Everyone in the community watches with interest as construction and remodeling progresses at Phillips Drug Store. The store is being doubled in size with the addition of the former Moore Mercantile building.

HS Track Team To Start Work

The Santa Anna High School boys track program will start next Monday, February 5, according to J. A. Smelley, SAHS track coach.

Driving Course Now Enrolling Local People

Final opportunity to enroll in the proposed Defensive Driving Course has been set for February 10, 1973. The course is set for Thursday and Friday evenings, February 22 and 23 and will run from 6:00 to 10:00 each evening. The course will be held in the classroom of the new vocational building.

Under terms of the insurance regulations drivers who complete the course are entitled to 10 percent reduction in some insurance premiums. The reduction covers premiums for coverage of moving accidents but does not cover damage by hailstorm, flood and other acts of nature. Since persons under 25 who have completed the public school driver training course are already entitled to a 10 percent reduction, no additional reduction can be earned through the defensive driving course. Nor can duplicate reductions be earned on the same vehicle by two or more persons.

A minimum of 25 persons must be enrolled before the course can be offered. A fee of \$10.00 is charged by the Education Service Center, Region XV for each enrollee. It is required that the course be repeated at three years intervals to reinstate the certificate to receive the insurance discount.

Eleven people have already notified the school that they will attend the local defensive driving course. It is hoped that fourteen more people will call the school office (348-3136) and place their names on the list of those who will definitely take the course.

ART CLASSES SLATED SOON AT ROCKWOOD

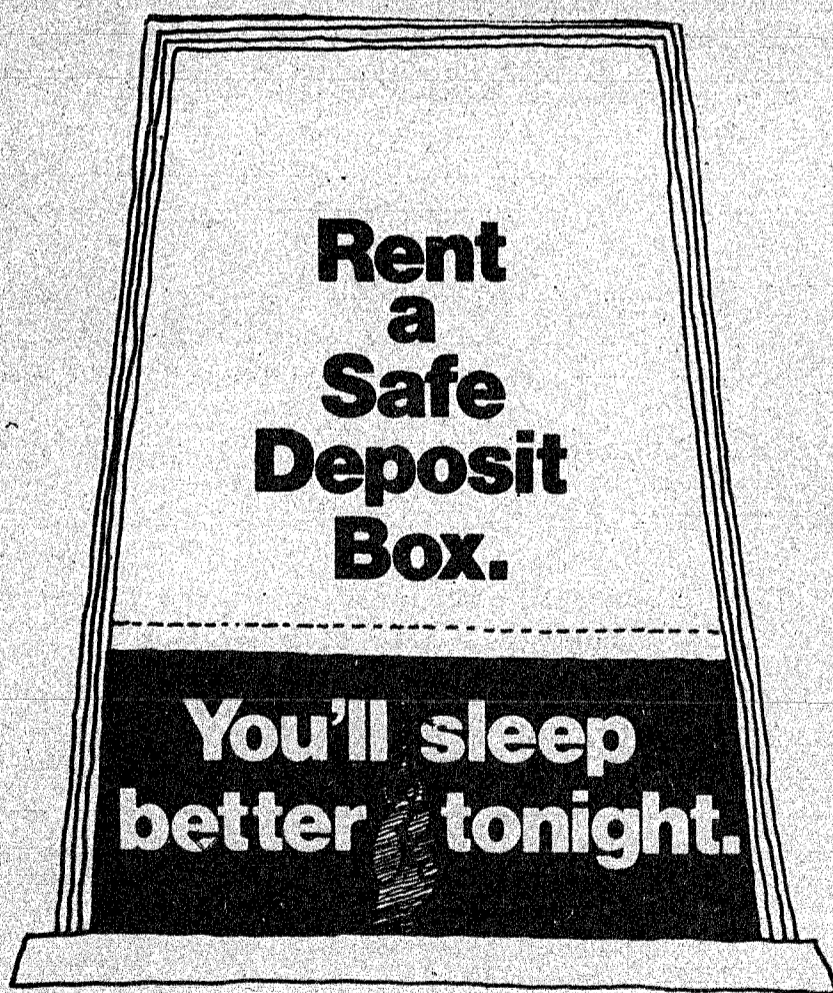

In Our Opinion

AN UNEASY WORLD watched and listened as a cease-fire was signed by the governments of the United States, North Vietnam, South Vietnam and the Viet Cong last Saturday, and the signing was watched with apprehension.

