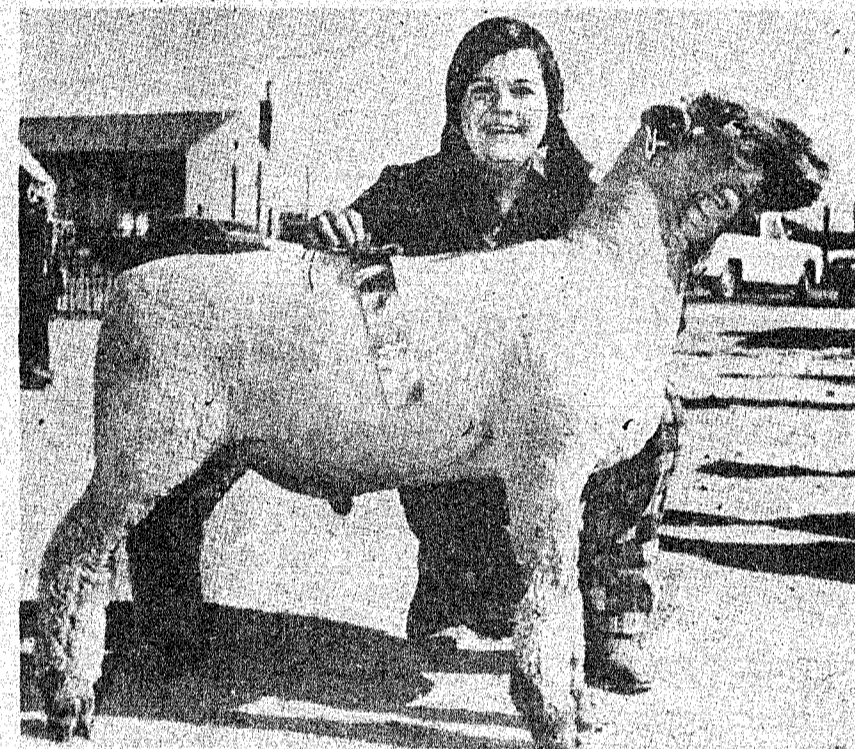

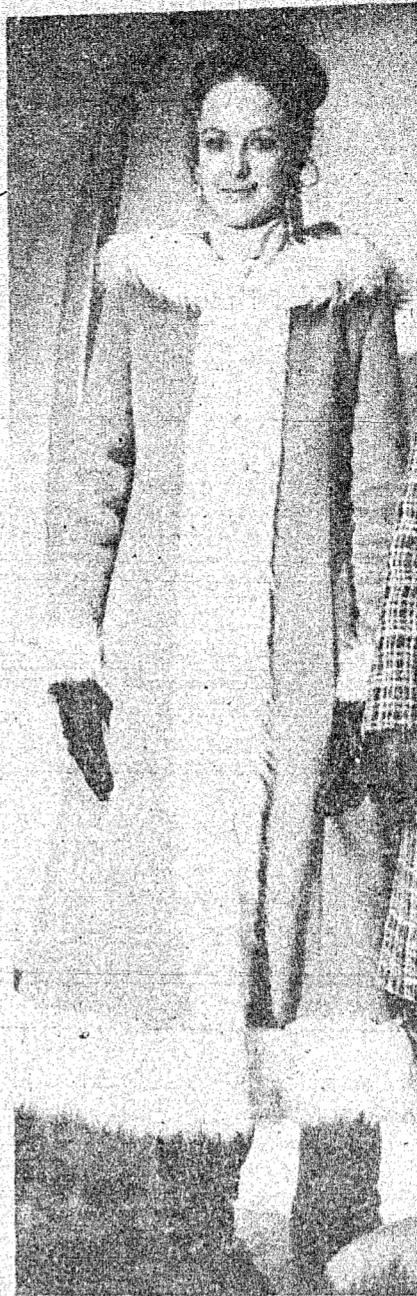
Born in Alvord May 8, 1880, he had lived most of his life in Santa Anna. He was a Baptist.
