Funeral Held Here On Friday For Prominent Businessman

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at the First Baptist Church for Norman Hosch, 68, died suddenly at his home on Wednesday night. Burial was in the Santa Anna Cemetery under the direction of Henderson Funeral Home.

Rev. Bill Brewer, pastor of the church, officiated at the service assisted by Rev. Donald Hosch of Rising Star. Ken Mayhall of Abilene was soloist for the service.

Born in Santa Anna August 15, 1904, he was the son of the late Walter J. and Hester Hosch, pioneer Santa Anna family. He married Edith Verne Stephens April 26, 1940.

A member of the First Baptist Church and the Santa Anna Masonic Lodge, Hosch was a past president of the Santa Anna Lions Club and the Chamber of Commerce. He also served at one time on the local school board and was active in all the community activities.

Until his recent retirement he was a funeral director and co-owner of Hosch Funeral Home and associated with the Hosch Furniture Company.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Gary Hosch of Abilene; two brothers, Roscoe Hosch and Pat Hosch, both of Santa Anna; three sisters, Mrs. George Vaughan, Mrs. J. L. Boggus and Mrs. V. F. Carpenter, all of Santa Anna; and two granddaughters, Shannon and Shala Hosch of Abilene.

Pallbearers for the service were Charles Hosch and Mike Hosch, both of Santa Anna; Pascal Hosch and Patrick Hosch, both of Stephenville; George Vaughan of Kingsville; Malcom Marks of Houston; Kenneth Thurmond of Fort Worth, and James Lommax of Waco.

Santa Anna merchants closed their businesses Friday afternoon during the time of the funeral service in memory of the popular local businessman.

Routine Agenda Gets Attention By SA Trustees

The Santa Anna school board met on Tuesday night of last week for the regular monthly session. A. D. Pettit presided during the session which was attended by all members except Richard Horner.

Vernon Parnell led the opening prayer and minutes of the January meeting were read and approved. The status of the budget was reviewed by Sandra Cammack, school business manager.

Bills and accounts for the past month were approved for payment totaling \$3,552.

Mrs. C. D. Bruce was chosen as judge for the April 7 trustee election Mrs. Lorene Rice, Mrs. Rose Bass and Mrs. Don Clifton were named as clerks, and Mrs. Rodney Dean was named alternate.

Supt. Perry gave information on the professional contract bill now before the State Legislature and compared the proposed contract legislation with the continuing contracts used by the local school system.

Members of the board approved a three day holiday at Easter which will include Friday, April 20, Monday and Tuesday, April 23 and 24. The change in the school calendar was necessary after losing two school days due to bad weather.

Information was given on a new testing and evaluation program which will be used in the primary grades next year. Teachers in the program will be given special instruction for the program.

It was announced that the school improvement study committee would have their recommendations soon and that the school board will meet with the citizens group on Thursday night (tonight). The next regular session of the board will be on Tuesday, March 13.

Return Ballots To C of C Office

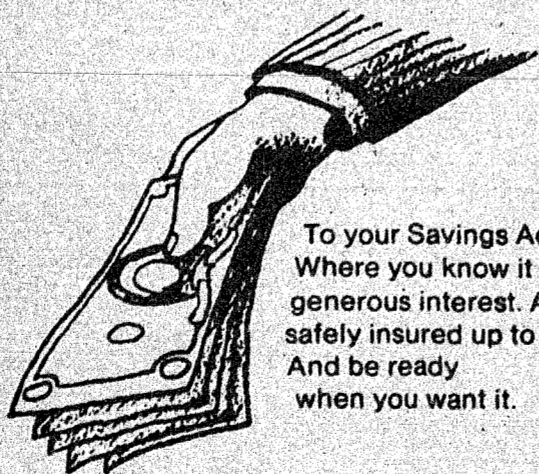
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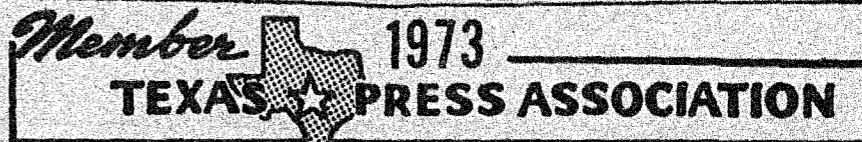
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In Our Opinion

AS MANY PEOPLE expected, fighting still goes on in Vietnam. As many as 170 contacts a day are reported and the peace-keeping teams still haven't even gotten organized.

Each side blames the other and as the observers are no where to be found, no one knows who starts what.

Ambassador Michel Gauvin, of Canada, chairman of the International Commission of Control and Supervision, admitted that the cease-fire was not working. However, he said the ICCS has decided to proceed with the deployment of the peace-keeping teams along the DMZ and at the subregional level.

It is hard for us to understand the thinking of the Oriental mind. Many believed from the beginning that as soon as the United States got out of the way the fighting would continue with business as usual. The Communists are not going to give up, and the South Vietnamese will fight back, so as it has been for 20 years, so it will be.

It is good that the United States got out of the fray, and we hope we stay out. We cannot win a "no-win" war and the politicians of this country are determined that this stay a political war and not a military one. If the United States had gone into this thing to win from the start, it would have been over a long time ago and more than likely a lot of lives would have been saved. But politics entered into it and so it ended up a "holding action" instead of a war.