We have learned from bitter experience that the communist mind is certainly different from our own, and that they can be trusted only when the occasion fits their needs or wants.

Even after the time set for the cease fire there was some fighting still going on, and our hope is that the troops of countries who will referee the cease fire will soon be in place to enforce the terms of the agreement.

Many of us can remember the cease fire in Korea and how many times contact between the enemies flared into minor skirmishes afterwards.

However, the main item of concern is whether the communists want to stop the fighting or just to get the United States out of the country so they can continue with less resistance.

From experience, we have learned that the communist is a fanatic. He cares little for human life, including his own, and his promises are about as dependable as that of any other criminal. He will agree to anything that will aid his cause and then renege on those promised the first time they don't suit his objective.

Regardless of all the criticism the President received in his handling of the war, he used the only method that the reds understand—force.

Teddy Roosevelt once said "Speak softly and carry a big stick" and that is just what they will go by. As long as we are strong and show our willingness to stop them where they strike, they will stay back. But once we show a sign of weakness the storm begins.

We hope we are wrong, but we cannot be optimistic about the future as far as the Communists are concerned.

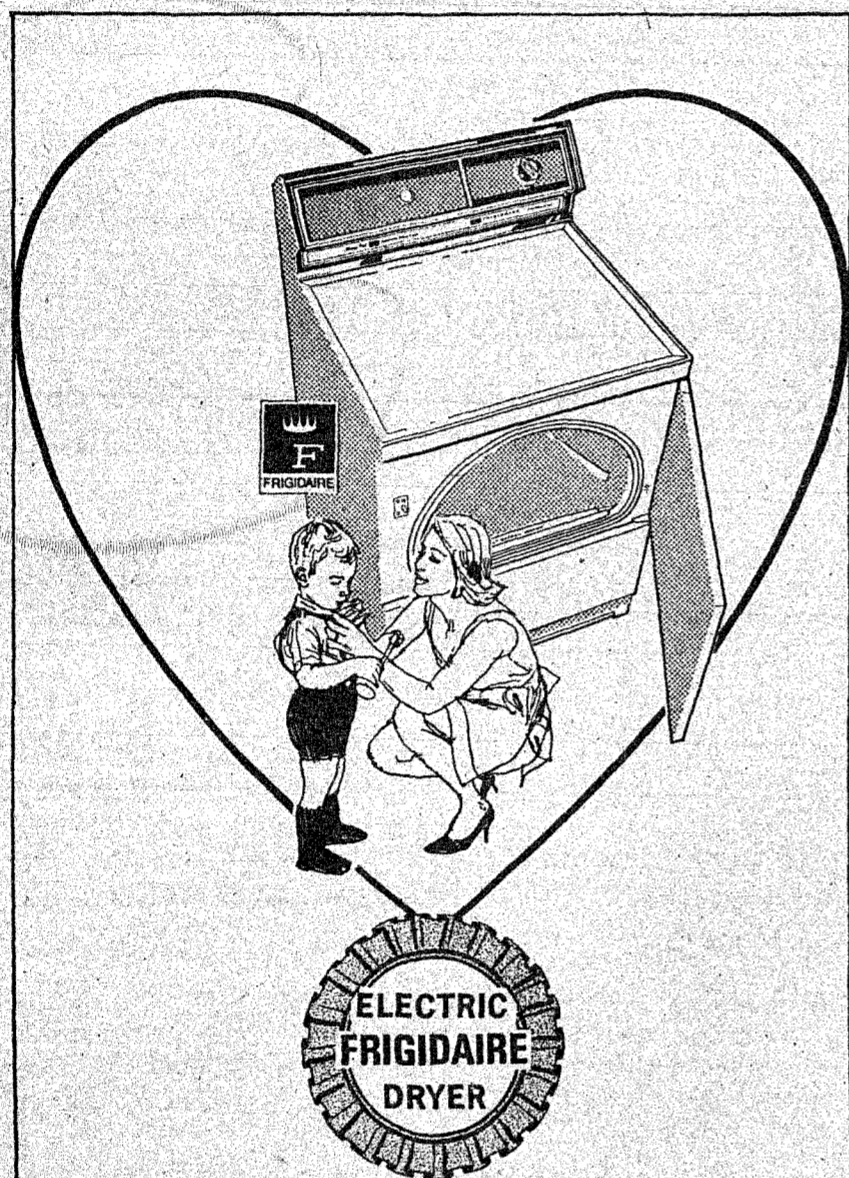

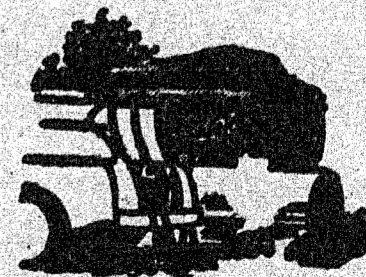

PAPA'S DAUGHTER

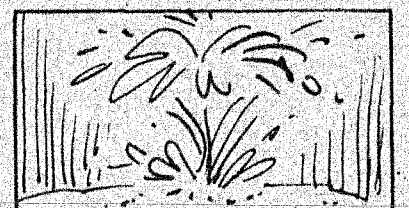
BY Thyra Ferre Bjorn

