A former Santa Anna minister, Rev. Hal Wingo of San Antonio, died last Wednesday, November 22, in a San Antonio hospital following a heart attack. Rev. Wingo had been hospitalized about a week at the time of his death.

Rev. Wingo was pastor of the First Baptist Church during the 1940's, serving for a period of seven and one-half years. He and his family resided in San Antonio for many years and he had been in failing health in recent months.

Funeral services were held Monday in San Antonio and burial was in Wolfe City on Tuesday.

Survivors include his wife of San Antonio; one son, Hal, Jr., a journalist with Life Magazine; one daughter, Nancy, a missionary teacher in Lebanon. A local survivor is a niece, Mrs. Norman Hosch.

Mounties Lose Bi-District Bid To Top Ranked Mason Punchers

The Mason Cowpunchers retained their number one ranking in Class A football Saturday night as they defeated the Santa Anna Mountaineers 32-0. The 'Punchers took an early lead and by halftime had a 19 point margin.

In the third period of play the Mountaineers drove to the Mason four yard line but could not get to the goal line. Mountie quarterback David Horner led in offense while Rocky Dean, linebacker, led the defense.

The Mountaineers got to the bi-district playoff after winning the District 10-A championship with a perfect 5-0 record. The loss Saturday night left the Mountaineers with a 7-4 season record and the second district championship in as many years.

The rugged Mason defense limited Santa Anna to just 134 yards while they made 323 yards.

Mason will meet Blooming Grove Friday night for the regional tilt. Mason has a 10-1 record for the year and entered the playoffs after defeating Sonora, Class A defending champions, in a district game earlier in the season.

Winning the District 10-A championship was a cinderella story for the Mountaineers who were picked at the bottom of the list in pre-season polls. Santa

Anna moved into Class A this year after two seasons in Class B. With 116 enrolled in the local high school, the 1972 football squad numbers only 23.

The town and community are proud of the 1972 Mountaineer football team and their coaches, J. A. Smelley and Larry Steele, for a successful season.

Open House at Day Care Center To Be Hosted by ESA Sorority

The Delta Omicron chapter, Epsilon Sigma Alpha, will host an open house at the Mountain City Day Care Center next Sunday afternoon, December 3, from 4 to 6 p. m.

The center, located at the Community Civic Center at the former Armory building, provides care for about ten preschool children each weekday and enables several young mothers to have outside employment.

The day care center opened on November 13 after getting approval through the Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. One full-time worker is provided by the federally funded CTO, and there is another full time worker and a part-time coordinator-supervisor.

Members of the ESA Sorority chapter will be on hand to greet visitors at the open house and to direct tours of the new facility. Workers and children will also be on hand to greet visitors.

In conjunction with the open house there will be a gift tea for the center. Items needed have been listed as sheets and blankets for baby beds, wash cloths, dress-up cloths, toys, books and records for the children's entertainment. Also needed is playground equipment, high chairs and trading stamps to be exchanged for other needed items.

New or used items will be welcomed by the center. Everyone is invited to attend the open house and gift tea next Sunday.

Mrs. W. Taylor Wheeler, 86, was buried in Santa Anna Friday November 24, after memorial services at the United Methodist Church. Rev. Louis Shambeck, pastor of the church, officiated at the services.

Mrs. Wheeler, a long-time resident of the community, died Tuesday November 21, in Dansforth Hospital in Texas City. She had resided in a Texas City nursing home in recent months.

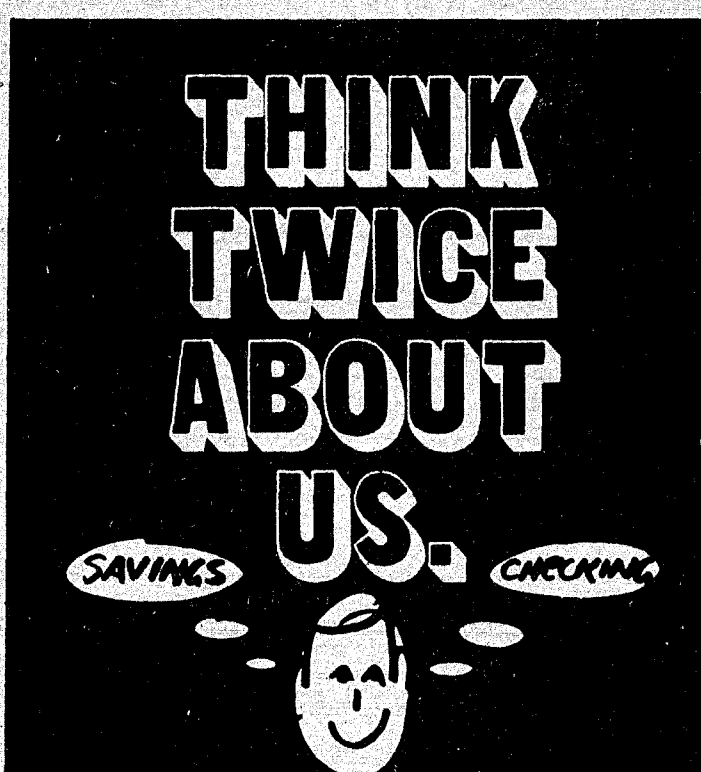

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In Our Opinion

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENTS all over the United States were left without funds from the federal government when Congress adjourned and there is no chance of a remedy to the situation before they convene in January.