The whole peace-keeping mission was completely un-organized from the beginning and it seem that it is taking them a long time to get any type of organization going. Could it be that they don't have their heart in it?

Some of them, Canada especially, didn't want the job in the beginning. They took it reluctantly and that is probably one of the reasons it is so slow in getting started.

However, regardless of the peace-keeping teams, we are convinced that the 170 or so sorties a day is just a lull in the fighting until things cool down a bit, then it will flare into a full-fledged war again.

Maybe by then the South will be able to hold their own and if we can keep them supplies with equipment and ammunition, maybe they can come out still free.

The past week or so has been very remarkable to be able to see the dear men who have been prisoners returning to their home land. And even though some don't look so well, most of the men seem to look well and be in real good spirits. As for myself, I can't imagine how good the men feel. Sunday I heard where the men who were landing in the Phillipines could not believe they were getting to come to America. They were so afraid it was some kind of a gag pulled on them.

It made me wonder, just really deep down, what the men who have been prisoners of war for as long as eight years will really think of we Americans when they get home? Everything has changed so much. People in America have changed, and we wonder if it is for the best. Those dear men seem so glad to be coming home. All are so clean-cut and neat. Hair cuts and freshly shaven.

Most of all, in lots of places what will meet their eyes when they go to public places? Have you ever wondered what they will think of the American people? Don't misunderstand me -- I love America, but I can't seem to love the way lots of people are doing in America, and I trust I will never get to a place in life where I will think there is no good people left. I dearly believe there are lots of good people still around, but so many who don't seem to care for themselves and certainly no one else.

I have done lots of thinking since the report came that the prisoners were coming home. I ask myself the question, "What am I doing to help make things better"? Someone somewhere surely must be failing to reach the goal set for us.

I feel very fortunate no personal friends or relatives of mine were listed among the missing. We still have so much to be thankful for.

Mr. Winter made his appearance again Saturday sending rain sleet and snow. Our community had very little snow and one-half inch of slow falling rain Saturday. We accept the moisture.

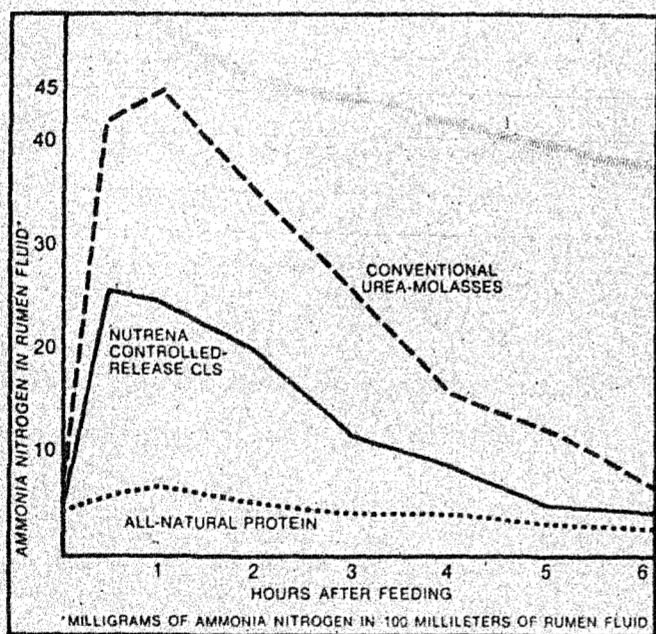

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ASCS NEWS

The decision was made on February 6, 1973, not to reseat 1972 crop farm stored loans for barley, corn, grain sorghum, oats, and rye. This action was taken in order to make available additional grainstocks to help meet strong market demands.

All crop year loans, both farm and warehouse stored barley, corn, grain sorghum, oats, rye, soybeans and wheat will not be extended beyond the current maturity dates.

The commodity loan program for this year has not officially been announced.

The farm stored oat loan program has been popular in Coleman County. In previous years the County Committee has approved as many as four hundred loans in one year. This gives the producer an opportunity to keep the grain on the farm and buy it back as it is needed. Currently we have approximately eight oat loans.

Farmers with current outstanding oat loans have until the first of May in which to redeem and or deliver the oats under these loans.

Final details of the reorganization plan of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, including an additional assistant secretary and realignment of responsibilities, will be announced the latter part of this month.

Responsibilities of the assistant secretary for international affairs and commodity programs remain unchanged. Agencies reporting to this assistant secretary are the Commodity Credit Corporation, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Export Marketing Service, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation and Foreign Agricultural Service. Assistant Secretary Carroll G. Brunthaver remains in this position.

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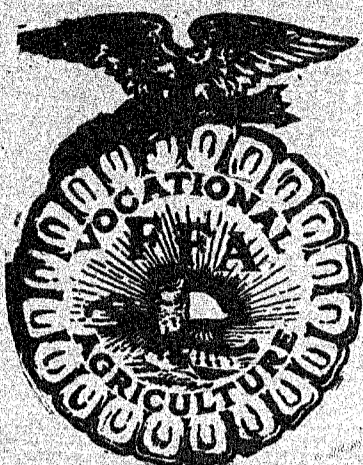