Blue-eyed, a dreamer, a troublemaker, Button Franzon was never out of mischief as a child almost never out of love as a young girl. Finally, long after she really fell in love and married, when she was wife and mother, cook and homemaker, she found the secret of self-realization.

The story of Papa's Daughter opens in Swedish Lapland, the northernmost province of Sweden, five years after the turn of the century. In Pastor Franzon's household, the second child, Charlotta Maria (nickname Button), was "A Sinner." Led into mistakes by a too-fertile imagination, she collected swear words, she stole, she lied. She put a head of cabbage on her pillow and sneaked out at night to meet her boyfriend. Then the Franzon family moved to America where things were different. Button met and married Eric Bjork.

This is the warm, romantic story of a child in Swedish Lapland who had a dream, and of a woman in the United States who dared to follow that dream through both joy and a dramatic, guilt-ridden sorrow to its fulfillment.

Thyra Ferre Bjorn herself was born in a small village in Swedish Lapland. Like the Franzon family, there were four sisters and four brothers and their father was the pastor of the local church. She came to America with her family in 1924. She is married to Robert J. Bjorn, also a native of Sweden, and has two daughters and four grandchildren.

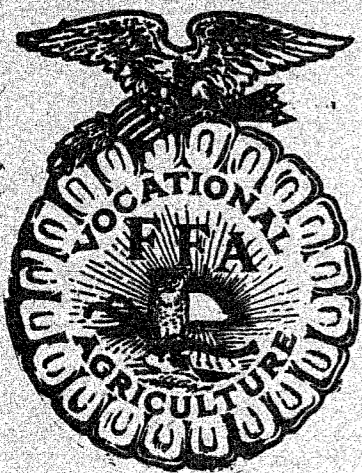

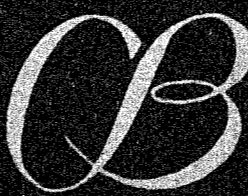

Driving Course Now Enrolling Local People

Final opportunity to enroll in the proposed Defensive Driving Course has been set for February 10, 1973. The course is set for Thursday and Friday evenings, February 22 and 23 and will run from 6:00 to 10:00 each evening. The course will be held in the classroom of the new vocational building.

