, our society worships youth and health and shuts one eye to sickness and death.

Deaths from coronary artery disease, chronic bronchitis, lung cancer, emphysema, and a host of other diseases are much higher for smokers than for nonsmokers. Dying is a lonely business in our society.

"Our embarrassment at the individual face of death forces the seriously ill and dying person to live alone on the brink of an abyss with no one to understand him," says psychiatrist Dr. Herman Feifel. But the topic of personal death, which has been taboo for decades, is surfacing again these days. Some hospitals are training special staff to help dying patients talk openly about their needs and fears, and to help bring them closer to their families and friends. What dying people fear most is abandonment and isolation.

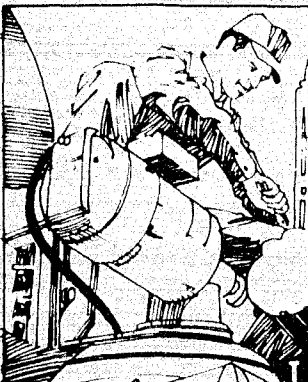
Among the loyal supporters is a new Santa Anna resident, Rob Cheaney, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Cheaney.

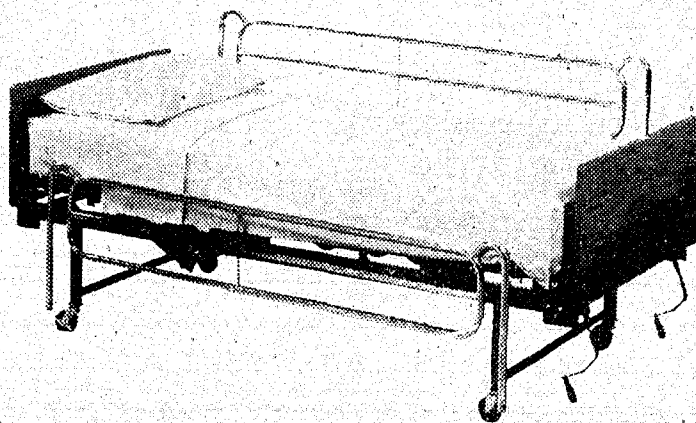
