S.A. Junior High Track Meet To Be Held Here On Friday

The Santa Anna Junior High Track Meet will be held Friday at the local athletic field. Eight teams will be participating including Early, Blanket, Rising Star, Richland Springs, Mozelle, Talpa-Centennial, Bangs and Santa Anna. Both boys and girls will take part in the events.

Field events will start at 2 p. m. and include shot put, high jump, broad jump, boys chinning and

pole vault and girls triple jump. Preliminaries in the running events will start at 4:30, and a two-hour break is scheduled between the preliminaries and the finals.

Finals will start at 7:30 p. m. and continue until 9 p. m.

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In Our Opinion

STAKES ARE HIGH in the battle to curb federal spending and it boils down to one thing—the integrity of the dollar.

If anyone would doubt the need to cut down on the rate the government is spending, all he would need to do is take a long look at the record.

Since 1960, social welfare spending has risen from \$52 billion annually to \$193 billion. Social insurance, including Medicare, is up from \$35.4 billion to \$61.4 billion in the past four years. Relief, in spite of good times, is up from \$6.5 billion to \$16 billion. Health and medical programs have increased from \$4.2 billion to \$5.9 billion, and veteran's aid has jumped from \$7.2 billion to \$11.4 billion.

Congress and the administration are at each other's throats over who is going to control the purse strings instead of getting together and trying to curb this run away splurge of federal tax money.

With the spending momentum that has been built up over the past several years, it will be nothing short of a miracle if the federal budget is ever tamed, but we have one alternative and that is tame it or go broke.

It is a certainty that if the tax burden on those few who pay taxes is made any harder than it is now, the time is coming soon when they will just have to close shop and join with those on welfare. Then who is going to furnish the money?

Researchers say that a decade ago the city of New York had 9.7 taxpayers for every one on welfare. Today the ratio is one welfare recipient to each 2.6 taxpayers, and the day is in sight when the ration will be one-to-one or less.

When the day comes that each taxpayer has to use half of what he makes to pay for someone else's living, then the time has come for him to join the other side.

This country was founded on the free enterprise system and it has worked better than any system of government in the world. But gradually over the years it has become a government of socialistic tendencies until a business has a hard time operating because of government interference.

Robin Hood, the story goes, robbed the rich and helped the poor. That made him a hero to the depressed peoples of the Sherwood Forest area. Our government isn't doing that. They are, in essence, robbing the industrious and helping the lazy. That doesn't set so well with those who are willing to work and accumulate for themselves.

Not only is it unfair to the workers, but it kills the incentive to try. Why should one work hard for what he gets and then have to split with one who won't work.

It is the old story of the ant and the grasshopper, and it is as true today as it was when the fable was written.

We would like to pass the word—those who would increase government spending are doing us no favor—and we know it!

Pallbearers for the service were G. K. Stearns, Jack Dockery, Rankin McIver, Grady McIver, Frank Wells and Jesse Earl York.

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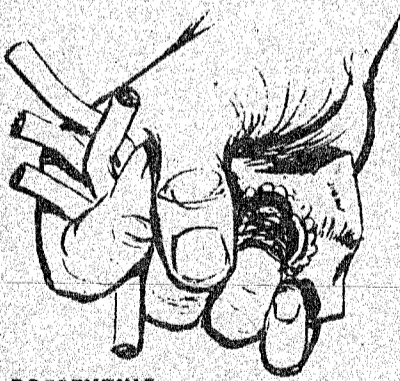

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ASCS NEWS

This is to remind producers that the final date for signing cotton, wheat and feed grain programs for this year's crops is Friday March 16. To be eligible for payment under any of these programs, it is necessary that an intention sheet be signed by this final date. Producers are not required to certify their crops at this time. Farmers signing intentions are not required to carry out the program. If the programs are not complied with, no payments will be made.

It is important that farmers having any ideal that they may comply with these programs sign an intention so they may receive payment if provisions of the program are carried out.

Land set-aside under the feed grain and additional wheat program must be of average productivity of the farm, free of brush, must be cropland and not severely eroded. Less productive land may be accepted at a reduced payment rate.

There is minimum and width rules on areas designated as set-aside. Generally, the set-aside which is less than the entire field must be at least five acres in size or may include the area between two terraces.

Farmers who have a conserving base must comply with the conserving base requirements and that is, the crop cannot be harvested from this area, however it can be grazed throughout the entire year.

The County Committee has changed their official meeting day from Tuesday to Wednesday of each week. They will meet at one o'clock in the afternoon.

Please observe the final dates listed below:

April 2 - Final date to sell, lease or transfer cotton
May 1 - Final date to certify to

wheat and barley acreage
May 1 - Final date to request small grain cover on set-aside acres

June 1 - Final date to plant feed grain

June 15 - Final date to plant cotton

July 1 - Final date for certifying feed grain, cotton and set-aside acreage.

The Department has made a decision not to reseal 1972 crop farm stored loans on barley, grain sorghum and oats.

1973 Loans will be available for these commodities at a rate to be announced later. The interest for these loans stored on the farm or in an approved warehouse will be 5 1/2 per cent per annum.

The County Committee may approve producers to construct grain storage bins under the five year repayment facility loan program. These loans bear interest at six percent per annum.

This is the time of year when many people have trouble with their fruit trees. Disease and insects usually play havoc with the fruit crops. In this situation, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." When fruit trees start blooming, it's a good idea to mix a fungicide and a safe insecticide such as malathion, and spray about every two or three weeks. This heads off disease and insect damage before it starts. Usually after a disease or insect pest has started to work the damage has been done, before the symptoms are even noticed. We have some bulletins giving formulations in our office.

How to help your child succeed
The most important thing any parent can do for a child at any age is to try and give him a good self-image. The way he sees himself, feels about himself, in large part determines what he will attempt to achieve and the degree of his success, say child specialists Louise Bates Ames, Ph.D., of the Gesell Institute of Child Development in New Haven, Connecticut, and Joan Ames Chase, Ph.D., from Children's Mental Health Center, Columbus, Ohio.

Self-esteem is based chiefly on two concepts: "I am lovable" and "I am worthwhile." You can help promote these ideas if you realize that how you treat your children has a greater influence on their feelings of self-acceptance than what you say to them.

One way to insure failure and self-depreciation is to expect too much. Make only reasonable demands on your children, demands they can fulfill—and try to see that away from home, at school, for example, only reasonable demands are placed on them. How much you require of a child depends on his age and his personality. The more you know what to expect of a child of a particular age and the more you know your own child, the better job you can do making reasonable demands of the child or in en-

couraging the child to make reasonable demands of himself.

What to do if he fails . . . It's your job, and a difficult one, to help your child handle failure. Here are some general rules on what not to do:

Don't reason with your child to show him that he shouldn't be disappointed at his failure.

Don't put him off with clichés, such as "Everything's for the best."

Don't point out to him how you would have acted differently.

Don't try to improve his personality by telling him how he should have behaved.

Don't minimize the situation, as if his failure really didn't matter.

Don't immediately try to cheer him up. Give him a chance to express his disappointment and sorrow.

If you want your children to grow up to be successful and have a happy adult life, your example may have as much affect as your admonition. Start by setting reasonable goals for yourself, your spouse and your children, and remember, that praise is a necessary ingredient of success and self-affirmation.