Under terms of the insurance regulations drivers who complete the course are entitled to 10 percent reduction in some insurance premiums. The reduction covers premiums for coverage of moving accidents but does not cover damage by hailstorm, flood and other acts of nature. Since persons under 25 who have completed the public school driver training course are already entitled to a 10 percent reduction, no additional reduction can be earned through the defensive driving course. Nor can duplicate reductions be earned on the same vehicle by two or more persons.

A minimum of 25 persons must be enrolled before the course can be offered. A fee of \$10.00 is charged by the Education Service Center, Region XV for each enrollee. It is required that the course be repeated at three years intervals to reinstate the certificate to receive the insurance discount.

Eleven people have already notified the school that they will attend the local defensive driving course. It is hoped that fourteen more people will call the school office (348-3136) and place their names on the list of those who will definitely take the course.

In Our Opinion

AN UNEASY WORLD watched and listened as a cease-fire was signed by the governments of the United States, North Vietnam, South Vietnam and the Viet Cong last Saturday, and the signing was watched with apprehension.

We have learned from bitter experience that the communist mind is certainly different from our own, and that they can be trusted only when the occasion fits their needs or wants.

Even after the time set for the cease fire there was some fighting still going on, and our hope is that the troops of countries who will referee the cease fire will soon be in place to enforce the terms of the agreement.

Many of us can remember the cease fire in Korea and how many times contact between the enemies flared into minor skirmishes afterwards.

However, the main item of concern is whether the communists want to stop the fighting or just to get the United States out of the country so they can continue with less resistance.

From experience, we have learned that the communist is a fanatic. He cares little for human life, including his own, and his promises are about as dependable as that of any other criminal. He will agree to anything that will aid his cause and then renege on those promised the first time they don't suit his objective.

Regardless of all the criticism the President received in his handling of the war, he used the only method that the reds understand—force.

Teddy Roosevelt once said "Speak softly and carry a big stick" and that is just what they will go by. As long as we are strong and show our willingness to stop them where they strike, they will stay back. But once we show a sign of weakness the storm begins.

We hope we are wrong, but we cannot be optimistic about the future as far as the Communists are concerned.

A brief review of one of the books is given as follows:

PAPA'S DAUGHTER BY Thyra Ferre ' Bjorn

Blue-eyed, a dreamer, a troublemaker, Button Franzon was never out of mischief as a child almost never out of love as a young girl. Finally, long after she really fell in love and married, when she was wife and mother, cook and homemaker, she found the secret of self-realization.

The story of Papa's Daughter opens in Swedish Lapland, the northernmost province of Sweden, five years after the turn of the century. In Pastor Franzon's household, the second child, Charlotta Maria (mickname Button), was "A Sinner." Led into mistakes by a too-fertile imagination, she collected swear words, she stole, she lied. She put a head of cabbage on her pillow and sneaked out at night to meet her boyfriend. Then the Franzon family moved to America where things were different. Button met and married Eric Bjork.

This is the warm, romantic story of a child in Swedish Lapland who had a dream, and of a woman in the United States who dared to follow that dream through both joy and a dramatic, guilt-ridden sorrow to its fulfillment.

Thyra Ferre ' Bjorn herself was born in a small village in Swedish Lapland. Like the Franzon family, there were four sisters and four brothers and their father was the pastor of the local church. She came to America with her family in 1924. She is married to Robert J. Bjorn, also a native of Sweden, and has two daughters and four grandchildren.



The name "geyser" comes from the Icelandic word "geysa," meaning "to rush furiously."



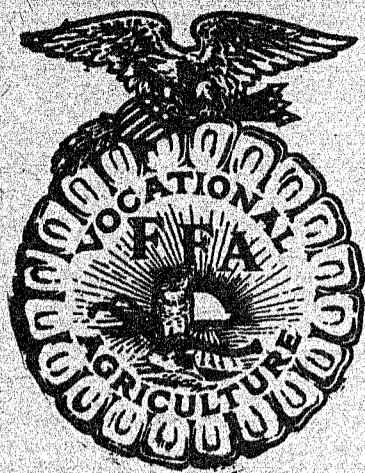
