



IT WOULD SEEM that Jean Westwood could realize that she was elected as national party chairman by a group of "losers" and would do the "gentlemanly" thing and resign.

She was elected by McGovern forces and the general election this year gave ample proof that the McGovern people do not carry the wishes of the Democratic party.

Robert Strauss, however, is more of the typical Democrat, although he may be more conservative than some of the eastern liberals, he is a good example of the "Texas" Democrat and most Texans will support him.

The Democratic Governor's caucus voted to ask Mrs. Westwood to resign and supported Strauss in its meeting Sunday, and that would indicate that a majority of the Democrats would also want the same result if the governors are representing the thought of their people.

Sen. McGovern suggested that both Mrs. Westwood and Strauss remove themselves from the race as they represent opposite wings of the party, but it is our belief that Strauss will represent far more party members than Mrs. Westwood could ever think of. The far left has consistently been defeated when they have gained control of party machinery and ran on the party ticket for national office. The more conservative have usually won. The big exception to that was Franklin D. Roosevelt, but compared to today's liberals, he was a piker. In his day he was a liberal, but things have changed since 1932. What one would call liberal during that time is pretty conservative today.

Predicting what the national Democratic committee will do is another thing however. They are not known to follow the dictates of the people too much. It will depend on their own ideology and not necessarily what the grass roots wants.

Political parties are somewhat like governments. They do not learn from experience. Our own country is a prime example of doing just what history has shown will not work.

How many countries have tread the path that we are following and found to their dismay that big government, big welfare, big taxes and catering to the radical element is the beginning of the end.

Let's hope we learn before it is too late.



Disaster areas receive their share from funds gathered in this way. Large vans are equiped with food and clothing, ready to go out to great disasters on a moment's notice. The Santa Anna church has helped to keep the yans supplied.



These prices are in accordance with the National Wool Act as amended by the Agricultural Act of 1970 which requires that the support shall be at the above levels for each of the three marketing years through the end of 1973.

Pulled wool will continue to be supported at a level comparable to the incentive price for shorn wool through payments on unshown lambs.

As in past years shorn wool payments will be based on a percentage of each producer's returns from sales. The percentage will be that required to raise the national average price received by all producers from shorn wool up the announced incentive price of 72 cents a pound.

Mohair payments will be calculated in a manner similar to wool.

Payments to producers on the 1973 calendar year marketings will be made beginning in April 1974. Applications for such payments must be filed not later than January 31, 1974. Applications for such payments must be filed not later than January 31, 1974, in the Department of Agriculture's county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation offices.

Farmers and ranchers are reminded that outstanding REAP practices must be completed this year in order to get credit under this year's program. If it is not completed, it will be cancelled and a new application made under

"Sea Jade" By Phyllis A. Whitney


