### Santa Anna VFD Aids At Coleman Tuesday Morning

Two trucks from the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department and about 10 firemen were dispatched to Coleman Tuesday for a major fire that completely gutted the Coleman Manufacturing Company, formerly Ginright Manufacturing Co.

An explosion at the company late Tuesday morning sent flames through the large building, and the inside of the business was completely burned although the walls of the building remained standing.

The business manufactures clothing and has recently been expanding and adding new equipment. According to reports, no one was injured in the explosion and fire.

Coleman firemen received another call to a house fire Tuesday at about the same time of the manufacturing company fire. A truck and firemen from Ballinger also assisted in controlling the major blaze.

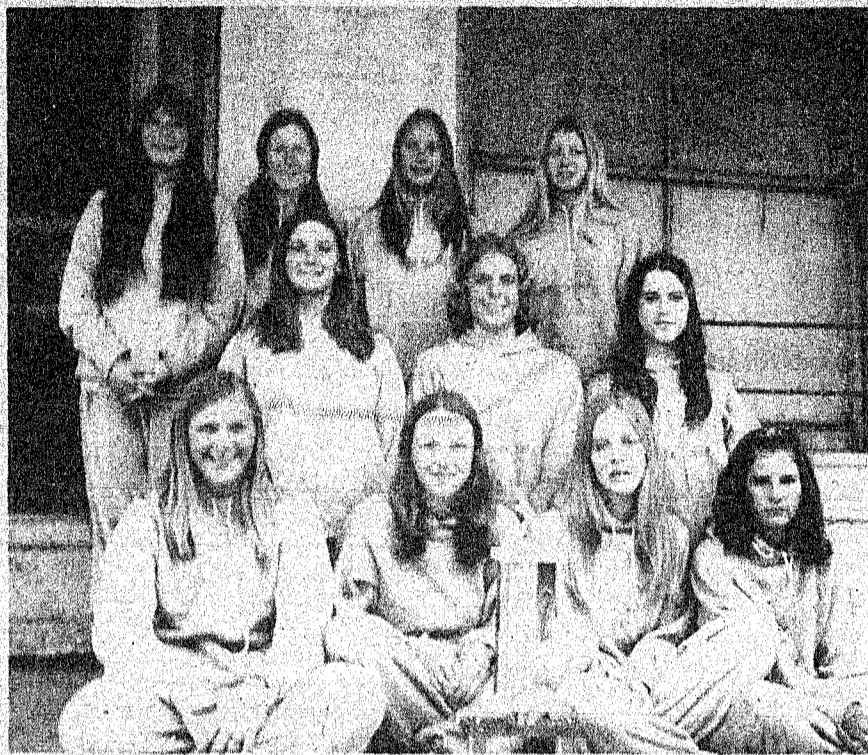
The March rainfall brings the 1973 total to 5.95 inches.

