Although the Santa Anna News is in its 88th year, we're still going strong! That's not the case of some weekly newspapers.

The Mitchell County News, published since 1920 at Loraine, closed up shop last week, according to George Parks, owner-publisher-editor of the neighboring Rosecoe Times.

The death knoll sounded for the small weekly paper as the town lost most of its businesses. The loss is, according to Mr. Parks, the trend of the times.

Even large public daily newspapers recognize the important place the hometown weekly plays in the lives of the residents.

It is the place where local merchants advertise their wares. And it serves mainly as a distributor of the news.

Mr. Parks noted some things that would be missed if there were no local paper.

Mrs. Anybody can tell about her visitors or that she went to visit out of town. A good student can get his name on the honor roll. Even elementary school boys and girls can be recognized for scoring two points in basketball games.

Vehicle Tags Sold Locally By B. Guthrie

Santa Anna motorists can pick up vehicle license plates at the Santa Anna Insurance Agency office again this year. Mrs. Billie Guthrie will be at the local substation each week day through March 31.

Sales started on Thursday, February 1 and have been running about as usual according to Mrs. Guthrie. About 1000 are expected to be sold here.

The 1973 license tags are white with black numerals. Plates sold locally have the letters DPY and start with the numerals 10. The license plates are the same price as last year, Mrs. Guthrie said.

If vehicle owners do not have the three-part computer form which they received in the mail, they may bring their vehicle title and last year's registration receipt to make the purchase.

Born in Jonesboro, Ark., January 21, 1883, Mrs. Niell moved from Santa Anna to Temple 20 years ago.

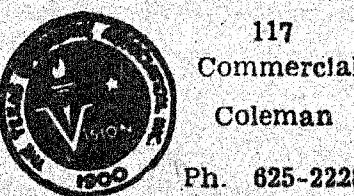

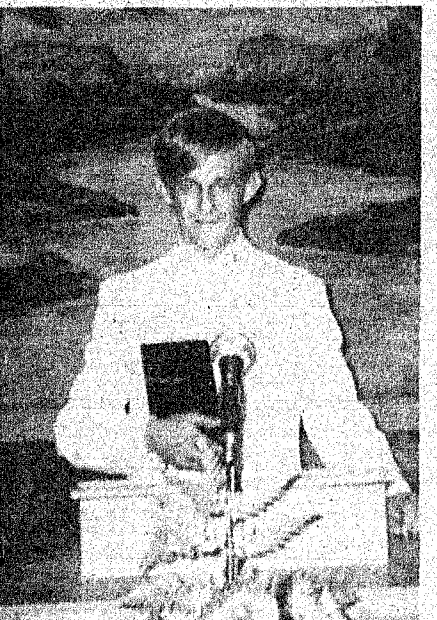

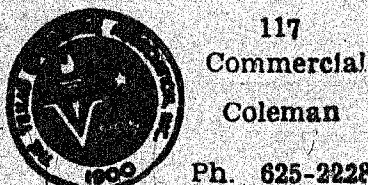

In Our Opinion

AFTER SOME NEWSMEN spent time in jail for refusing to disclose sources of news stories published, both Congress and the State Legislature have introduced legislation that would exempt the writer from such a disclosure.

Reasoning behind the move is that if a newsman can be forced to give his sources of information then those sources would be cut off. If he is protected for such a disclosure then he will be better able to get information and pass it on to the public.

In Congress several bills have been introduced and public hearings are going on now. At Austin, House Bill 10 has been reported out of committee with a favorable vote of 16 to 4. However proponents expect a tough fight on the floor.

There are pros and cons to the bill and as a newsman, this writer can appreciate both sides. A lot of people will give a reporter information if they feel that their identity will be protected. Otherwise they will clam up because they don't want to become involved with the outcome of the situation, especially if it involves criminal action in the courts.

Some time it is because they might be subject to some punishment because of their own involvement.

Regardless of their reasons for wanting to remain anonymous, if the information is available, the newsmen feel that the public has a right to know what is going on, even if their failure to disclose the source saves someone from prosecution.

A California newsman has just been released from jail on a contempt of court charge for refusing to divulge his source of information that actually helped law enforcement officers in solving a case. In this case he possible saved one man from prosecution but was of help in the prosecution of others.

Prosecution officials have been known to make deals with one who would turn state's evidence in order to be able to prosecute others. The principal is the same.

In most cases, if the news media is forced to give such information to a court, then their sources of information would dry up over night. Self preservation is the first law of nature.

PRESIDENT NIXON has submitted his budget proposal for the next fiscal year to Congress. Even though it has some pretty good cuts suggested, it still would cause us to operate at a deficit.

The big problem is that there are so many built-in expenditures that the President cannot cut out that if he recommends a balanced budget, the cuts in domestic spending would be enormous. But there has to come a time that we spend only what we take in. The interest on the national debt is a whopping amount by itself, and that is a portion of the budget that can't be cut. The problem is figuring how to pay any of it off.

In private business, one who operated that way would have a day of reckoning with his banker and would suddenly find himself out of business. But I guess we can't foreclose on the government.

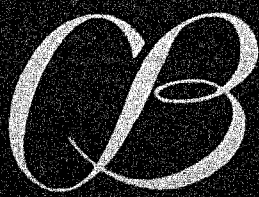

S.A. Post Office Is Issuing The Park 'Passports'

Two new special passports are available for sale or issuance at the Santa Anna post office and at other offices throughout the region.

Known as the Golden Eagle Passport and the Golden Age Passport, the wallet size permits, provide entry to areas of the National Park System where entrance fees are charged.

The Golden Egle passport, which sells for ten dollars, admits the bearer and persons accompanying him in a single private noncommercial vehicle to areas in any of the 53 National Park Systems where entrance fees are charged. The permit is non-transferable and does not cover special recreation use fees that may be charged within the area.

The Golden Age Passport is issued free of charge to persons 62 years of age or over. It must be applied for in person so that proof of age can be established. This permit provides the same entry privileges as the Golden Eagle permit and in addition provides the bearer a 50 per cent discount on special recreation use fees. It is also non-transferable.

Neither of these passports cover charges by private concessionaires operating within Federal recreation areas.

Suitable identification such as drivers license or birth certificate can be used to establish proof of age when applying for the Golden Age permit.

The Golden Eagle Passport can save money for the frequent visitor to any one or more of the National Park System areas charging entrance fees.