The bad thing for Texas is that the State Highway Department had been working ahead and already had projects planned for fiscal 1973 that are awaiting authorization. Texas had some \$50 million in construction planned.

The big fight over funds is the attempt to divert highway funds to rail transit by the Secretary of Transportation, John Volpe.

Texas has some of the best highways in the United States and has used a combination of state and federal funds to a good advantage in building the system. The money has been used very competently and consequently the state is better off as far as highways is concerned than most other states. We have very few toll roads and many freeways that both residents and tourists alike can enjoy.

The backers of the Transit system idea are trying to take highway trust fund money and give help to five per cent of the people at the expense of 95 per cent.

Texas was working ahead on federal-aid projects as were several other states and now they are in a quandry because they have no federal fund and Texas is \$50 million in debt.

So unless Congress gets on the ball and gets around to passing a federal aid highway bill in January, we can forget out highway system for another year.

THE PRESIDENT announced Monday that he had no plans for a major governmental post for John Connally, and that is not a surprise, as most people feel Connally wants to quietly bide his time for a while after leading the Democrats for Nixon in the last campaign.

Connally is probably the best representative of the feelings and beliefs of most Texas Democrats, but the fact that he has served in the Republican administration would cause some Democrats to refuse to support him.

To our way of thinking, it takes a good man to put country above political ambition or political party. We cannot see the attitude taken by some that the party is always right regardless of who heads it. The last campaign was a prime example of what can happen when the wrong people get control of party machinery. That is the worst defeat of the Democrats since we can remember and that is quite a few years.

As far as we are concerned, when he enters politics again, we can support him with a clear conscience.

United States Savings Bond sales in Coleman County totaled \$34,975 during the month of October. Sales for the ten-month period were \$136,733 which represents 114 percent of the 1972 goal for the county, according to County Bond Chairman Robert I. Bowen of Coleman.

October sales in Texas totaled \$17,851,277 compared to sales of \$15,480,457 during the same period of 1971—an increase of 15.3 percent. Ten-month sales totaled \$177,041,956 for 89.6 percent of the sales goal of \$197.5 million.

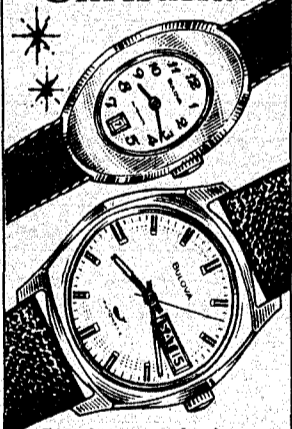

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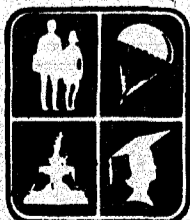

Homemaker of Tomorrow Test To Be Given at SAHS Tuesday

College scholarships totaling \$111,000 will be at stake next Tuesday when high school seniors here and throughout the country join in the written knowledge and attitude examination of the 1973 Betty Crocker Search for American Homemakers of Tomorrow. This year, for the first time in the 19-year history of the educational program, boys are eligible to participate.

Scores on the 50-minute test will form the basis for selection of a Homemaker of Tomorrow here. This student will receive a specially designed award from General Mills, sponsor of the Betty Crocker Search, and will, together with all other school

Personal observation and interviews during the tour will be added factors in the selection, from the state winners, of the 1973 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and three runners-up.

Registration Required After 18th Birthday

Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, has again reminded young men of their obligation to register with Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday.

Glantz stressed that the requirement to register will continue in full effect whether the all-voluntary military force becomes a reality or not. Every native born and resident-alien young man is required to present himself for registration from 30 days before to 30 days after his 18th birthday. If, for any reason, a young man has failed to register he should do so immediately to escape the penalty of Federal law. Failure to register may result in a fine, imprisonment, or both, under provisions of the Military Selective Service Act.

Young men may register at the office of the local board near their home or place of residence, or may be registered by volunteer registrars who are located in most high schools or other similarly convenient locations. Registrars in the Coleman County area are Ford Barnes, Mrs. Mary E. Sewell, and Mrs. Eileen Hightower, of Coleman.

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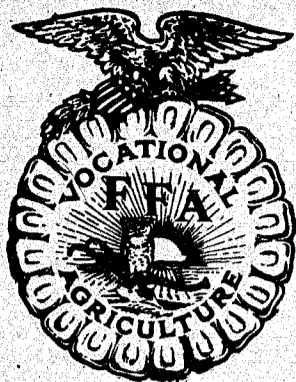

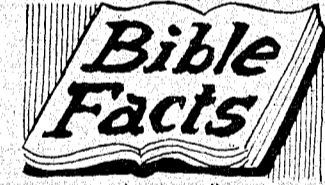