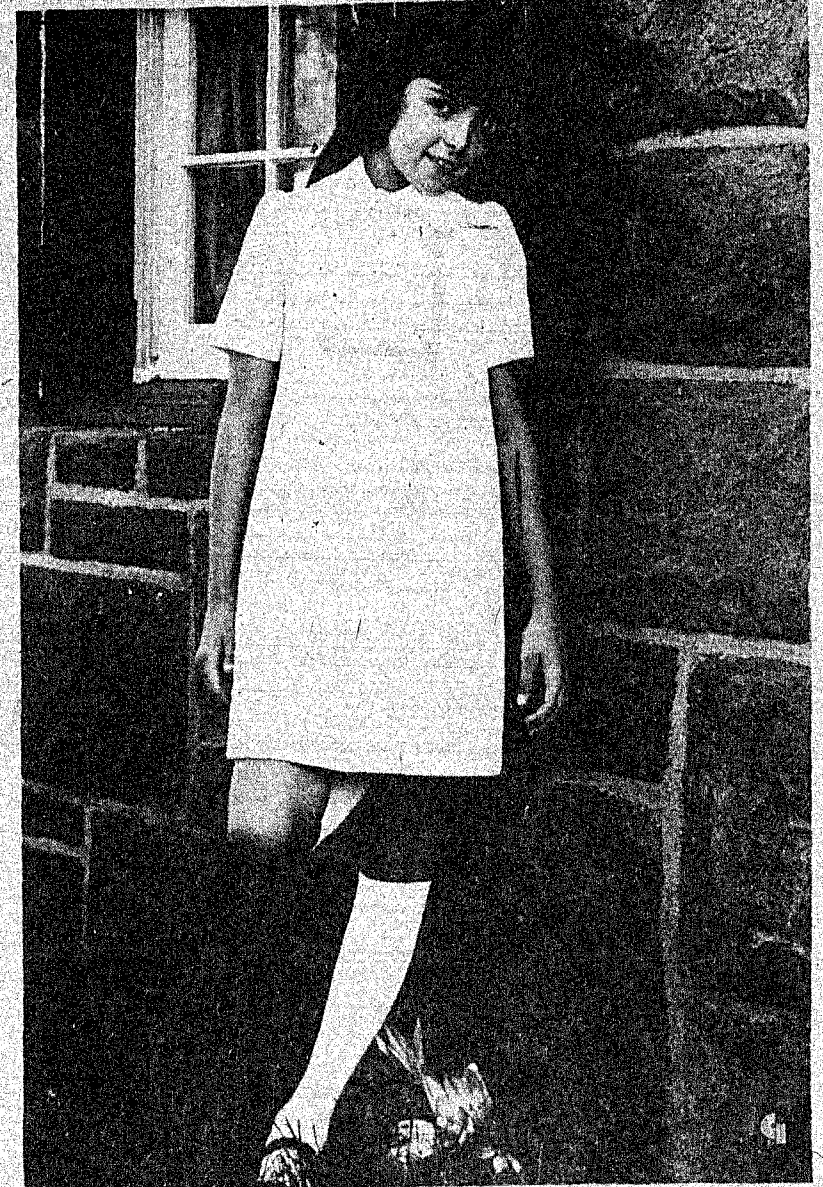
Several members of the local Lions Club are expected to attend the two-day convention.

**In Our Opinion**

**BIG GOVERNMENT**, like big business, is a very complicated organization. Even the simplest program grows into a vast bureaucratic organization and takes a vast number of employees to handle all the reports, and other paper work to make it work.

The Congress can pass a simple bill, concise and to the point, but when it gets into the bureau that handles it, then the work begins. A recent order from the federal government dealing with the price of cabbage contained 26,911 words. Congress can write one page of law, in clear and simple terms, only to see the bureaucrats transform that one page into 50 pages of guidelines and regulations that will confound the public and never really reflect what Congress intended in the first place.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen of Texas reflected: "The Lord's Prayer has only 56 words; Lincoln's Gettysburg Address only 266; the Ten Commandments has 297 words; and the Declaration of Independence only 300." The bureaucrats could have a field day with them and probably expand them into three million words without any trouble.

The public loses in two ways. It not only pays for the obscure and superfluous guidelines, produced at considerable tax expense in Washington, but also pays for local lawyers and experts to interpret those guidelines.

One estimate says it costs the government \$18 billion a year to print, shuffle and store all its paper work, and in turn costs small business another \$18 billion a year to fill out the different forms which includes Internal Revenue forms, unemployment forms, health forms, accident forms, Social Security forms, sales tax forms, and quarterly this and monthly that forms, until even in a small business, it takes almost a full time employee to make out all the reports that the government requires. And that doesn't count what they have to pay along with these forms, matching Social Security, unemployment insurance, various fees etc.

The result is that many small business are so hit by the expense of these procedures until they either go out of business or merge with large corporations who have accountants and lawyers hired full time for this type of thing. The larger business can hire these experts and then pass the cost on to the consumer.

Senator Bentsen recently co-sponsored legislation that would limit paper work and reporting on federal legislation thus no longer giving the bureaucrats unlimited authority to require whatever documents and papers they want to enforce the laws Congress approves. Committee hearings on this bill revealed hundreds of instances in which government paper work became an unmanageable burden for Americans in business or trying to go into business for themselves.

