SAHS Student To Be Named For Symposium

An outstanding Santa Anna High School student will attend the 13th Texas Nuclear Science Symposium for High Schools to be held in Austin June 4-7, Bob Burton local manager of West Texas Utilities Company announced.

Held on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin, the four-day symposium is co-sponsored by the university and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. The foundation is supporting research at the university in seeking a future source of energy supply for generation of electric power by controlling nuclear fusion reactions. West Texas Utilities Company and nine other investor-owned electric utility companies in Texas make up the foundation.

A number of outstanding authorities in the field of science, education and industry will address the symposium delegates. Science laboratories at the university will be open to the students for conducted tours.

The company will also sponsor a teacher to accompany the student. The student and teacher chosen for the symposium will be selected by the high school. Some 550 students and teachers from throughout Texas will attend.

"This is a real honor and an unusual opportunity for those attending to participate in a most educational, interesting and enjoyable experience," Mr. Burton said. "We are pleased that we can, with the cooperation of the high school, make it available to each of them."

The local student will be named in several weeks, according to Burton.

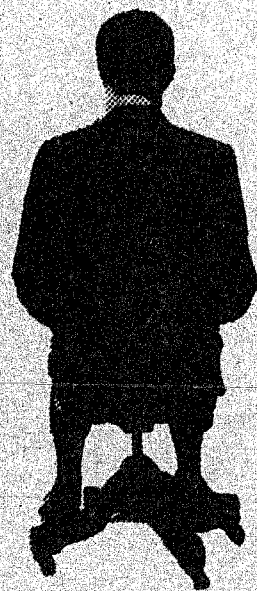

In Our Opinion

IN THE LAST election, McGovern forces exhibited what happens when one group tires to take over a political party. They excluded many party regulars from activity in the party and as a result lost the election by a whopping margin. That is the price of disunity.

The result is that an effort is being made to bring congressional Democrats, state governors and the national committee back into an organization in which all elements can have a voice in party affairs. It is a step in the right direction.

Following McGovern's defeat, Democratic governors pointed out that McGovern's loss was due to his ignoring the grass roots. Now that a new chairman has been named, Robert Strauss has made a vow to reunite all factions of the party. It can be done, but at the same time all factions will have to be heard.

Following a Senate Democratic caucus, Majority Leader Mike Mansfield has called on the 32 Democratic governors and the national committee for ideas in formulating the year's legislative programs. This has been unheard of before and could be the step that is needed to bring Democrats back into the fold. For years congressional Democrats have virtually ignored the rest of the party.

These positive steps have been taken as an aftermath to the McGovern debacle, and if they are faithfully followed could provide the basis for a new breadth and unity of the party.

But it took the experience of a shattering disunity to wake up some of them that first things should come first. No more will a party member blindly follow the leader for party's sake, and they must come up with a program that the majority can support.

There was a time when some felt that they should vote for the party regardless of the circumstances, but no more. Now voters of both parties, in the main, have a mind of their own.

GOV. DOLPH BRISCOE started the year right when he came out for no new taxes, expressing the belief that the state could operate efficiently from its income if some of the dead-wood was cut out.

We certainly agree with him in that respect, and hope that he will stick to his guns.

Comparing the tax bite in Texas and some of the other states, we Texans are fortunate. In many other states the cost of state government is much larger in proportion to population and that is the way we would like to keep it.

Lower taxes is one of the best ways to attract industry to any state or city, and if the Legislature cooperates with the governor, then we may get through another year without a tax boost of some kind.

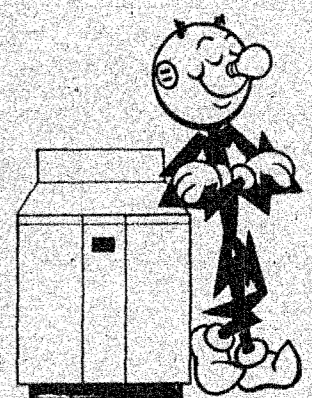

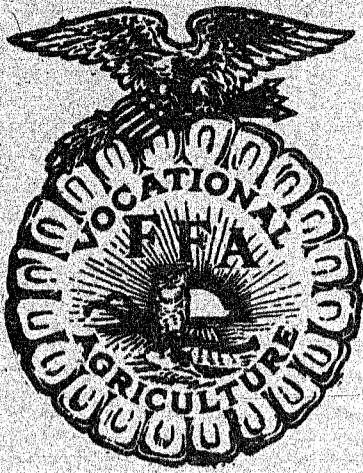