Nothing could probably help a small business man more than being relieved of this paper work and reporting chore.

### ASCS NEWS

Certification is the final farm program paper work for the farmer participating in the 1973 feed grain, wheat, and cotton programs, the last step preceding payment.

Because certification is a final action by the producer, he must be careful to make no mistakes. Once he has certified, he cannot adjust the acreage he has certified to.

When a producer certifies, he reports exactly what acreage he has in program crops, what acreage he has in set-aside, that he is maintaining the farm's conserving base, and that he has complied with all program regulations and will continue to comply throughout the year.

A certification mistake can result in loss of some or all of the farm program payment.

Measurement and set-aside inspection service offered at cost by the ASCS office can be a real money-saver for farmers.

Both services carry a guarantee that if the producer stays within the measured and staked area and keeps to his designated set-aside, no penalties will be imposed on him if it is later found there was a mistake in the measurement or inspection service.

Payment will be made beginning July 1 to all producers who have certified program compliance. A producer may come in to the ASCS county office at any time up until July 1 to certify, just as soon as his program crops are planted and he knows he is in compliance with the programs he has signed up for.

The earlier the better for the producer since it helps assure early payment for him, but a producer with a question about any detail of certification should check it out at the ASCS county office before he certifies.

All producers who signed up for the feed grain, wheat, or cotton programs and who want to qualify for program payments are required to certify program compliance. This applies to producers who enrolled in the zero set-aside plans just as much as to those with set-aside acreage.

The dance will begin at 8:00 P. M. and dancers and spectators are invited to attend.

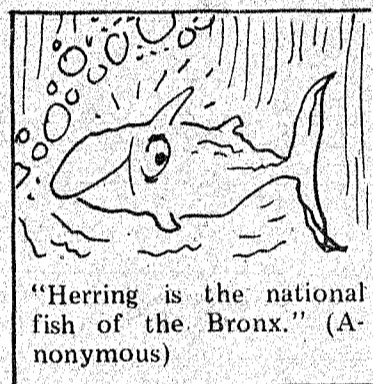

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# STATE Capital NEWS

By BILL BOYKIN



AUSTIN—The complex job of rewriting the 97-year-old State Constitution began officially last week with initial work sessions of the new Constitutional Revision Commission.

Commissioners outlined plans for a series of public hearings in 18 areas.

The hearings will be held between now and next fall in Houston, Dallas-Fort Worth, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, McAllen, San Angelo, Lubbock, Longview, Wichita Falls, El Paso, Amarillo, Abilene, Midland-Odessa, Laredo, Tyler, Lufkin, Beaumont-Port Arthur-Orange and Austin.

Chairman Robert W. Calvert, former Texas Supreme Court judge, said the hearings may "determine largely whether people accept the final product."

The 37-member Commission heard advice from a large group of experts, then divided into seven sub-committees to study specific areas of the Constitution which one of the advisors labeled an "appalling" document.

Revision Commissioners received these key bits of advice:

Do the best job they can of streamlining the Constitution, but be prepared for the legislature to "water down their recommendations."

Don't try "to solve the problems but make clear who solves the problems."

Sweep out detailed property tax provisions... get rid of the grants and loans prohibition and provide "home rule" for counties.

The commission will be backed up by a statewide advisory committee.

Revision drafts must be completed by November. The Legislature will convene January 1 as a constitutional convention.

**OPEN MEETINGS BILL PASSES**—An amended version of legislation to strengthen state laws requiring that the business of state government be conducted in public has been finally passed by the Senate.

A much-revised version of the bill to shield newsmen's sources of information, meanwhile, advanced to the Senate calendar with Jurisprudence Committee blessing.

The Texas Joint Media Committee representatives and "Common Cause," the people's lobby, termed the open meetings

bill as passed by the Senate an improvement over both present law and the Jurisprudence Committee bill.

One controversial section of the latter was amended to allow closed sessions on "negotiated contracts" only for gifts or donations to the government. The bill would allow private sessions of governing bodies to discuss purchase, exchange, lease or value of real estate—but not the sale of property. Also stricken from the Committee bill was a provision for closed sessions with attorneys on "possible avoidance of litigation."

Remaining as exemptions from open meetings guarantees are a wide range of discussions personnel matters including employment evaluation."

The revised shield bills would allow forced disclosure of information and sources on mandamus by the State Supreme Court which could be sought by any individual to prevent "substantial harm or injury... or substantial injustice."

**VEE REVACCINATION URGED**—Texas Veterinary Medical Association called for immediate revaccination of all horses for Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE).

The Association said 100 per cent immunity can be established and reservoirs of the disease eliminated. It urged revaccination of all horses vaccinated in 1971, vaccination of all newborns, those six months of age and older and those coming into the state. Length of immunity is uncertain.

**COURTS SPEAK**—Persons who have sexual relations with wives or husbands of others can be sued for damages, the State Supreme Court held.

The High Court turned down an appeal of a Dallas lawyer who lost his license after a jury found he

asked a client for \$500 more than his legal fee, allegedly to prosecute an assistant district attorney.

The Supreme Court set a hearing April 25 over whether Austin could sell 32 acres of park land to a school district without an approving vote of local residents.

The Court of Criminal Appeals overturned convictions for sale of heroin (an 1,800 year sentence from Ector County) and possession of marijuana (25 year sentence from Tarrant County) due to judicial error.

A Lipscomb County youth ordered fined and jailed for aggravated assault on a deputy sheriff he called a "pig" won a new trial on appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals, which held the boy's contention that he was resisting what he considered unlawful arrest should have been presented to the trial jury.

**AGOPINIONS**—A bill (HB 168) proposing to give the governor budgetary authority over state agencies and require submission of quarterly expenditure plans is unconstitutional, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

Hill said, however, the legislature might confer on the governor's discretion to approve or disapprove expenditures of funds appropriated to restructured agencies discharging only duties which could be constitutionally discharged by the governor.

In other recent opinions, Hill held:

A district judge has discretion to grant a prisoner credit for pretrial time spent in jail between trial and final conviction and must give credit for time spent in jail awaiting determination of appeal. However, he cannot reduce a sentence due to good behavior and prisoner reform.

Hunting club employees can carry firearms but unless they are law enforcement officers have no more right to enforce the law or to protect the club property than any other individual.

An individual convicted of a felony three years ago, and is now on probation, is not qualified to be appointed a deputy sheriff.

**FIRMS TO BE HONORED**—Five industrial firms will receive the governor's industrial

expansion award for 1972 at a conference her May 10.

Selected to receive the 1972 awards at the Governor's Conference on Industrial Expansion are Stemco Manufacturing Company of Longview, Redman Mobile Homes Inc. of Burleson, Lanchart Homes of Childress, Can-Tex Industries of Mineral Wells and Weber Aircraft of Gainesville.

All were named by local chambers of commerce and selected by Texas Industrial Commission based on economic and civic contributions to their communities during last year.

**APPOINTMENTS**—James F. Ray was named executive director of the Constitutional Revision Commission, taking a leave of absence as staff director of the Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations.

Mrs. Donald E. Redmond of Austin was selected as Texas Mother of the Year for 1973.

### SHORT SNORTS

Gov. Dolph Briscoe went to Washington to protest that new federal regulations would destroy the social services program in Texas for non-welfare recipients and increase welfare rolls.

A bill to set up a "little Hoover commission" on reorganization of the executive branch of state government finally won Senate approval and now goes to the House for consideration.

New state bank charters are being sought in Houston, Austin and Comanche.

Of 7,572 roadside park facilities in the nation, 1,159 are located in Texas, according to a U. S. Department of Transportation survey.

The Sabinal Canyon area (1,280 acres) in Bandera and Real Counties has been purchased by the Parks and Wildlife Department for \$512,000.

August and September primary election dates received Senate approval.

City officials are urging Governor Briscoe to recall a bill granting collective bargaining rights to policemen and firemen for amendment.
